

Most Area Sales Tax Shows Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$56.6 million in local sale tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest, \$9.1 million, bringing total payments in 1985 to \$123.4 million, up four percent over 1984. Dallas received \$6.9 million for a total of \$91.2 million in

total payments for this year, an increase of 13 percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.5 million increased that city's 1985 payments to \$45.3 million, up 13 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.8 million pushed payments to \$35.8 million, a 20 percent increase over 1984 payments.

Fort Worth received \$2.1 million for a 1985 total of \$27.4 million, up 10 percent. El Paso's payment of \$1.3 million brought its total to \$16.9 million, a 14 percent increase over payments last year.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by

September 20.

Locally, Blossom received \$960.77 for a yearly total of \$11,207.89 for a 12.94 percent increase.

Deport received \$728.02, for a yearly total of \$8,066.60 for a 13.90 percent increase over 1984.

Paris received \$126,873.86 for an 8.01 percent increase over last year.

Bogata received \$1,622.01 for a yearly total of \$19,637.00, marking a 7.65 percent increase from last year. Clarksville received \$11,535.93 for a 2.78 percent increase.

Detroit received \$713.71 for a 41.09 percent increase over last year's payment of \$586.65.

Mt. Pleasant received \$68,410.29 for

a 5.71 percent increase over the 1984 payments to date.

Talco received a check for \$1,540.15, bringing their 1985 total to \$19,159.86 for a 0.67 percent increase over the 1984 payments to date for the same period.

Rivercrest Rebels Hand Loss To Redwater

The Rivercrest Rebels defeated the Redwater Dragons in a wet, muddy contest Friday night in Jolton. The Rebels won 12-6. The Dragons went into score territory first traveling 74 yards in eight

plays. Chris Roberts dashed 62 yards during the drive. Quarterback Brian Burleson kept the ball and carried over from the three for the six points. The point after failed and the Dragons led 6-0. This score would stand for the first half.

Rivercrest quarterback, Bradley Woods, evaded the Dragon defense and ran 47 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. A holding call against the Rebels brought the play back and nullified the score.

Rivercrest tailback, Bubba Simpson, got the call time after time in the second half and responded with two touchdowns and over 100 yards for the evening. Simpson dodged through the Redwater defense to hit paydirt in the end zone with 4:16 remaining in the third period. Simpson ran for 56 of the 58 yards in six plays. The point after attempt was no good for a tied ballgame at six each.

Reb defenders forced a Dragon fumble on their next series of plays which gave the ball to the Rebels on the Redwater 29. The Rebels didn't fool around about putting another score on the board as Bubba Simpson scampered over from the 16 yard line to give the Rivercrest squad the lead 12-6.

Rivercrest quarterback, Bradley Woods, rushed the ball 27 yards in 13 carries and was on target completing two of six passes for 30 yards to Chris Anderson. Bubba Simpson rushed the ball 23 times for over 100 yards and fullback Clintg Stephenson ran 11 times for 58 yards for the night. The Rebels racked up 225 yards total offense for the night.

The Rebel defense was a deciding factor in the game. The Dragons dominated the first quarter with 79 yards rushing but it was the Rebel defense all the way in the second period as they held the Redwater boys to only nine yards.

The Rebels are now one of the only teams that have not lost a District game in 19-AA. New Diana is 4-0 and the Rebels are 3-0-1. The Rebels will travel to Maud next Friday night to play the Cardinals. The last two regular season games will be with Ore City and New Diana with both games played at Rivercrest.

Rivercrest Head Coach Terry Giddens said, "The rain put the two teams on more equal footing. We controlled the ball well without fumbling. No turnovers and our good defense made the difference. Overall, Bradley Woods played pretty good. He's young and the ball was wet and heavy, he had a few problems with that but he ran the option well and ran the other plays well."

"Jerry Belcher did a good job on defense. Clint Stephenson continues to improve. They are all improving so much each week that it is not any one person doing an outstanding job. Everyone is getting the job done."

Giddens continued, "Maud is a good ball club. They have pretty quick linemen and some good running backs. If you let them get away, they are hard to catch."

Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m. in Maud, Friday night. Come out and support your team!

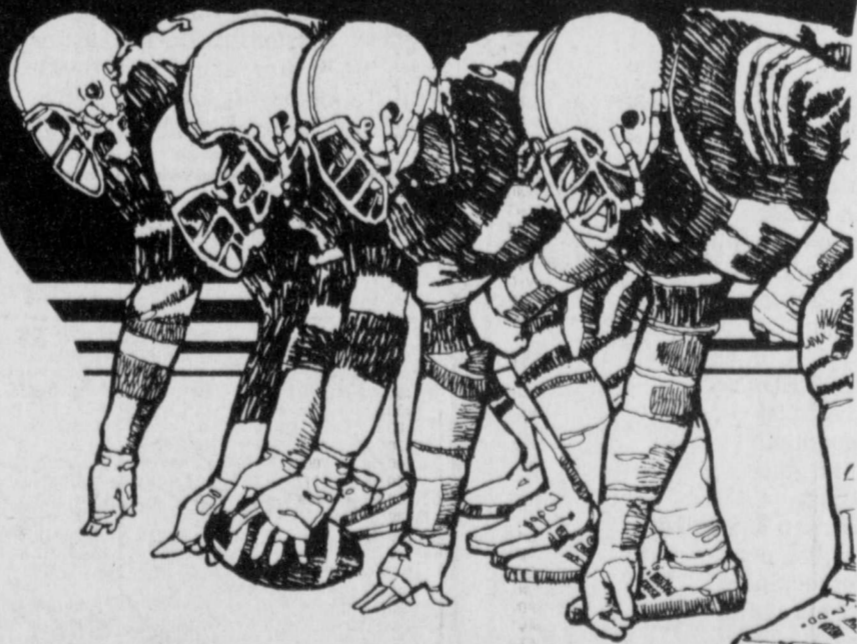

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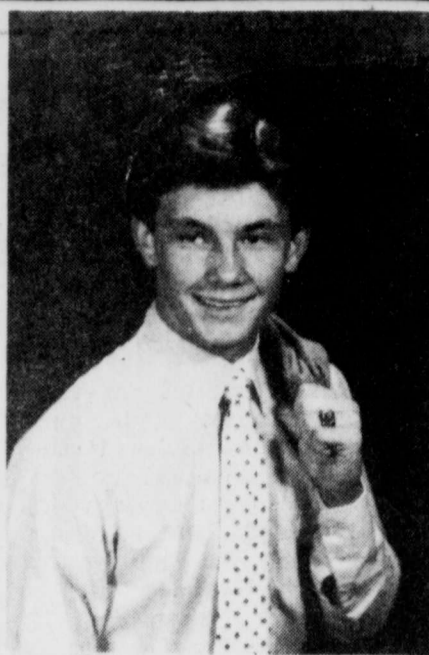

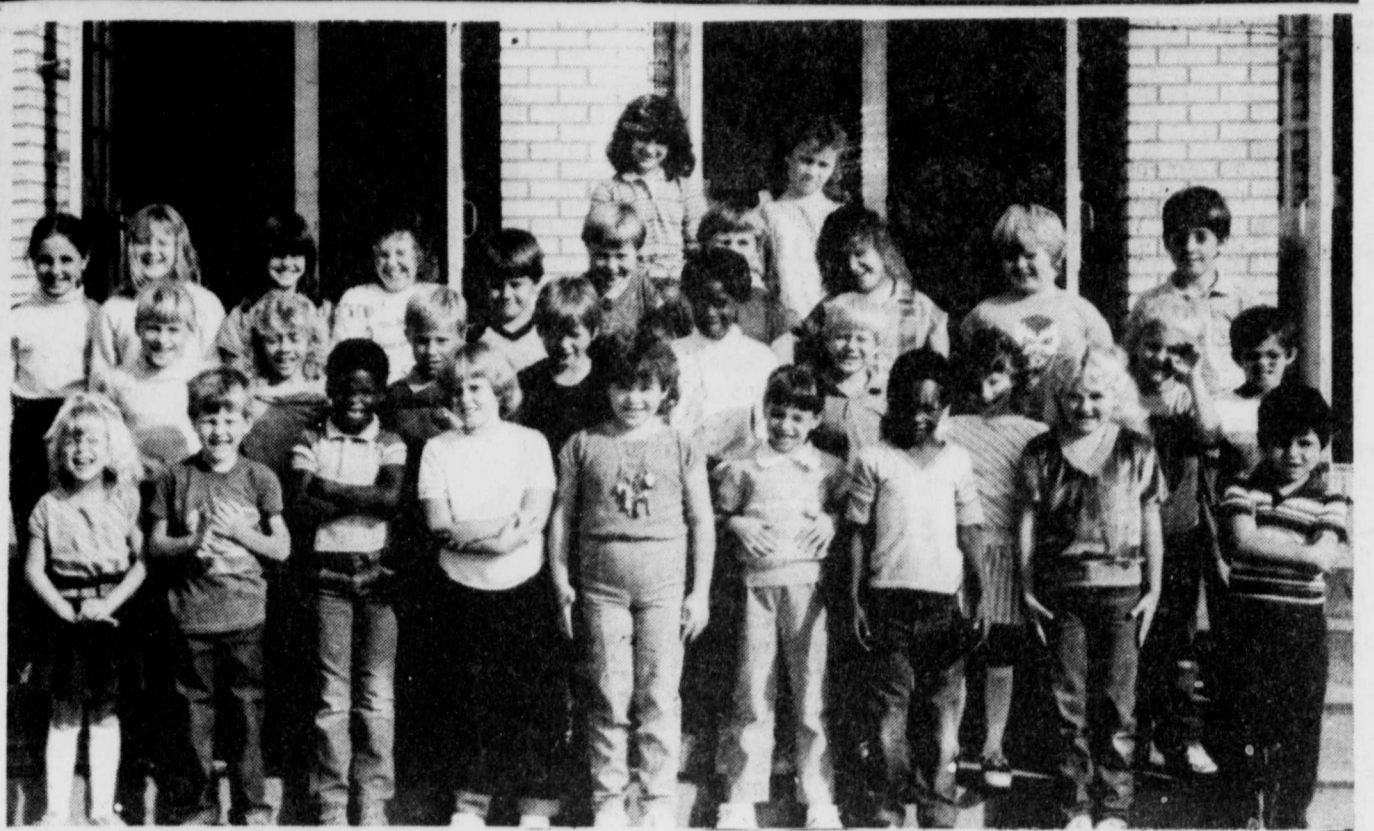

Halloween magic turns pumpkin into big party-size treats.

HALLOWEEN'S MAGIC HERITAGE

Ask the neighborhood kids what Halloween means, and they'll tell you "trick or treat," "costumes" and "parties." Not too many will know that Halloween is, literally, the evening before All Hallow's, otherwise known as All Saints' Day, and like many Christian observances, has its roots in pagan festivals. The Druids in ancient Britain, Ireland and France lit bonfires on the eve of their three-day November festival to drive away the spirits of the dead. And the Romans celebrated Pomona, a harvest celebration, at the same time of year.

Today's costumed ghosts, goblins, black cats and witches recall the Druids' exorcism of evil spirits, and our Halloween traditions of bobbing for apples and trick-or-treating for edible goodies pay homage to the harvest festival theme.

Halloween

Great Pumpkin Cookies

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 cup granulated sugar

- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 can (16 oz.) LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 1 cup semi-sweet real chocolate morsels
- Assorted icing or peanut butter
- Assorted candies, raisins or nuts

Preheat oven to 350°F. Combine flour, oats, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; set aside. Cream butter; gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla; mix well. Alternate additions of dry ingredients and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Stir in morsels. For each cookie, drop 1/4 cup dough onto lightly greased cookie sheet; spread into pumpkin shape using a thin metal spatula. Add a bit more dough to form stem. Bake 20-25 minutes, until cookies are firm and lightly browned. Remove from cookie sheets; cool on racks. Decorate, using icing or peanut butter to affix assorted candies, raisins or nuts. Yields 19 to 20 cookies.

Variation: Substitute 1 cup raisins for morsels.

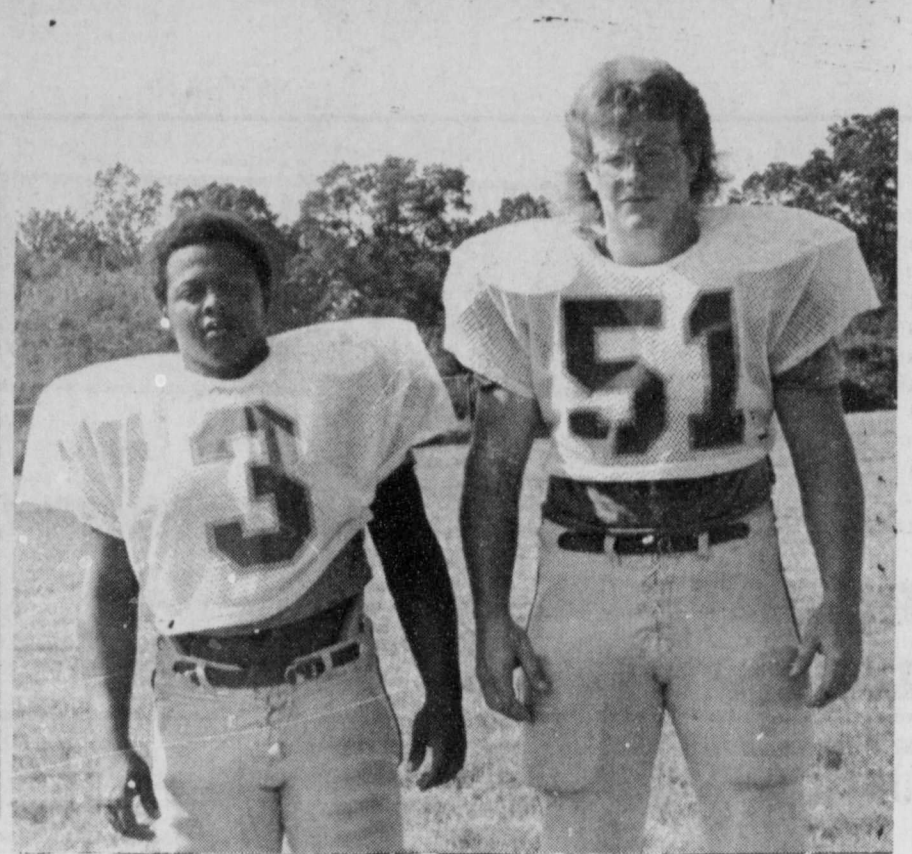
