Speaker will be Dave Stanley, step-brother of Elvis Presley. Saturday night will feature "Election Singers" and "Vision" in a Christian concert.

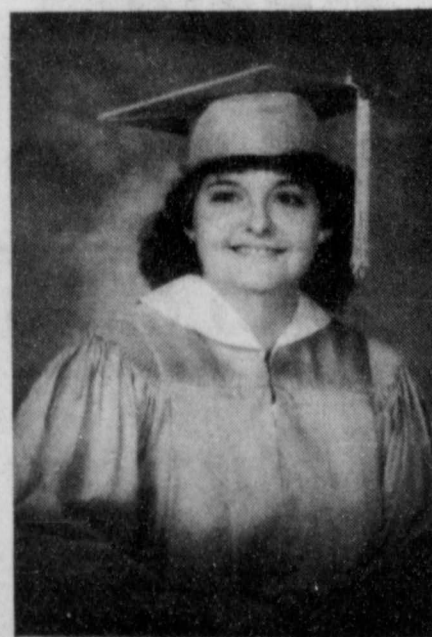
Local Student Wins Scholarship

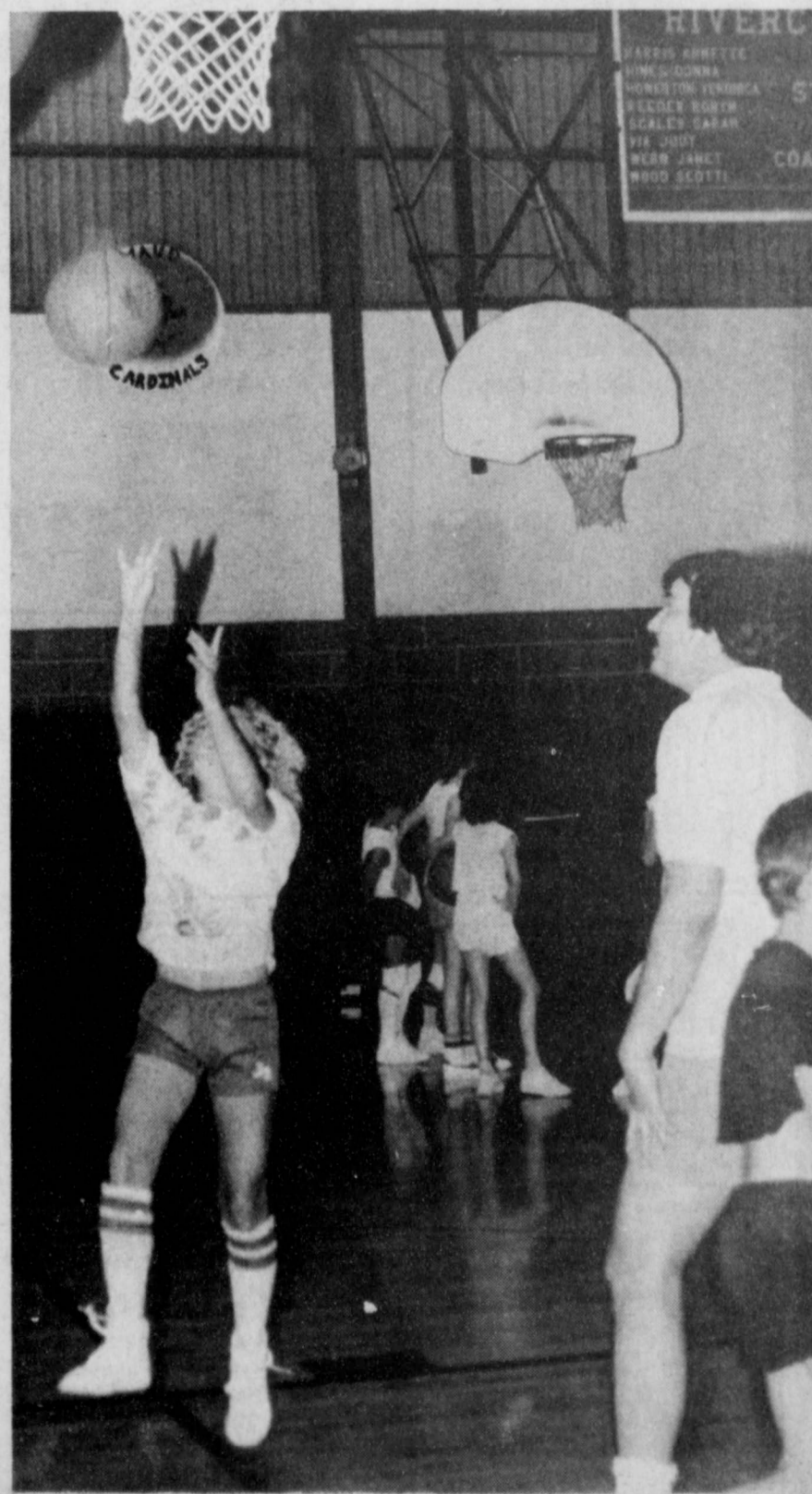

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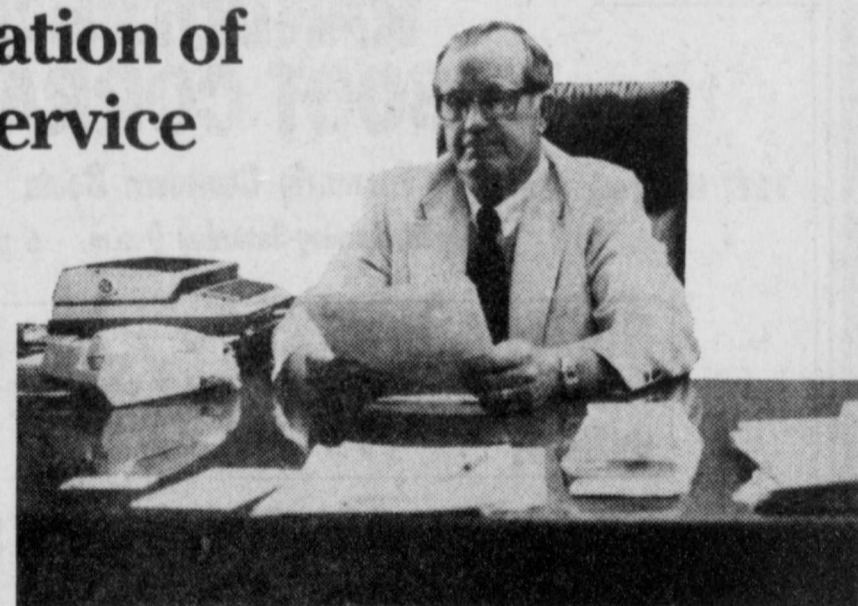

Don't Forget The Birds

By Charles VanDeaver

Don't forget wildlife when harvesting wheat and oats. Quail, pheasant, mourning dove, turkey and other birds find food and cover in fields of small grains.

Strips of unharvested grain around field edges near brush or tall grasses provide excellent food for quail and turkey. Pheasant will use unharvested strips along terraces and around areas in the field that are too wet to cultivate. Mourning dove will feed on shatter seed where soils are shallow and the stand of grain is thin.

Farmers in the east and northeast part of Red River County should be especially careful to elave grain for pheasant and turkey. These birds have been stocked and are being established in that area. About 400 young pheasants were released last summer. Another release is being planned this year. Their success will depend largely on farmers and ranchers and their management of cropland.

Even if the entire field is combined, these same areas can be left untilled until next planting season to benefit wildlife. Without tillage, waste

grain is available to the birds and an 8-inch stubble provides suitable cover until it deteriorates.

If an area in the field has a thin stand of wheat and a good stand of native sunflowers, save this area for dove hunting next September.

Do not burn the small grain stubble. Wildlife benefits are lost as well as organic matter; it also exposes the soil to erosion. The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District and U.S. Soil Conservation Service encourages soil protection through proper use of small grain residues.

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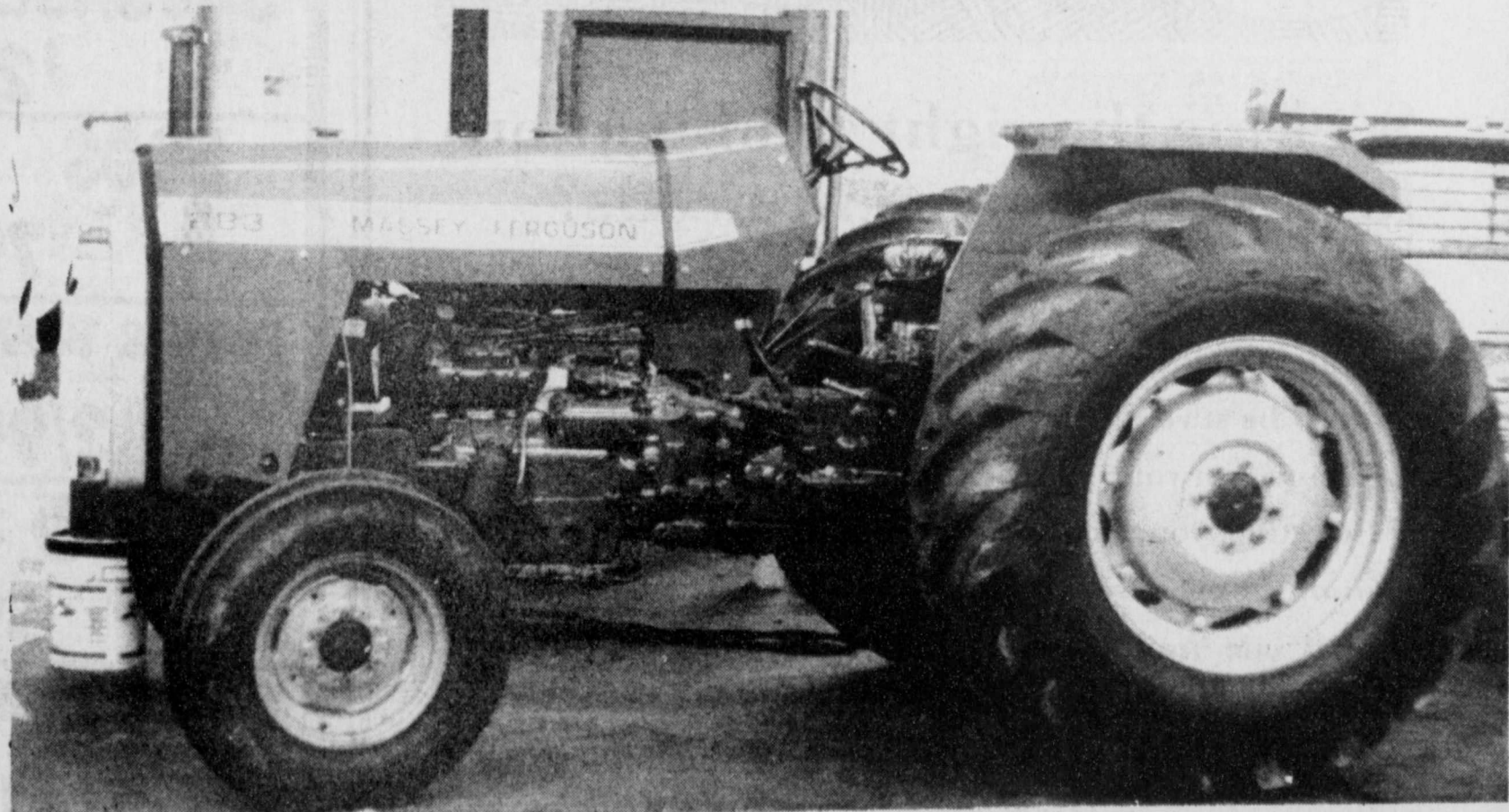
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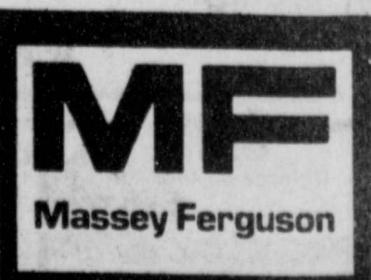

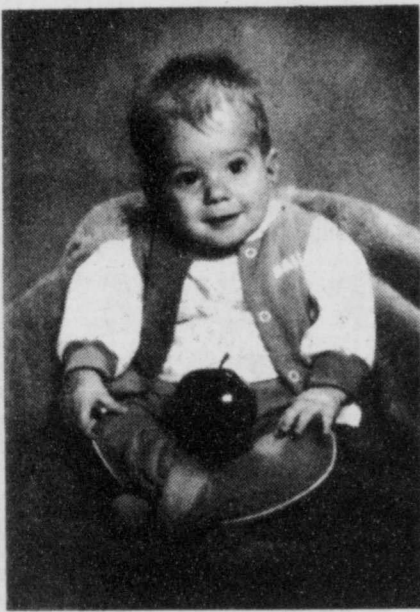
tions Commission. Businesses with multiline telephone service have been paying \$6.00 per month subscriber line charges since May 25, 1984.

If the insecticide impregnated ear tags failed to control the flies on your cattle last year, forget about using them this year. That is the advice of livestock entomologists.

On the other hand, if you are one of the many area beef and dairy producers who got good fly control from the ear tags last year, then continue to use them. Fly control from the ear tags more than likely will not be as good as it was a couple of years ago, but may be worth the gamble.

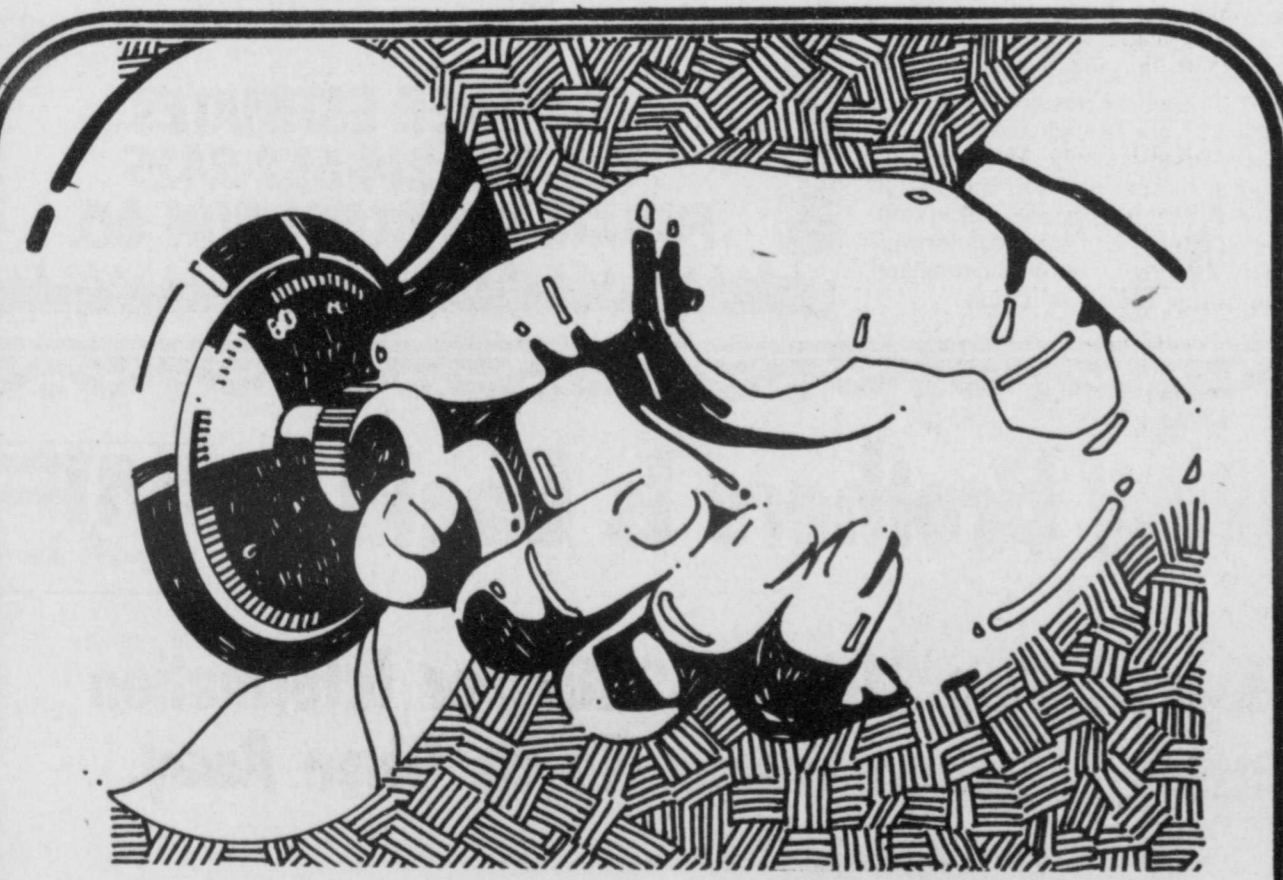
All of the ear tags that are on the market have the same family of insecticides in the tag. Therefore, if cattle have built up resistance to X-Brand of tags, they will also be resistant to Z-brand of tag. Changing brands will do no good.

Research scientist have gone back to their laboratories to develop a new group of insecticides to use in the ear tags, but it takes time, a lot of money and piles of red tape before one can be available. We hope it is soon.

In the meantime, producers should go back to the old remedies, sprays, dusts, rub-ons, dips, etc. Most of the methods will do a good job but frequent application of materials is a must. Dust bags should be located so that animals use them daily. If you have a successful way to control the flies, let me know and I will share it with everyone.

Pecan Nut Casebearers Are Active

Pecan nut casebearers are becoming active in East Texas, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist. Some producers are spraying for the insect this week in the Tyler area.

Populations of the pecan nut casebearer are spotted. In some orchards, the insect is still in the egg stage while larvae are becoming active in toehrs. As a result, individual producers must determine the stage of the life cycle in their particular orchard. It usually takes about three or four days from the time the eggs are laid until the larvae are hatched and become active.

In the Texarkana area, Robinson says it looks like the time to spray will be about the week of May 26 through 31. However, it could be slightly later. Producers must inspect their orchards frequently to determine the exact time to spray.

Zolone and malathion are approved for pecan nut casebearer control. Other insecticides are also available for commercial producers. A sprayer which can develop 200 to 300 pounds of pressure is required for adequate control. The entire tree must be sprayed. However, homeowners with one or two trees may not be able to spray the entire tree, especially larger ones. In these instances, they should spray as high as possible on the tree.

Robinson also says that ticks are becoming active in many areas. Persons should take precautions themselves when walking in tall grass or in the woods. Many people are picking wild blackberries and this is an ideal time and place to get an infestation of both ticks and chiggers. Dursban, diazinon, malathion and sevin are all approved for tick control.

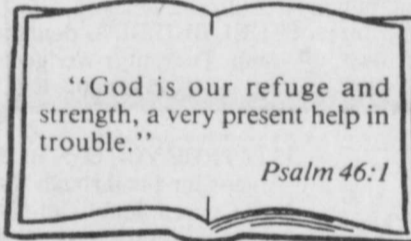
