

Rivercrest Romps Over Redwater

The Rivercrest Rebels met Redwater in a district game Thursday night on the road. The Rebels were victorious 55-32. The Rivercrest boys marked up four players in double figures for the evening. Charley Martin led with 16, Tony Jasso hit for 11 and Russell Rozell and Brad Anderson each scored ten.

The Rebels scored 19 points in the first period to the Dragons 11. They added another 15 in the second period to claim a halftime lead 34-25.

Redwater came back with 11 points in the third quarter but Rivercrest put through 10 of their own.

The Dragons tried for a comeback in the final period but the Rebels held them at bay taking the win 55-32.

Scoring for the Rebels were Charley Martin with 16, Tony Jasso with 11, Russell Rozell and Brad Anderson each with 10 and Chris Anderson and Wade White each with four.

The Rebels captured a district victory Saturday night as they edged out Ore City 45-37. Rivercrest is presently 2-0 into Tuesday night's contest with New Diana. Ore City dropped to 0-2 in district.

Chris Anderson was top scorer for the Rebel boys with 16 points. Russell Rozell followed closely behind with 13.

Rivercrest trailed by six points at the end of the first period 16-10. Russell Rozell connected for six points and Brad Anderson added four.

Ore City held the lead at the halfway mark 27-22. Chris Anderson and Tony Jasso each scored four points and Russell Rozell and Charley Martin added two each.

The Rebels outscored the Ore City boys in the third period and took the lead at the end of the quarter 33-31. Rivercrest hit for eleven points to Ore City's four.

Rivercrest came back with 12 more points in the final period to their opponent's six to claim the victory.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Chris Anderson with 16, Russell Rozell with 13, Tony Jasso with 9, Brad Anderson with 4 and Charley Martin with 3. The Rebels made seven free throws of 16 attempted for a 43% average.

District standings following this game were Harleton 2-0, Rivercrest 2-0, New Diana 1-1, Maud 1-1, Harmony 1-1, Karnack 1-1, Redwater 0-2 and Ore City 0-2.

The Rebels defeated the New Diana Eagles Tuesday night in a very close, hard-fought game. The Rebs took the district win 47-45 in last second efforts.

Rivercrest trailed by three at the end of the first quarter 11-8. The Rebs hit for 18 points in the second period to take a halftime lead 26-21.

The Eagles came on strong in the second half but the Rebs held their ground. The Rebels led 37-31 at the end of the third period.

New Diana tied the score up in the

final period and the score began to see-saw back and forth. The board read 45-45 with only a few seconds remaining. A Rebel basket gave them the two points for the victory. New Diana had run out of time and the Rebs claimed the win.

Scoring for the Rebels were Chris Anderson with 12, Tony Jasso with 11, Charley Martin with 10, Brad Anderson with 8 and Russell Rozell with six.

The Rivercrest Rebelettes romped over Redwater Thursday night 56-26. The Rebelettes featured three players in double figures. Donna Sessums led the scoring with 15. RaNell Burns

followed closely with 14 and Cynthia Thompson added 10.

The Reb girls led by three points at the end of the first stanza 11-8. They added seven more in the second period but Redwater answered with 10 to tie the score at 18 all at the half.

Rivercrest hit for 15 in the third period to Redwater's 8 for a lead of 33-26. They blew the lid off in the final quarter racking up 23 points and completely shutting out their opponent. The Rebelettes did not allow Redwater any points in the final quarter of play. Rivercrest took the win 56-26.

Scoring for the Rebelettes were Donna Sessums with 15, RaNell Burns

with 14, Cynthia Thompson with 10, Kelli Anschutz with 8, Barbi Rackliff with four, Lori Alford with three and Misti Foxworthy with two.

The Rebelettes clashed with Ore City Saturday night and claimed the district win 40-26.

Kelli Anschutz and Donna Sessums shared top scoring honors with 12 points each.

The Rebelettes dominated the quarter scores. They led 8-5 at the end of the first period. Ore City came back with 12 points in the second period to narrow the Rebelettes' lead to one point at halftime 18-17.

Rivercrest hit for 12 points in the

third period to Ore City's seven. They added another 10 points in the final period while defensively allowing Ore City only two. The Rivercrest girls won the game 40-26.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Kelli Anschutz and Donna Sessums each with 12, Cynthia Thompson with six, RaNell Burns with four, and Lori Alford, Rachel Smith and Ronda Collins each with two.

The Rivercrest girls defeated New Diana Tuesday night 43-35. The Rebelettes dominated the game throughout.

The Reb girls led 10-5 at the end of the first period. They added 12 more

in the second period to New Diana's 11. The halftime score read 22-16 Rivercrest.

Rivercrest hit for 11 in the third quarter while New Diana made six. The Eagle fens tried to close the gap in the last quarter hitting for 13 points, but the Rebelettes hit for 10 on their own to take the win 43-35.

Dickey, Holley Announce Candidacy

Robert (Bobby) D. Dickey of Bogata, Commissioner of Precinct 1 announced his candidacy for a two year unexpired term as commissioner.

Dickey, 54, was born in Bay City, TX on Aug. 11, 1931 and was graduated from Bay City High School. He entered the U.S. Air Force in July 1951 and was honorably discharged as Sergeant in July, 1955.

Dickey worked for Phillips Petroleum as a pipefitter from 1955 to 1964, when he became a licensed plumber in Bogata. He was employed by E.L. Dalton Construction of Dallas as a foreman and assistant superintendent. Dickey was self-employed with a backhoe service in the Bogata area then went to Simmons General Contractor of Talco.

Following is the text of Dickey's announcement:

"I am announcing my candidacy for Commissioner of Precinct 1. Since my appointment Sept. 9, 1985 I have initiated a program of permanent improvements to our roads and bridges and at the same time I have reduced the expenditure of your county tax dollars considerably."

"I think being Commissioner is a full time job, and I will devote my

time and ability to this office. I will be fair, improve conditions, and stay within a conservative, realistic budget."

"I enjoy a very pleasant working relationship with the other elected officials and their staff."

"I am 54 years old, with most of those years in construction, gaining experience as a craftsman and supervisor. My other interest has always been livestock. Jimmy Dickey, my 21 year old son, is a senior at East Texas State University majoring in agriculture."

"I ask for your vote and thank you for your support."

J.B. (Ballard) Holley, Justice of the Peace for JP Prec. 1, has announced his candidacy for re-election in the May 1985 primary.

Judge Holley was first appointed to an unexpired term on Feb. 1, 1979, succeeding W.M. (Bill) McDonough who had resigned. He subsequently won a short term election and a four year term.

The Justice was born in Clarksville, attended the Clarksville school, and is a lifelong resident of the area. During World War II he entered service in Nov., 1942, with the artillery and was honorably discharged in Nov. 1945. He

was overseas in the European Theater, serving in the invasion of France with the First Infantry Division.

He was married to Margaret Cross in 1940 and they have a son, Britt, associated with TP&L in Waco.

Judge Holley has been very active in the American Legion, having served in virtually every position in the local Post 45, and have been Adjutant, Vice-Commander and Commander of the Legion First District.

During his time in office, he has completed 180 hours of training and instruction in duties of the position at Southwest Texas State University.

Judge Holley has collected \$539,307.89 in fines and court costs during his six years and 11 months in office.

In announcing his candidacy for re-election, Judge Holley says: "I feel I have qualified myself to serve the people of Justice of the Peace Prec. 1."

"It has been an honor to have been elected to this office and I hope the voters will allow me the opportunity to continue to service as Justice of the Peace for a second term."

"Your vote and support will be greatly appreciated."

The Prec. 1 Justice of the Peace of office is in the Courthouse.

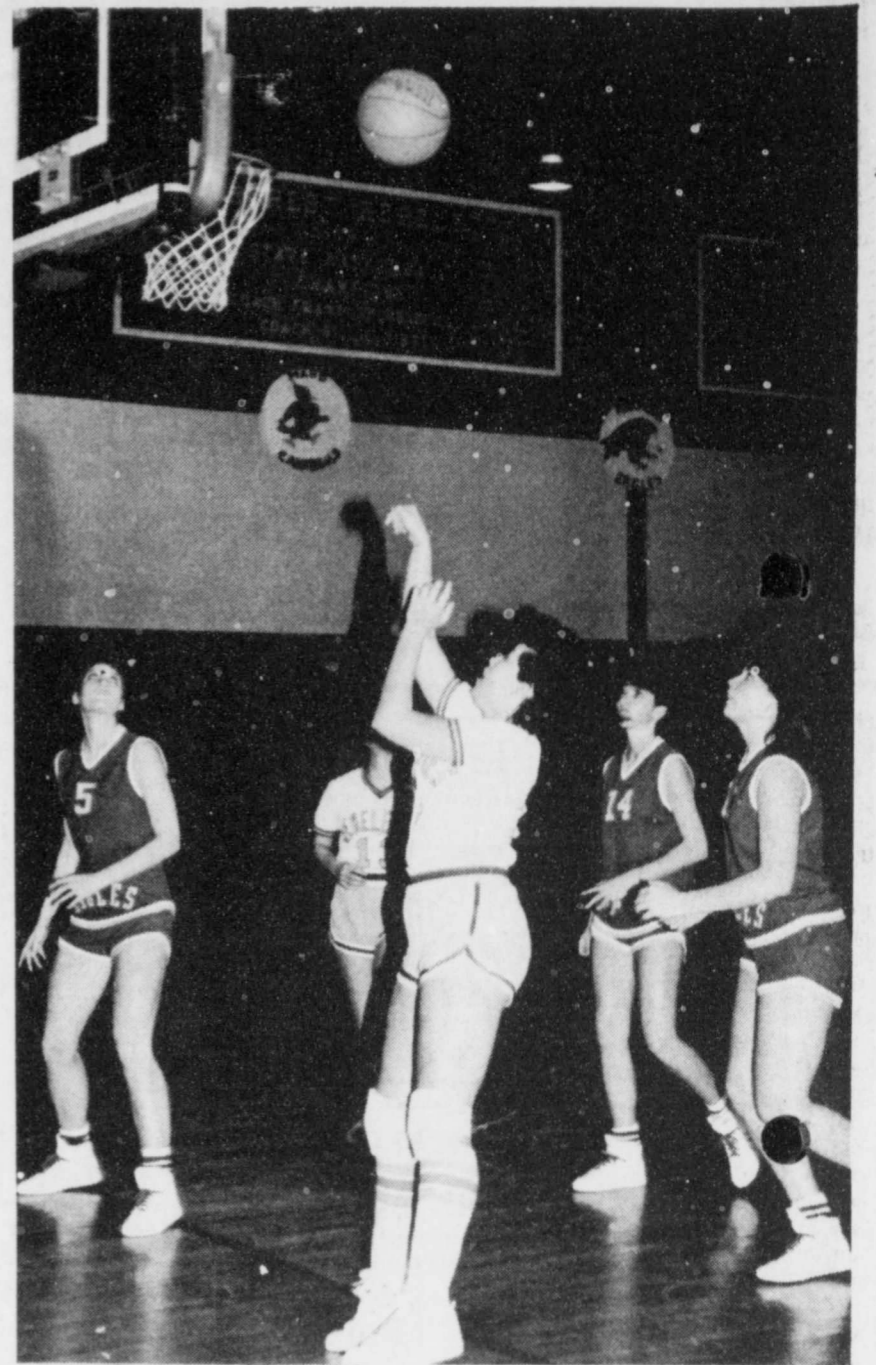

Election Code Revised

During the 1985 session, the Texas legislature voted to recodify the Texas Election Code. Precleared by the Justice Department in late summer, Senate Bill 616 will take effect on January 1, 1986. Because many of the changes affect you, you probably

want to acquire new copies of the Election Code for your own reference library.

Section 143.007 of the new code changes the filing period for city candidates. An application for a place on the ballot must be filed not later than

5:00 p.m. on the 45th day before election day and not earlier than the 30th day before the date of the filing deadline. An application filed by mail is considered to be filed at the time of its receipt by the appropriate authority. As a result, the filing deadline for the April 5, 1986 city elections will be Wednesday, February 19, 1986; filing begins Monday, January 20, 1986. Chapter 143 of the new Election Code also discusses several other filing requirements for partisan and independent candidates.

The filing deadline for school board candidates is unchanged. See Tex. Elec. Code 144.005 and Tex. Educ. Code 23.03 (Vernon Supp. 1985).

When a candidate for city office is required to pay a filing fee or file a petition in lieu thereof, or simply required to file a petition, House Bill 2162, 69th Legislature (1985) states
