

Wing Rodeo Flies High In "Dallas" Episode

During the week of July 29 through August 2, a part of the Wing Rodeo Company of Bogata, TX was doing something a little bit different from their average day, they were helping film a television episode for "Dallas" to be seen during the new fall season. A truckload of bulls and horses left Bogata on Monday, July 28, and were transported to South Fork Ranch in

Dallas where they were housed in portable pens, which had been set up for the special filming.

During the week's activities at South Fork, Wing Rodeo Company's bulls and horses were ridden by several "doubles", who were riding for the show character of Ray Krebs, portrayed by Steve Kanaly, the ranch-hand turned new found

member of the infamous Ewing family. Riding bulls in the episode will be Richard McCallum of Grand Saline, TX and riding bareback horses was Steve Hall of Bonham, TX. Rodeo judges who were shown in the episode include Kent Hall of Bonham, TX.

Barrel racing was also a part of the episode, where doubles rode for Priscilla Presley, who portrays Jen-

na Wade in the serial. When the double for Ms. Presley completed her ride, Ms. Presley then rode the horse herself around the barrels. It was reported that she did a very good job in handling her mount.

All cast members including Larry Hagman, who plays the evil and overbearing "J.R." were on location during the filming.

Bull riding, bareback riding, steer wrestling and girls barrel racing were included in the activities for the episode, which will be aired November 15.

The Wing Rodeo Company has previously been involved in movie making and stock has been featured in films such as "Urban Cowboy" starring John Travolta, along with

"Stir Crazy" starring Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor. "Dallas" was the first television appearance for the Wing Rodeo Company.

The filming lasted four days for this particular segment of the episode, and everyone reported that it was a hard day's work everyday, but very exciting, and yes, they would all do it again.

There is also an almost palpable feeling of anticipation as customer after customer proceeds to his box and digs out the daily accumulation of postal deliveries.

The majority of people aren't able to leave the lobby without looking through their mail!

They stand, often with one hand still lingering on the key in the lock of the box, sorting through the various circulars, magazines and bills.

There is a system to this sorting, too. Bills, usually accompanied by a resigned sigh, are consigned to one slot between the fingers.

Advertising or sale papers are relegated to another.

Magazines are tucked under one arm. Personal letters, the highlight of mail call, are looked at immediately.

Some people seem to heighten their anticipation by holding an envelope to the light before tearing it open.

There are those, of course, who are more organized. They go across the lobby and open their mail on the available table, carefully sorting through, discarding "junk" mail in the trash, and often reading their letters on the spot.

Still others manage to actually restrain their curiosity until they make it all the way to their automobile. Then they settle in for some serious mail sorting. Again, bills in one pile, discards or "to be read at leisure" in another, and personal letters to be opened and read on the spot.

Mail is a little like a daily Christmas. It is a routine, and a ritual...but one that instead of being the same, promises a touch of excitement daily.

There is the ever-present possibility of something new and exciting coming through the U.S. Postal Service, the contact with those who live far away, and, of course, we all might get a million dollars in the mail. I haven't given up hope for mine, yet, anyway!!

Judge Passes Arson Sentence

On August 9, District Judge Henry Braswell of Paris sentenced Jimmie Reed Smith, age 27, of Clarksville to 15 years in prison for arson of Western Cleaners on E. Broadway on August 18, 1984 and for burglary.

Braswell sentenced Curby Joe Peek, age 49, of the English area to 10 years in prison for aggravated sexual abuse of his 13 year old stepdaughter.

Braswell placed Gwendolyn Colbert of Dallas and Cynthia Avraham of Bogata on five years probation for welfare fraud and ordered them to pay restitution of \$3057.85.

Roy Lee Durham of Clarksville was placed on five years probation and fined \$1,000 for threatening the life of Highway Patrolman Jerry Conway.

Judge Braswell sentenced William Taylor to five years probation and a \$1,000 fine for theft of natural gas.

Braswell placed Barbara Tucker of Paris on two years probation for aggravated assault.

Judge Braswell heard the guilty plea of Jerry Roten to the September 18, 1980 arson of the Lovett Building on W. Main in Clarksville and deferred sentence until the completion of other criminal proceedings.

Pine Branch 4-H Elects Officers

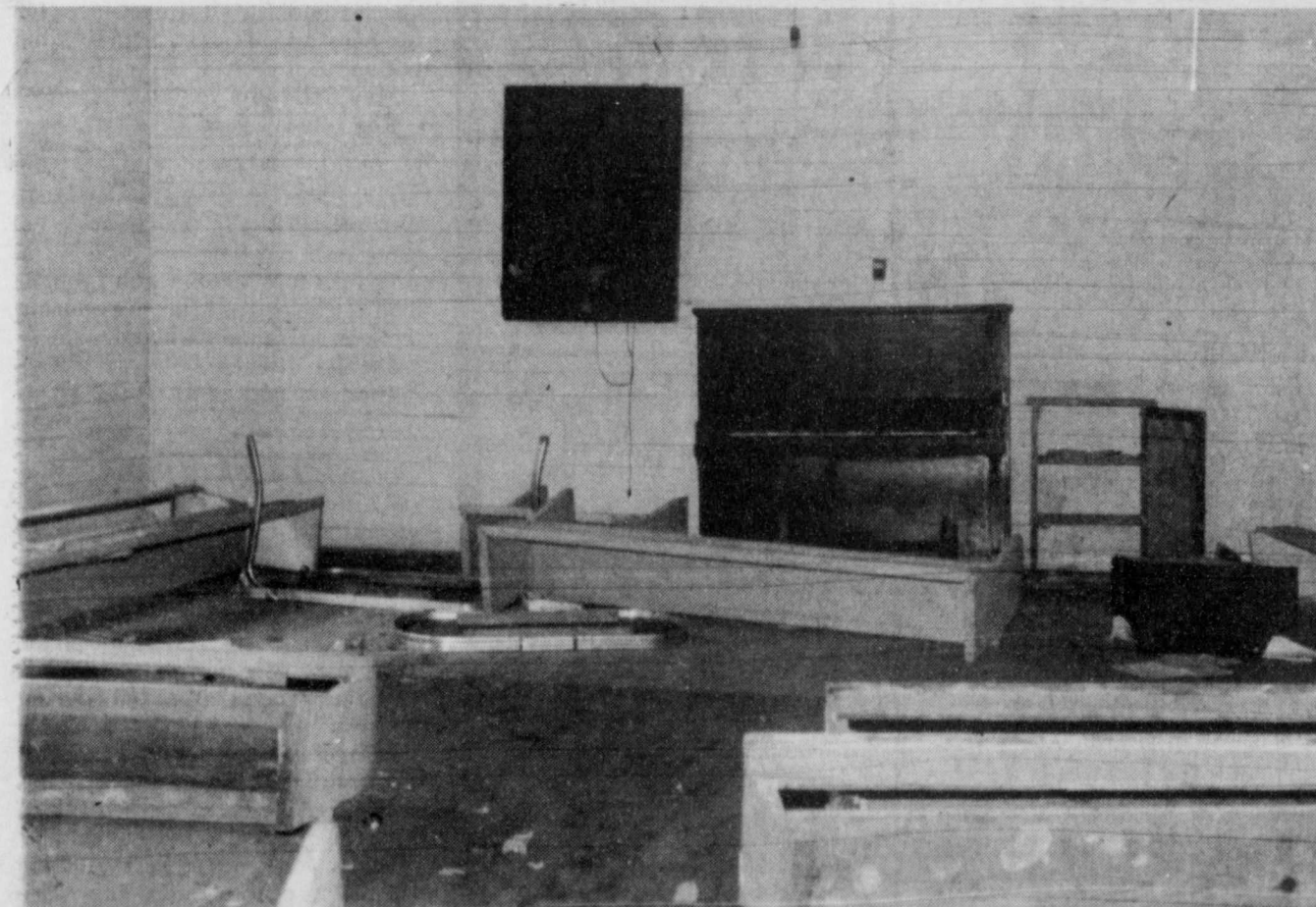
The Pine Branch 4-H Club met Monday night at the Bogata Community Center. Fifteen members and adults were in attendance.

Projects and activities were the main topics of discussion. The club members voted to participate in the stew cook-off September 14 at the County Fairgrounds in Clarksville.

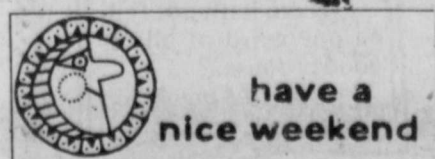

BAKED APPLE DELUXE

6 large baking apples

1/2 cup dark brown sugar, packed
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

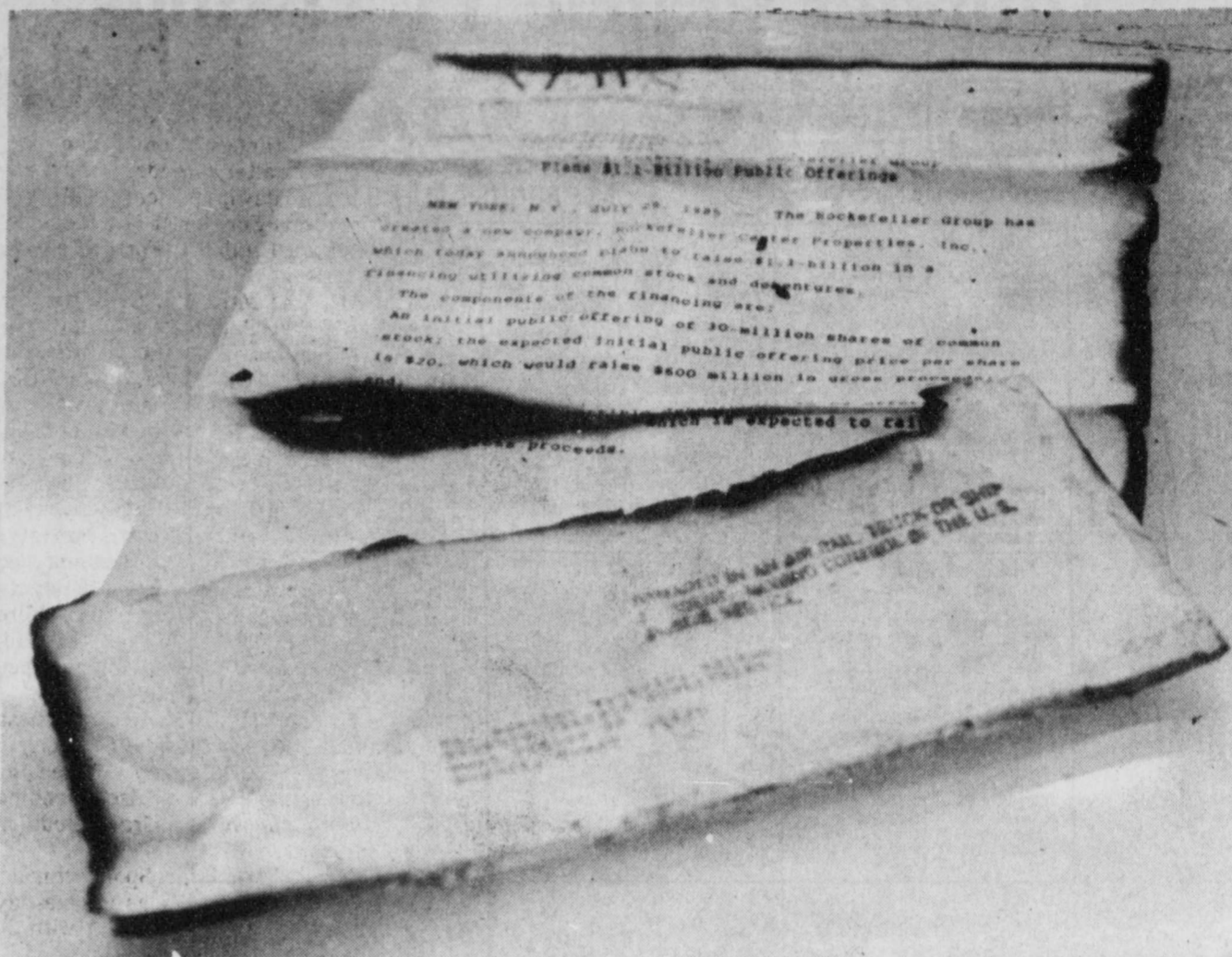

PJC Offers Clarksville Courses

As a convenience to Clarksville area students, Paris Junior College will teach evening courses in Clarksville this fall, said Jimmye Hancock, dean of instructional support services and continuing education at PJC.

Four general courses needed by any student beginning a college education will be taught from 6 to 9 p.m. in the Vocational Building of Clarksville High School. Do you spend money to soothe your ego? If you get depressed or angry, do you go out and buy something?

Is it difficult for you to resist buying on credit? Are you a snob buyer?

Do you have a tendency to buy worthless things? Do you have a lot of gadgets or trinkets you do not use?

If you had 50 percent "yeses" to the money management skill test, you definitely need help. With a 50 % score it is recommended you secure assistance on mastering money management techniques.

Hungarian Goulash

- 2 lbs. boneless beef chunks for stew
- 2 med. onions, chopped
- 1 tbsp. paprika
- 1 med. green pepper, sliced
- 1 med. tomato, diced
- 1 tbsp. tomato paste
- 1 1/2 cups water
- Up to 1 tsp. salt

Place beef on a rack in a broiler pan and broil lightly until meat loses its red color. Turn frequently to prevent overcooking. Spray a large covered frying pan with non-stick release agent. 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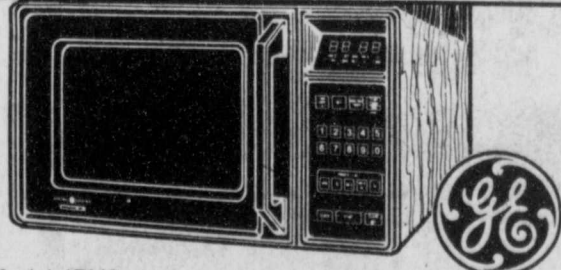
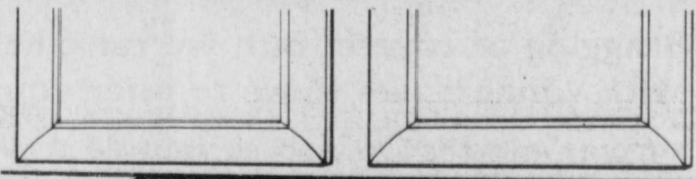

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Emergency Response Service Available

The Texas Department of Human Resources is making emergency response service available to qualified persons through the Hooker Communications Division of the

Hocom Corporation.

Emergency response service consists of a wireless device which is worn in and around the home by a person who has a high risk of having

an emergency. In such an emergency, the person wearing the device presses a button which activates computerized equipment that dispatches aid to the person. Response is tailored to the particular needs of each person.

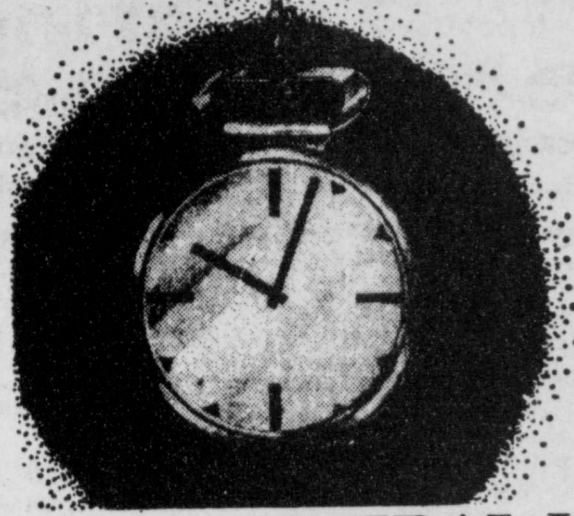
Emergency response service is an alternative to placing a person in a nursing home.

Hooker Communications now has nearly 100 individuals utilizing this service in the east Texas area, and near 300 individuals statewide who are department of human resources clients.

According to Wayne Hooker, president of Hocom, the company will have several thousand units of this type in service by the end of 1985. Hocom only recently became a high volume manufacturer of this type of equipment when they introduced the computerized central monitoring concept to human resources application. This innovative equipment differs from the "hospital based" monitoring systems in that it will allow persons in rural areas and even those with party lines to receive the service. The older hospital based equipment only served those persons living in the proximity of a hospital.



Chapman's Office Open

The congressional office of Congressman-elect Jim Chapman, D-Sulphur Springs, opened officially on Monday, August 5 at 10 a.m. following Saturday's special election in the First Congressional District.

First District local offices opened for the congressman-elect at the same time in Marshall, Paris, Jacksonville and Texarkana.

Chapman will remain congressman-elect until he is sworn in with an official ceremony in the House of Representatives. However, since Congress is in recess for the month of August, Chapman cannot be sworn in until Sept 4, according to Deputy House Clerk W. Raymond Colley.

Colley said the swearing-in ceremony, "likely" will be held that day when Congress returns, although he said arrangements will have to be made between Colley and the leadership of the House.

A spokesman for House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, D-Mass., also said Chapman would probably be sworn in soon after the House is back in session in September. She could not confirm that it would be Sept. 4.

Colley said a new congressman cannot be sworn in from a special election until the clerk's office receives a certificate from the Texas secretary of state's office giving the official election returns. He said there should be "no real problem" getting the certificate by the time the house is back in session.

The transition to the new office holder seemed to go quickly Monday, with the secretary answering the phone, "Office of Congressman-elect Jim Chapman."

Ken Black, former top aide to former Rep. Sam Hall, D-Marshall, said the staff of the office in Washington and the district offices would be working as usual for the district. He said the staff in the office would include most of the same personnel that worked for Hall.

He said Chapman talked to the clerk of the House Monday morning to get clearance to open the offices.

"So he (Chapman) really is in control" of the congressional offices, said Black.

The office for Hall closed officially when Hall was sworn in as U.S. district judge for the eastern district of Texas on May 28. The office then was controlled by Black, who was appointed as administrator for the office of the First Congressional District by the clerk's office. Black subsequently has become top aide to Rep. Floyd Spence, D-S.C.

THOUGHT FOR FOOD

No-Bake Pumpkin Pie

- 1 Keebler Ready-Crust Butter-Flavored pie crust
- 1 envelope (1 tsp) unflavored gelatin
- 1 tsp. cinnamon*
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. ginger*
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg*
- 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk (Not evaporated)
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 can (16 oz.) pumpkin

In medium saucepan, combine gelatin, spices and salt. Stir in sweetened condensed milk and eggs, mixing well. Let stand 1 minute. Cook and stir constantly over low heat until gelatin dissolves and mixture thickens slightly, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in pumpkin until well mixed. Pour into crust. Chill until set, about 3 hours. Garnish with whipped cream or topping sprinkled with cinnamon or nutmeg or as desired.
