
The honorees, who were the Senior Superlatives and Senior Class Favorites, took a stroll down "Memory Lane" which was constructed of a white arch with greenery

The Pattonville Water Supply Corporation has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water ing supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Fluoride established by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act Public Law 93-523 (U.S.)

The limit for this area has been se at 1.6 milligrams of Fluoride per liter of water. The samples of water from our system contained 3.8 milligrams of Fluoride per liter. There is no im-mediate health hazard for drinking water containing Fluoride at this level. The Fluoride may cause mottling (brown staining) of the teeth in children under 14 years of age.

All dentists in this area are aware of the Fluoride level. 
