

Local Sales Tax Show Upward Trend

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$58.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Houston received the largest check, \$10.3 million, to push 1985 payments to \$76.6 million, up five percent from last year. Locally, Talco received \$1,773.39

this period, making the 1985 payments to date a total of \$11,250.68, for a 10.11 percent decrease from the 1984 payments. Bogata received a check for

\$1,237.09 for this period, compared to a payment of \$1,336.77 last year, marking a 5.48% increase. Blossom received a check for \$789.01, comparable to \$1,021.59 for

the 1984 payment for the same period, marking a 10.18 percent increase in total payments for 1985. Deport received no payment for

this period, with the 1985 payments totaling \$4,956.41, for a 14.87 percent increase over 1984.

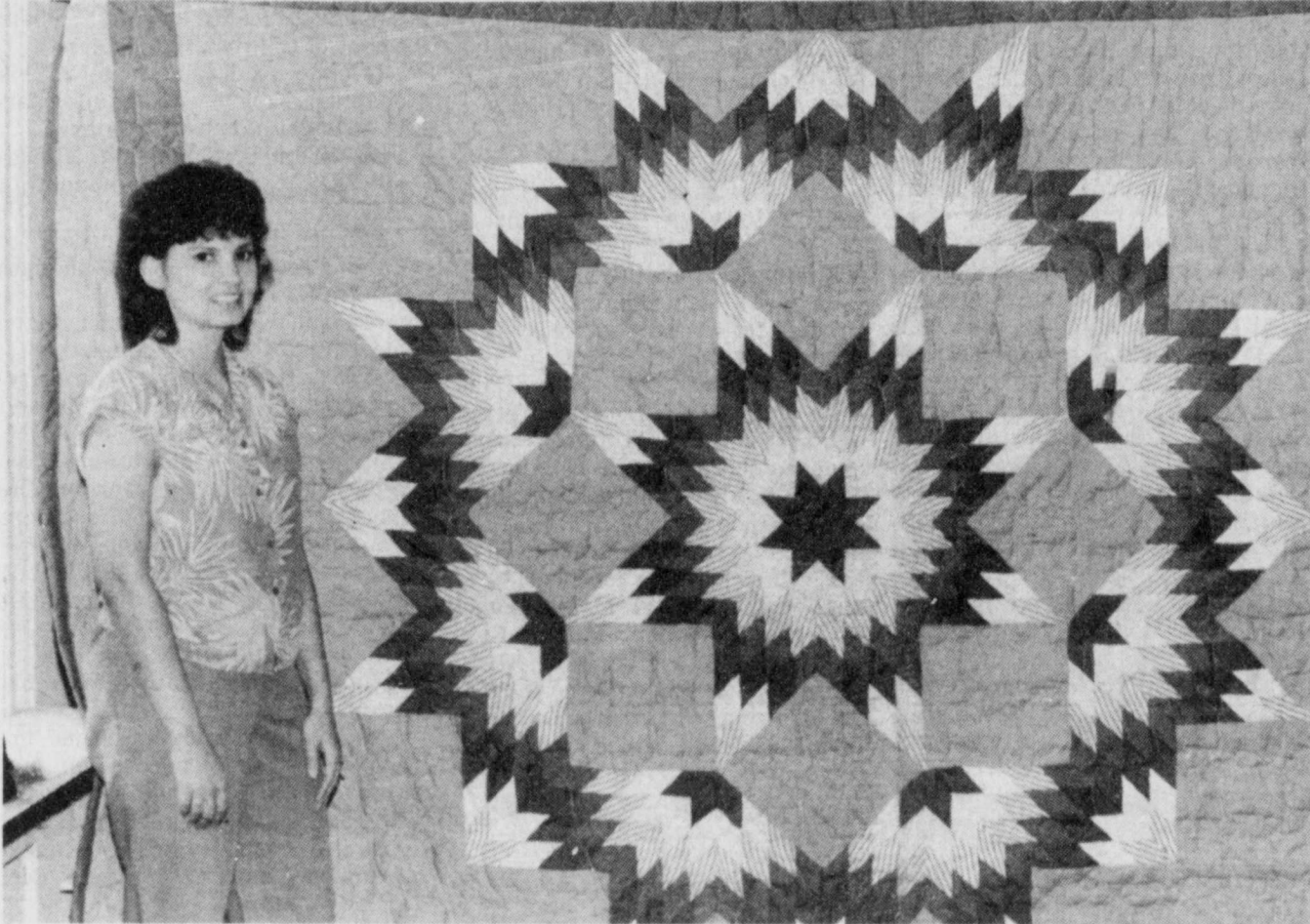

Bogata Rodeo Gearing Up!

Rodeo action will begin in Bogata June 27-28-29, for the annual Bogata Rodeo Association C.R.R.A. approved rodeo. The yearly event hosts top cowboys and cowgirls from a seven state area encompassed by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, which is headquartered in Tulsa, OK.

Championship rodeo action will be presented in six championship events, including bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding and cowgirls barrel racing. Many champions, runner-ups and title threats will be listed on the entry list at the Bogata rodeo.

This year Frontier Days will be held again in conjunction with the rodeo, beginning Saturday morning, June 29 at 7:30 with a free pancake breakfast in downtown Bogata. Many other activities are scheduled to bring the day-long festivities to a conclusion with the final performance of the rodeo.

The rodeo is produced and directed by the Wing Ranch Rodeo Company, a home-based operation, owned by Jerald and Joan Smith located in the Pine Branch area. The Wing Ranch Rodeo Company was again named in 1984 as Producer of the Year in the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, as well as receiving awards for its bucking bulls and horses, from balloting within the membership of the C.R.R.A.

Equine celebrities that will be on hand for the Bogata rodeo include AL "First Chance", Bucking Horse of the Year for 1984; "Strawberry Hill" Saddle Bronc of the Year for 1984; along with "Whiz Bang" the 1983 Bareback

Horse of the Year. The Wing Ranch Rodeo Company produces some 100 rodeos throughout a four state area during the regular rodeo season of the year and brings the cream of the crop to it's home rodeo.

Athletes competing for championship honors this year will be Richard McCallum of Grand Saline, TX, who currently leads the race for the bull riding championship for 1985; Kenneth Prater of Checotah, OK who leads the Steer Wrestling race for the title and Karen Henderson of Cypress, TX who leads the barrel racers for the distaff crown in the barrel racing event.

The Bogata Rodeo Association has also added a special attraction to the rodeo this year, the superb trick riding talents of Bonnie Williams will be demonstrated each performance of the rodeo, along with Ronny and Donny Sparks, the bullfighting twins from Texarkana, TX.

As usual, there will be something for everyone at the Bogata Rodeo, and it will be sure to be a most entertaining evening for the whole family.

Rodeo performances will be held at the Bogata Rodeo Arena each evening and will be kicked off with a downtown parade.

Cairo, A City Of Contrasts

Cairo, a city of 14 million people that is filled with one of the greatest contrasts between modern and old ever seen.

We began our tour of the ancient city almost stunned by the variety of traffic.

Mixed in with buses, trucks, thousands of tiny autos and motorcycles were bicycles, camels and donkey carts!

No one who drives in Cairo recognizes a white dividing line, a stop sign if they can help, or the right of way of anyone other than themselves!

Pedestrians have no fears about dashing across four lanes of traffic in front on onrushing buses...even though so many people have been hurt that the government is imposing a huge fine for jaywalking.

Motorists simply honk their horns in warning, and it's up to the pedestrian to leap out of the way...they won't slow down.

Huge apartment buildings house thousands of Egyptians, clad in the traditional long robe-like galabia for men, or the cumbersome black garments, complete with head coverings, for the women.

On a tenth story balcony children can be seen feeding the family milk goat!

Crowds are unbelievable, it is a city short of space and long on people. Mixed throughout the whole are beautiful parks and gardens, some wonderful museums, and some very lovely hotels.

The bazaars are twisting lanes of tiny shops specializing in gold, silver or fine works. The prices are cheap, if one haggles with all their might.

To buy an item at the first price asked is to insult an Egyptian. He is disappointed, his fun has been taken away, and you have paid too much.

By the time the trip was over I felt a failure if I had to pay more than fifty percent of the original asking price to secure what I wanted.

Indeed, bargaining had become so natural that it was hard when at the store not to reply \$8 to the checkers \$25!

Egyptians are perhaps the friendliest, most gentle natured people in the world.

They will smile broad smiles and say, over and over "Welcome" to any and all visitors.

Never did we feel any hostility or irritation on the part of the Egyptians, even when they had been rebuffed in their sales attempts.

And sales attempts they will make. On the streets or at the pyramids, hoards of young boys and men will have necklaces, burnouses, carvings, a bewildering variety of goods, all for sales...as they say...."cheap, not much money".

In Cairo in particular almost everyone spoke a certain amount of English.

Everywhere are the military police. It takes a little while to get used to the sight of soldiers with machine guns on the corners. But, as any Egyptian will tell you, they have "crazy neighbors" on both sides, and have learned through tragedy the price for a relaxed guard.

Cairo is dirty...but how can a city be clean without rain to wash down the buildings?

It is dust and grime, not nasty filth. Mixed in with the new buildings are old Mosques, the churches of the Moslems, minarets from which the Moslem call to prayer is sounded five times a day, ancient cemeteries, looking much like small villages of houses, and shops that seem to have come straight from a tale of the Arabian nights.

Through it all winds the Nile, the everpresent, ever important source of life for all of Egypt.

From Cairo we flew to Aswan, to catch our ship down the Nile, and at Aswan we experienced perhaps one of the most fascinating events of our trip. It's a long summer, so stand by and you can all hear more about the entire trip in the next few weeks!

Justine Ford Retires From Teaching

When Justine Ford joined the Dallas Independent School District as a third grade teacher in January, 1944, the district didn't hire married teachers.

A lot has changed since then in the Dallas schools but not much about Justine Ford has. There are a few new wrinkles and her hair is salt and pepper gray, but she's still small and slender. The day we met, she was wearing a straight white skirt, a white blouse with a big lace collar, a narrow red belt and red shoes with 4-inch spike heels. She's also never married, not because she hasn't been asked but because the right man hasn't done the asking.

Something else that hasn't changed is Ford's attitude and approach toward teaching. "I very much believe in the three R's," said the third grade teacher at Martha Turner Reilly Elementary School near Jupiter and Garland roads in northeast Dallas, "and I love the children. Third graders today may be more mature than they were when I started teaching in my home town of Bogata near Mt. Pleasant, but basically they're still the same. Children are children anywhere."

According to Reilly principal Robert Vermillion, Ford's teaching method hasn't altered over the years. "They don't make them like her anymore," he said. "She's consistent, a firm disciplinarian and has a reputation for being a very thorough teacher. There are no gaps with her students. They master all the skills and their developmental skills stand out. And she can never be accused of having a teacher's pet. If I could bottle and sell her, I'd be a millionaire."

However, after 48 years in the classroom, Justine Ford is packing her pencil box and retiring to full-time recess when school lets out Thursday. She never wanted to be anything but an elementary school teacher and her goal growing up in Bogata, she said, was to teach in the Dallas schools.

After graduating from East Texas State University in three years, the postmaster's daughter taught second grade at Bogata for seven years before applying to DISD. She reported to Lagow Elementary on Second Avenue the day after New Year's Day, 1944, and remained there as a third grade teacher until Reilly opened in 1954. She's taught reading,

writing and arithmetic to third graders 28 of her 31 years at Reilly. The other three were spent with fourth graders.

She loves third grade, she explained, because it's the year children master the three R's. "They're not babies anymore and they're becoming more independent. It's also a good age for habits to be formed."

Ford noted that parents who grumble about too many students in the classroom today should have been around when she entered teaching. "My first year at Bogata in 1937, I had 41 second graders," she said. "At Lagow, I had 35 to 40 each year. This year I have 25 at Reilly."

While she's going to miss the challenge of a new group of students next August, Ford already has plans to get her through any regrets she might have about calling it quits two years before mandatory retirement.

"I'm going to take a fall foliage tour through the East," she said. "I could never do that before."
