

Local Sales Taxes Show General Increase

State comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$108.1 million in local sales tax to the 1,015 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest, \$17.7 million, bringing total payment

sin 1986 to \$64.8 million, down two percent over 1985. Dallas received \$12.5 million for a total of \$46.1 million in total payments for this year, a decrease of five percent.

Blossom received \$1,895.27 for this period payment, a 5.40% increase

over the 1985 payment of \$1,886.18 while Deport received \$2,022.96 for this period, marking an 0.52% decrease over the 1985 payment of \$2,197.08. Total payments to date for Deport are \$4,930.48.

Paris received \$234,680.19 for a

10.74% decrease over 1985.

Bogata received \$3,879.63 for a 16% increase over the 1985 payment of \$3,405.84 for a total of \$12,388.49 to date. Clarksville received \$26,447.07 for a 9.84% increase.

Detroit received \$1,974.95 for a

4.77% increase over last year's payment for the same period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$114,276.57 for a 7.36% increase over the 1985 payment.

Talco received \$2,711.57 for a 5.83% increase over the 1985 payment of

\$1,913.83. Total payments to date for Talco are \$10,030.20.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

Former Coach To Speak At Banquet

Coach Wake Wood has announced that J.L. Tucker, superintendent of the Leonard schools, will be the guest speaker at the athletic banquet to be held in the Rivercrest cafeteria Monday, May 19 at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$4.50 for adults and \$3.50 for students.

Mr. Tucker, former Rivercrest Coach and principal, has an outstanding coaching record. In 1960-61 as coach at Avery High School, he coached the girls' basketball team to a district championship, but was defeated in the regional finals.

In 1962-63, Coach Tucker accepted the coaching position at Talco High School. In 1963, the girls were state runner-up and in 1964, they were bi-district winners. His boys' team won the Class A state championship in 1964. Again in 1964-65, his Talco girls were district champs.

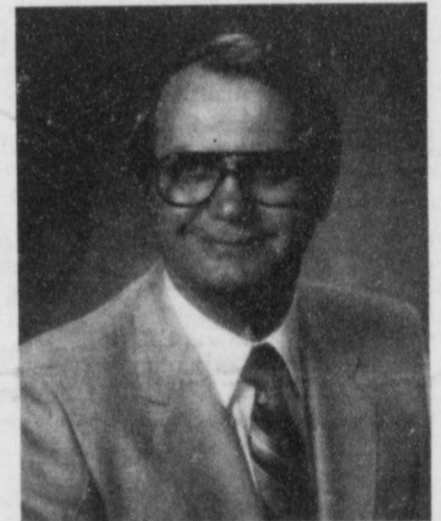
After Bogata and Talco schools consolidated, Coach Tucker won the girls' district championship every year from 1965-75. His teams participated in the state meet four times and won the state championship in 1968 with a flawless record of 35-0.

Coach Tucker served on the committee that consisted of ten representatives from throughout Texas that met in Waco during the 1962-63 school year and organized the Texas High School Girls' Track Association. He served as director for the nine years the association was in existence. During this time he coached the track and field events and won district championships every year from 1965-74.

When asked what he contributed his success to Coach Tucker said "I truly believe that the Lord blessed me with being at the right place at the right time; and was fortunate enough to have outstanding boys and girls that made coaching them a pleasure."

Mr. Tucker is married and he and wife Mary have three daughters, Jamie, who is married and teaching school, Jana, a student at East Texas State University and Jae who is a sophomore at Leonard High School.

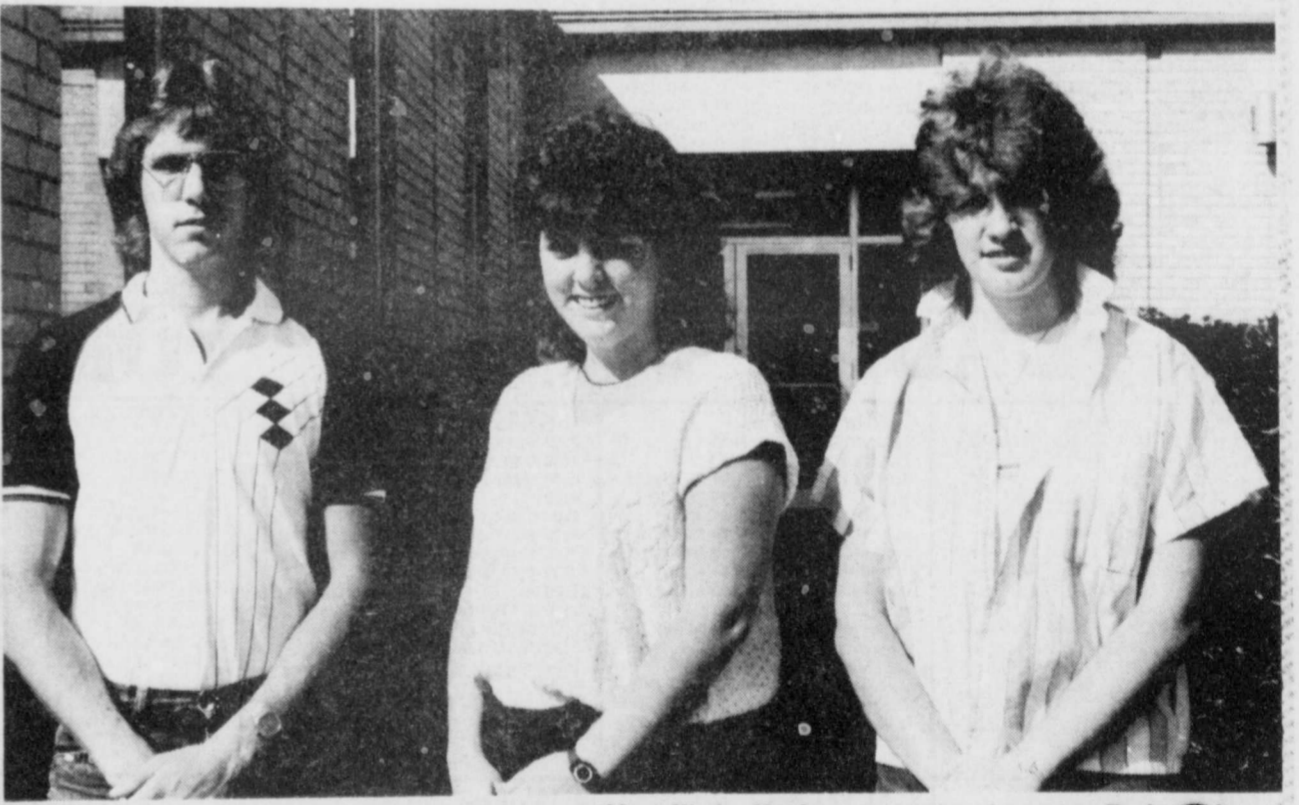

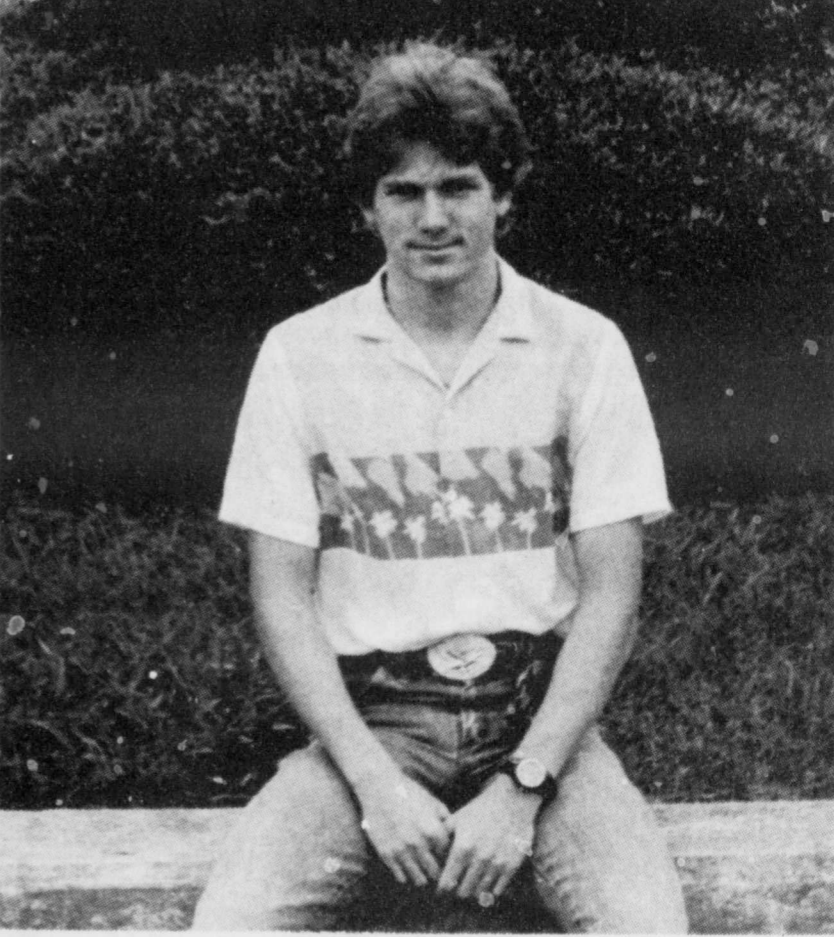

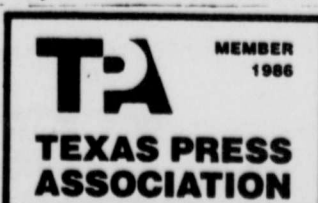

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The Jesse Chisholm Trail

Jesse Chisholm gave his name to one of the most famous episodes in western history, but he never knew it. Chisholm, of Scotch and Cherokee ancestry, migrated with the Cherokees from Tennessee to Arkansas in the 1830s and later set up a trading post at Council Grove, on the North Canadian River near present-day Oklahoma City. His freight wagons cut a 220-mile path from Wichita, Kan., down to his store, and in 1866 when a Texas cattleman asked the best way to drive a herd to the Kansas and Missouri markets, he was advised to "take Chisholm's trail."

Joseph G. McCoy was hired by the developers of the new town of Abilene, Kan., to get a trail laid out to bring Texas herds to their railhead. McCoy's trail began deep in Texas, the first cattle going up to Abilene in 1867. But instead of being called "McCoy Trail" or "Abilene Trail," by 1868 the route from Texas to Kansas was called the Chisholm Trail, giving its title to legendary cattle drives of story, song and film. The Texas portion of the trail saw several herds combined below San Antonio and again near Austin, crossing the Colorado River. The Brazos was crossed at Kimball Bend or Waco, then all herds combined at Fort Worth, continuing through Denton, Cooke and Montague counties to the dangerous crossing of "Big Red" at Red River Station.

Fort Worth was where the trail drivers outfitted their cowboys for the long trip across the Indian Nations. In season, the trail was a living, animal river. In 1871, half a million head of cattle passed through Fort Worth going up the Chisholm Trail. Although later cattle trails moved westward, Fort Worth remained "Cowtown" in the hearts and minds of Texas forever more.

Poor Jesse Chisholm, he died in 1868, reputedly from eating tainted bear meat from a copper pot, never dreaming how celebrated his name would become.
