Kids running up years later to say "remember when you took my picture doing so and so" make things nice.

Lying in a ditch watching a skilled bomb squad dismantle an explosive device was an educational experience.

So was seeing an oil well drilled. There have been so many educational, interesting, amusing and enlightening events over those thirteen years.

It makes looking forward to the next thirteen years brighter and easier!

As usual, small town helpfulness came through last week, as the all-night search in bitter cold kept law enforcement officers busy looking for the two who held up the Community National Bank of Detroit last Friday night.

CNB-Detroit Robbed, Suspects Caught

One of the largest manhunts in the area's history netted two bank robbery suspects after the Community National Bank of Detroit was held up Friday evening.

Two men entered the bank lobby shortly before 6 p.m. Friday, one positioning himself by the front door with a sawed-off shotgun, while the other threatened tellers with a 9 mm pistol.

Shirley Anderson and Susan Yarbrough, the tellers on duty, handed over \$14,507 and the pair then fled in a 1968 red and white Chevrolet pickup truck, according to Lamar County Sheriff Jim Parker.

Apparently, the two had planned on abandoning the pickup on County Line Road walking back to U.S. Highway 82, where they would pick up a motorcycle they had hidden in the

area and make their escape.

This plan failed to work when a Texas Department of Public Safety officer appeared on the County Line Road before they could reach the motorcycle, forcing them to flee on foot.

The officer was acting on information provided by Hugh Jeffus, president of the Community National Bank. Jeffus had first gotten the license number of the pickup and then followed the vehicle at a safe distance. He spotted brake lights near the intersection of County Line Road and U.S. Highway 82, and passed the information on to law enforcement officials, who took prompt action.

The shotgun and pistol were discovered in a ditch near the abandoned pickup truck, Sheriff Parker stated.

Law enforcement officials from Red River, Lamar and Titus Counties, Texas Rangers, Department of Public Safety officers, Paris City Policeman and Lamar County Game Wardens all began an all night search of the entire area.

Dogs from the Oklahoma State Department of Corrections were brought in and began tracking.

About 12:30 a.m. on Saturday, Gerald Mack Payne, age 47, of California was captured in a barn east of Blossom. The bloodhounds picked up the trail near County Line Road, according to the dog's handler, David Turner.

One dog was separated from the rest and kept returning to the barn. A search of the structure revealed Payne, who was taken into custody at that time.

Just before noon on Saturday, the second suspect, identified as Gilbert George Adams, age 39, of Aspen, Colorado, was captured, also near Blossom.

He was spotted by Mike Connot, an eighteen-year old Blossom man, in the door of a cabin. Connot didn't stop upon spying the man, but continued on down the road and located a deputy to relay the information.

The dogs had been chasing Adams, and were going in circles near the suspect.

Deputies, officials and Paris policemen surrounded the area, and Adams was brought out shortly afterwards. Authorities said he was carrying the money taken in the robbery.

Sheriff Jim Parker's office said Tuesday morning that both men had made statements. They confessed to

the bank robbery, the robbery of Short's Piggly Wiggly store in Paris on January 3, the theft of a van from the Evangel Church of God on the same date, and the burglary of the William Dorries residence near Blossom.

Officials report that the property stolen in that burglary has been recovered.

Apparently, the two had been living "on the road" for some time, and had been looking for a bank to rob.

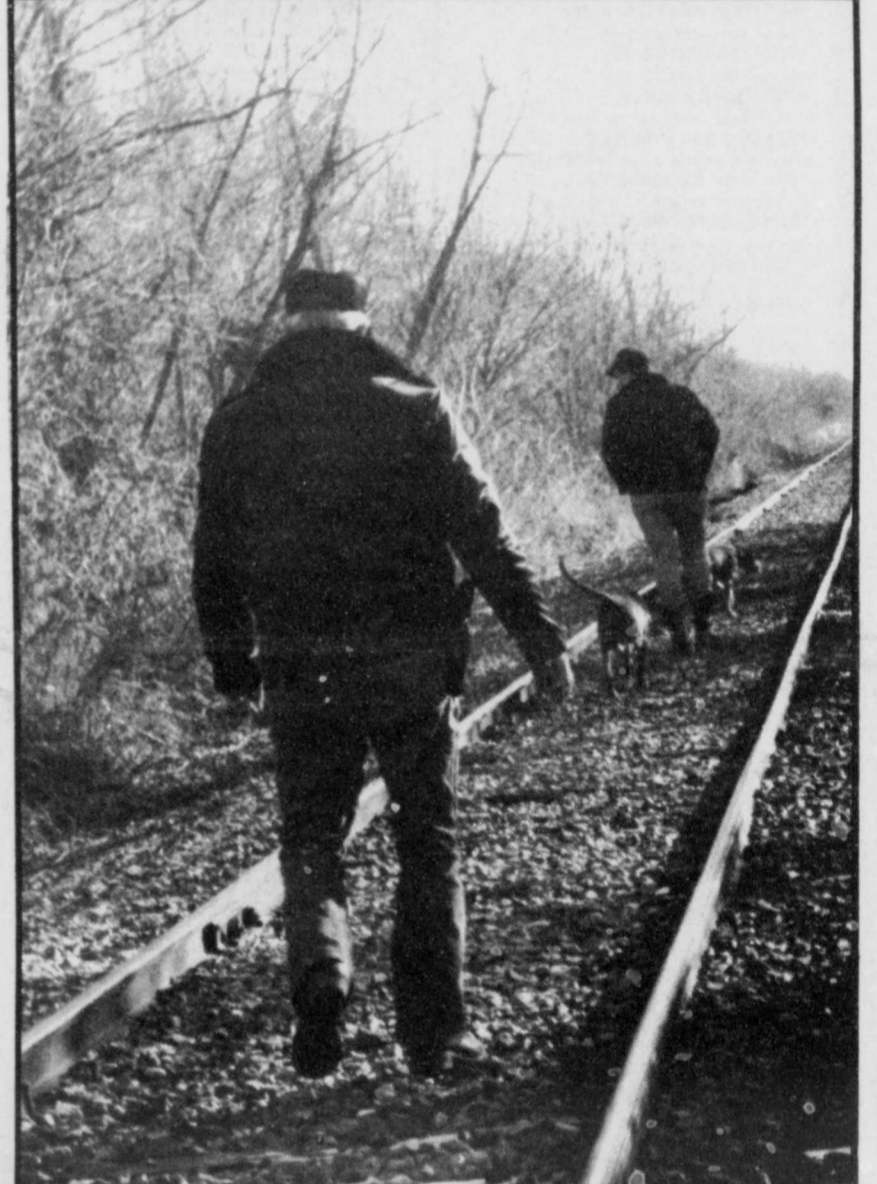
Both have been charged with aggravated robbery. Lamar County Judge Robert Burns set bond for each man at \$100,000.00 and the two will be transferred to Red River County Jail, since the bank robbery occurred in that county.

Mrs. Bogie, Home Cooking Specialist

If you're in Bogata or the area nearby, and you're hungry for some good old fashioned home cooking, chances are you won't be disappointed if you stop in and eat at Bogie's Cafe located on North Main Street in Bogata.

Mrs. Lorene Bogie started her tradition of home cooked cafe meals about 42 years ago when she began cooking for Claude and Edith Gray in their cafe which was located here the new post office now sits. The business there sold and she worked for Ann Walker and later for Jeff Hancock. Mr. Hancock moved the cafe business to where Mary's Boutique is now located. She also worked for the McKelvie's in their cafe near the old bank building, which now houses City Hall, and Mr. and Mrs. Robbins, who ran a cafe here for awhile.

Mrs. Bogie and her husband, Odell opened their own cafe February 22, 1961 on Highway 271. The hours were 5 a.m. to 8 p.m., seven days a week. She turned the business over to her son, Harold Dean Bogie and wife, Janie, in 1972, but has continued to help. The Bogies moved their business to North Main Street on May 8, 1978.

Mrs. Bogie recalls that in her cafe on 271, she had a cut-out where she could place the orders for the waitresses to pick up. Through this hole, she could look out into the dining portion of the cafe and see the customers. As she saw many of the regular customers come in, she could begin to fill their order before it was turned in.

Dixie Stringfellow, her faithful employee, who has been with her since the beginning, and Mrs. Bogie reminisced about some of those regular customers who patronized the cafe in years past. They spoke of Rena and Newt Bryson who ate with

them every Sunday. "Regardless of what was offered on the menu, it was always ordered fried chicken," says Mrs. Bogie. "There were others who ate with us on a daily basis and many who do, today," she added.

"Many of our regular customers just call in and say 'fix me a hamburger'", and Mrs. Bogie knows just how to fix it and what to put on it for them," said Dixie.

Like a lot of good cooks, Mrs. Bogie does not use recipes. A pinch of this ingredient and a shake of that always seems to come out just right for her.

Specialties of the house, which Mrs. Bogie has cooked up for hungry folks through the years are her famous roast beef plate lunches, chicken fried steaks, and hamburgers which have been labeled by her patrons as "Mrs. Bogie hamburgers". She's also become famous in these parts for her home baked pies, which she makes fresh every day.

Mrs. Bogie has a recliner in the kitchen of the cafe, now, in which she sometimes rests during working hours. She only comes down to help out and to have something to do, she says.

Her mother, Mrs. Maggie Gillis, who lived to be 102, always spent one day a week at the cafe with the Bogies and enjoyed a meal there with them. Now, we won't try to tell you that eating at Bogie's Cafe helped her to live such a long life, but we will say that Mrs. Bogie's fine cooking has become a "treat" to most folks in these parts.

Mrs. Bogie has been known to quip, "I've made enough gravy to float a horse."

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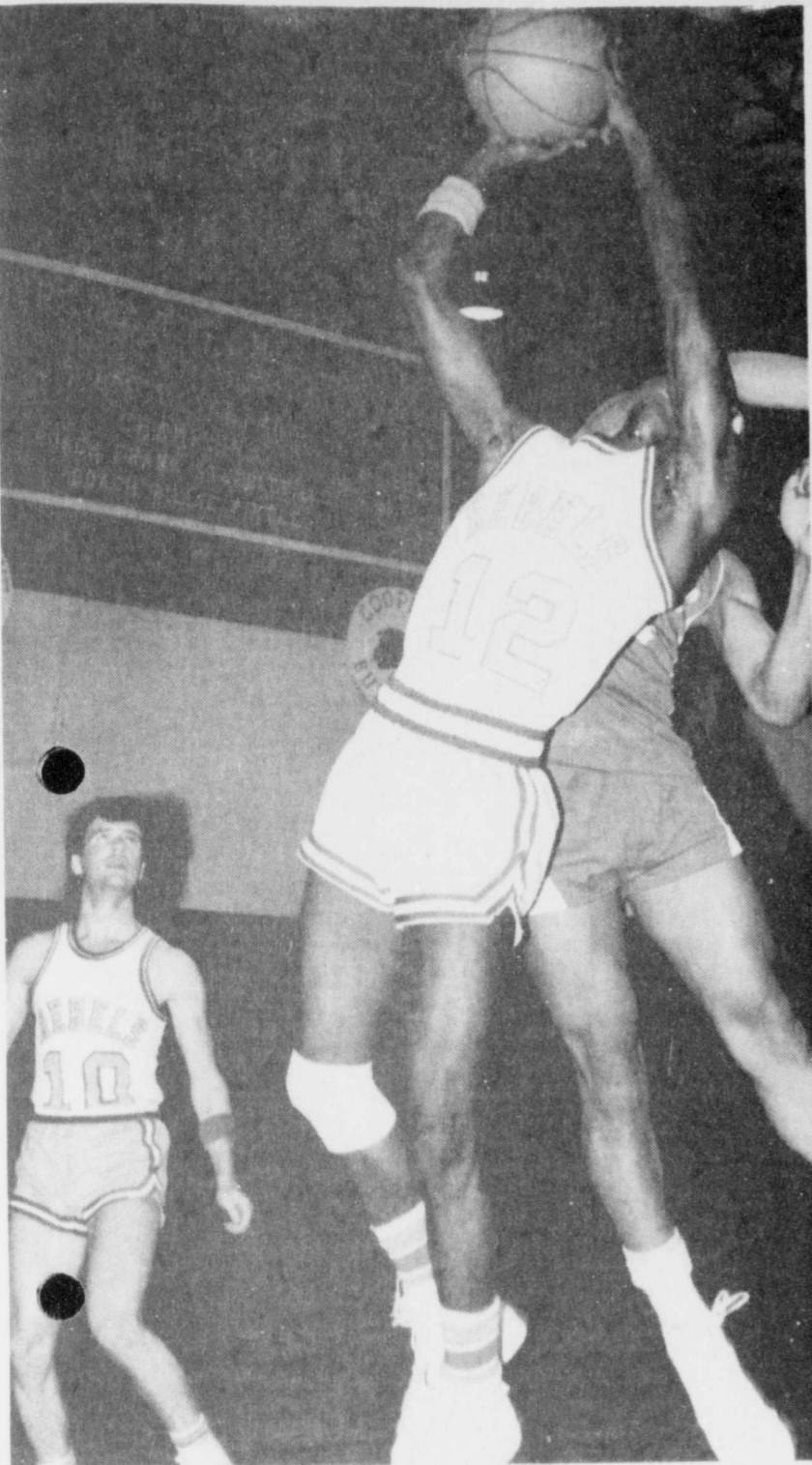
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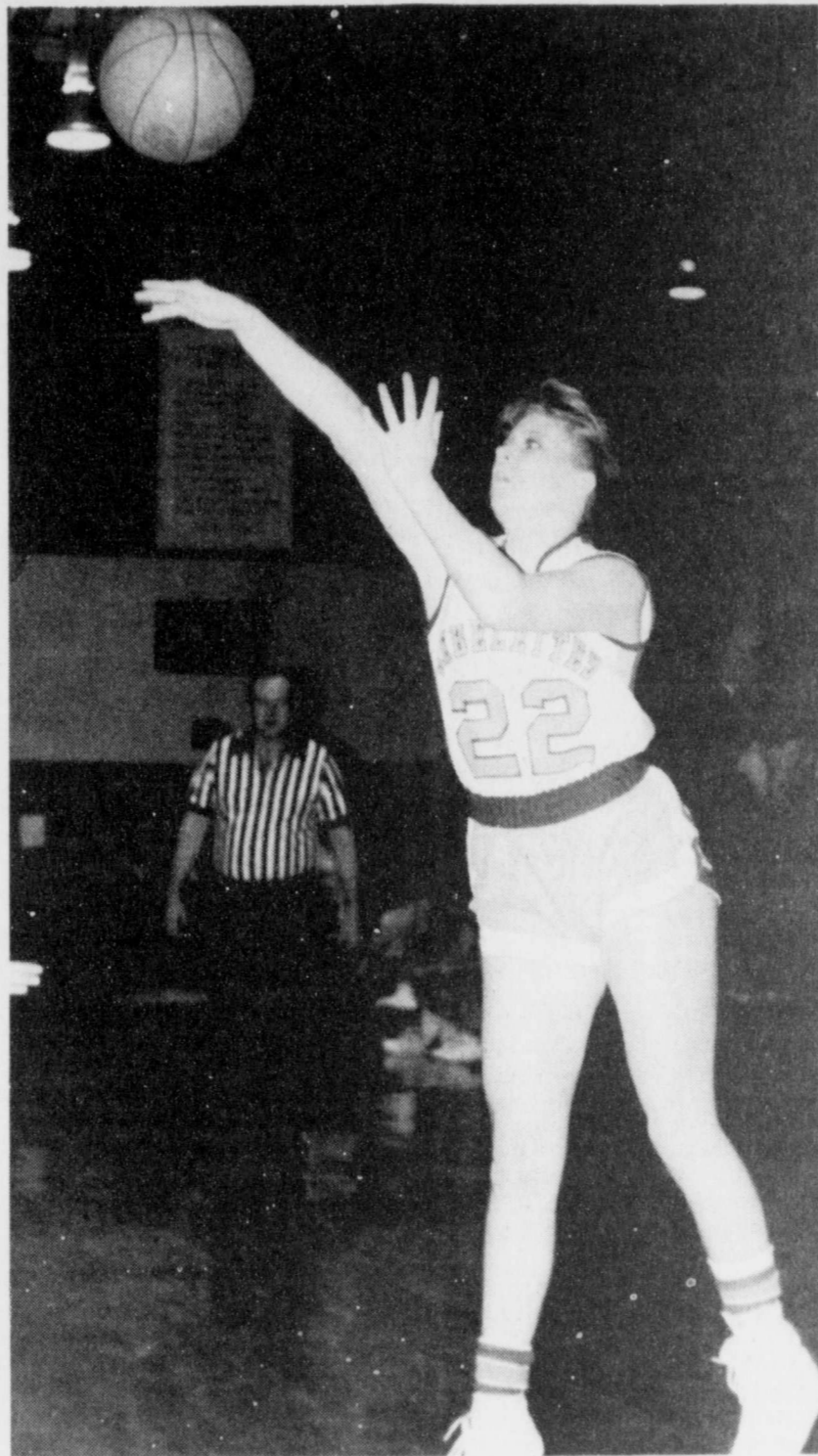
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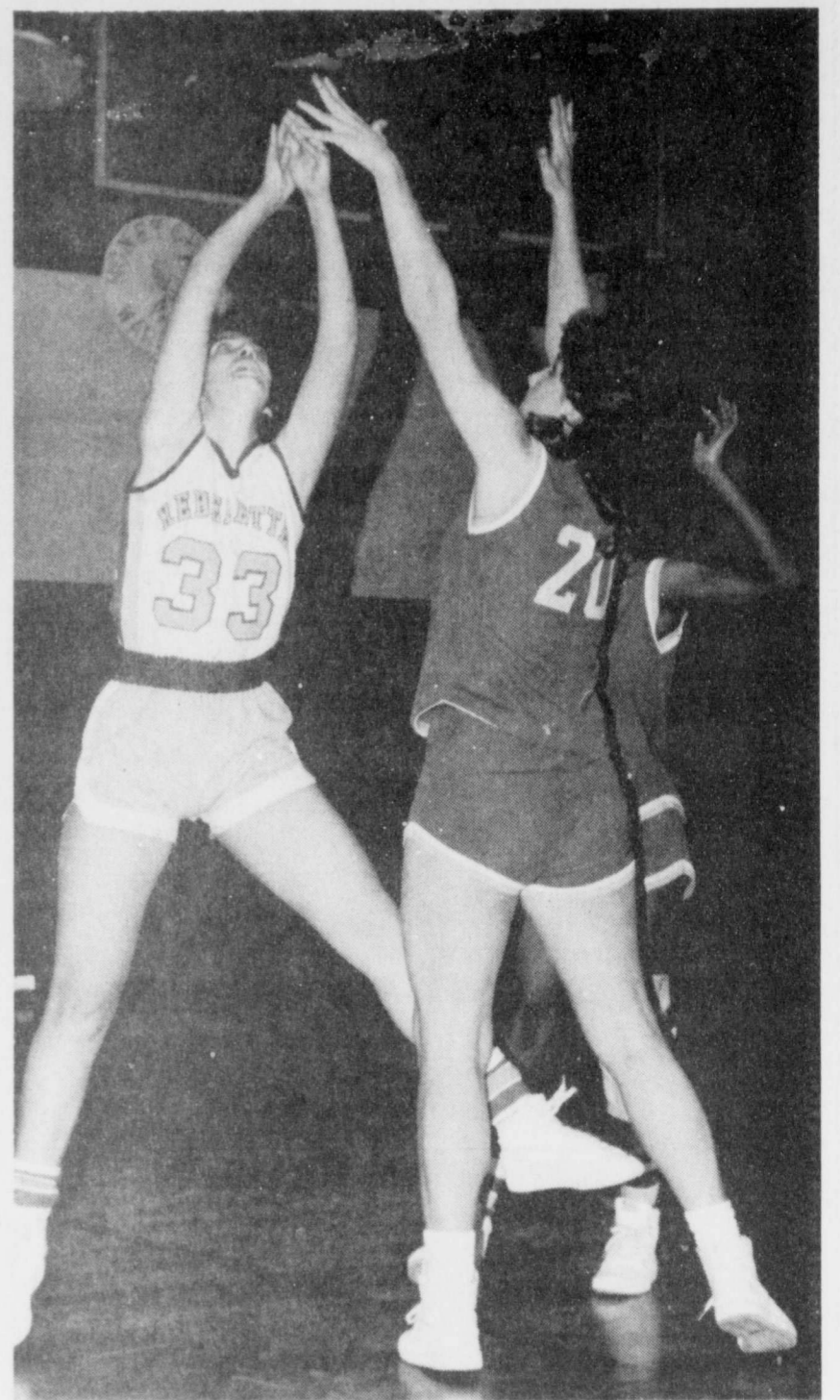

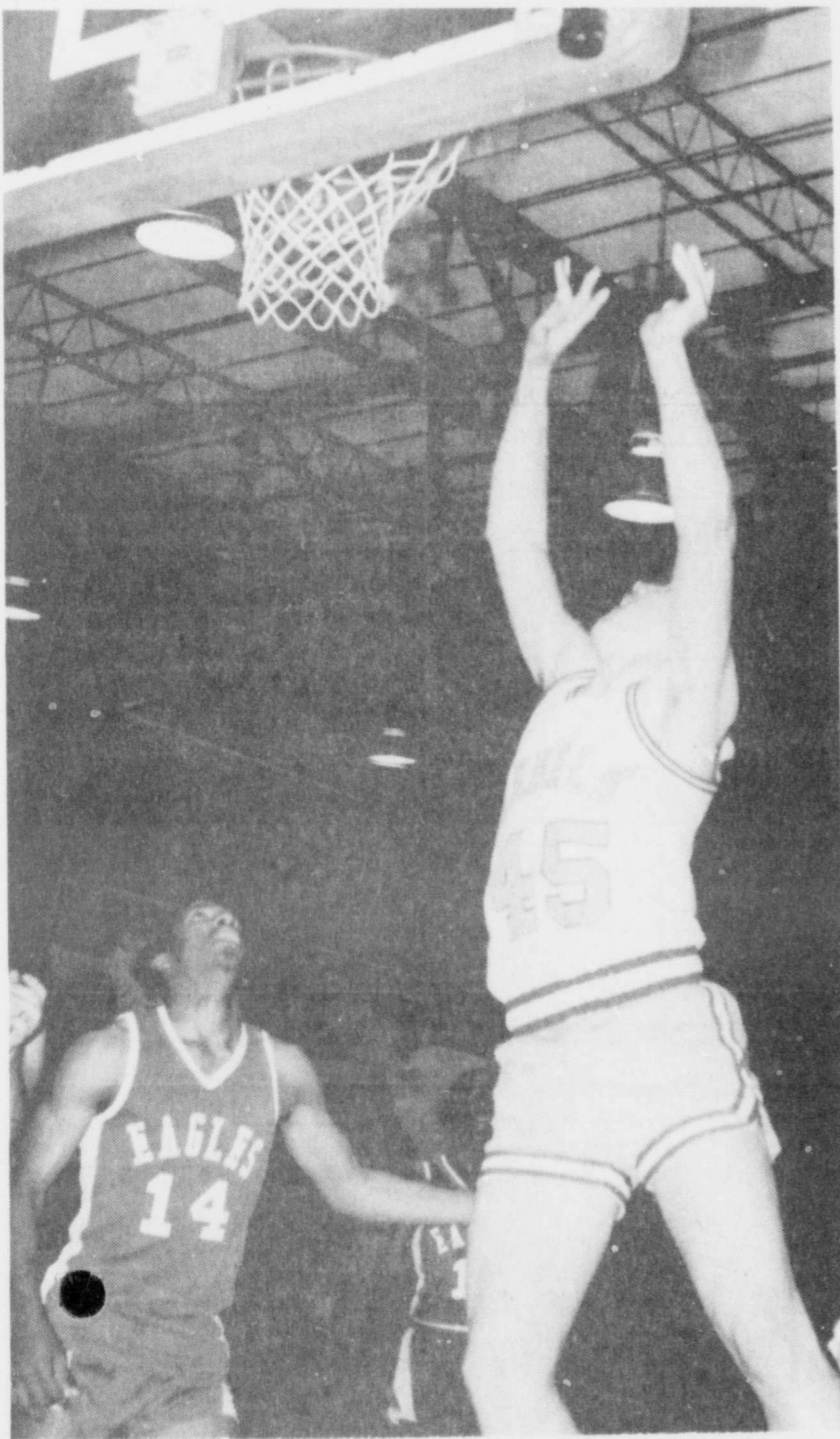

Paying Practices For Beef Outlined

By Paul D. Payne

Cattlemen must pay close attention to efficient management practices to survive financially in today's depressed economic conditions. That means following practices that offer the greatest potential for increased income while keeping risks at a minimum.

Certain management practices can make a difference in total dollars returned to an operation depending on such factors as weather, market prices and dedication of operator to efficient management.

The following practices offer an expected return on savings per cow. The dollar values shown were taken from result demonstration trials on cattle under average environmental conditions. Returns will be variable where cattle are stressed due to drought, disease and other natural influences.

Herd health program	\$5 to \$20
Breeding soundness in bulls	\$3 to \$50
Controlled breeding season	\$50
Breeding heifers 30 days before the rest of the herd.	\$10

Tested easy calving sire	\$10 to \$60
on virgin heifers	
Observing for calving difficulties three times daily.	\$4 to \$10
Use of wormers	\$2 to \$5
Use of growth implants in calves	\$7 to \$25

Use of estrous synchronization	\$3 to \$12
Use of artificial insemination	\$7 to \$30
Sorting cows based on feed needs	\$8
Use of year-round mineral supplement	\$5 to \$12

Retained ownership of calves (stockers and/or feeding)	\$0 to \$40
Targeted marketing (specialized production, such as F1 heifers, club calves)	\$20 to \$200
Crossbreeding	\$15 to \$30

One might think that if all the practices were implemented simultaneously, the result would be increased net income equal to the sum total of all the values in the dollar column. That, obviously, is not true, but certainly a combination of two or three practices would have an additive effect on net income. The actual

realized return also depends on the level of production and management that the cows are experiencing when the practices are implemented.

These practices will help a cattleman minimize production with minimum costs. Use of these types of technological advances requires determination and dedication, but the potential for increased profits is real.

Men Turning 26 Reach Milestone Says Selective Service

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1987 are reaching an important milestone.

Beginning on January 1, 1987, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man will have permanently forfeited his right to certain benefits including federal student aid, job training and federal employment. In addition to these federal benefits, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the 25-year-olds who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the armed forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1961 who have registered, 1987 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present

law should there be a return to the draft. Over 17 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with selective service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 97 percent of those required to register.

Men, age 18 to 25, who have not yet

registered still have a chance to avoid risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in jail, or both.

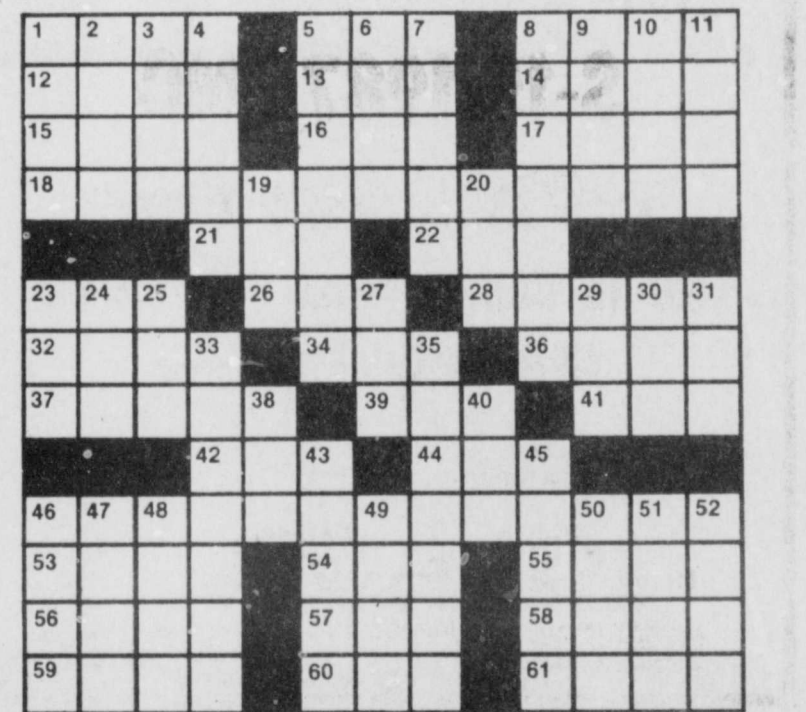

Rivercrest Closes Out Non-District With Wins

The Rivercrest basketball teams closed out their non-district schedule last Tuesday night against the New Dianna Eagles, sweeping three games from the former district rival. 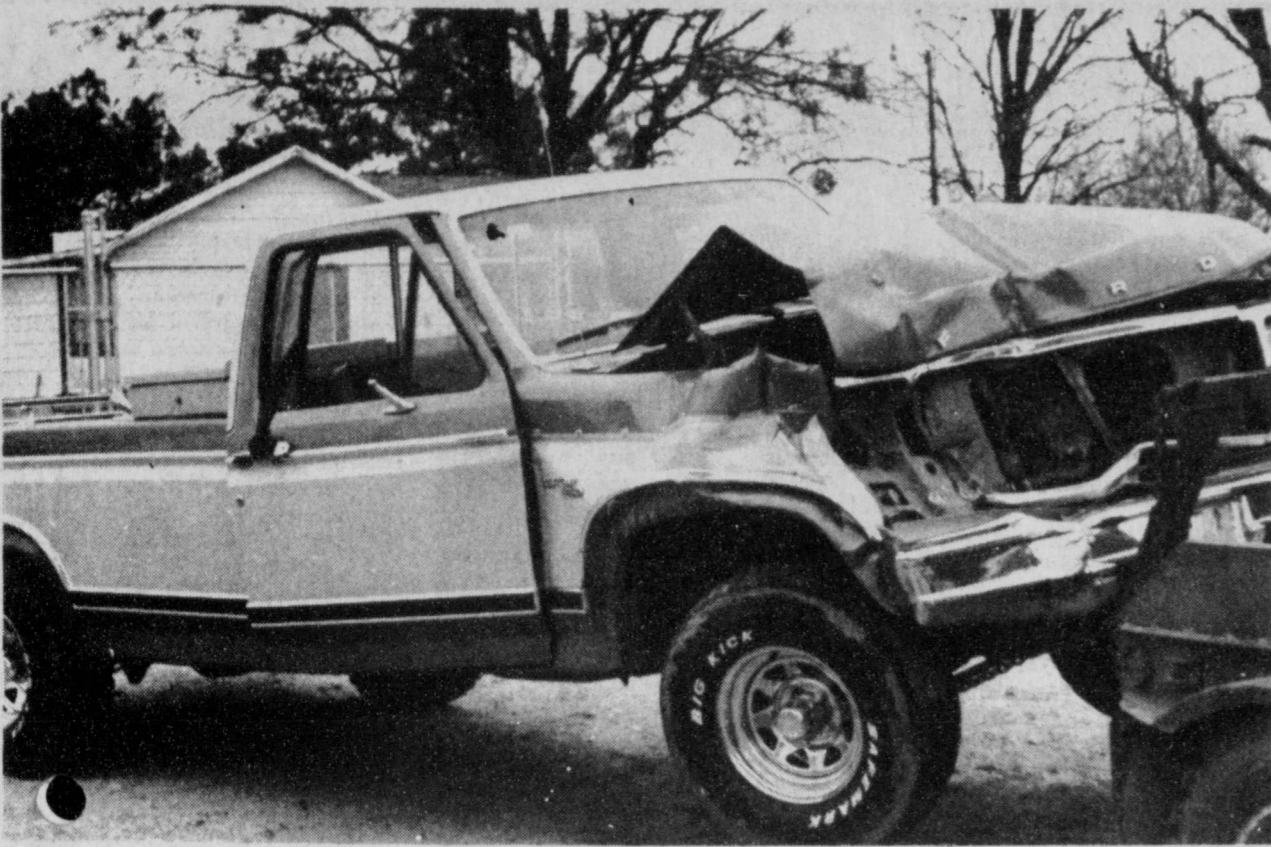

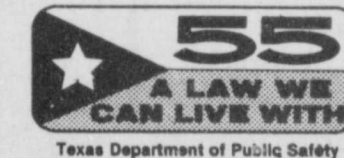
