Rivercrest Rebels Defeat Maud

Monday night was the absolutely perfect night to have nothing to do. What in the world could ever feel more comfortable than curling up with a good book, or a good TV program, depending upon your preference, and listening to the rain and wind slam fruitlessly against the north wall of the house?

It was probably the first of any such nights coming up during our wet and generally snowless winters.

But that first one brings a sense of peace and security that is rather unique.

Rebel Jerry Belcher was credited with three touchdowns at the final buzzer in Maud Friday night as he helped his team claim a sound victory 34-8. The Rivercrest tailback racked up 123 yards rushing to lead the Rebels offense in the important district win.

Belcher, playing in the place of Bubba Simpson, who was injured, carried 24 times for 123 yards and an average carry of five yards.

The Cardinals were unable to put together a drive on their first possession and the Rebels took over on their own 34. On their first possession of the night, Rivercret's Jerry Belcher went in to score territory with 7:48 left in the first period. He ran 34 yards off tackle for the six points. The point after kick was good for a Reb lead 7-0.

Maud seemed to have something going in their next series until they came up against the tough Rebel defense. The defensive squad stopped the Cardinals on the Rivercrest 45-yard line but the offense couldn't generate an attack this time.

The second period was a defensive battle all the way as each team stopped the other time after time. Then with 1:10 remaining in the half, Maud halfback, Stick Vaughn, fumbled on the Maud 43 and the Rebels recovered.

The Rivercrest offense took the ball down to the two yard line as a result of a pass play to split end Chris Anderson. With only 20 seconds left on the clock, Bradley Woods carried the ball over the line for six points. Charley Martin made the extra point. The Rebs led 14-0.

The Cardinals went for broke on the next play as quarterback Vaughn passed to fullback Conkeltan for a b/-yard score as the clock ticked down to 0. Maud ran the ball for two points and narrowed the Reb lead to 14-8 at

Penalties and turnovers hampered the Maud Cardinals int eh second half and the Rebel defense held them to only 48 yards in the second half. Maud fumbled twice in the second half to give the Rivercrest squad good field position each time.

On this particular night, a team couldn't give Jerry Belcher a break and not expect him to take advantage of it. Following one of the recovered Cardinal fumbles, Belcher ran seven yards for his second touchdown of the evening. Martin made good on the extra point and the Rebs led 21-8.

Maud began their next drive by handing the ball over to the Rebels on the 49 yard line. Rivercrest marched 51 yards in five plays for yet another score. With :53 seconds remaining in the third quarter, Clint Stephenson outran several Cardinal defenders for the 31-yard score. Rivercrest led 27-8.

However, the Rivercrest Rebels were not finished as they handed off to Belcher yet again in the fourth period and got another six points for his efforts. The Rebels finished the evening with a 34-8 victory in the district clash.

Jerry Belcher carried 24 times for 123 yards, Clint Stephenson carried 12 times for 72 yards, Bradley Woods carried 8 times for 14 yards, Jimmy Lewis carried two times for nine yards and Wesley Hood carried three times for six yards.

Jimmy Lewis completed one of three passes for 23 yards. Chris Anderson was the receiver.


Jerry Belcher returned one kick for 35 yards an Bradley Woods returned three for 40 yards.

Rivercrest head coach Terry Giddens said, "Our defense is continually holding strong. Maud broke one play at the end of the first half or they would have probably had negative vardage rushing. They had 70 yards rushing and 50 of it was on the

touchdown play. On offense, we had to use some backup players. Jerry Belcher came in for Bubba Simpson and did an outstanding job. Simpson was out with ankle injuries. Clint Stephenson usually plays one half on offense and one half on defense, but

Friday night he played full time on both and did a good job. Everybody played a good game, they are all working as one. On the bus going home the boys were already talking about what they had to do next week."

"We must win both of our remaining games to win district," Giddens continued. "To make the playoffs we must win one of them. Ore City is currently 3-2 for the district and New Diana is 5-0.'

P.O. Box 306 Bogata, TX 75417 eleventh grades being tested on October 16. The seniors were given the ASVAB, an aptitude test sponsored by the Armed Services. The seniors also participated in a career planning session during the afternoon, presented by Mrs. Huddleston, Jackie Gildon from ETSU at Texarkana, Sherrie Singleton and James Cowley, ETSU, Commerce, and a representative from the new Northeast Texas Community College.

The testing program consists of Science Research Associates tests for Grades 1-8. Grades nine, ten and eleven take the Iowa Test of Educational Development. On each campus, the classroom teachers administered the achievement tests and will be able to use the information gained from test results in many ways. Test scores will be returned to the schools from the computer center, where they are scored, in approximately six weeks. Parents and students alike may see the test results by appointment, as the information is processed and placed in each student's permanent record.

Along with the regular testing program, the state mandated Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills tests will be administered this

year to Grades 1,3,5,7,9 and 11. The eleventh graders were given the first TEAMS test October 1 and 2. This exit level test, which is required for graduation, will be administered again in May for any eleventh grader not showing mastery and again during his senior year if necessary. GRades 3,5,7 and 9 will be given the TEAMS test in February and first graders will be tested in April.

Talco-Bogata schools have also participated in some field tests given to certain grades to compare results of the two types of testing.

If you smell gas, here's what to do.




