

Rebels Suffer Loss To Mt. Vernon Tigers

The Rivercrest Rebels suffered a resounding loss 28-0 to the Mount Vernon Tigers Friday, Sept. 20 in Tiger Stadium.

Fielding freshman quarterback Jimmy Lewis, the Rebels could never muster a successful offense and took some hard hits from the heavier Tiger defense.

The Tigers took their first points in

the first quarter, when a Rebel fumble was recovered on the Rivercrest 18 yard line. Five plays later the Tigers scored.

The second Tiger score came with 27 seconds in the half, when a Tiger punt dropped on the three yard line, was touched by a Rebel, and was recovered in the end zone for the touchdown.

The Tigers scored again on their first drive in the third quarter, which began on their own 38 yard line. Nine plays later the Tigers were in the end zone again, but were unable to convert the extra point. Another scoring drive began in the third quarter on the Rivercrest 45 yard line. The extra point attempt was good. A 30 yard field goal in the

final seconds of the game brought the final score to 28-0.

A fumble recovered in the second quarter by Sammy Sparger led to the Rebel first down in the second quarter, highlighted by a seven yard effort by Clint Stephenson.

The Rebels crossed the down marker again in the third quarter, when Jerry Belcher plunged through

the Tiger line for an eight yard gain. The passing arm of Charley Martin was put into action late in the fourth quarter, and he connected twice with Chris Anderson, once for 11 yards and once for 33 yards.

The Rebels will play Karnack at Karnack at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 27.

NTCC Enrollment Larger Than Expected

Enrollment in college credit courses for the 1985 fall semester at Northeast Texas Community College totaled 1395 students, according to figures released this week by the Office of Admissions and Records.

"This far surpassed our projections and we are indeed grateful to the residents of our community college district comprised of Camp, Morris and Titus counties, for their tremendous support during this, our initial semester," commented NTCC President, Dr. Wayland DeWitt.

A breakdown of the final figures indicates NTCC enrolled 993 freshmen, 126 sophomores and 167 students above sophomore standing. Women outnumber men with 934 females enrolled compared to 461 males.

Sixty-four percent of the students are over 26 years of age with 888 numbered in this category. Two hundred eighty-seven students are between 20 and 25 years of age and 220 students are under 20 years of age.

Sixteen different counties and three states are represented in the student body with 45 percent of the enrollment living in Titus county, 23 percent in Morris county and 14 percent residing in Camp County.

Two hundred eighty-three students are listed as full time, enrolled for at

least 12 semester hours. Of this group, 50.7 percent are enrolled in academic or Associate of Art degree programs and 44.9 percent are enrolled in Technical-Occupational programs. The remaining 4.3 percent are not classified with the majority of the students in this group enrolled in developmental type courses.

Almost 21 percent of the students are enrolled in at least one computer science course with 287 students taking at least one course in this discipline. Students enrolled in at least one English course total 279 and 227 students are taking at least one mathematics course.

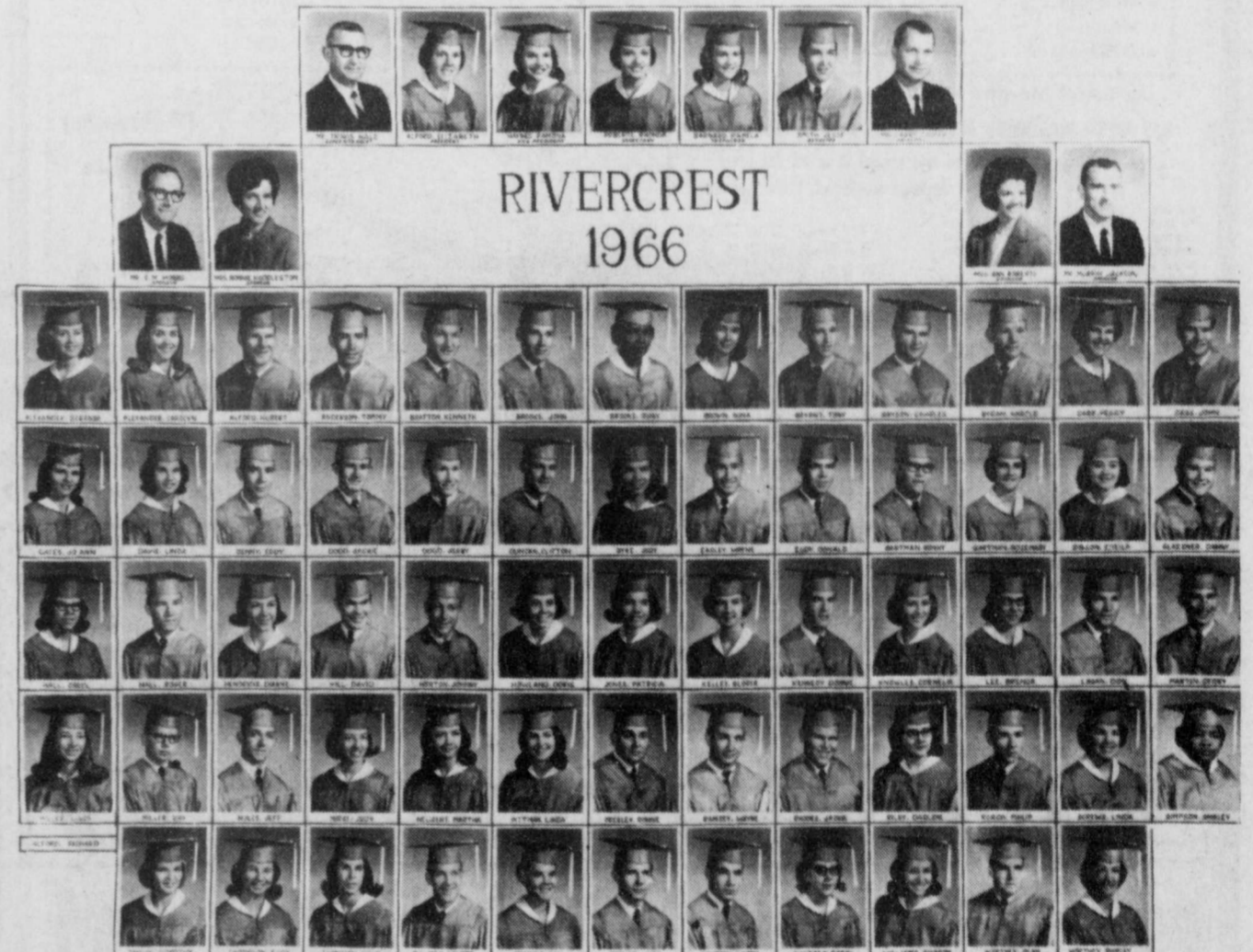
Fifty-two percent of the students, 724, indicate previous college attendance. Students entering college for the first time as high school graduates number 514, whiel 115 students entered with high school G.E.D. Thirty-two students were admitted on individual approval.

Students attending evening classes number 713 and account for 51 percent of the enrollment while 682 students are classified as day students.

NTCC received a total of 1725 applications for the fall semester and the 1395 enrolled represents an 81 percent enrollment factor.

Parents are asked to visit their child's classroom, which will give each teacher the opportunity to ex-

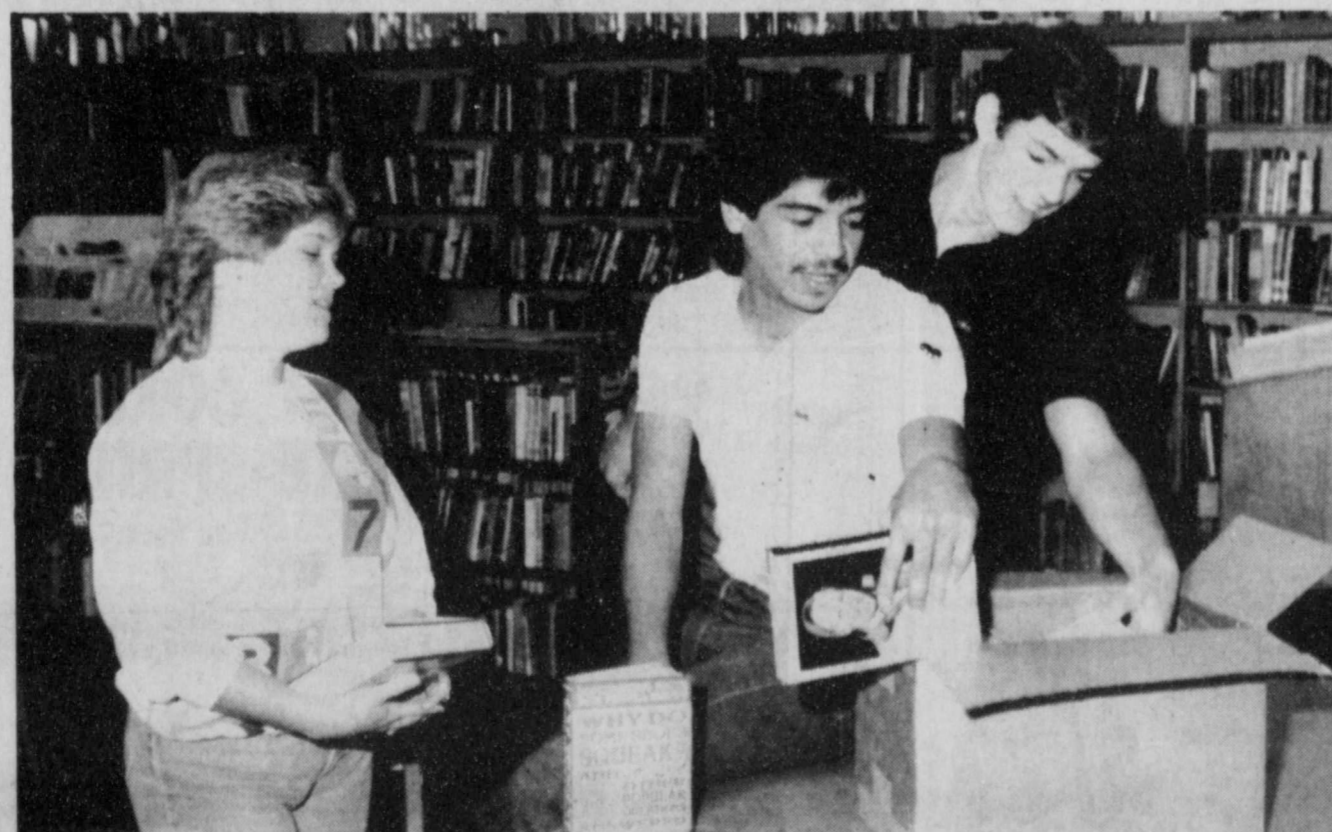
plain the nature of the leass and what is expected of the students.

Preventing Heart Attacks
Conclusive evidence that reducing elevated blood cholesterol with a cholesterol-lowering drug and diet can prevent heart attacks and death from heart disease was presented recently by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI).
The study was the largest, longest and most closely monitored to date of cholesterol and its relationship to heart attacks. Directed and funded by the NHLBI at 12 U.S. medical centers, the Lipid Research Clinics Trial demonstrated that combining the cholesterol-lowering drug, cholestyramine (Questran), with a moderately low-fat diet, reduced heart attacks by almost 20%.
The NHLBI scientists estimate that if Americans would reduce their blood cholesterol levels by 25%, this would eventually lead to a 50% reduction in the incidence of coronary heart disease.
The study participants were 3,806 men between the ages of 35 and 59, but the NHLBI believes that the results are also applicable to both men and women of all

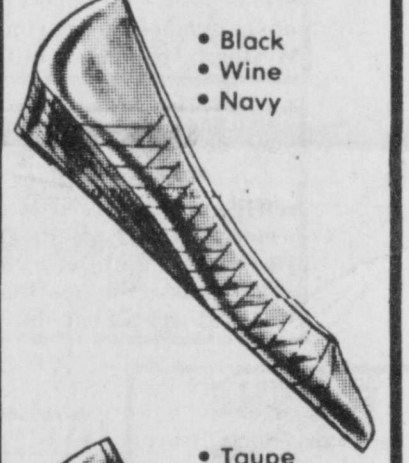

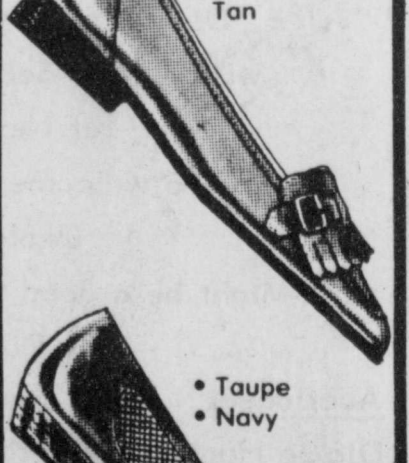
