My company has gone on to tour more of the United States now, and soon will be home in England once more.

We had a lovely time, introducing them to Texas, and learning about life in another country.

Most of us are aware that we have a much higher standard of living than the average third world nation...but perhaps are not so aware of the differences between ourselves and a civilized nation like England.

Here is a short list of some of the things that make a difference in our lives and theirs:

My wife is worried constantly about the electric bill. A fan, or lights left on, bothered them. The air conditioner quite stunned them.

They refused to use the electric clothes dryer because of the wastefulness of it. The average Londoner does not own a washer and dryer, and they don't run down to the nearest laundromat either. Instead, they wash in their bathtub, using a little spin dryer to wring them out, hanging the laundry out of window lines or in the kitchen during the frequent rainy spells.

Hot water heaters do not provide hot water all the time for them...but have timers that provide heated water for about two hours, during which time bathing and laundry is done. It is simply too expensive to operate one all the time.

Phones are a luxury, and so is warmth in winter! Many gas meters accept coins, and when the coins run out, so does the heat.

The average senior citizen doesn't keep overly warm in winter, and lives in one room to conserve heat.

The idea of almost everyone owning a car, or of a family of two adults owning two vehicles was startling to them. When they discovered how many high school students take cars to school, they were completely overwhelmed.

They shop with little carts and walk miles and miles. Driving a few blocks between stores seemed funny to them.

Bread and margarine seem to be about the only cheap foods, although meat is eaten, it isn't consumed in the quantities we eat it.

Salaries are low in comparison to ours. A highly trained computer operator makes about the equivalent of \$175 per week before taxes. Compare that to our computer personnel!

Most refrigerators are small, many have no freezer at all. Shopping is done on a daily basis.

They find things in the U.S. rather "dear" (expensive) and wonder how people can afford so very much.

They find the standard of living amazing. The simple frame houses that we accept as a normal part of life they find luxuriously large, with lawns and gardens hundreds of times bigger than theirs.

Very little property is privately owned, most rental is through the council, a form of the government.

Buying a house is expensive and quite beyond the means of the average wage earner.

They are people just like us, with the same dreams, the same hopes as we have. The big difference, it seems is in the realizability of those dreams.

For the average American, things sometimes seem a little rough. Owning a big home, a new car, requires a lot of work.

For the average English citizen, those things require more than a little work...they require years and years of waiting, hoping, filling out forms and then, more than likely, doing without.

Believe me, the American dream is still alive and well...just ask anyone who isn't privileged enough to have been born here!

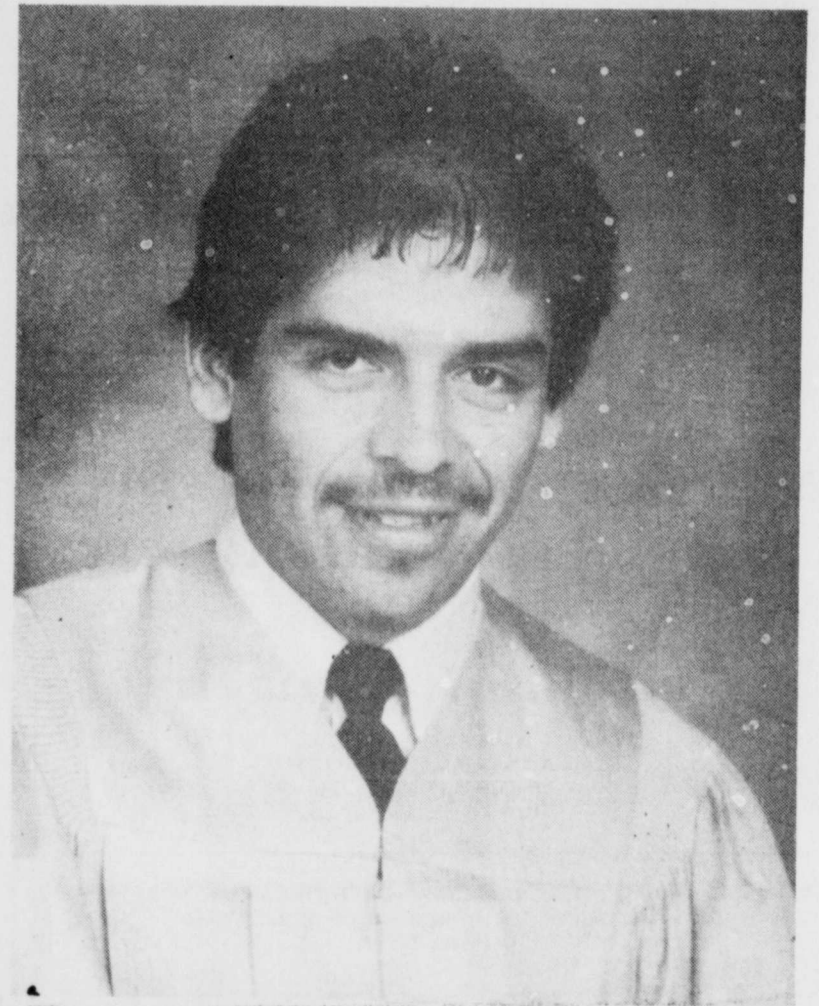

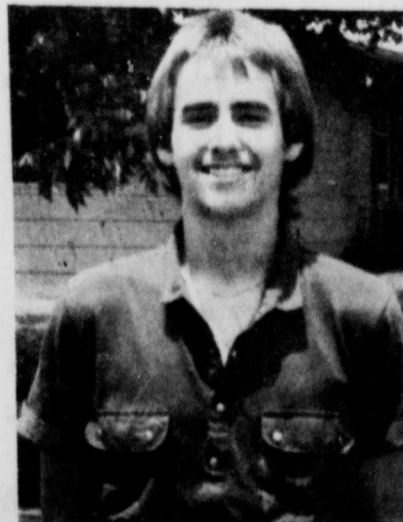
of 90.8. These grade averages were based on the 1985-86 school year.

PJC Summer Program Includes High School And Adult Classes

In addition to classes for young persons, Paris Junior College's summer program will include several courses for high school age students and adults, said June Jones, director of community services.

During the three week period from June 9-27, courses offered for high school age students will include typing, microcomputer I, II and III, chess, photography, pre-algebra, drivers education, tennis, speed reading, study and test taking skills and career opportunities for health careers.

Art workshops in basic drawing and watercolor will be taught June 16-19 and scuba diving classes will begin earlier, from May 29-June 30. Registration for the courses may be made Tuesday, May 27 from 1 to 5 p.m. in the Alford Center. All fees must be paid at time of registration.

Typing will be Monday and Friday from 2 to 4 p.m. June 9-27. Fee is \$65 for the 30-hour course. Chess will include basic moves and strategies, procedures and rules for tournament play. Classes will be from 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. Mondays and Wednesdays during three weeks. Fee is \$25.

Microcomputer courses will be Monday through Thursday from 2:45 to 5 p.m. on Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. Fee for one week is \$25. High school age students with computer experience may take the 15-hour adult microcomputer course from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Fee is \$50 for the longer course.

Pre-algebra courses will be Mondays and Wednesdays from 8:30 to 10 a.m. for a fee of \$25. Speed reading is set for Mondays and Wednesdays from 2 to 4 p.m. and tennis will be on Monday through Thursday from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. The fee for either course is \$25.

Drivers education will be Monday through Friday from 8 to 10 a.m. and the fee is \$145. Scuba diving, Monday and Thursday from 6 to 10 p.m. on May 29-June 30 will cost \$290. Photography will be Mondays, June 9, 16 and 23 from 1 to 4 p.m. with a fee of \$25. Career opportunities for health occupations will be Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1 to 4 p.m. for a \$25 fee.

Study and test taking skills will be taught only on Friday, June 14 from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Fee is \$10. The basic drawing and watercolor workshops will be Monday through Thursday, June 16-19 from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. Fee is \$40.

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School Board Accepts Tax Reports, Adjustments

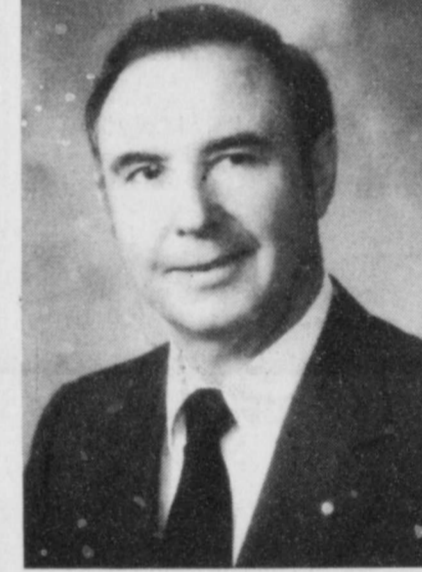
"Our manufacturing plant exists to serve our customers. Our customers is why we exist. Our company is why we exist. Our company strives for quality products of good service and of value to our customers," he

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An Editorial

For this paper to reprint a column by another columnist at another paper is highly unusual. But the column on the Red River County Water problem written by John A. Moseley on April 23 said such a mouthful that we decided to reprint it so that our readers could consider it...with permission from John, of course. Editor.

No, I'm not Zero Mostel, and the Clarksville Kiwanis Club isn't exactly the Forum, but a funny thing, if you can call anything this serious funny, happened during Tuesday's lunch meeting of that body.

It suddenly struck me that it was ridiculous that Red River Countians should be facing the water crisis they now face.

Crisis, you ask?
Certainly. And to be honest, I hadn't even realized how serious the crisis was until Kyle Harvey made his presentation supporting the proposed Dimple Reservoir on White Oak Bayou Project.

How many Clarksville residents are aware that the State of Texas continually labels the city's tap water as being "unfit for human consumption". You can wash clothes in it, you can take a bath in it, but you shouldn't drink it.

There's only one real problem with that, we all DO drink it, don't we? Even those of us who don't live in Clarksville have ample occasion to taste the city's strong-tasting water.

Me? I live in Detroit. But I spend more time in Clarksville, because that's where I work. As a result, I'm sure I consume more Clarksville water than that provided by the City of Detroit.

That, friends, is scary.
Looks like I just thought The Times' business manager, Delaine Williams, was a little strange when she steadfastly refused to make the office coffee without using distilled water. Pretty smart lady, if you ask me.

Wish I could say the same for the county's decisionmakers that have held sway for the last several years.

Sure, sure...I know all about those artesian wells Clarksville and some other cities hereabouts draw their water from. They used to provide pure water...more than anyone could have believed would have ever been needed.

"Last a lifetime," I believe is the way Harvey put it.

They didn't now did they?
What's that you folks over there in Detroit say? You're getting your water from the Lamar County Water Supply Corporation? So's the 410 Water Supply.

Avery, Annona and Red River County Water Supply get theirs from Texarkana?

Well, looks like everybody but the folks in Clarksville are set, right? And heck, we've never trusted those folks in Clarksville, have we? Not interested in getting involved in anything they're interested in doing, might wind up having to pay for something only they'd use.

Look again.
Correct me if I'm wrong, but every one of those entities purchasing water from other concerns is contractually

required to purchase water for a certain period of time. That means that you're going to have water for 40 years if the contract says you have to buy it for that length of time, right?

Wrong, again. Take another look. I'll bet the selling agency can curtail sales at any time with only a short period of notice. I'll also bet there's nothing in this world that can stop them from doubling or tripling the price they charge for that water, too. Couldn't happen?

Check again. The City of Texarkana gets a large amount of its water from Arkansas lakes, and it just so happens that there is a current move underway in the Arkansas Legislature that would prohibit sale of that state's water to entities in other states. Imagine, if you will, what that would do to Texarkana's method of doing business.

Of course, there's no problem with the Lamar County Water Supply. They buy their water from the City of Paris, which gets its water from Pat Mayse Lake.

Paris is growing. So's Lamar County. In fact, Lamar County's rural areas are growing at a much faster rate than the city can claim.

Oh, yes, have you happened to note the growth taking place in the Texarkana area lately? Nuff said.

The bottom line is: We don't have our own lake. Not one that can provide for our communities.

Of course, there are those who'll claim that disasters of the aforementioned nature could never come to pass.

Sure about that? Just ask the folks down in Cooper.

They had all the water that town would ever need. All of a sudden, though, there was a crisis. They wound up having to run 20 miles of piping over ground to buy water from Sulphur Springs. In the interim, they hauled water, went down to the square and filled plastic jugs from a tanker truck parked downtown.

"You don't know hardship until you have to haul water in five gallon buckets to flush the toilet," one woman once told me. I haven't forgotten that, and one of us should.

What's worse is the fact that Red River County is the second-poorest county in Texas. Only Rains County is worse off.

Delta County, of which Cooper is the county seat, used to be the poorest. It's residents had allowed the entire community to virtually die as they waited for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to fulfill a 30-year old promise to build Cooper Lake.

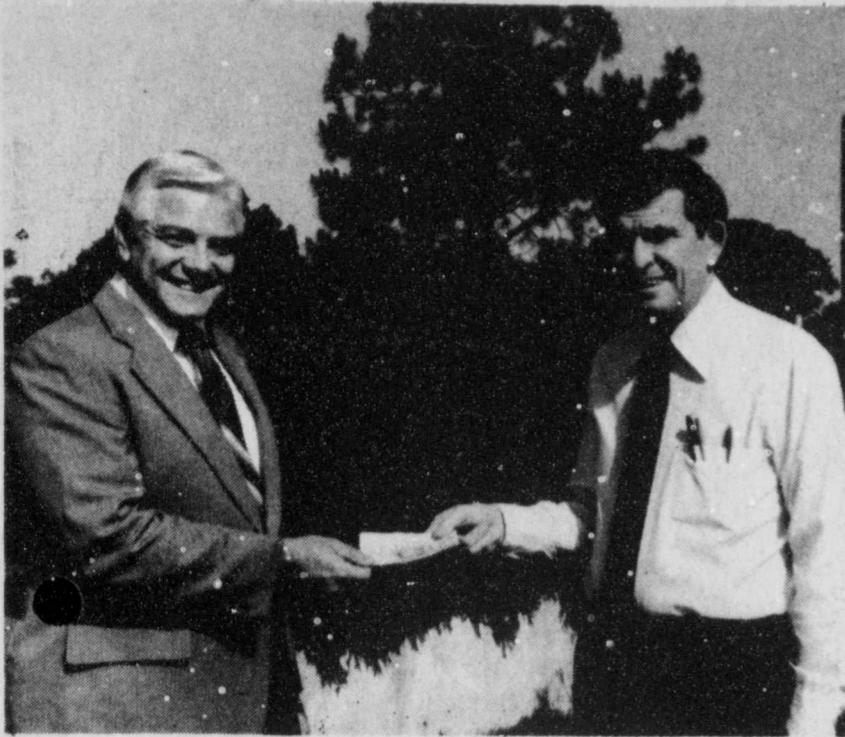
They finally got tired of waiting, formed a municipal utilities district (MUD) and began making plans to build their own lake.

They're now getting ready to break ground on that project, and already new industry is beginning to locate in Cooper, simply because it is known that water will soon be available.

As a result, Delta County has leapfrogged to where it is no longer close to being the state's poorest county.

Good grief, Charlie Brown, you mean we're poorer than Delta County?

Shame on us.

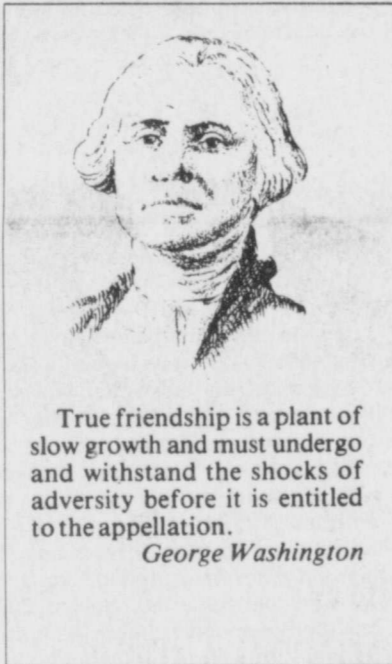

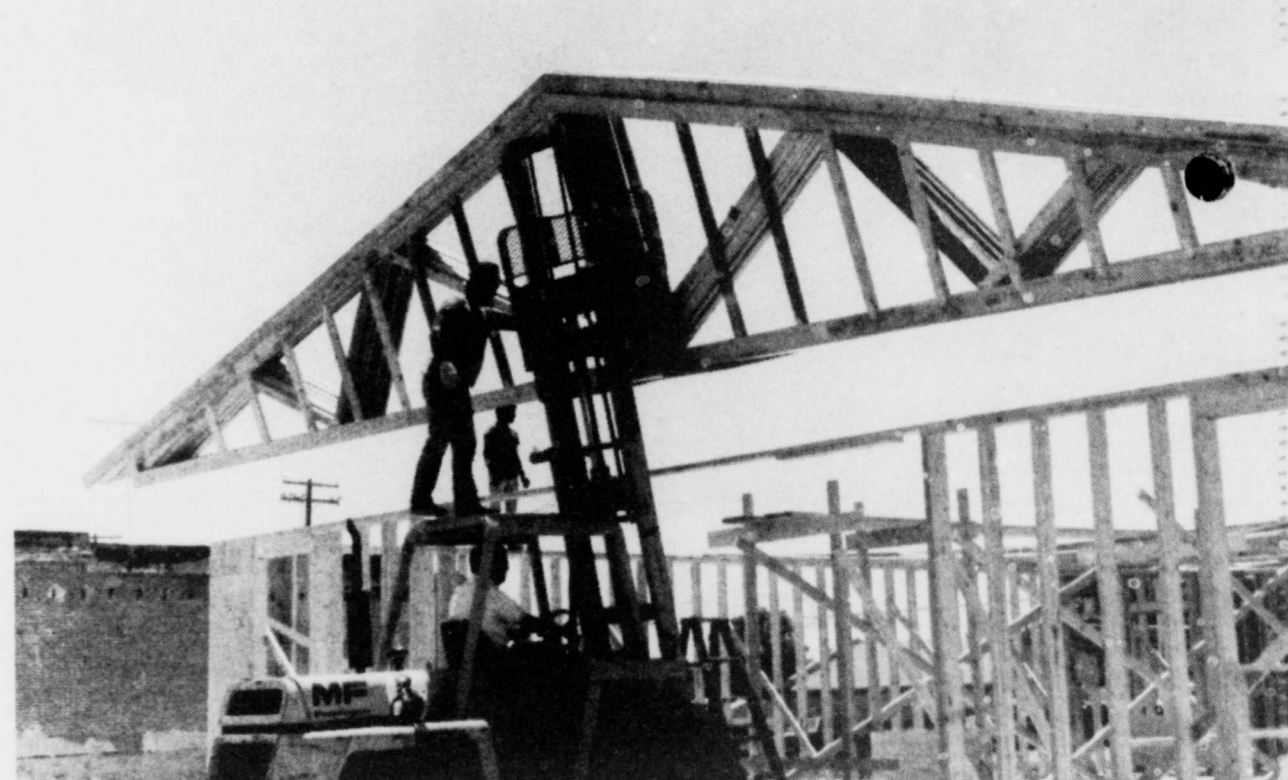

A Continuation Of The True Recollections of Agnes Moore

We had only gone a few miles, just past Maple when we saw some of our best friends "cutting persimmon sprouts" in the field. We waved goodbye to them, and more tears flowed. Incidentally, one in that field that day, many years later, became my husband.

We spent the night in Cuthand with relatives and left early the next morning. Finally on our way to West Texas. When night came close, we would look for a good place to camp, where the tent could be set up, and the team could have water and a place to graze. There was a three burner oil stove, which when the wind was not blowing, mama could cook our meals on it. That kerosene stove was quite a novelty to us as we'd never had one before. Another great attraction to we children was the loaf bread, store bought. My mother had baked bread, but this was so different, and with white karo syrup, it was really a delicacy to us, for a while. Then we didn't want that white bread and karo syrup.

After traveling the first week, camping at night, leaving fairly early to travel while it was cool, we began to feel like real pilgrims. We were east of Sherman one day and had set up camp when the man who lived nearby came out to see if the family would like to hoe cotton. Needless to say, all the family were not willing, but since our parents were, we agreed. The week of traveling and camping out in the open air had helped Papa so much, also my sister, Gracie, who had not been well, was improving. While we were working for a week, I would stay at camp with my mom and help get the dinner ready and Papa and Gracie would hoe cotton while it was cooler, and mama and I would work in the p.m. We all remember that week, I'm sure for several reasons. The best one was that our Papa was so much improved and could enjoy working, and another reason the young couple we were working for had a baby daughter about the same age of our little niece we had left behind. When we were not working, we could play with her.

We traveled the old 82 highway. Farmers along the way were friendly. Several times a man and woman would come out and stop us and offer fresh vegetables, etc. And one dear lady asked my mom if we could use some milk on our trip so far. She gave us two lard buckets of clabber milk! When we stopped for the night, my mother fried cornbread and we had a feast on bread and milk.

There were lots of excitement in our trip, one night we were all asleep when a storm came up. The tent began to shake and rain fell. Before we could all get things in the wagon, the bedclothes were all wet, for the tent had blown over. Also water had

come under the tent. Next a.m. a lady who lived nearby came down and asked my mother and older sisters to come up and wash the clothes. We hung the quilts on a fence nearby and by another day were on our way.

One night my baby sister who was near seven years of age, awakened my mother screaming "There's a gray bug on me." Someone asked how she knew it was gray and she exclaimed "Cause it's fuzzy".

The girls all took turns riding the horse. I'd never wanted to ride, until we were out for a few weeks. Then one day I decided I could ride him. I felt very important riding behind the horse. Then all of a sudden "Bailey" decided he would eat some grass on the roadside. He would nibble and walk slow, there was a farmhouse

with several children in the yard. Some wanted to talk to me, but my concern was to get the horse back on the road. I looked up and the wagon had gone around a curve and I was scared. I could just imagine they would go off and leave me for good. So I pulled on Bailey's reins and when he raised his head from eating and could not see the wagon, he nickered real loud and jumped the ditch and ran as fast as he could to catch the wagon. No, I didn't fall off, but as he turned the curve, there was a creek with a bridge, and when he hit the bridge it scared me so bad I was sick. The others were watching for me.

That evening I had a very hard chill and stayed in the wagon for two or three days, and needless to say that was the last time I was interested in riding the horse.

Chapman Pushes Bill To Limit Foreign Investments

U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman (D-Texas) charged recently that new foreign investments, which are getting tax breaks and subsidies from the U.S. government, are crushing the domestic dairy industry.

"After all of the efforts we have made to address the problem of surplus dairy production, we are allowing foreign entities to invest in new milk production on our soil," said Chapman.

"Not only are we allowing this new foreign investment in an industry with a serious surplus, our government is actually providing federal financial encouragement to make those investments, thus using taxpayer funds to support the price and guarantee a market for the surplus milk."

Chapman made his remarks as he announced his cosponsorship of two important pieces of legislation designed to limit the use of federal tax dollars and tax loopholes for foreign agriculture investments.

One bill, H.R. 4519, would prohibit foreigners from receiving any benefits under U.S. Department of Agriculture crop insurance, Farmers Home Administration and other price support or programs administered by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

The second bill, H.R. 4520, would eliminate the federal tax exempt

status of any Industrial Development Bond used to finance the purchase, construction or improvement of farm property by foreign persons.

Spring Is Time To Study Cow Herd

By Herb Brevard

Recent rains in East Texas brought about an abundance of lush, green grass. Most calves are on the ground and the breeding season is underway. This is the time when cattle management is relatively easy, but certain chores demand our utmost attention, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist.

Grooms suggests studying the cow herd. Note and record the cows in estrus and check those cows three weeks later to be sure the bull is doing his job. Numerous repeat cycles are indicative of breeding problems. Observe the bull during the breeding act to be sure of libido, lack of physical restrictions and general activity.

When the calves are two to three months old, branding, dehorning, castration, implanting and vaccination for clostridial diseases are necessary management chores. At this age, most calves are vaccinated with the three way blackleg vaccine.

Grooms points out that these management practices are proven to pay dividends without great costs other than time and labor. Many cat-

tle men fail to follow through on these practices and every year a number of cattle are lost from diseases that could have been prevented. When the calves are taken to market, those that have been properly managed will return the highest dollar.

This accident happened here in Ponca City, OK last July. It stunned the town of 30,000 because things like this usually happen in the winter time.

It was very humid and no breeze the night when Jeff Norman, 16, and Kristen Streeter, 17, went out for an evening at the movies. Before taking her home, Jeff parked a short distance from his home. This was about 10:30 p.m. Where he parked the car, the grass was tall, therefore, air could not circulate under the car. He left the motor running with the air conditioner on. The investigators said in five minutes the brain was paralyzed and in ten minutes they were dead.

Kristen was to spend the night with a friend so her parents were not worried at the time Jeff's friends were alarmed. They called Jeff's friends to see when they had seen him last and found that he was with Kristen. They called Kristen's parents which in turned called her friend. That's when everyone became alarmed and went searching. The fathers found the car and their children sitting up with Jeff's arm around her shoulder, but it was far, far, too late.

Carbon monoxide is just as deadly in the summer as winter. You can't see it, smell it, or hear it. It is a silent killer, so keep some fresh air coming into the car all the time. The investigators said babies are so vulnerable because they are often placed in the back seat snuggled in blankets and fresh air can't get to them.

Please stress that your child always let someone know where they plan to be. If it's with friends and they are late getting to their house, call the parents and find out if they decided to go home instead.

The boy and girl I've described in this tragedy were Barry Jeffries' dearest friends. It wasn't just the young that were stunned, but so many adults that said, "I didn't know that could happen, just never gave it a thought," or "I thought that just happened in the winter with the heater."

Rust Epidemic Didn't Hit Here

Apparently, wheat producers in Northeast Texas have been spared a major leaf rust epidemic this year, says Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Gulf Coast area and central and southwest Texas had heavy leaf rust development.

Philley says that leaf rust was late in reaching Northeast Texas, the wheat crop was well advanced when the disease appeared. There may be further infection, but the wheat is generally at a growth stage where leaf rust will do minimal damage.

More root-rot was observed in wheat fields this year. Symptoms include areas of the fields showing white heads which indicated premature death of the plants. Most of the root-rot damage was found in fields that have been in wheat for several years without rotation and generally under minimum tillage. Rotation is a good control practice for root-rot.

Philley says that lots of turf problems have shown up this spring. Much of the grass, particularly centipede, is yellowing and some did not put out this year. Brown patch is probably an important cause of these conditions. Infection last fall probably continued throughout the mild winter. Control of brown patch with proper fungicides will help, but some areas may need to be reseeded or sodded. Brown patch becomes less active when night temperatures rise above 70 degrees.

TEXAS SKETCHES

Austin alone among Texas cities was founded on beauty, the inspiration of Mirabeau Bonaparte Lamar, an impulsive soldier-poet who became President of the Republic of Texas.

In 1837 when he was vice president under Sam Houston, Lamar decided to take a vacation from both President Houston and the new capital city named for him. There was no love lost between Old Sam and Lamar. Someone suggested Lamar hunt buffalo on the Colorado River above Bastrop, so with his private secretary, the Reverend Edward Fontaine, he set out for that Indian-haunted frontier. They got an escort of six rangers from Fort Colorado, near the river of that name, and rode beside the Colorado upstream to where Jacob Harrell had created a little stockade settlement he called Waterloo. Harrell welcomed the hunters and early on the morning following their arrival, his young son woke everybody shouting that the prairie was full of buffalo.

Lamar brought down the biggest

bull any of the hunters had seen, dropping the animal in a valley where Congress Avenue and Seventh Street would someday cross in downtown Austin. Later the hunting party was assembled by bugle to the hill where the capitol now stands, and Lamar, stirred by the magnificent scenery, exclaimed to Fontaine, "This should be the seat of Future Empire!"

Lamar was elected President in 1838 and one of his first official acts was to appoint a commission to locate a site for a new capital nearer

the center of the Republic—nobody but Old Sam and the local merchants liked Houston. In April 1839, when the commission reported, Waterloo (which Lamar recommended) was the unanimous choice. The Republic paid \$3 an acre for land and the erection of government buildings began in mid-May and the town lot sale was held August 1. Lamar and cabinet arrived October 17, 1839 to find an instant city waiting
