

Huffman Reports On Hungry In Africa

Just about a year ago, Wayne Huffman was the subject of a feature article in this paper. Since that time, once again, Wayne's life has changed, although his main goal, spreading the gospel, has remained as firm and fixed as a compass on the north.

Wayne has just returned from five weeks in Zimbabwe, Africa, where he has helped to conduct evangelical programs in cities, and taken food to starving children in refugee camps.

Along the path to those destinations, he has had an elephant charge the

boat, and nearly been tipped over by a hippo. He has eaten with natives, given clothes to the ragged, and seen the terrible deprivations disease makes upon the hungry.

All this was a part of his efforts with a group from Jimmy Swaggart ministries.

Wayne is a gospel singer, but his need to help others led him to join this group, knowing full well that they were going into a Communist country.

"The Communists just don't care about you," he says sadly, "They

don't care who starves, or who lives. They hate Americans, but don't mind if we feed the starving...I think they believe we're fools for feeding them."

In the cities the group sang, spoke and generally brought the word of God to groups each night for fifteen nights.

In the camps, they distributed food and clothing to people who have bloated stomachs and hopeless looks. Americans have become so familiar with through the news media.

"It really makes you appreciate being American," Huffman continues,

"Even the very poorest of Americans have so much more than these people can even imagine."

In a government such as that of Zimbabwe, one hasn't the freedom to criticize the government or politics...they simply take the offender out and shoot him!

At one village, the group sat on the packed cow manure floor for a meal. They were honored with the very best that the village could offer...rice with bugs in it and a chicken. Chicken is a rare treat for the villagers, and they

waste none of it...cooking it whole, without removing insides, head or feet.

"I said, 'God, I'll get it down if you'll keep it there' ", Wayne Grins wryly. "You simply cannot offend such gentle, well-meaning people."

In spite of long hours, bugs, lost luggage and many other hardships, the group managed sightseeing through game preserves, and several days to see London, England, a highlight of the trip.

With typical, simple determination,

Wayne states that he wants to go back next summer. His fiancée, who was also on the trip, and is majoring in Missions, plans to go back too.

In fact, there is the possibility that Wayne will spend his life dedicated to mission work...still doing what he loves to do best, singing, but mixing it with lots of other hard work.

One Arrested, One Sought In Attack

One man is being held and another is wanted for the beating and sexual assault of a 13-year old girl. The incident occurred on June 27, during rodeo weekend in Bogata.

Two local people reported to Bogata City Marshall Ted Byndas that they found the girl wandering on Highway 271, west of town. She was suffering from an eye injury and numerous cuts and bruises.

Byndas reported that he took the girl to Red River General Hospital for treatment.

The child told officers, according to Red River County Sheriff's Deputy John Penny and Marshall Byndas, that the two men, whom she knew, offered her a ride home after the rodeo, but took her to an isolated spot where they assaulted and beat her before ordering her out of the vehicle on the highway.

One of the suspects is now being held in lieu of \$50,000 bond, and charged with aggravated sexual abuse, while a warrant is out for the other suspect.

Two Injured In Ultra-Light Crash

Jackie Dodd is recovering from injuries sustained in an ultra-light plane crash last Friday evening in Cuthand. He is currently in Methodist

Hospital in Dallas but is expected to be released soon. Norris Ray Woodall was also injured in the accident and is in a Paris hospital.

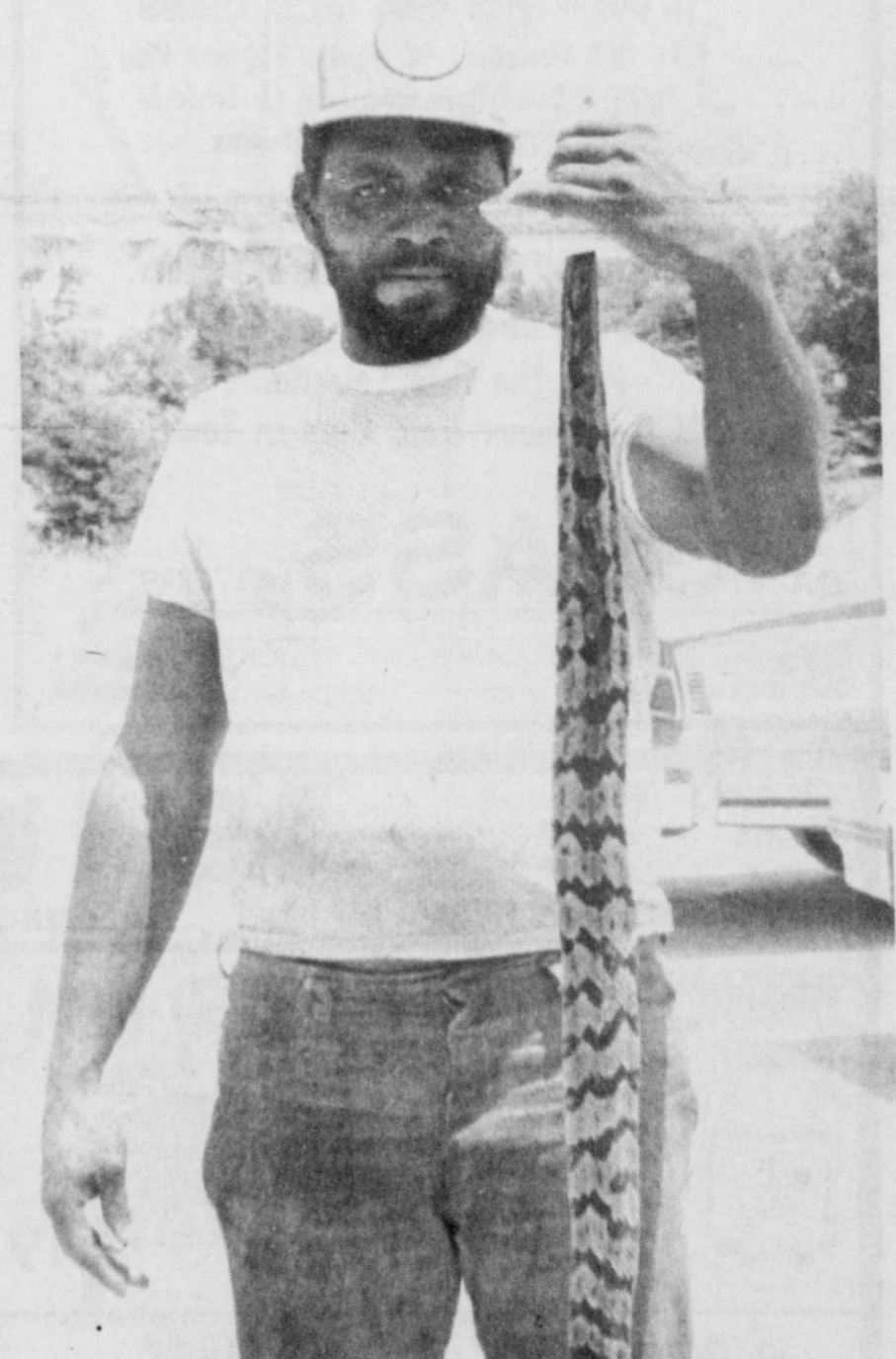

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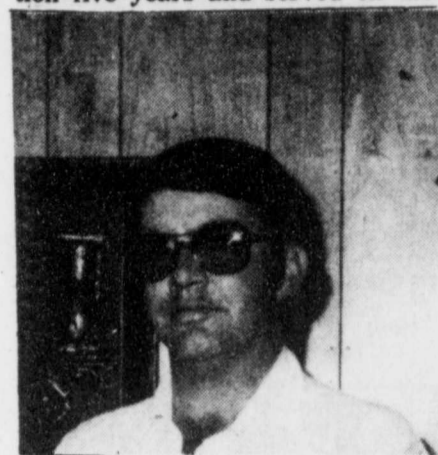
Rev. Barnett To Deliver Farewell Message

Rev. Terry Barnett

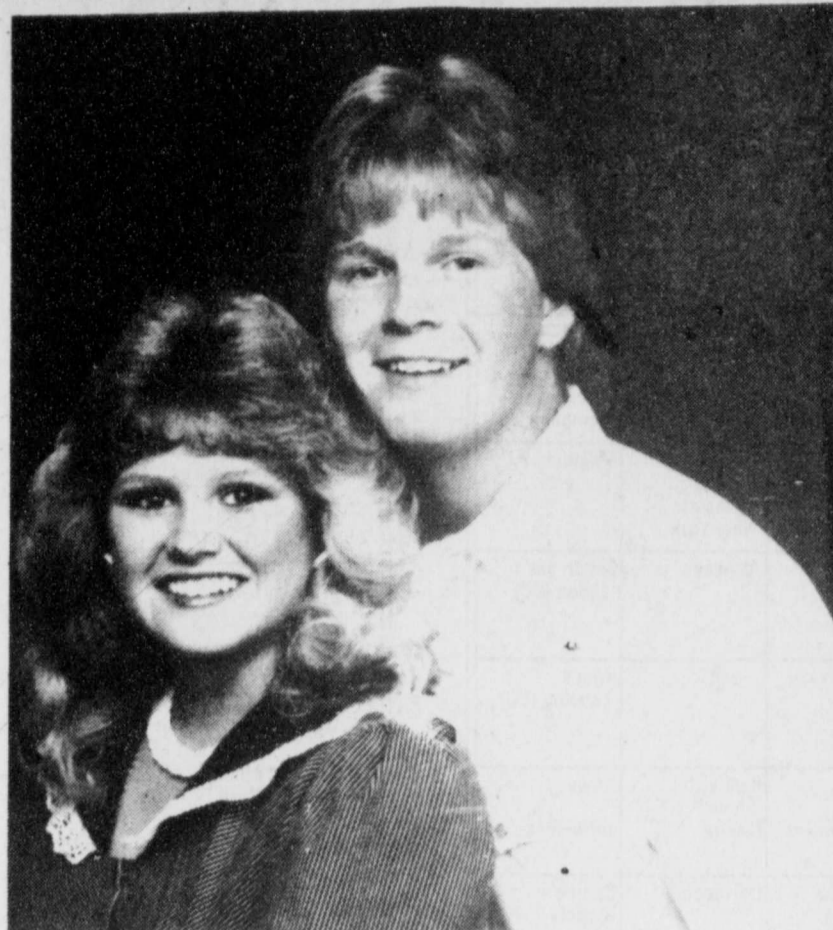
enrollment committee for the state association for three years and was on the advisory council for the state WMA.

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

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Narrow Streets And Fishing Dogs!

Esna, Egypt, a tiny city honeycombed with narrow alleys and twisting streets, topped by the ever-present minarets of the Islamic mosques.

We walked from our Nile cruiser down those narrow streets which merchants called and followed us, trying, as always, to strike a bargain on their goods.

As we walked down the tiny streets, children mounted on carts pulled by donkeys, would call out in Arabic for us to move over, and women peered from behind latticed shutters at what must seem strange and unseemly women, us.

At the temple of Esna, we descended steep stairs to the court yard, finding it filled with the ever-present Egyptian stray dogs.

These dogs don't look fat, but they aren't actually starving either. They scavenge for food and scraps, plus another neat little trick.....they fish.

One can see the dogs out in the waters of the river, sitting on their haunches perfectly motionless. Their eyes are intently on the water, their tongues hanging out in anticipation. Suddenly they dart their head down, coming up with a small, wriggling fish. A toss of the head and down

the fish goes!

This is a fact, not a tale told to us, so believe it (some people look at me like I'm fibbing.)

One dear British lady always felt sorry for the dogs, so she would get up early in the morning and go to the boat's kitchen and get scraps from the maitre'd. Then, armed with those and often carrot sticks for the carriage horses, she would take her tours, stopping to do her part to make life for the animals a little better.

At Esna, we saw the gravel pits dug around the foundations of the temples

The interior of the temple has many rooms, and in some of them the walls are completely covered with hieroglyphics. These ancient writings are the formulas for incense, perfumes, wines, beers, embalming, a vast storehouse of knowledge that provides a look into ancient Egyptian life that few cultures can provide.

On our walk back through the town we had time to buy a few things, bartering in our by now experienced manner.

The galabias, in various colors, were a favorite item among the ladies. We all purchased the loose, flowing robes to wear both at home and while on the trip, finding the fine

cotton and loose design perfect for the hot weather.

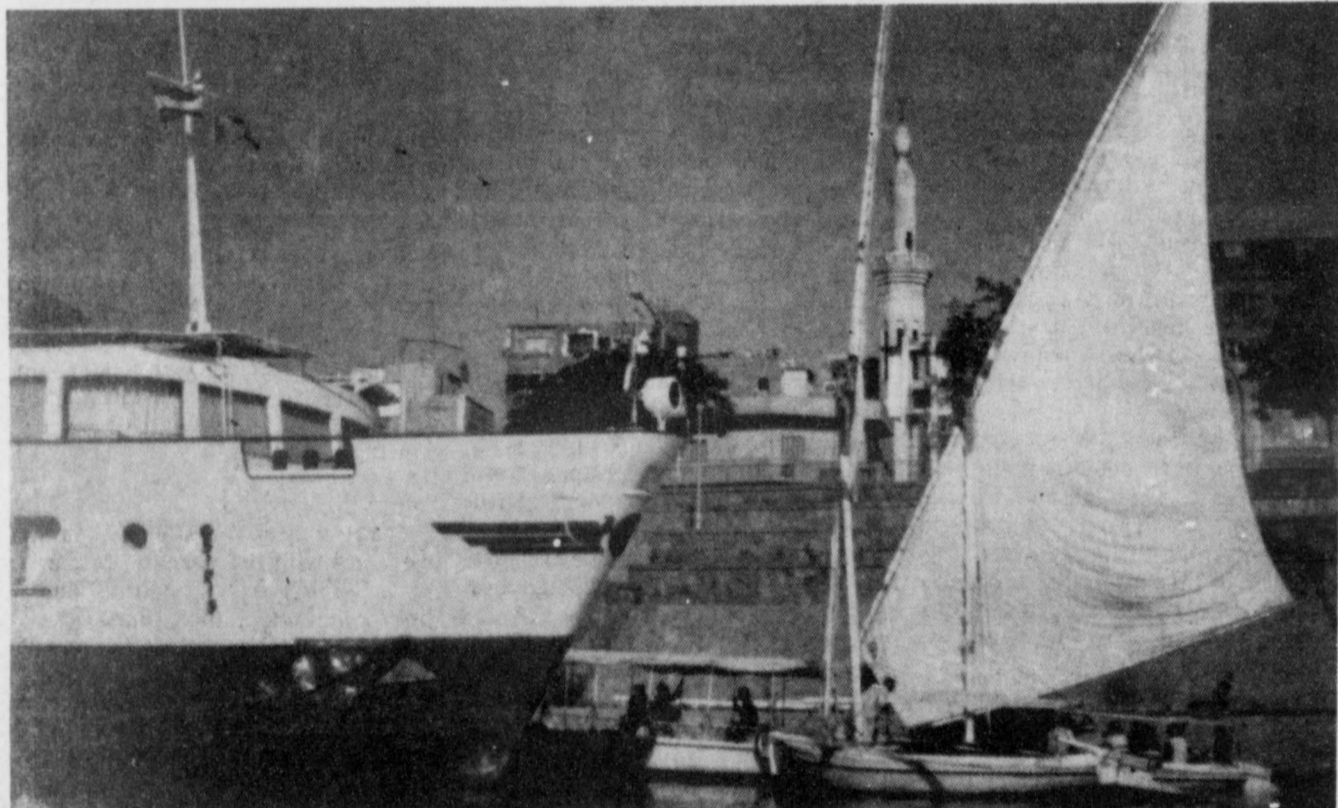
One small item had to be attended to, though. In an Egyptian's galabia, there is always a "thieves pocket" or magic pocket. On the other side there is a normal pocket, but the thieves pocket is merely a slit in the side seam. It will be on one side or the other, and is there not only to provide ventilation, but so that pickpockets take a chance on finding not a wallet, but the bare side of the robe's wearer! Obviously, pickpocketing is not a very flourishing industry in Egypt.

Every variety of good is available in the markets. Robes, shirts, sandals, flutes and musical instruments, vases and pottery, all for sale in tiny shops barely big enough for the proprietor and one or two customers.

The local laundrymen can be seen, sitting on the ground and drepelling their huge flat irons back and forth over fabric with their feet!

We didn't see the snake charmer the day we were there, but were told that often he was to be found, sitting on a mat with his basketful of cobras, ready to make them dance for anyone willing to drop a few piastras in his bowl.

Esna provided yet another look into the daily lives of the common

The first thing visible in the front yard at Sonny and Juanita Davis' house is a low down, 1934 Ford pickup. It isn't hard to spot, because it's painted the brightest, glossiest orange-red imaginable!

The vehicle looks like it had just rolled off an assembly line, and is Sonny's pride and joy.

The vehicle recently won the Nostalgia Award at the Lone Star Street Rod Association meet at Fort Fisher in Waco. There were 480 cars in competition there, and Sonny's won because it was built in the old style of "hot" rods, with no power assists, fancy upholstery or any of the more modern traits.

Street rods, according to Sonny, aren't quite the same as the older "hot rods". Although they have big engines, they are strictly for show, not for racing.

The little vehicle was featured in Rod Action Magazine in January of this year.

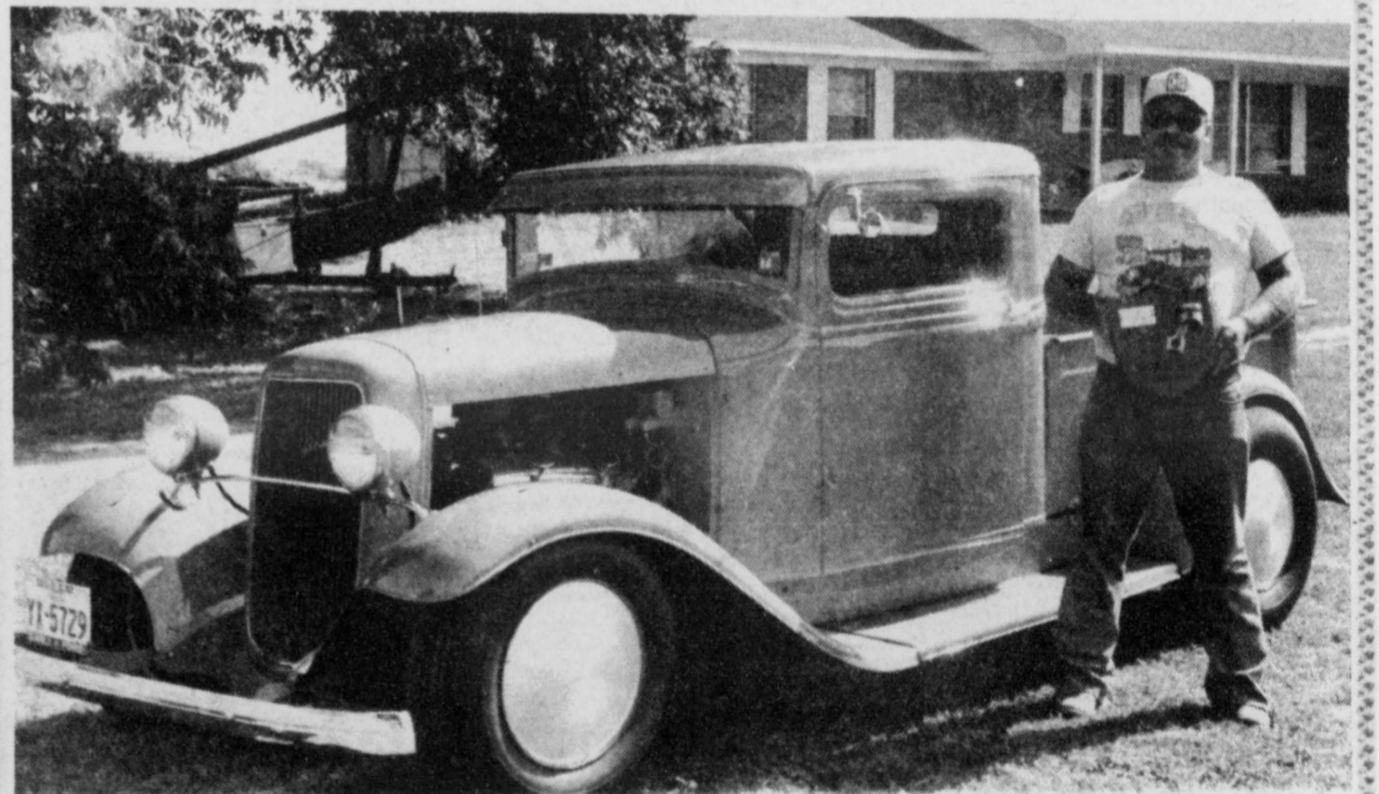
How fast will the street rod go? Sonny smiles and says easily "Oh, well, fifty-five is sufficient".

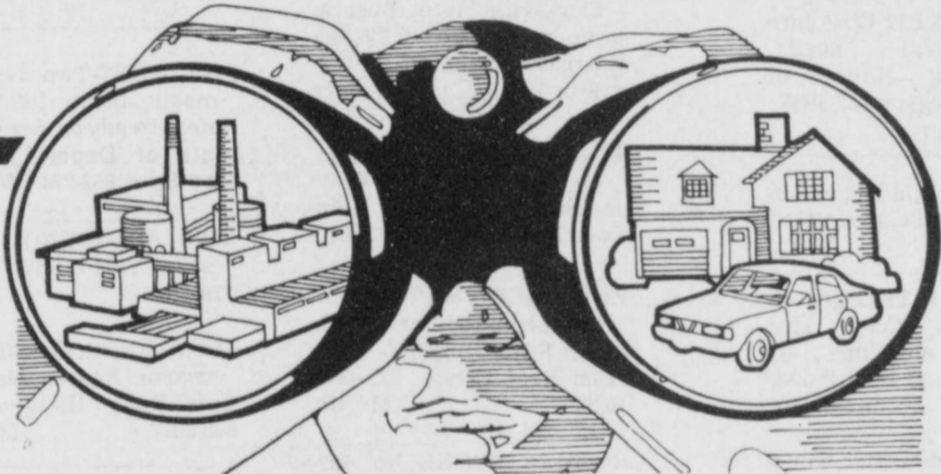

Crunchy Peanut Butter Cookies

- 3/4 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 cups Bisquick baking mix
- 1/2 cup chopped peanuts
