

Rebels, Rebelettes, Lose One, Win One

It was overtime again for the Rivercrest Rebels Tuesday night as they defeated Harleton 60-57. The two teams were tied up at the fourth quarter buzzer 55-55. Overtime points from Charlie Martin, Chris Anderson and a free throw from Tony Jasso gave the Rebels the edge.

Scoring in double figures for Rivercrest were Chris Anderson with 14, Russell Rozell with 13 and Charley Martin and Brad Anderson each with 11.

The Rebels trailed 16-8 at the end of the first period. Rozell connected on four points and Chris and Brad Anderson each hit for two.

Rivercrest came back with 16 points in the third stanza, however, as they outscored the Wildcats twenty points to eight. They took the lead 44-39 at the finish of the third period.

The final quarter was a battle to the finish, as neither team would give any ground to the other. The two squads fought it out to a tie at 55 each at the quarter end.

Overtime action was exciting with the Rebels hitting for five points to Harleton's two. Rivercrest took the victory 60-57.

Scoring for the Rebels were Chris Anderson with 14, Russell Rozell with 13, Charley Martin and Brad Anderson each with 11, Tony Jasso with five and Clint Stephenson, Danny Brown and Kenneth Kelley each with two.

Rivercrest dropped a tough match to Karnack Friday night 56-48. Chris Anderson led the Rebels in scoring with 20 points. Tony Jasso also hit in double figures with ten.

Rivercrest hit for 17 points in the first period to Karnack's 14. Chris Anderson popped the net for seven, Charley Martin hit for six and Russell Rozell and Brad Anderson each hit for two.

Karnack caught up and passed the Rebels in the second period, outscoring them 15-8 for a halftime lead 29-25. Chris Anderson hit for five, Charley Martin connected for two and Tony Jasso added a free throw.

The Rebels scored eight points in the third period but Karnack hit for 14 to extend their lead to 10 points the quarter score read 43-33 in favor of Karnack. Chris Anderson added six points for the Rebels and Tony Jasso added two.

Rivercrest marked up 15 points in the final period but it was not enough to overcome the Karnack team as they put another 13 on the board. Rivercrest dropped the game 48-56.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Chris Anderson with 20, Tony Jasso with 10, Charley Martin with eight, Russell Rozell with four, Kenneth Kelley with three, Brad Anderson with two and Clint Stephenson with one.

The Rivercrest Rebelettes were defeated by the Harleton girls last week in Jolntown. The game, following an exciting overtime period, was won by Harleton 56-55. Free throws were a definite factor in the game. Top scorer for the Rebelettes was Donna Sessums with 22 points. Also in double figures was Kelli Anschutz with 15.

The Rebelettes trailed 18-9 at the end of the first quarter. Donna Sessums hit for eight points and Kelli Anschutz added a free throw.

Rivercrest came within four at the halfway mark hitting for 11 points in the second period to Harleton's six. Anschutz scored seven, Sessums hit for two and Barbi Rackliff added two on free throws. The score was 24-20 at halftime.

Sessums added eight more in the third period and Anschutz hit for two bringing the tally to 38-30. Rebelettes still trailing.

The fourth stanza was a blowout, though, as the Rebelettes scored 2 points in the period to Harleton's 14.

Overtime was a period of fouls and free shots. It seemed that the ball just didn't want to fall through the hoop for Rivercrest. They made one of six free throws in overtime while Harleton made two of five. Barbi Rackliff hit for two points and Mary

Tiffie added one on a free throw. The Rebelettes fell by one 56-55.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Donna Sessums with 22, Kelli Anschutz with 15, Barbi Rackliff with seven, Ronda Collins with five and Dara Stephenson and Mary Tiffie each with three.

The girls took an important victory over the Karnack girls in Karnack Friday night 46-39. Donna Sessums and Kelli Anschutz led the Rebelettes in scoring hitting for 17 and 16 respectively.

Rivercrest held a two point lead at the first quarter buzzer 8-6. Ronda Collins, Lori Alford, Donna Sessums, and Kelli Anschutz each popped the net for two points.

Sessums hit for nine in the second period and Alford and Cynthia Thompson each added two for a halftime lead of 21-11. Defensively, the Rebelettes allowed the Karnack girls only five points in the second period.

The Rebelettes continued to

dominate the game with a third period score of 35-24. Sessums and Anschutz each scored six and Ronda Collins added two. The Rebelettes hit for 14 points to Karnack's 13.

The Karnack girls tried for a comeback in the final period but came up short 46-39 losing to the Rebelettes. The Rebelettes hit for 11 points in the final period to their opponent's 15.

He entered Texas Baptist Institute in 1962 in preparation for the ministry and received a Bachelors Degree in 1965 and a Masters Degree in 1966.

The churches of the Missionary Baptist Association of Texas have

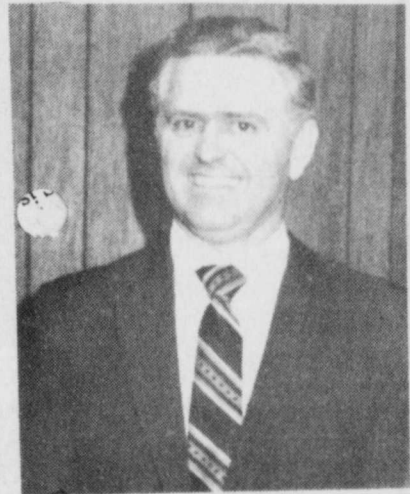

H. Drue Pirtle To Run For Commissioner

H. Drue Pirtle, a native of the Jolntown community in Red River County, has announced that he will be a candidate for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 1, the southwest quadrant of the county, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 3.

Pirtle was appointed as Commissioner of Precinct 1 by County Judge William S. Whiteman on September 16, 1983, following the resignation of Bruce Scott. He was elected to a four-year term in November 1984 and served as commissioner until Judge Whiteman fired him on August 30, 1985. Pirtle was removed from office because he was serving on the Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees. He resigned his position on the school board effective January 14, 1986.

Pirtle, a Jolntown rancher and civic leader, retired in 1979 from a successful and financially rewarding career as an accountant and oil company executive and built a home at Jolntown in 1981 where he and his family now reside.

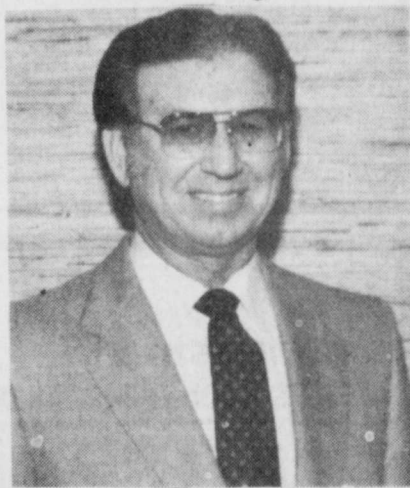
Pirtle attended school at Jolntown Elementary, Bogata High School, Paris Junior College and received a BBA degree with a major in accounting and minor in economics from East Texas State University in January, 1956.

After college, Pirtle lived in Longview and worked in public accounting for three and one-half years before joining an independent oil and gas firm as a staff accountant. He served in various capacities with the company until he was elected as a

Vice-president in 1973 and as Treasurer in 1975.

While with Oleum Incorporated, a wholly owned subsidiary of Falcon Seaboard, Inc., Pirtle served as a director of the corporation and as an officer and director of several wholly owned subsidiary companies. He was also elected as President and Chairman of the Board of East Texas Data Center, Inc., a Tyler, TX computer company.

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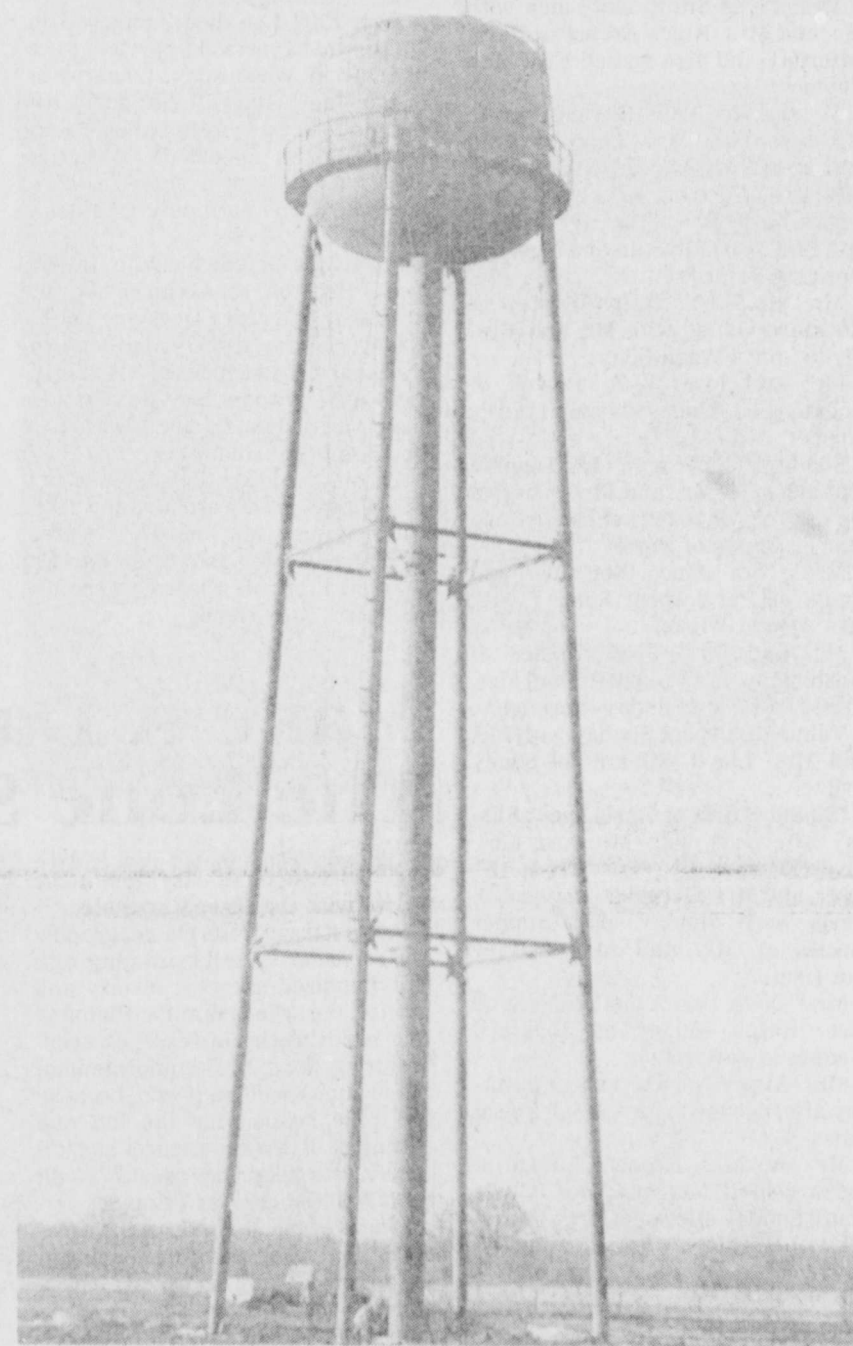
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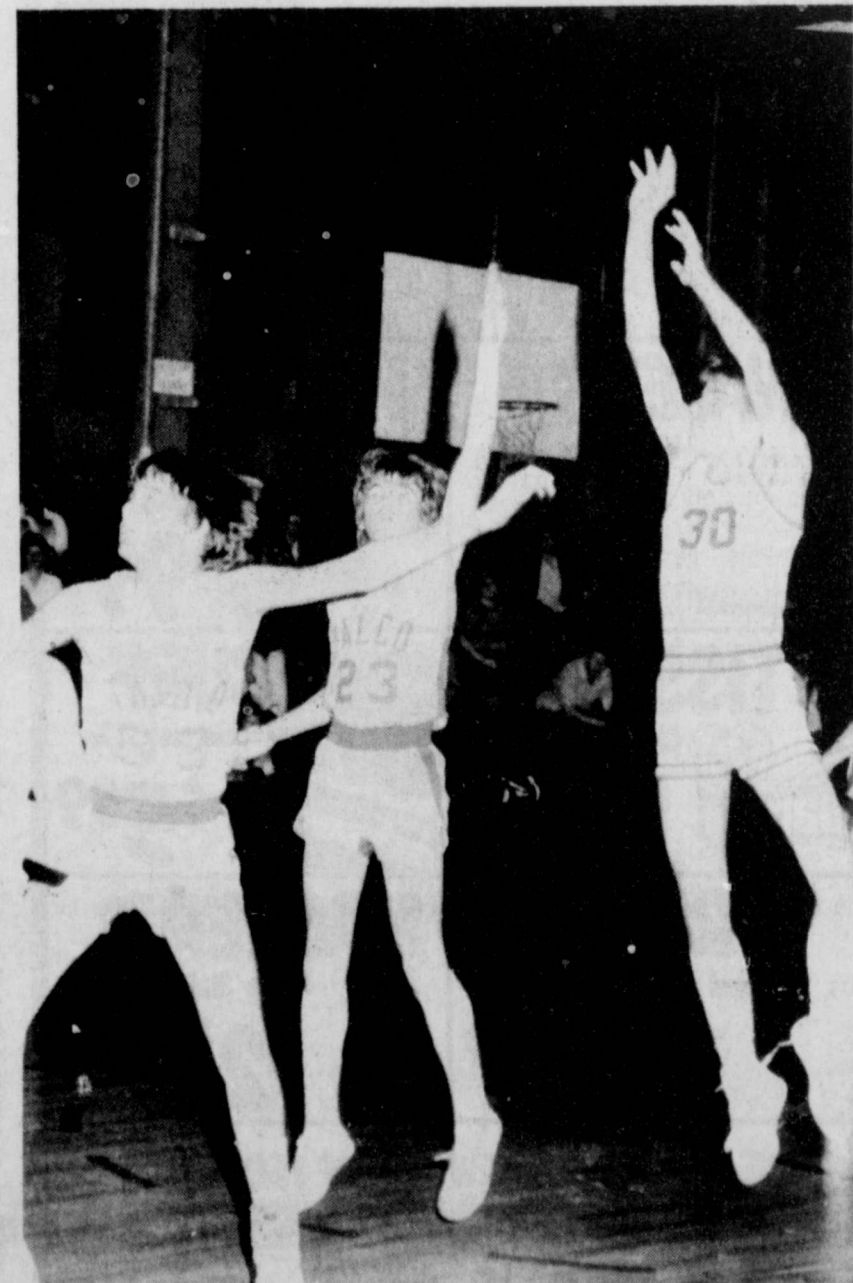
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NEW TOWER-Red River County Water Supply has built this new tower at Morris Chapel. It will provide the county with an expanded

and No. 23, Shane Crafts, try to block a downtown pass to No. 30, Jason Lankford. (Staff Photo)

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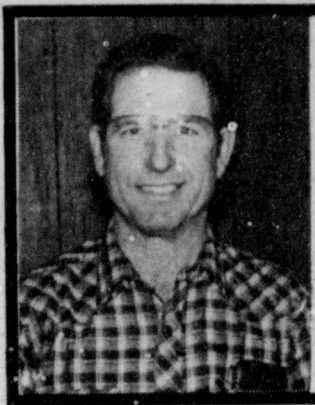

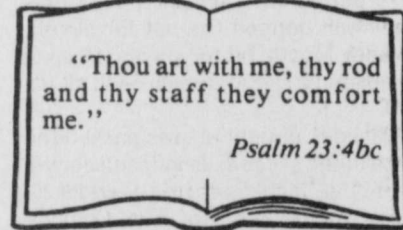

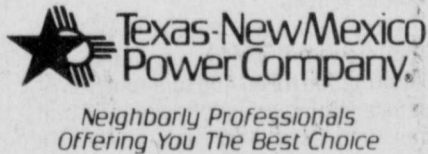

NTCC To Hold EMT Course

On March 4, Northeast Texas Community College in association with Titus County Memorial Hospital will begin an Emergency Medical Technician training course. According to Bill Weaver, Director of Lifelong Learning at NTCC, the class will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6 until 10 p.m. and will conclude July 17.

Weaver stated that NTCC is working with the Ark-Tex Council of Governments and expects to receive a grant that will pay the training costs of all area volunteers that seek E.M.T. certification and re-certification. The grant is not expected to be approved until March 1, and it cannot be used to pay for classes beginning before that date. The grant can only be used to pay costs of volunteers that are designated by area volunteer agencies.

The cost of the course will be \$175.00 plus the cost of materials. If the training grant is received from the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, those eligible under the grant will have tuition reimbursed by NTCC.

Oleum Incorporated was merged into Diamond Shamrock Corporation in 1970 and Pirtle became self-employed in the oil and gas business and ranching. While living in Longview for 25 years, Pirtle maintained a home in Jhntown and returned every weekend to live in the community and operate his cattle ranch.

Pirtle and his wife, Tommie Joy, are active members of the Jhntown Missionary Baptist Church where he serves as music director, Sunday school teacher, treasurer and deacon. They have two children, a daughter, Lana age 11, and a son, Clay, age 10.

He is active in the community and has served four years on the Talco-Bogata School Board, is president of the local baseball association, a past director of the Red River Valley Girl Scouts and has served on the Sulphur River Basin Planning Advisory Committee of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments. He is a director of the First National Bank of Deport.

In making his announcement as candidate for commissioner, Pirtle stated that he thinks he is the best qualified candidate to serve the people of Precinct 1. "I will use my educational background, business experience and experience as commissioner to continue the program I initiated of improving the roads and bridges. At the same time, I will represent the people of our precinct in county government.

"When I was appointed commissioner in September 1983, the roads, bridges and workign equipment were in extremely poor condition. There was approximately \$60,000 in precinct 1 funds, and a debt of over \$50,000 that had to be paid. Some of the major improvements that were completed in teh precinct during the two-year period were 1) purchase of office building and received over 1,000 hours in donated office work by seven ladies 2) cleaned up county barn and yard 3) purchased 1975 diesel gravel truck 4) purchased new motor grader on buy-back plan 5) purchased used backhoe/loader 6) purchased new pickup truck 7) installed three new engines in trucks, 8) oiled over eight miles of road 9) repaired and/or rebuilt eighteen bridges 10) received over \$65,000 in donated cash and/or materials 11) opened Batesville-Fulbright road that had been closed by pouring concrete on low water crossing 12) promoted Harold White as foreman of road crew 13) received donated sand from Charles Skaggs and a place to mix oil dirt for patching roads.

After making the above improvements, I still had a balance of \$42,000 in the Road and Bridge No. 1 Fund and \$32,000 in the Main Road and Bridge Fund when I was fired on August 30, 1985.

"I have appointed Travis Hale as my campaign manager and Billy Daniels as my campaign treasurer, and I will appreciate your vote and support on May 3."

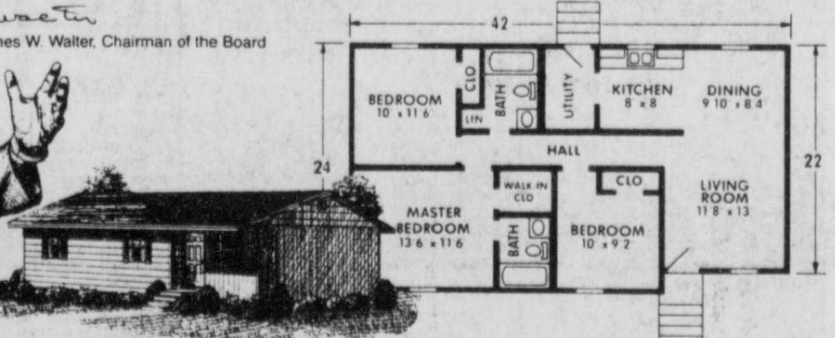

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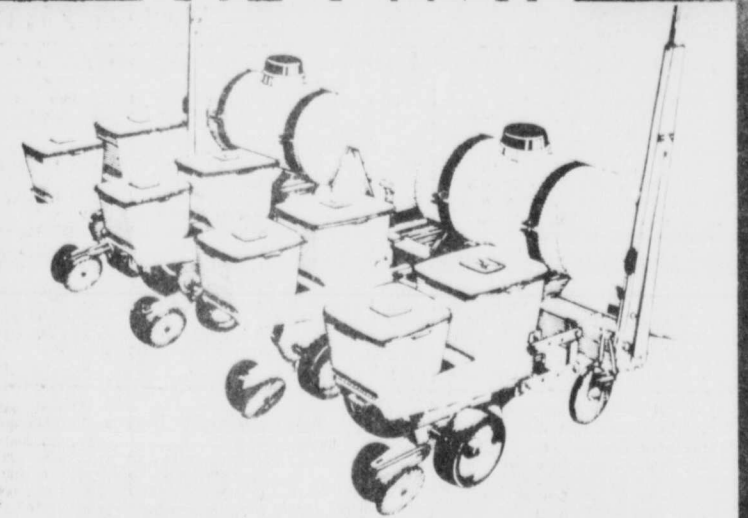

Dismissal prayer and prayer for the sick was voiced by Mrs. Vivian Westbrook. After dismissal the group enjoyed a covered dish supper.

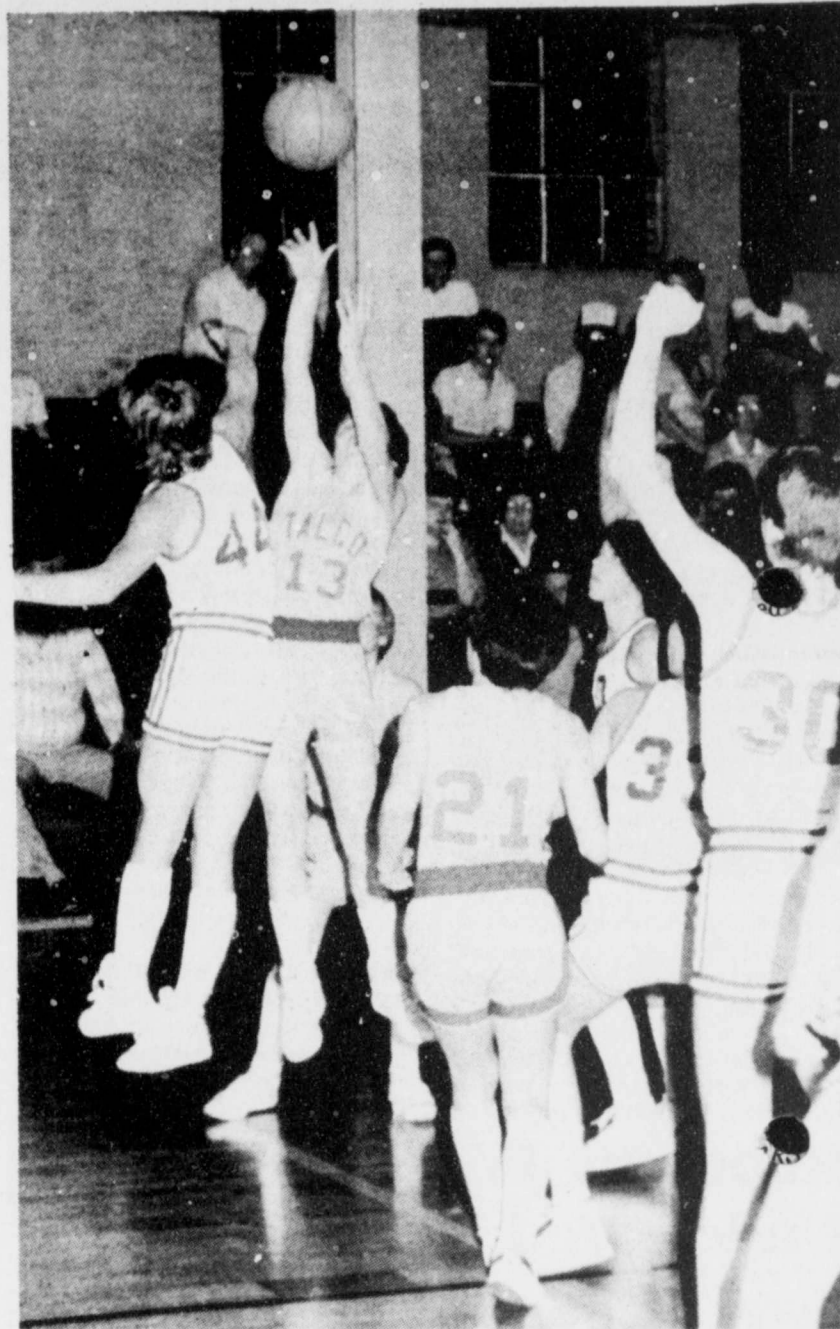

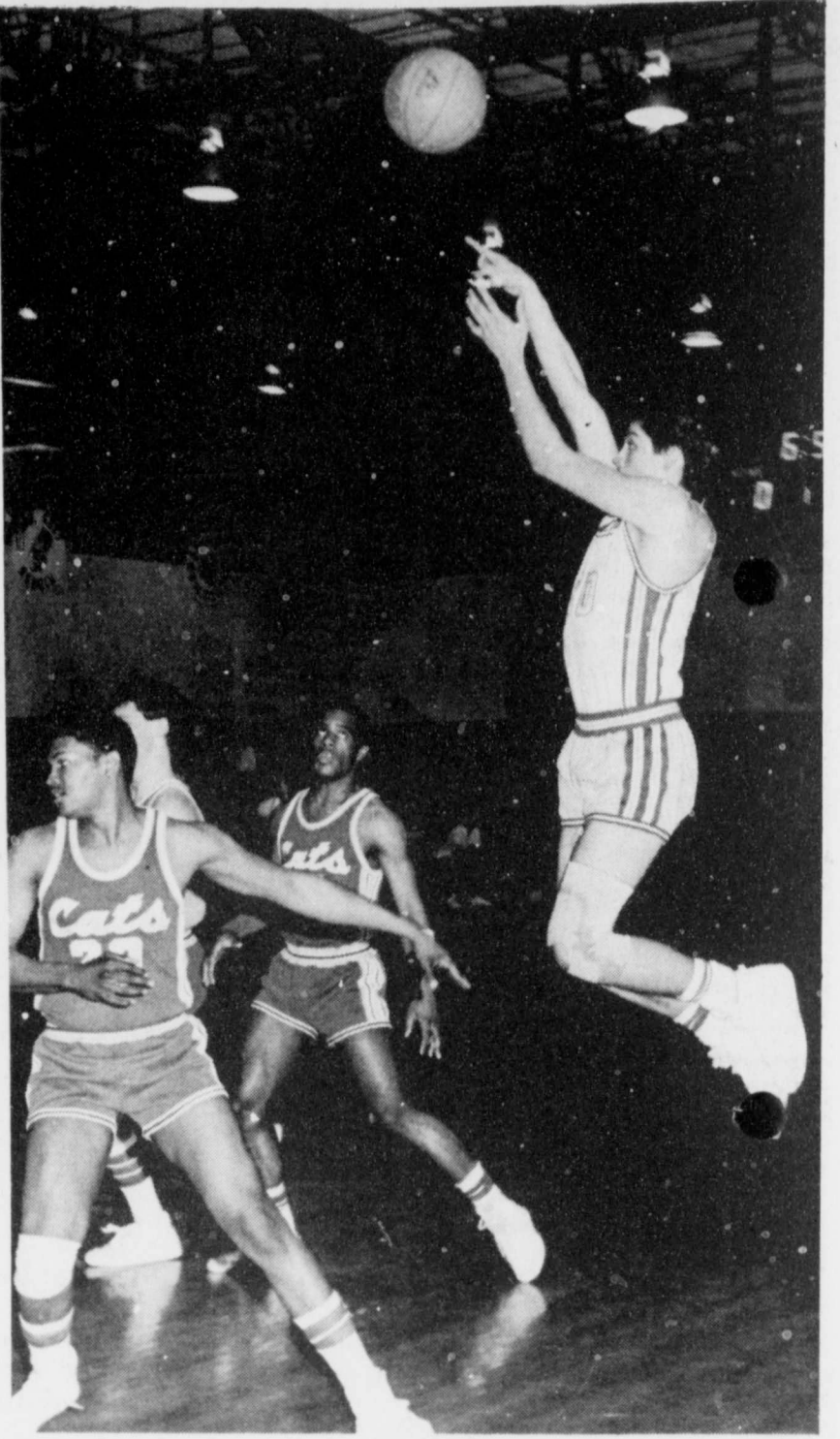
