

Texas Oil Production At Low Ebb

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said that Texas oil wells have produced 51.1 million barrels less this past year than the year before.

This shows that the low price of oil

isn't the only culprit working against the Texas economy and the Texas oil industry, he said.

"The drop in production was worth \$772.1 million at current market prices," Bullock said. "So much at-

ention on declining oil prices may have masked the fact that production in Texas has slipped by more than 140,000 barrels a day."

He said tax records show that Texas wells were producing about 2.3

million taxable barrels of oil a day in mid-1985.

Production had dropped to slightly more than 2 million taxable barrels a day by August of this year.

Bullock said the downturn in pro-

duction alone cost the state about \$35.5 million in severance taxes during the one-year period based on the Comptroller's estimated average oil price per barrel.

Further, Bullock said, active rotary

rigs operating in Texas fell by about 60 percent and drilling permits were down by more than 50 percent, he said.

There will be a Lions Club Directors meeting Thursday night (tonight), November 14 at 7 p.m. at the Community Center in Bogata.

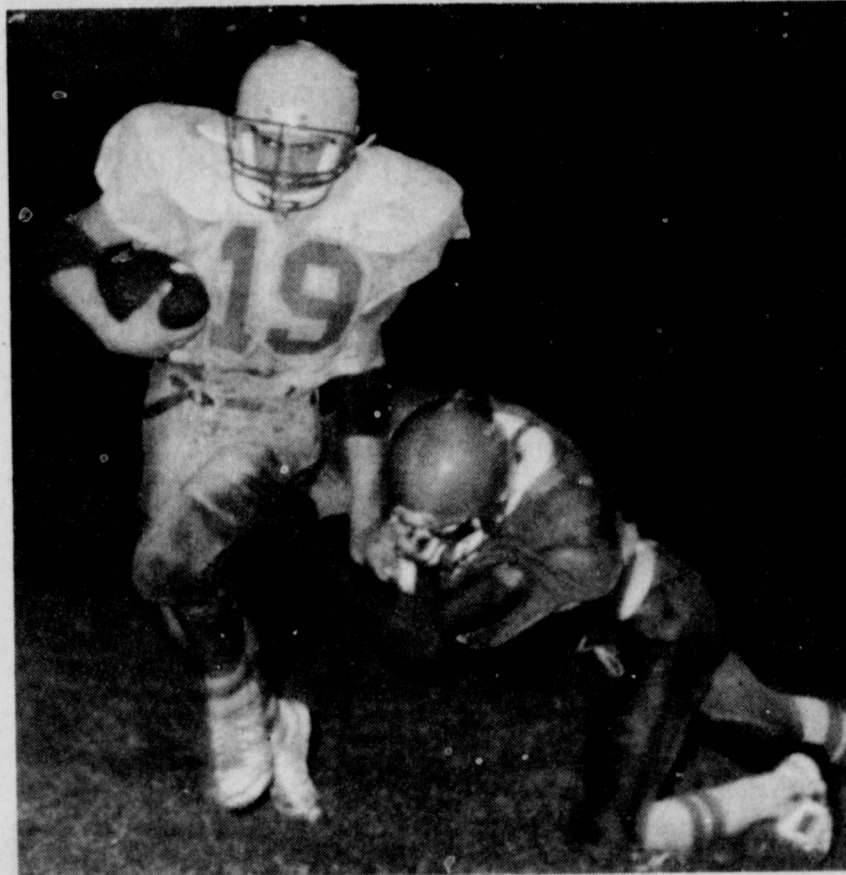

Rebs End Season With Victory

The Rivercrest Rebels ended the 1986 football season last Friday night with a victory over the Wolfe City Wolves. A devastating rushing attack and an outstanding defensive effort shut down a potent Wolfe City team.

The Rebel offense compiled 278 total yards offensively while allowing only 165 total yards for the Wolves.

Rivercrest won the toss and tailback Amos Brown provided a 27-yard return, giving the Rebs possession on their own 42-yard line. The Rebels moved the ball 31 yards in six plays before turning the ball over on downs. A stiff Rebel defense held the Wolves at bay on their first series. The Rebels took over on their 38-yard line, following the Wolves first punt. After two plays, the Rebels were faced with a third and ten situation when fullback Bradley Woods found an opening in the Wolves line and rambled 56 yards before being tackled on the 17. The drive was stalled on an intercepted pass. Both teams were unable to mount a threat in the remainder of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, quarterback Jimmy Lewis found

Bradley Woods wide open in the Wolves secondary for a 47-yard scoring strike. The point after attempt was no good, giving Rivercrest a 6-0 lead. The Rebels quickly shut down the Wolves on their next possession and took over on their own 23-yard line. The last play went for 46 yards. Once again Bradley Woods did the honors for his second TD of the evening, making the score 12-0 at the half.

Both teams battled back and forth all during the third period until the Rebs were intercepted on their own 16-yard line. Wolfe City pushed the ball to the eleven yard marker and was forced with a fourth down and goal situation from the 5-yard line when quarterback Ronald Wortham carried the ball in for their first TD of the evening.

Later in the game, the Wolves had the Rebs pinned down on the eight, when tailback Clint Stephenson broke for 57 yards and an apparent touchdown, but bobbled the ball near the Wolves' 35 and gave Wolfe City a final shot at the TD. The Rebel defense fought back a desperate effort from the Wolves by registering

three quarterback sacks, one by Bobby Littrell and two by Wesley Hood, to squelch any hope of victory.

Bradley Woods led all rushers with 105 yards and 58 yards receiving, followed by Clint Stephenson with 90 yards rushing and Amos Brown with 50 yards.

Bogata City Council Holds Meeting

The Bogata City Council met in a called session Tuesday night, November 4 at 6:30 p.m.

There was a discussion of city procedures required by the insurance company. The motion was made and approved to pay the \$100 billed by Capps Insurance Company for an extension on the insurance policy for law enforcement. The procedures manual and Employee Handbook is to be discussed at the next regular meeting.

Council members discussed water and sewer hookups at the Texas-New

Mexico Power Co. new plant on Highway 271. The motion was approved to annex the property where the Texas-New Mexico Power Co. will build their new plant with the understanding that they build and finance a 6" water line and a sewer line from the plant site to hook up to city lines on the east side of Highway 37 and the north side of Highway 271 at no cost to the city.

The purchase of a computer to be used by the water department and city hall was discussed. Plans are for Perry Mahan, salesman for

Municipal Data Systems, to demonstrate the computer for the council at the next regular meeting.

The Council approved the appointment of Dr. E.E. Brooks as city doctor for two years subject to his approval.

The Council approved a motion which would put into force the resolution which was passed, but never put into effect, in April 1, 1975, which imposes double water rates for users outside of the city limits. This resolution is to go into effect in January, 1987.

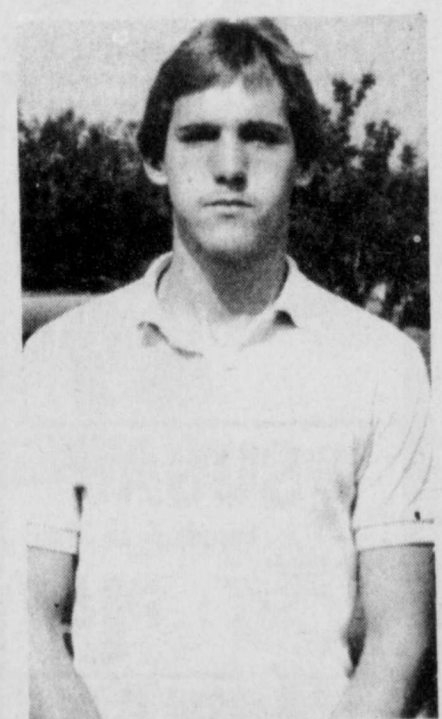



Sisters Recall "When Mama Was A Preacher"

(Editor's Note: The Clark sisters, Velma Clark Roach, Tommie Clark Lanier and my mother, Loree Clark Roach, were guest speakers recently at a senior citizens dinner at the First Assembly of God Church in Bogata. The title of their presentation was "When Mama Was A Preacher". This article is written from some of those recollections mentioned in their presentation.)

Mrs. Velma Clark Roach, age 82, the oldest of three sisters, was the first speaker. She recalled the early days of 1916 and the revival in which their mother, Delia Clark, had attended and felt her "call" into the ministry.

Later, Mrs. Clark was ordained as a licensed minister. Velma told of the long treks by wagon, to and from church meetings which were held in homes, store fronts and brush arbors. She recalled the many hardships and persecutions the family went through during those days.

One incident she shared happened during a brush arbor meeting when she was about 13 years old. A group of boys of the community where the brush arbor was being held, attempting to cause trouble, tried to drive a team of mules in the brush arbor among all the people. They were unable to make the mules go in, but later that night, as the Clark family was on their way home, the boys used the mules to drive the family into the ditch. She recollected the many times in her own life, when trouble arose, how she had drawn strength from the words of wisdom and the faith that her mother had given to her. Velma married Raymond Roach at the age of 16. They have six children, one daughter is deceased. They make their home in Quinlan.

Tommie Clark Lanier, the second speaker, continued the story and events in their lives during those days when their mother carried the gospel. She told of her service as a missionary covering areas in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and a small portion of Colorado, ministering to the blacks, whites and the Indians. Mrs. Clark preached wherever she was asked, staying in the homes of people in the areas where she preached. Tommie recalled her first T-Model car ride, along with her mother and baby

sister. The car was driven by the pastor of the church where Mrs. Clark was to preach. He had picked them up from the train station. The car was a one-seater, and the vent cap had been removed. As they traveled, the steam from the car would spray into Tommie's face, almost frightening her to death. She also shared with the group, some of her mother's "antidotes" for emergency situations. One of those was during the time when everyone, including men and women, boys and girls, wore black cotton stockings. On one particular Sunday morning, as the family was preparing to leave for church, a hole was discovered in her mother's black stocking. There wasn't enough time to mend the tear, so she secured the black shoe polish from it's place and dabbed it on the exposed leg. Then, all was black and the family proceeded to their destination.

Mrs. Lanier made mention of the results of their mother's seeds of faith now being reaped in the lives of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Tommie married Erbert Burrow, now deceased, at a young age. They had four children. She is now married to Rev. J.D. Lanier, and they live in Midlothian. Loree Roach, the baby of the Clark family, summed up the presentation. Loree was seven years old when their mother passed away with pneumonia. Their father had passed away the previous year. Even though she was very young at her mother's death, Loree also holds many memories of those few years when their mama was a preacher. She shared some of those memories she has about her mother's patience and love and about her strong faith in God.

Many of her memories are incidents which happened while staying in homes during the revival meetings her mother held. On one of these occasions, the lady of the house had allowed her to cut paper dolls from a catalogue. The next day, she decided once more to cut paper dolls, so she proceeded to get the scissors which had been hung from a nail on the wall. She climbed up on a five gallon lard bucket, in an attempt to reach the scissors. As she stepped on the bucket, the lid caved in causing her to bury two feet deep in syrup. Not only did she ruin these kind people's five gallons of syrup, but she also ruined her brand new patent leather slippers. Other memories she shared were incidents and occasions of great kindnesses and love expressed by their mother in helping the sick, the needy, and the giving of herself in whatever way she was needed. Loree married M.E. Roach at the age of 15. They live in Bogata and have five children. One daughter is deceased.
