It is natural, and it feels, somehow, good.

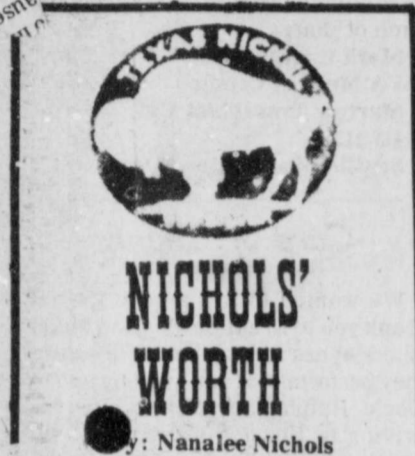

What has happened in Deport can happen in any small community with a volunteer fire department. Hopefully, it will not. Perhaps someone reading this will think twice before they take something from the fire station, no matter how trivial it seems.

Saturday morning the Deport Volunteer Fire Department responded to a call...a five year old boy in a cistern.

In this case, the child had already been there too long, and there was nothing that could have saved him, despite desperate efforts. But the operation was severely hampered by the fact that when the fire department arrived, the flashlights had been stolen.

It was dark in that well, and IF the child had still been alive, the rescue operation would have been hampered by that darkness, and the time lost locating a light source. What if the casual theft of one of those flashlights had caused the death of a child? What if the lack of flashlights had hampered rescue operations at a fire, or a night-time wreck?

The necessity of having lights there and ready is critical. The firemen cannot waste precious time checking to see that all of their equipment is in place, nor can they lose time with a locked fire station...the volunteers from fire to fire vary, and everyone cannot carry a key to all the doors, nor take the time unlocking side doors, garage doors, equipment doors, etc.

This isn't the first thing to come up missing from the station. Gloves, and odds and ends have disappeared before. An air pack was thrown into a nearby pool. Those air packs cost literally thousands of dollars, the gloves are special fireproof equipment, and cost over twenty-five dollars a pair. Again, each piece of equipment needs to BE IN IT'S PLACE at all times.

As the fire department's letter this week states, it takes a special kind of person to climb down into a cistern full of water and retrieve the limp body of a child. It takes a special person to know, and administer the proper efforts of revival.

But those efforts are overshadowed by the senseless theft of valuable, critical equipment.

How frustrating it must be for those volunteers to feel that what they are trying to do is cancelled out by the careless contempt of someone else.

I prefer to think that whoever took these things didn't really think about the consequences. Hopefully they aren't so insensitive as to realize they could cause loss of life or property by their theft.

Hopefully, they will give it careful consideration now, and realize that it could be their home, their brother or sister, their OWN life that they could lose because of their thoughtless act. Come on, folks, let's bring this to a halt now...before tragedy does.

Five-Year Old Dies In Cistern

An abandoned cistern proved a death-trap Saturday morning in Fulbright, as five year old Thomas J. Massey fell into it and apparently drowned.

The youngster and his sister, age one year, were playing near the family's home in Fulbright when the grandmother, Marie Massey, noticed them missing and began searching for them.

Mrs. Massey found the little girl standing near the cistern at an emp-

ty house next door. She discovered the boy's body at the bottom of the cistern, and called authorities, including the Deport Volunteer Fire Department.

Volunteer firemen put a ladder down the fifteen foot deep cistern, which had a concrete coping about two feet high around it, and went down and retrieved the child's body.

CPR was started, and all efforts were made to revive the child, he was transported by Red River Ambulance

Service to McCuiston Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead.

A sheet of peg board, some tin and boards had apparently covered the old cistern, which had about four feet of water in it.

The child was the son of Tommy and Brenda Massey.

Funeral arrangements were made at Turrentine-Jackson-Morrow Funeral Home in McKinney, after Gene Roden's Sons transferred the body to them.

Ed Bryson, Lifetime Newspaper Work, A Special Person

Ed Bryson, better known to those who know him... and that's just about anyone in the area, as Ed, is a retired newspaperman.

Retirement, however, hasn't been a restful, leisurely thing for Ed, as he has been as busy retired as he was working full time.

At 79, his interest in reading and free lance writing is undiminished.

A book lover from youth, he now possesses a large collection of books. Though the volumes have no visible order to an outsider, Ed can find any book desired promptly.

Included in his collection is a Cherokee Bible. Having some Cherokee ancestry, he intended to visit Oklahoma and do a study on the Cherokee Indians, something he hasn't given up on yet.

In his late teens, Ed wrote poetry for magazines and newspapers and had some short stories and articles published.

He began working at the Deport Times back in 1930, when the depression set upon everyone's shoulders heavily. During World War II he served four years in Navy Aviation. After the war, in 1947, he began to work for the Paris News.

Later he moved to Beaumont where he became the City Editor for the Beaumont Journal. Later, he became the Chief Editorial Writer and Editor of the editorial page, working for Enterprise Company in the Ivory Tower, a secluded area designated for the editor. He was there for seventeen years. He also did book reviews in Beaumont, and worked for the Dallas Morning News for a while.

When he retired, back in 1971, he received a telegram congratulating him from Lyndon B. Johnson, whom he knew and had written about.

Now, Ed and his wife Edith live in Bogata. One daughter, Jeanne Haydock of Deer Park, brightens their life. He is a member of the United Methodist Church in Bogata, and a member of the Masonic Lodge. He is a former member of the Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce.

His hobbies, he says with a wide

grin, are "reading, writing and rocking". He writes the Sunday editorial page feature and an occasional Monday column for the Paris News.

He is a "Democrat and professional Texan". He is also one of the most thoughtful people around. Anyone doing worthwhile things, from a good article in the Bogata News on, is likely to receive a postcard from Ed letting them know they are appreciated.

His interest in other people and the dedication to the profession he spent his life in, is evident from the articles he writes.

"I have a great respect for people in small communities," he states, "they are special people".

As in most cases, those who see others as "special" are usually pretty special themselves. Ed Bryson appreciates people, he likes them... people like and appreciate Ed, too.

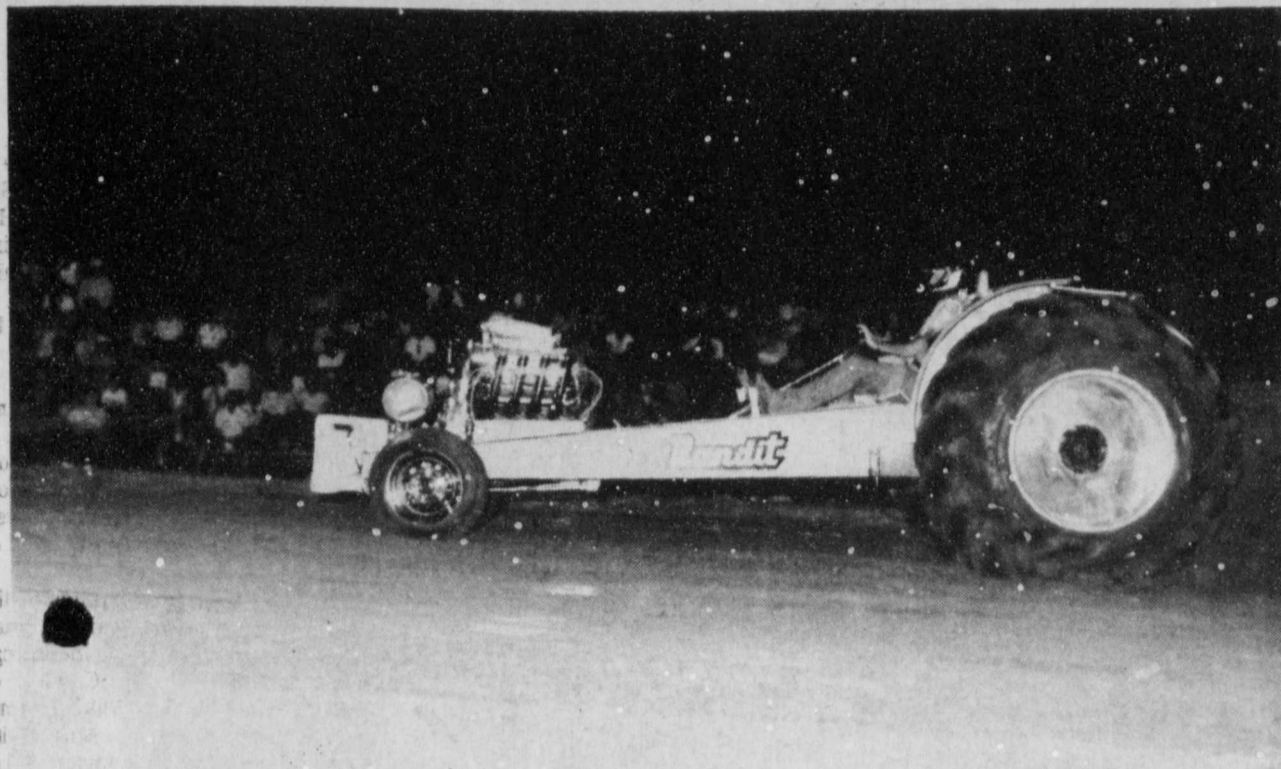

PJC Has Financial Assistance For Students

Persons interested in attending Paris Junior College in the 1986-87 school year may be eligible for financial assistance to cover much of the cost, according to Dr. Jerry deBin, director of student financial aid. The college has financial aid programs in the form of grants, low-interest loans or work-study employment to help students pay their educational costs. Often, these programs will cover tuition, fees, books and supplies for students who are eligible, deBin said. Students then only have to pay the normal living expenses of room and board. All prospective students are encouraged to apply for the financial aid; many eligible students fail to make application because they do not think they can qualify. Requirements for eligibility differ from program to program and constantly change. The awards are based on various factors other than income, so prospective students should take the time to apply for the assistance.

The Pell Grant Program is the largest federal student aid program. For many students, these grants provide a foundation of financial aid, to which aid from other federal and non-federal sources may be added. Unlike loans, grants do not have to be paid back. Supplemental educational grants may be obtained in addition to the Pell grants. To apply for the Pell grant only, students should complete the U.S. Education Department's Application for Federal Student Aid. Those applying for the Pell grant and other types of financial aid should complete the American College Testing Program's Family Financial Statement. Awards range from \$200 to \$5,000 or more, depending upon the student's need and the availability of funds. Veterans who have eligibility entitlements also should apply through the Financial Aid Office at PJC. Texas veterans whose benefits have expired may apply for a tuition waiver through the Hazelwood Act. Prospective

students interested in PJC scholarships should contact the department head in the program of their major interest. A large number of applicants for the 1986-87 school year have not submitted the required documents for the particular aid they are seeking, the financial aid director said. Until these procedures are completed, the aid cannot be awarded. There are certain documents which must be submitted before any money can be awarded. Area residents should take advantage of the opportunity for a college education at a community college with reasonable costs. PJC's in-district tuition for a full time student for one semester is \$202 while out-of-district tuition is \$286. Additional costs include laboratory fees, books and supplies. These educational costs are often covered by the financial aid award, the director explained. Therefore, all area residents have an opportunity to work toward a college degree which will make a difference in their lifetime incomes. Before deciding that college is too costly, students should visit the PJC Financial Aid Office in the Rheudasil Learning Center, Room 130. Applications may be obtained from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to noon on Friday this summer.

Keeping Healthy

Hot Weather Hard on the Elderly

Older people have an increased risk of heat-related illness and the National Institute of Aging of the National Institutes of Health warns against heat exhaustion, heat cramps and heat stroke. The Institute suggests several ways to cool off during a hot spell: taking lukewarm or cool baths or showers, allowing the body to air dry; placing an ice bag or wet towels on the body; staying out of direct sunlight and avoiding strenuous activity; wearing lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing; wearing a hat outdoors. Whenever possible, remaining indoors in a cool place is advisable. Another suggestion from the Institute is to drink plenty of water or fruit juices to replace fluids lost through perspiration but to avoid alcoholic beverages. Elderly relatives or neighbors should be checked on routinely, and especially those who live alone. Danger signs such as nausea, dizziness, fatigue or fever require prompt medical attention.

Sorghum Infested With Midge

Producer with sorghum fields are still in the flowering stage should monitor the fields daily for midge activity. In fact, it is almost a certainty that infestation levels of the tiny orange colored insect are high enough in every field to require spraying. Now, we certainly do not advocate the application of an insecticide without checking it, but insect numbers are extremely high throughout the area.

Due to the wet spring, the sorghum plants within a field are in various development stages. In many fields part of the crop has already begun to change color while other plants in low spots are just now beginning to head. This fact complicates the situation as to when a field should be treated.

The life of an adult midge is about 24 hours. This is why it is so important for one to inspect his crop. If an infestation is found today, it should be treated if the crop is in the proper development stage. Waiting a day to treat will only result in a significant loss in grain.

One should determine the economic injury level for their crop. This takes into account the cost per acre to treat and the market value of the crop. More than one application of an insecticide could be required this season. Applications at three to five day intervals are suggested if a sufficient number of the crop is still in the flowering stage.

There are several insecticides that are labeled for midge control. Pydrin is the latest insecticide to get a label and is being used extensively in the area. It will cost \$2.23 per acre plus application. Lannate will cost \$3.89 for one pint per acre and Lorsban will cost \$2.61 for one-half pint. Parathion is a cheaper insecticide at \$1.07 per acre, but evaporates soon after application. Other chemicals suggested include Sevin, Diazinon, Malathion and Di-Syston.

Since all insects are bad this year, we can anticipate Sorghum Headworms to be bad in sorghum once the grain begins to harden. This is the same worm that gets on corn, the Corn Earworm.

PJC To Begin Scuba Diving Course

A scuba diver course for open water certification will begin Thursday, July 31 at Paris Junior College, instructor will be Marcus Roden, a Gold Star YMCA scuba instructor.

Grub Control Should Take Place Now

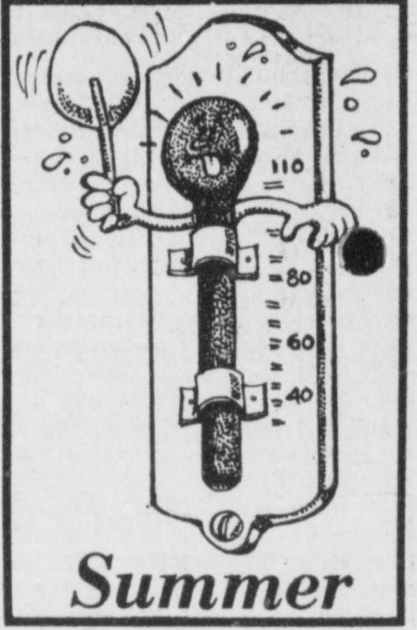

 June bugs or May beetles had a peak flight from mid to late June. According to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist, the best time to treat for white grubs, the larval stage of the June bug is from late July to mid-August. Lawns should be checked for grub population before applying an insecticide. Treat if more than four grubs per square foot are found. Diazinon and Dursban are two of the old standby insecticides for grub control. Water in the insecticides with one-half to one inch of water immediately after application.

The same insecticides applied for grub control should also control chinch bugs in the lawn. This is the time of year that chinch bug infestations begin to build. Follow label directions for applying the

insecticides. Whiteflies and scale are increasing an Eucalyptus and some other landscape plants. Both whiteflies and scale can be controlled by several insecticides, including cygon, orthene and MSR.

Aphids are common on pecans this time of year. The water-stage spray for insect and disease control, which is due now, should kill the aphids. Additionally, fall webworms are becoming more prevalent. Control of the hickory shuckworm in pecans should begin about the middle of August. Preparation should be made now to carefully scout the orchard and apply insecticides at the proper time.

Producers should keep a close watch for armyworms in forages. Although none have been observed, this is the time of year for infestations to begin.

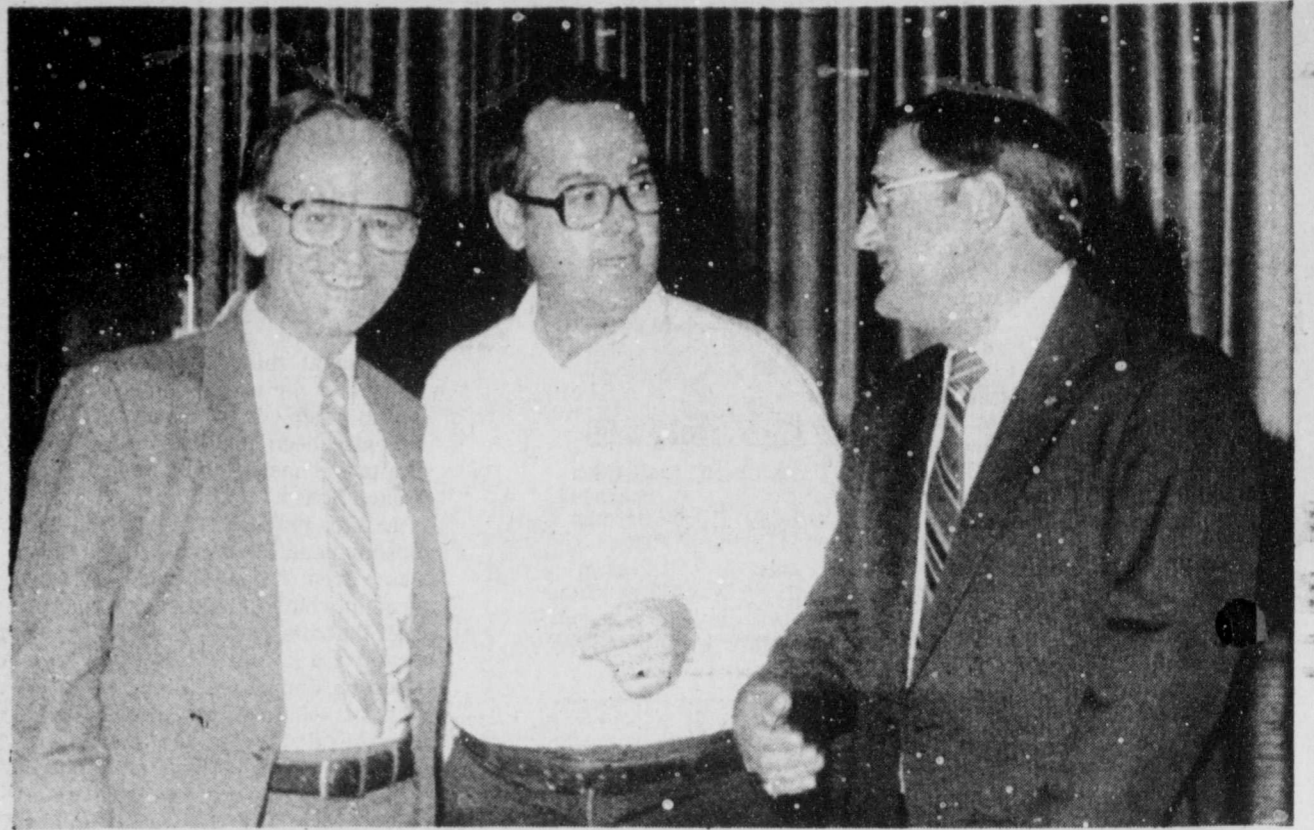

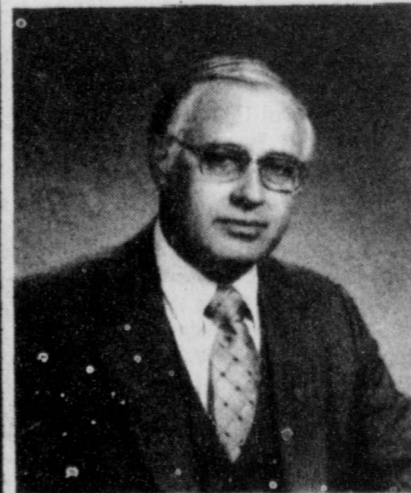
Standard, one of the largest publications in Texas, will be in Bogata to hold a revival August 10 through August 15.
