

Rebel 9th And JV Split With North Lamar

The Rebel 9th grade boys team dropped their Saturday morning game to AAA North Lamar 59-42. The Rebels held the game close during the first half. Clifford Martin was high scorer for Rivercrest with 21 points. Rivercrest hit for nine points in the first period while North Lamar hit 15. Clifford Martin scored eight and Audie Earley added one free throw. The Rebs put through seven more in the second period to their opponent's ten. They trailed the Panthers 25-11 at the halfway point. Rivercrest led by two at the end of the first period 13-11. David Bush hit for five, Wade Smith hit for six, and Clint Stephenson hit two free throws.

The Reb JV added seven points in the second quarter to North Lamar's nine. The score was tied up at 20 each at the halftime buzzer. Bradley Woods popped the net from mid-court with a last second shot to tie the score.

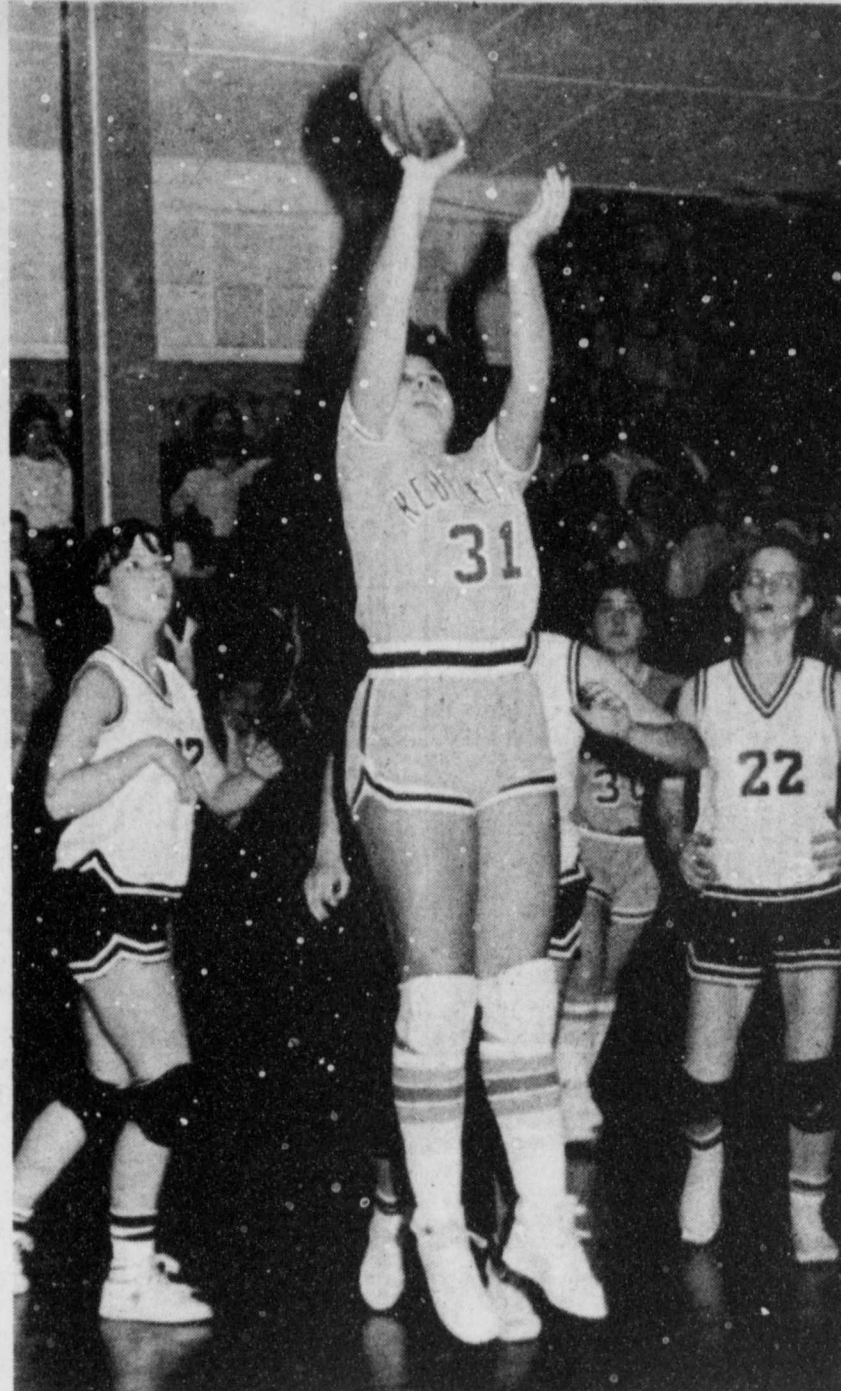
The Rebelettes hit for five points in the first period to Maud's zip. Dawn Stephenson hit for three and Tonia Hinsley for two.

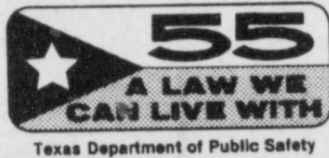
