The cat suffering from some sort of virus crawled up onto the sundeck. glared at the puppies and proceeded to yowl every five seconds, a legacy of her half-Siamese heritage.

After seeing the vet, vaccinations and worm medicine administered. bill paid, medicine in hand, I gave a sigh of relief. The worst, I was sure, was over. Of course, any animal person should have known better!

The cat in the carrier proceeded to wail on the return trip, and got down to serious clawing in an escape attempt. The puppies upped their volumn of sound several decibels.

Changes In Grocery Business By Nanalee Nichols

Joe Ford's Grocery in downtown Bogata will be closing soon. Joe and Lela Ford have finally decided to try retirement. The closing will end an era that

began in 1933, when Joe first began working for his cousin before and after school.

Ford recalls the changes that he has seen in Bogata, the difference in the size of the town, the radical changes in buying habits.

One of his first jobs, back when he worked from 6 a.m. until school, then from after school until 8 p.m., and all day on Saturday, was sacking up 'everything but the flour'

Vinegar and cooking oil came in fifty-five gallon barrels, and kerosene was one of the biggest sellers.

Business was booming them, and seventy percent of it came on Saturdays, when wagons full of people from the outlying farms and communities arrived in town for a day long shopping and visiting spree.

He remembers when the market square in town was crowded with wagons, and later the Model T's, and the streets teemed with families "come to town"

Then, Ford recalls, flour was bought by the fifty pound sack, sugar by the 100 weight, and salt twenty-five pounds at a time.

Many people purchased a month's supply of groceries and hardware or

dry goods, coming to town only rarely

Joe Ford Reflects On

The store, which is the same size now as then, sold as much as 50 50-pound flour, 25 25-pound meal, 25 bottles of snuff and uncounted pounds of freshly ground coffee during it's heyday in a single day.

"Boy", he smiles, "grinding those coffee beans sure did smell good" During the 1940's, Joe worked at the store, still owned by his cousin, and attended Paris Junior College. In 1942 he went into the service, returning in 1945, and then going to East Texas State Teachers College for a business degree

He returned to Bogata to manage the store from 1947 until he purchased it in 1969.

Eggs, watermelons and various other fresh produce didn't come from a grocery truck, then, but from individuals who brought their goods by.

He recalls that during his days going to Paris Junior College a bus would come through, picking up about 15 people from Bogata, ten or twelve at Deport and some at Pattonville, so that by the time it arrived in Paris. it was full. He also grins as he recalls marrying Lela in 1964, "The best thing I ever did" he says with a twinkle in his eye.

He was one of the first stores in the area to handle seed and fertilizer. starting in the 1950's.

The Fords say they have seen

'good times and bad times'', but always come through them. It is obvious that life is something to be faced, and enjoyed.

"There used to be twelve grocery stores in this town" Joe says. The town wasn't but half the size it is now,

but the farms were full and folks didn't travel very far for what they needed.

From cutting five and ten cent

plugs of tobacco from five pound chunks, to specially cut steaks, Joe Ford knows about the grocery business. He chose, he says, to remain in the old tradition of the grocery business, not going towards the streamlined "Supermarket" image.



Being Accepted

loans for losses caused by this past cial credit but who choose to borrow summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office in Clarksville, County Supervisor Frank B. Stroud said recently. Red River County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cove rpart of actual production losses resulting from the drought

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five percent : interest rate is eight percent on the balance borrowed over that amount.

Applications for emergency farm For farmers who can obtain comemifrom FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75%

> As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will ahve to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation willb e accepted until October 7, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season

To Discuss Lake

March 11 is the date set tor an open meeting to decide if the City of Bogata should participate in the new water district proposal or not. The meeting is scheduled for City Hall at 7 p.m.

Mayor John Hood points out that, although the city does not need the water at the present time, the formation of a county lake would provide water for the children and grandchildren of the county, and provide for expansion for the city.

There are a number of alternatives in financing the formation of a lake, and the Bogata City Council very much wants the input of the citizens of Bogata. They are urging everyone to attend the meeting and let their feelings be heard.

The best information available so far is that it would add about \$10 or \$15 to the present beills, or the county could ask for an election and sell county-wide bonds to pay for the construction.

Mayor Hood also points out that the lake will be built with or without Bogata, the question is whether the city wants to participate so that water will be available later on.

The City Council must make the decision, so everyone is urged to at-

tend the meeting and h them do what the people want.

"As we discussed this test stuff around the newsroom the other day. I could see why teachers do not want





Everyone is invited to come by and browse, eat and get your car washed. If the weather is bad, the activities will be postponed one week.






