

Schools Begin Sept. 2, Caution Urged

When classes start Tuesday, September 2, the tardy bell rings at 8:15 a.m. on all three campuses. But, schools will dismiss according to the following schedules: kindergarten through third grade will be dismissed at 3:05 p.m. and the rest of the students at the Talco and Bogata campuses be dismissed at 3:50 p.m. The Rivercrest campus will start at 8:15 and will be out at 3:40 p.m. The crossing guard at the Bogata campus will be working from 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. in the morning. In the afternoon, the guard will work-

ing from 3 p.m. until 4 p.m. The flashing lights will also be working during this time.

The highway department should also be installing flashing lights near the Rivercrest campus in the near future, according to Rivercrest Principal James Smith. He contacted the Texas Highway Department earlier in the summer and the equipment has been ordered.

In the 1986-87 school year, all vocational education programs are open to all students, including women,

members of minority groups, handicapped students, disadvantaged students and persons of Limited English Proficiency. They shall have equal access to vocational education programs, services and activities.

Talco and Bogata Junior High students planning to participate in sports must have a physical. Those students who do not comply will not be allowed to work out.

Last year in the state of Texas, there were 1,228 accidents involving

school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries.

Area drivers are cautioned to keep a sharp eye out in and around school zones and school buses in an effort to prevent these accidents.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while that bus is loading or unloading children.

Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them. Children also frequently do not use good judgment, darting out to catch up with companions, or forgetting to check and see whether their path is clear.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traf-

fic lane while the bus is stopped.

At present, Texas buses have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

A problem exists, too, around school. Parents or people driving by must keep an extra-wary eye out for youngsters coming from behind parked cars or structures which might obscure them until it is too late to stop.

Men were only a shade behind them in layers, with long underwear, heavy slacks, undershirts, shirts, attachable cuffs and collars, long sleeves, vest and coats.

Even those who worked beneath the blazing Texas sun made few concessions to the heat...leaving off ties or petticoats to some extent was all.

Now, when working in the summer sun is frequently a matter of choice instead of necessity, when tennis and swimming rank among favorite past times, we think nothing of removing all but the skimpiest layer of clothing.

Even in air conditioning we seldom think of wearing long sleeves in the summer, and the undergarments of today would have sent a Victorian woman into a swoon of shock.

The more air conditioning became available, the fewer garments society has chosen to wear!

Can anyone in today's world truly imagine what trying to work in those cumbersome, bundlesome skirts must have been like? Can we recall what the heat without even an electric fan was like?

Labor Day Death Estimates Released

Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," director Adams said. "We know that some drivers will be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement

action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

Adams said the DPS deeply appreciates the positive response shown by Texas motorists to the safety belt law.

"We'd like to mark the first anniversary of the seat belt law by having far fewer fatalities occur than our statisticians have estimated for the holiday period," Adams said.

During the July 4 holiday period earlier this summer, 8 of 9 persons killed in motorcycle accidents had not been wearing helmets.

"Though only those motorcyclists 18 and younger are required to wear protective headgear, statistics show overwhelmingly that helmets save lives," Adams said.

As part of the increased driving awareness program, the DPS will furnish revised fatality counts to the news media during the Labor Day period.

Rescue Unit Object Of Fund Raising

The Clarksville Volunteer Fire Department will enhance the rescue services available to the residents of Red River County by putting a new rescue vehicle into operation in the very near future. In December of 1984, through financial support from all over the county, \$12,000.00 in rescue equipment was purchased and rescue service became a reality. The department currently uses a 1971 van to transport the equipment to rescue scenes and recently committed to replace that vehicle and raise funds to purchase the new vehicle at a cost of \$26,500.00, complete with a utility bed for storage of the rescue equipment, a Darley "Champion" fire pump powered by a Wisconsin 30hp engine with a 300 gallon booster tank all mounted on a 1986 model 1-ton cab and chassis.

The rescue vehicle is staffed 24 hours per day by members of the Clarksville Volunteer Fire Department who are trained in rescue operation and extrication techniques. Since the service began, the department has responded 22 times including 13 major automobile accidents where victims were pinned in their vehicles.

The department has financed \$16,500.00 of the cost and in an effort to retire the debt, is asking for financial support of this project. Numerous fund raising activities are planned and in progress. Any donations may be made to the department by contacting Chief Mike Boulware, Assistant Chief Larry Moore, Captain Billy Mitchell, Secretary-treasurer James Vaughan, Jr. or any member of the Clarksville Volunteer Fire Department.

The board adopted the 1986-87 budget as presented and set the tax rate at 89¢ which is the same rate as last year.

The minutes of the previous two meetings were approved. The board also approved budget changes, and to pay bills.

The tax report and adjustments were accepted as presented.

A request was made for the penalty of interest to be waived on a 1984 tax. The board voted against the request.

gasoline bid. A luncheon for the teachers and board members was planned for Monday, August 25 at Rivercrest, beginning at 11:45 a.m.

The board voted to provide funds to pay the difference needed to purchase a new football clock. Several donations have been given for the clock.

It was decided that too much work would be involved in repairing the principal's house in Talco, and the Board voted to sell the house and keep the property.

A meeting for August 29 at 7 p.m. was planned to adopt the amended budget.

Linda Woods was hired as a teacher's aide for the Talco campus, Sue Nolen was hired as an aide on the Rivercrest campus, and Maxine Anderson was hired as a cafeteria worker for the Talco campus.

On one particular day a boy from Talco happened on the scene. This was before consolidation of the schools, and rivalry between the two towns was big, so the Bogata guys took offense of his being there, and attempted to throw the 'trespasser' in the lake. He somehow managed to get to his car and escape and before they could reach him.

The dark driving us in, we'd pile as many kids as possible on one of the guy's jeep and head for home, already anticipating tomorrow and another fun time at the lake.

We really thought we were 'cool'—and we were—until the 70's crowd came along and outdusted us. Memories are fun, though. I hope you've enjoyed me sharing mine with you.

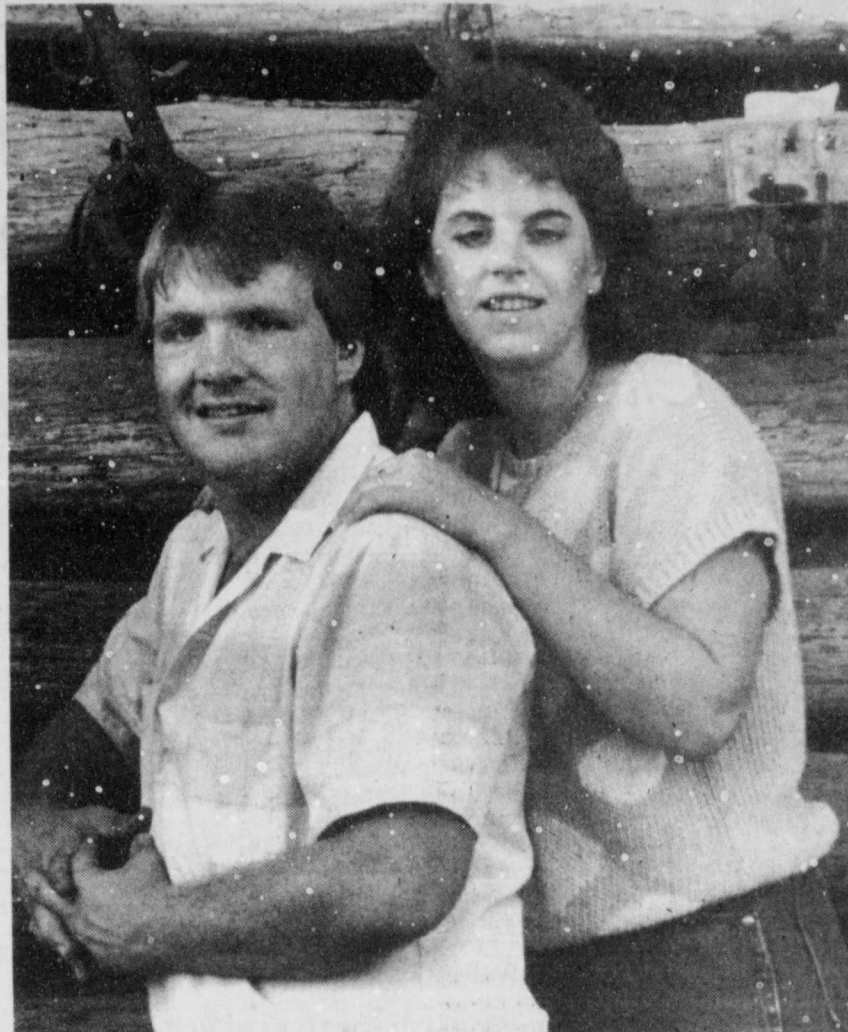

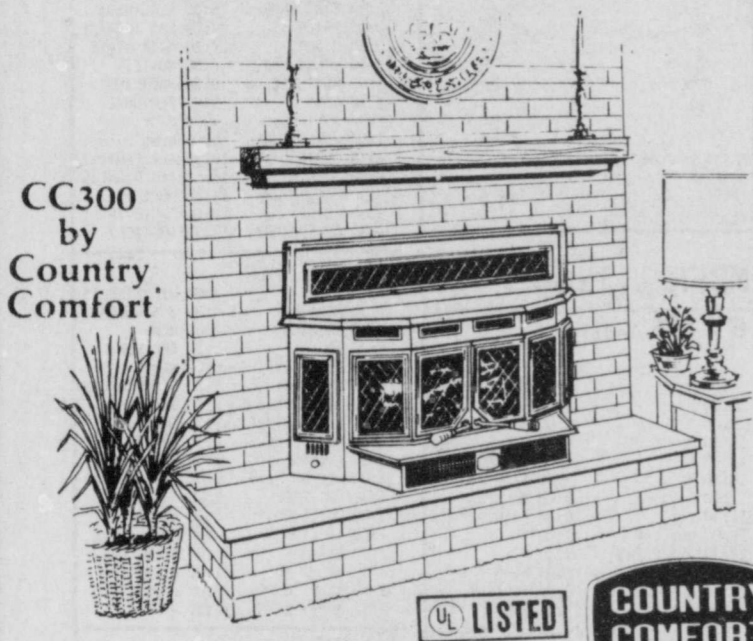

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢. Extra milk may be purchased for 25¢.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the accompanying scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out the application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security number so all household members 21 years old or older or the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against

because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediate to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the

school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Harold Cowley at Box 130, Bogata, TX or call 632-5205.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

Help with Application: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact us. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

Please make application for your child at the school he/she will be attending.

(These guidelines should be used by the school to determine eligibility for free or reduced-price meals and should be provided the media for public release.)

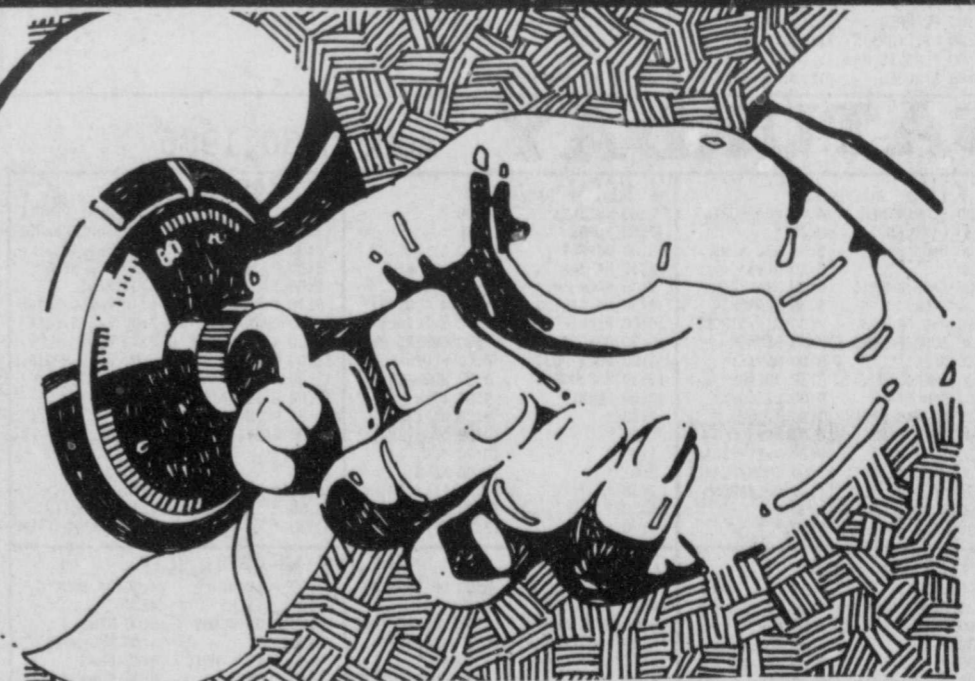

Mr. Cowley reported that drug dogs would be used again this year and welcomed parent input.

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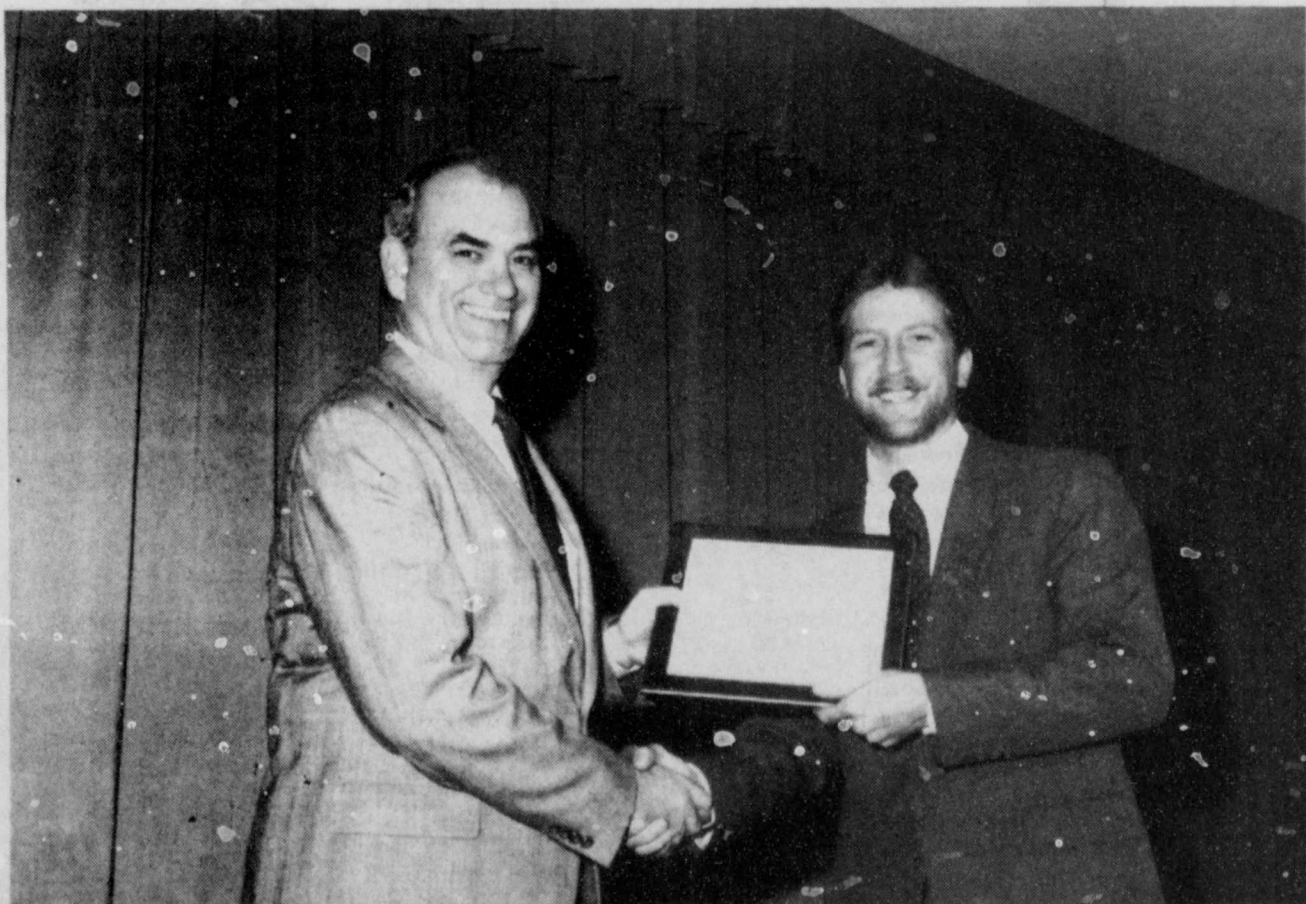

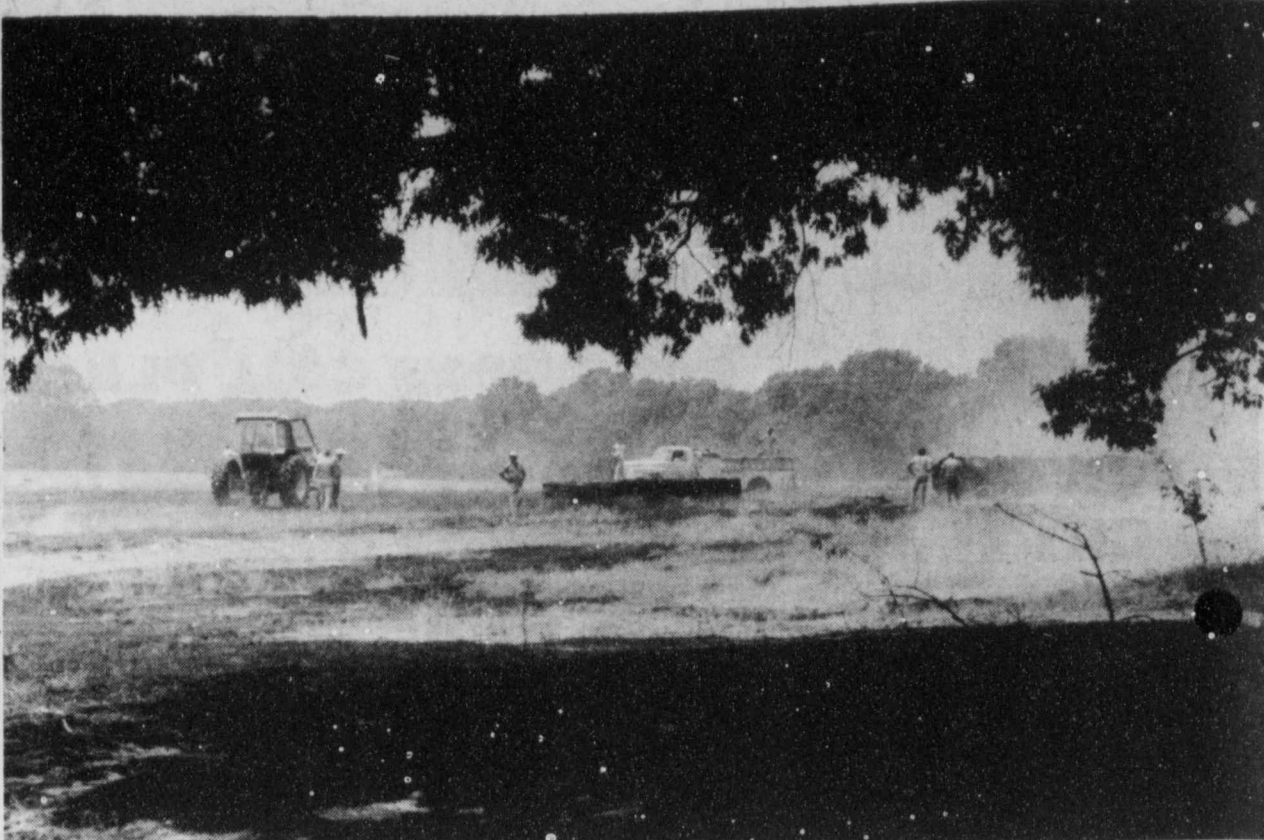

A couple of weeks ago, I got a chance to talk to my grandfather. You may be thinking that is not very strange, but he has lived in southwest Georgia for the past 15 years or so. So the years of my life that I could learn the most from him, I have not been able to because of the distance between us. But the times that I have gotten to talk to him, usually at Christmas or on his infrequent visits to Texas, have been very informative to me. I love to sit and listen to his stories. Of course over the years they got a little better, not exaggerated, but better.

You see my grandfather was born in 1899, a different century, a different time, a different world. He remembers a time without cars, without planes and without television. Can you imagine a world without television? The everyone would have to think for themselves, not have someone do it for them. It was a much simpler life, when trips to town came once a month and God was the head of every household. God was very close to my grandfather's heart.

One of the best stories my grandfather told me was about the first automobile he ever saw. It belonged to his cousin. My grandfather was fourteen or fifteen at the time and was so intrigued by the car that he PAID his cousin five dollars, which would translate into about \$500 in today's dollars, just to drive the car down the hill! Not around the block, not to the next town, but just down the hill! And thus his love for cars began. He always had a good car and he always drove very fast.

On one of his treks to Texas, he was stopped in Mississippi on Interstate 10 for speeding. The officer asked the required questions about an emergency or specific reasons for speeding to which my grandfather replied that he was just not paying attention to the speed. The officer asked for his license, and noticed the birthday of January 21, 1899. He queried about the

accuracy of the date and was told it was correct. The officer then handed my grandfather back his license and said that anyone that had been driving that long did not deserve a ticket, and let my grandfather go on his way! Funny how only a few people respect age anymore.

He also told me stories of seeing the first airplane, and how a two-and-a-half hour plant trip from Atlanta, Georgia to Houston would have taken two-and-a-half months when he was a boy, by wagon, and was almost unheard of.

Technology amazed him...the atomic bomb, television, air conditioning, space travel. For a man

whose only knowledge of space was a sea of stars on a dark night and the sun rising in the east and setting in the west, amazement of men going into space and coming back was unbelievable.

I got to hear all those stories again when I went to see him. He was in a nursing home in Lufkin and for the first time in his life was confined to a bed. Cancer was slowly eating up his body, though his mind was sharp as a tack.

He talked about family and old friends and how he was getting a chance to ponder many of the decisions he had made throughout his life and about all the changes he had seen

in the world. That was the last time I got to talk to him.

My grandfather died last week. I do not think that I ever will know anyone who lived a more fulfilling life. He lived his dreams and passed on as much of the knowledge that he had to as many that would listen. He was a good person, and was always able to keep things in perspective. He was a year older than the twentieth century, held a millineum's worth of knowledge.

I know that on the other side of death there is a mansion on a gold-lined street with a mailbox out front that bears the name of Jonathon Everett Morgan.
