FFA, A Program To Last A Lifetime

All across the nation, Future Farmers of America Chapters are celebrating their week, National FFA Week.

Rivercrest FFA chapter, with 97 members and two advisors has as much or more reason to celebrate as any chapter in the nation.

Among the activities the local chapter has been involved in are their leadership contest, held in November, they have participated in two livestock shows and have more coming up.

They will be in the judging contests, and have a banquet in the spring.

The Rivercrest Talent Team is currently competing in the area contest this week. The chapter sweetheart is Selena Alford.

Perhaps most people think of FFA as simply an organization with animal projects and a few skills taught. That is a complete misconception.

Just think about this for a moment: Mathematics are taught in shop and vocational ag by figuring board feet, bill of material, cost of shop projects, rate of gain on project programs, pound of gain per 100 pounds of feed fed, etc.

The record books required on projects teach bookkeeping and English skills are sharpened by written reports required. An astonishing amount of history can be learned through the study of the background and origin of animals.

Physical education takes place in the physical work done and the exercise expended as part of their projects.

Speech is developed through public speaking, and biology, both botany and zoology are taught in the forms of plant and animal science. Animal diseases are studied extensively in Vo Ag.

Chemistry is learned in the testing of soil, testing of milk, figuring of amounts and types of fertilizers.

Free enterprise is encouraged, economics of agriculture is taught, and marketing and economics enable

Vo Ag students to understand and use their knowledge in all phases of life. At Rivercrest, there is Production

Agriculture Ag I, II and III. Agribusiness Training is given. Pre-employment laboratory training is

designed for high school students preparing to enter employment in an agricultural occupation. General Ag

Mechanics provides training in classroom and shop in the areas of farm mower and machinery, small gas engines, electric wiring, motors, surveying and measuring land, plumbing, welding and hand and power tools. Obviously, all of these skills can be of use, no matter what career an individual might choose.

The meat processing training program at Rivercrest provides training in the classroom and laboratory in making wholesale and retail cuts of beef, swine and sheep.

All students in production ag must complete a six month successful supervised Occupational Experience Program to receive credit in the course.

This is the backbone of the FFA program. It makes things very relevant to the student, and is often their first experience in owning some productive animal which is totally dependent on their care. It is probably the first time that a crop becomes a concern. The weather, prices, harvest costs, markets, become very real. Free enterprise, in other words, becomes a fact.

Also, a good SOEP in the community provides an opportunity for community involvement. People from all walks of life become interested in the young people. Many successes can be attributed to the fact that many in the community care for the welfare of a young student.

Members learn through active participation how to conduct and take part in public meetings; to speak in public; to buy and sell cooperatively; to solve their own problems; to finance themselves; and to assume civic responsibility.

Judging teams, FFA leadership teams; talent teams, all are a vital part of the learning and competitive process.

It would take a whole page to list the many benefits of vocational ag programs in the school system, a community, a state, a nation!

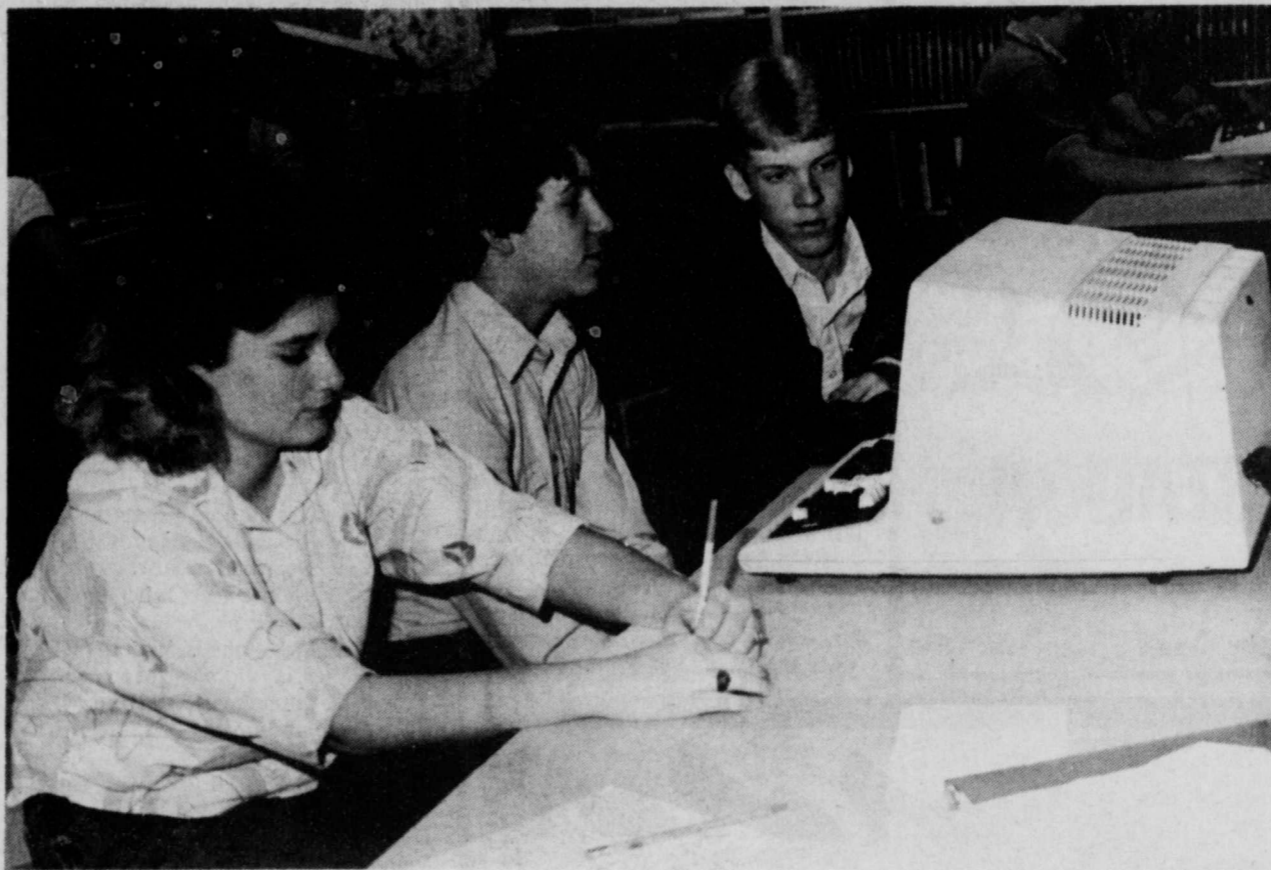
But, suffice it to say simply that Rivercrest FFA deserves a big salute from everyone...keep up the good work!

Rebels Take Final Two

The Rivercrest Rebels captured their game against Karnack last week 68-64. Tony Jasso was top pointer for the Rebels with 21. The Rebs featured four more in double figures.

Rivercrest led by four at the end of the first period 16-12. Charley Martin hit for six, Tony Jasso hit for four and Russell Rozell, Brad Anderson and Clint Stephenson each added two.

The Rebels put their scoring together in the second period as they marked up 23 points. Chris Anderson popped the net with eight as did Tony Jasso. Brad Anderson added five and Charley Martin two. They held the lead 39-26 at the halfway point.

Rivercrest added another 16 points in the third period. Karnack hit for 19. The Rebels led by ten, 55-45.

Karnack got hot in the final period hitting for 19 points but another 13 by the Rebs gave the victory to Rivercrest 68-64.

Scoring for the Rebels were Tony Jasso with 21, Brad Anderson with 13, Chris Anderson with 12, Russell Rozell with 10, Charley Martin with 10, and Clint Stephenson with two.

Rivercrest met Harmony on the road Friday night and claimed their last game of the season, 54-42. Tony Jasso was high scorer again with 27 points. Charley Martin was also in double figures with 10.

Rivercrest led 14-11 at the end of the first quarter of play. Jasso scored ten

points and Charley Martin and Kenneth Kelly added two each.

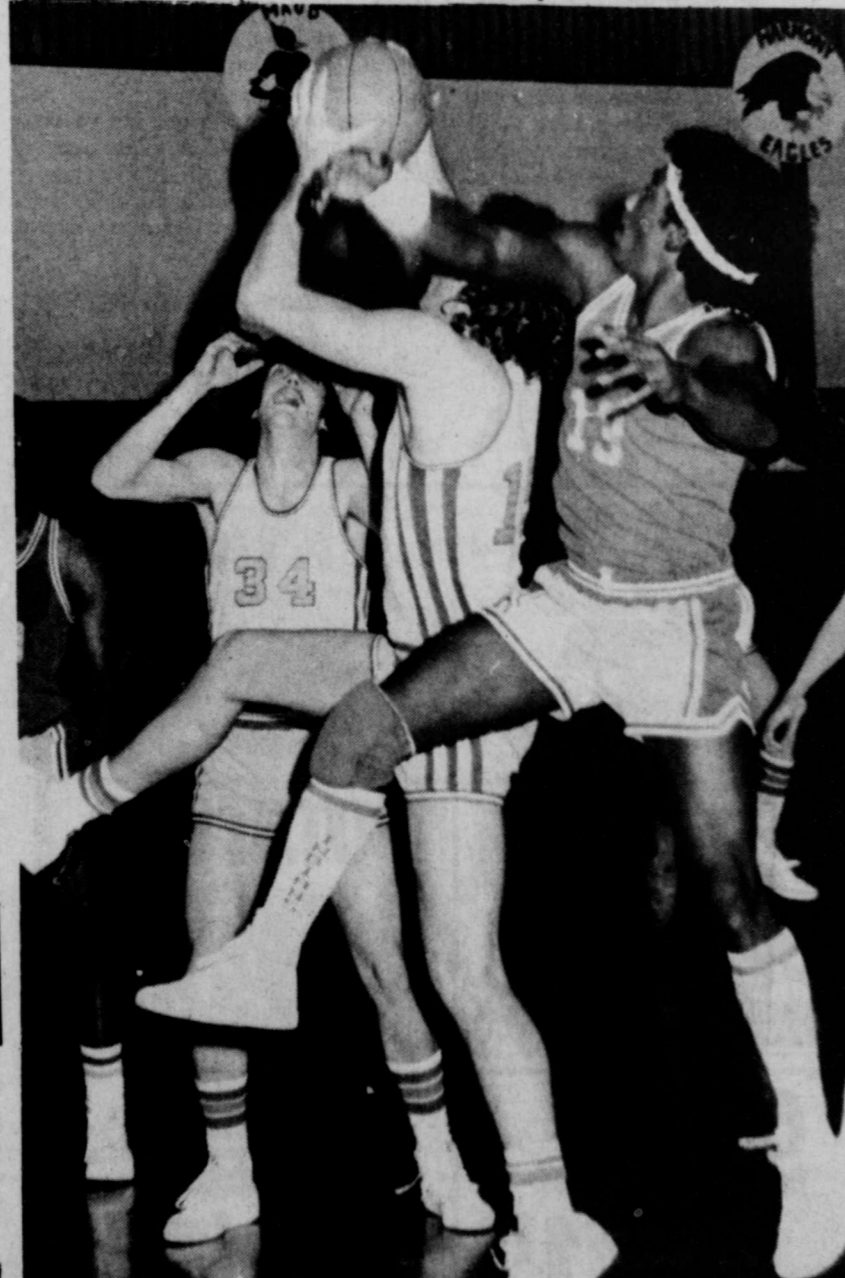
The Rebels added 11 in the second period to Harmony's seven. Brad Anderson hit for four, Tony Jasso hit for three, and Russel Rozell and Charley Martin each added two. Rivercrest led at the half 25-18.

Harmony hit for 11 in the third period but Rivercrest answered with 12 of their own. Martin and Jasso hit for four each and Brad and Chris Anderson added two each.

The Rebels marked up an additional 17 points in the final period to Harmony's 13. Tony Jasso scored four points and eight more on free throws. Charley Martin and Brad Anderson each hit for two and Kenneth Kelly added one on a free throw. The Rebs claimed the victory to finish out their season.

Scoring for Rivercrest were Tony Jasso with 27, Charley Martin 10, Brad Anderson 8, Kenneth Kelly 3, Russell Rozell and Chris Anderson each with two.

Rivercrest will be a different district next season. Over the past years in 19AA the Rebels have held a good winning record. Rivercrest met New Diana 13 times and won eight; met Maud 16 times and won 14; met Redwater 22 times and won 20; met Ore City 17 times and won nine; met Harleton five times and won three; met Harmony eight times and won six; met James Bowie 15 times and won 15; met Karnack four times and won three; met Queen City six times and won four; met Big Sandy four times and won four; and met Detroit 16 times and won nine.

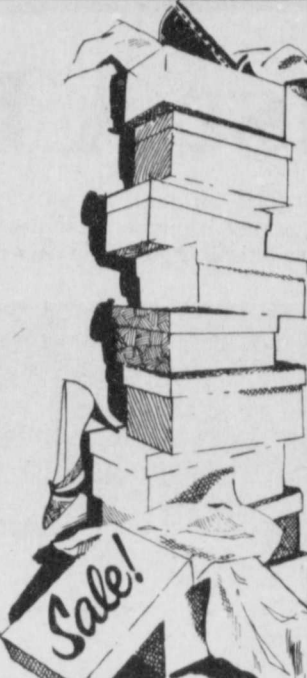

Paris Art Fair To Feature Variety

The 1986 Paris-YWCA Art Fair will have both professional and non-professional exhibitors. Each year craftsmen from all over Texas and surrounding states rent marked areas on the Paris Junior College campus to sell their original work. Professional exhibitors will be on the front lawn under a tent with pegboard

divider panels furnished by the YWCA. The '86 Fair is set for Saturday, May 3.

Professional exhibitors are to be juried. The jury is a competent panel of artists with expertise in various media. Artists must submit slides with entry forms, tent fees and return envelopes by March 3.

The professional exhibitors area is open to any professional artist or craftsman whose work is original. Work must be submitted on 2x2" color slides which should not be glass mounts. Slides should be labeled with the artist's name, address and medium and the top of the slide should be indicated. A stamped-self-addressed business size envelope should be enclosed for a letter of notification and the return of all slides.

The slides and return envelope should be accompanied by an entry form from the Artist Application and a \$75 tent fee which will reserve a 10x10' space. If work is not accepted, the tent fee will be returned.

Only items like those represented in accepted slides will be permitted for sale. The Fair reserves the right to reject any inappropriate work. Work must be original; however, prints of an artist's original work may be sold. No commission is charged on exhibitor's sales and this year advance purchase awards will be offered.

A professional exhibitor's application is considered a commitment to exhibit in the 1986 art fair. If accepted, no refund will be made for cancellation after April 1. Professional exhibitors are encouraged to enter work in the Professional Art Competition area, but they may not enter any work in the Non-Professional Art Competition.

To obtain more information or to receive a Paris Art Fair Artist Application one may contact the YWCA, 308 S. Main, Paris, TX 75460. The YWCA of Paris and Lamar County is a United Way agency.

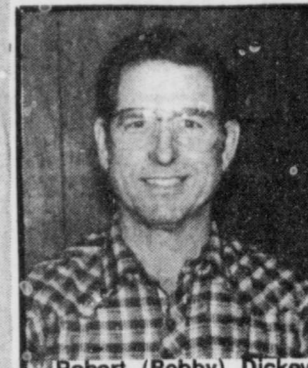

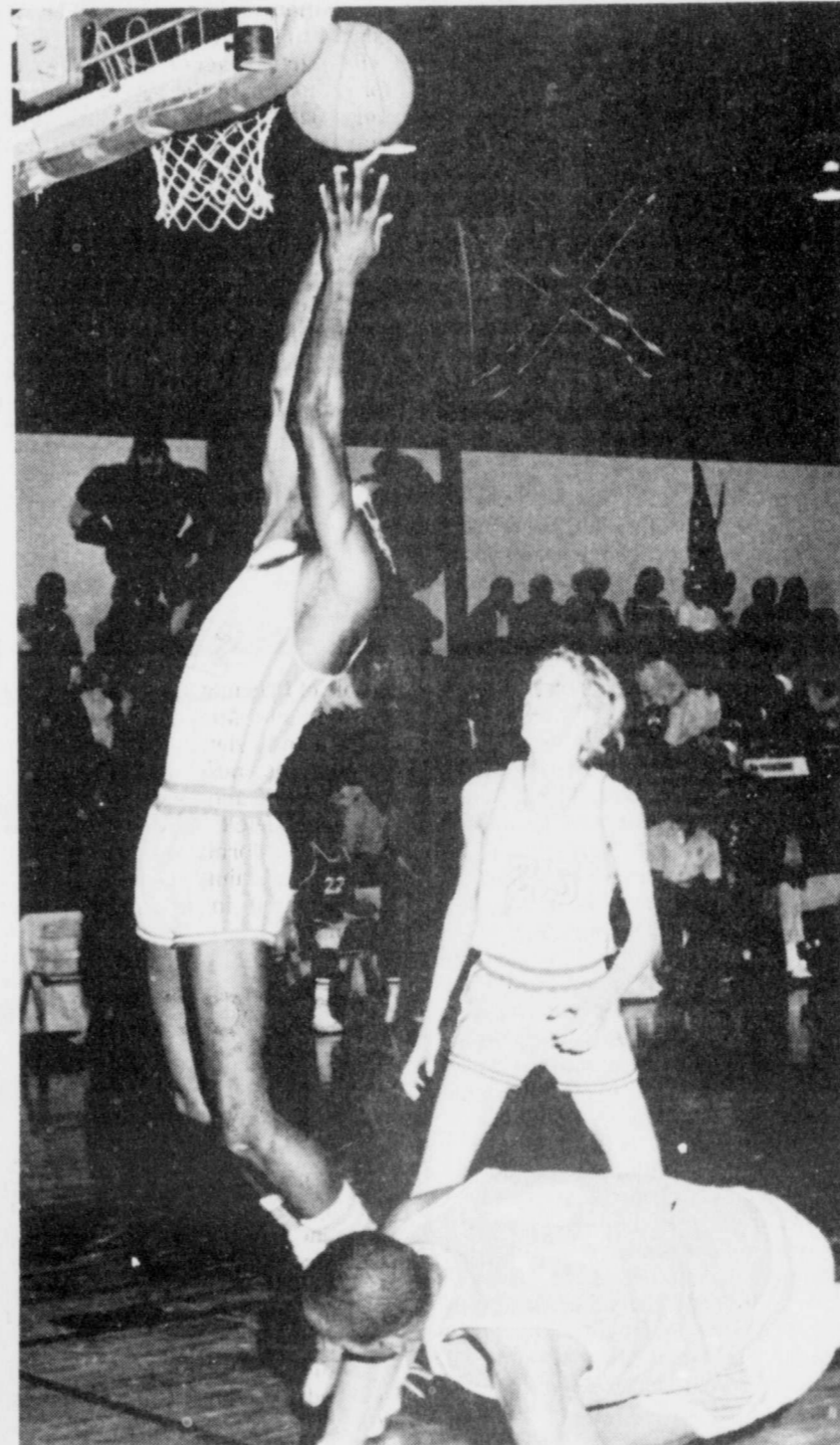

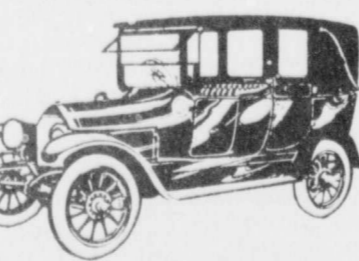

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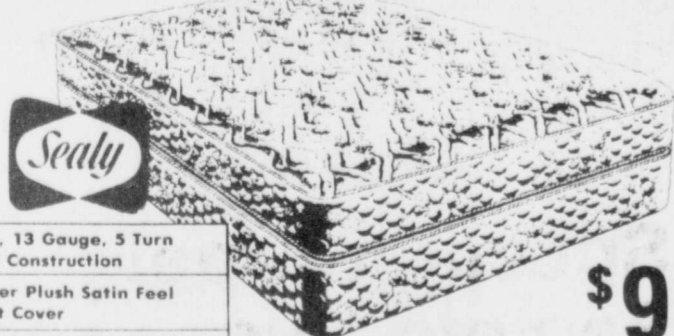

Test Dates For Teachers Scheduled

Test dates have been scheduled for individuals who are not currently employed in public education but who want to have continued certification to remain eligible to teach in Texas schools after June 30.

The first four test dates, April 12, June 28, July 12 and October 4, are part of a statewide program to continue certification of all holders of valid Texas teacher certificates.

March 1 is the deadline for registering to take the April 12 test.

A provision included in House Bill 72, passed in 1984, requires all Texas school teachers and administrators who want to remain eligible to teach in Texas public schools after June 30 to pass a reading and writing test called the Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers, (TECAT).

About 210,000 teachers and administrators who are currently employed in public schools will take the TECAT on March 10.

All test sessions following the March 10 examination are open to individuals holding Texas teacher certificates issued prior to February 1, 1986.

Tests will be administered at 125 sites across the state. Most test sites will be within 75 miles of an individual's residence.

A \$30 fee for the test will be charged. The fee includes registration materials and the official study guide.

Because only a limited number of individuals can be accommodated during each of the examination sessions, assignments to test sites will be filled on a first-come, first served basis.

Registration packets that include information about the test, a registration form and TECAT study guide may be obtained at your local school district personnel office or at any of the state's 20 regional educational service centers. Individuals must be registered to take the exam.

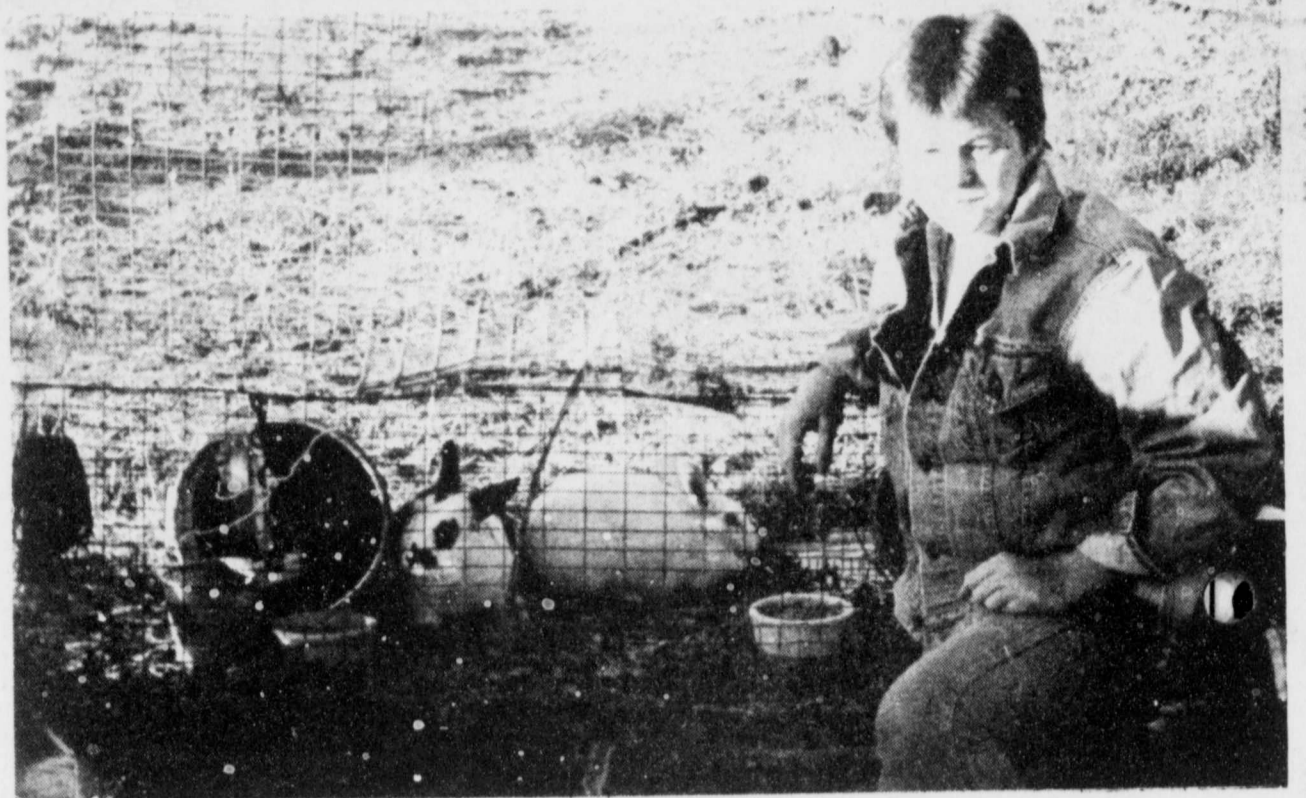

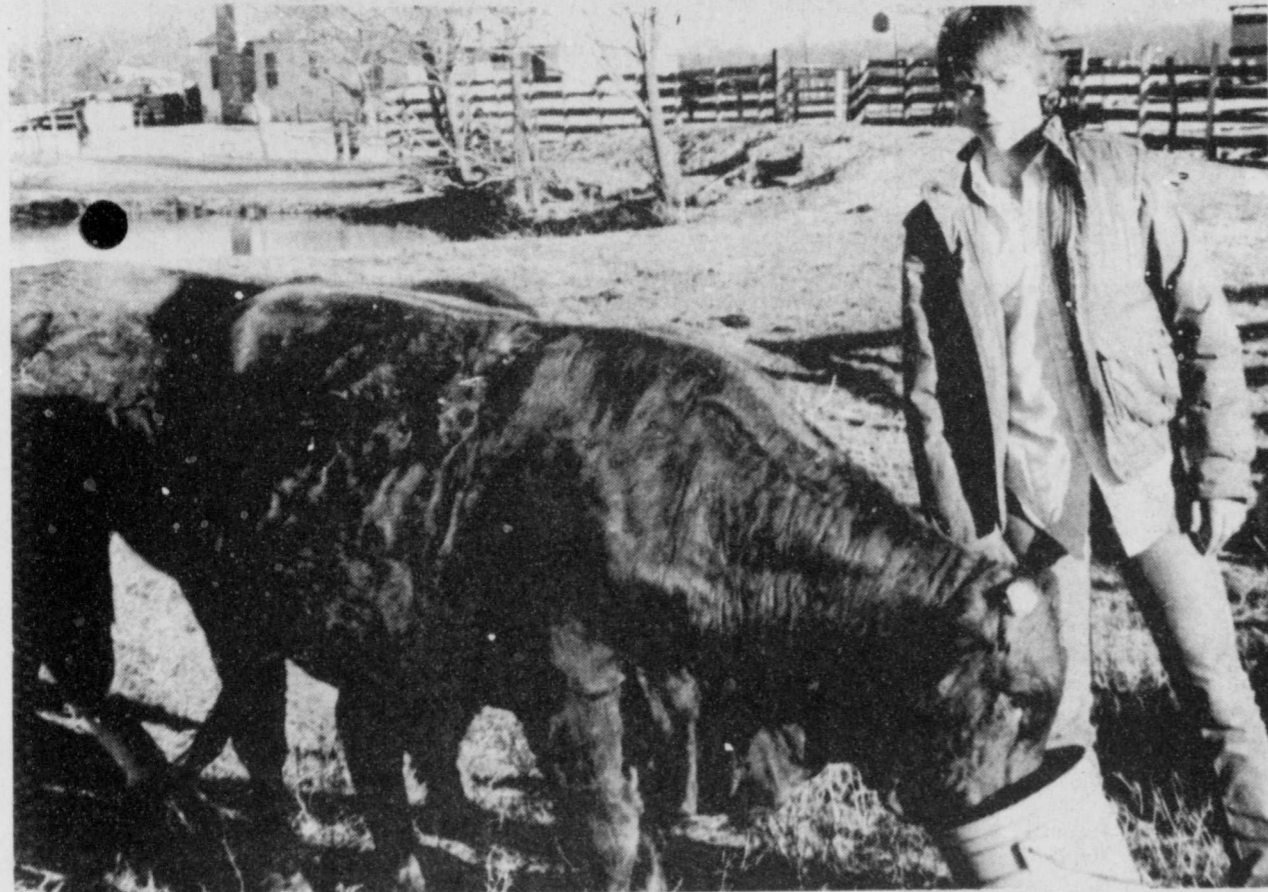

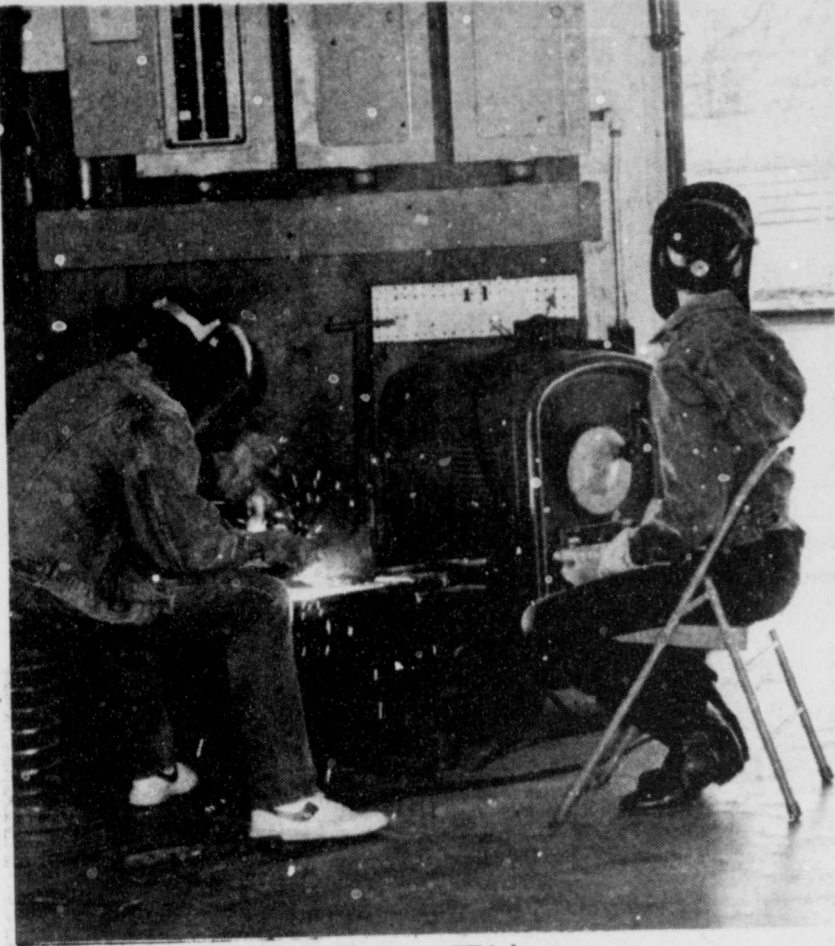

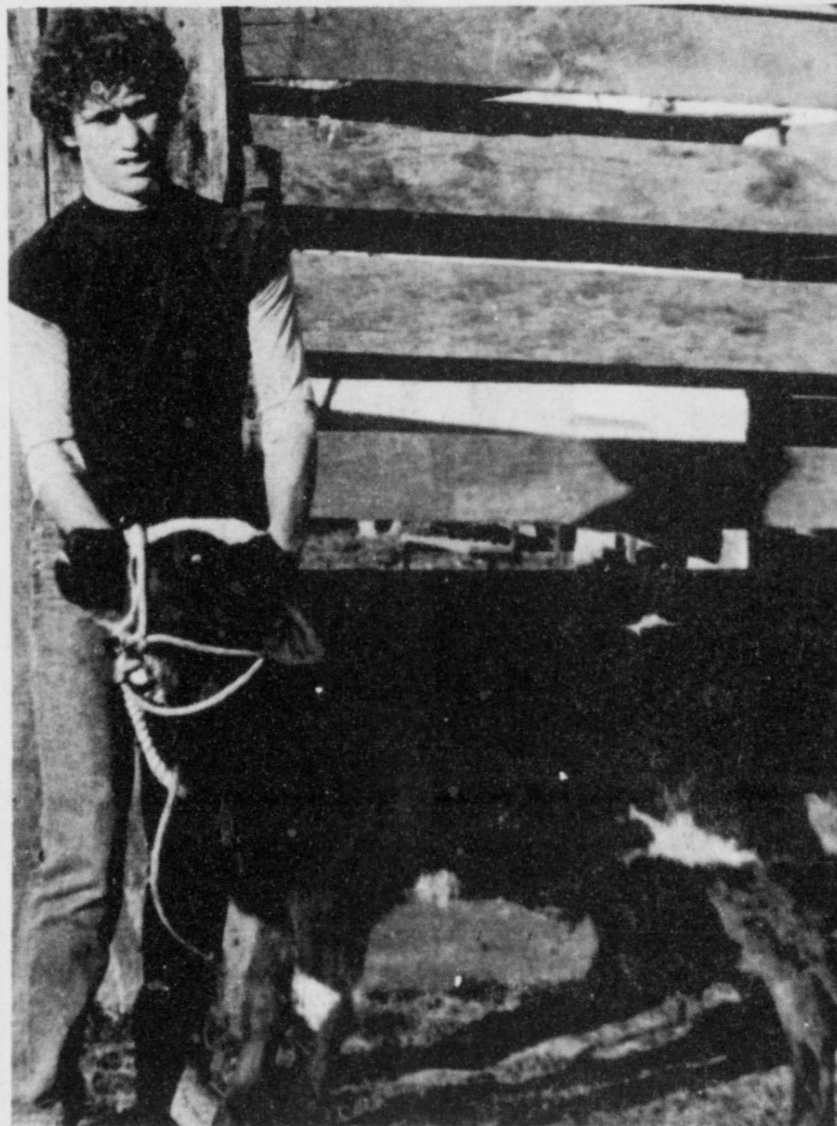
