## Gardeners Seek Satisfaction In Seeds

It is a time of restlessness for gardeners. Whether a vegetable grower, producer of flowers, or container cultivator, every gardener is ready to delve in the earth.

But the earth is not ready. In spite of warm days, the bitter nights keep soil icy and wet.

The autumn satisfaction of being through with outdoor chores has long since faded away, the holiday rush is over...gardeners want to garden!

What to do, then, since nature says no? Many find refuge in the old standby...the seed catalog.

Burpee's, Starks, Johnson's or any other, the bright pictures and descriptions of new varieties and old standbys attract gardeners like flowers attract bees.

The seed catalog provides a glimpse of the upcoming spring, relieving the winter doldrums, helping allay cabin fever.

Like any catalog, the seed catalog must be used with care. The temptation to spend more money is there...the glorious photographs of prize vegetables and breath-taking flowers prompt the pen to extend the list of seeds and plants.

A serious gardener may sit for an afternoon, coffee at hand, lap full of publications, perusing page after page, making decisions as to what to order. Almost invariably, the list must be shortened until it is more realistic. But when all the chaff has been separated, and only the necessary things listed in the columns of the order blank, few gardeners can resist adding just another item or two. They "treat" themselves to something new, exotic, or perhaps only marginally suitable to the area.

With the order blank filled in, totalled up and check included, a trip to the

mail box or post office takes care of it. The satisfaction is almost equal to an afternoon in the outdoors!

Then, of course, comes the wait. One fine day, the mail will yield it's mini-harvest of seeds. The envelopes are tiny works of art, yet the twisted, withered and dried seeds within are a long way from the glorious results pictured on the packet.

That, every gardener knows, is the true miracle, to place those wizened seeds into the earth and help them grow into luxuriant plants.

Hopefully, by the time the seeds arrive, the gardener will be into the

beginning of spring. Bulbs, planted in the dismal November, will be fulfilling their promise with green shoots pushing up. It will be time to prepare beds, dry-cleaning the dusty soil into a velvety richness. English peas, onions, other cold-resistant plants can be set out.

But for now, in the middle of winter, gardeners must be contented with seed catalogs and quick walks around the garden, and the age old promise that "there are sleeping seeds under the bitter earth, waiting for the warm sun of spring".

It is as it always has been, a part of the cycle of the earth... something every gardener is aware of.

## Bogata Has New City Marshall

Bogata City Judge, Mildred Eudy, swore in the new City Marshall, James A. Elston, Wednesday, January 21 at the Bogata City Hall.

Mr. Elston has been a resident of Bogata for two months, moving here from Monahans, TX. He has 13 years experience in law enforcement and has a permanent license issued by the state. He attended Waco Police Academy, has 60 hours from Texas A&M in Accident and Criminal Investigation, studied Law Enforcement at Howard Junior College and has received many hours of inservice training through the years. He has worked as a law enforcer in the Houston area and worked for the Ward County Sheriff's Department in Monahans.

Marshall Elston's wife, Doris, is employed with Red River Haven Nur-

sing Home and has several relatives who live in the Bogata area. The Elstons have two children, Stacy, 5 years old, and Bobby, 10 years old. The children attend Bogata Elementary School. The family plans to buy a house here and make Bogata their home. The new City Marshall will be available for service to the public 24 hours a day except for his regular days off.

"I'm looking forward to serving the people of Bogata," said Elston, "and to serve the people better, I've installed a two-way radio in my home with which my wife, when not at work, can take your calls anytime and contact me directly in the patrol car," he added.

In discussing other areas of service, Elston stated that he planned to give special attention to the school cross-

ing. "I plan to run a lot of radar in the school zone in the afternoons to try and keep some innocent child from being hit by a speeding vehicle," he said. "Also," he added, "if you are going to be out of town overnight or on vacation, if you will please call me, I will keep a special watch on your residence, or if I can be of any service to you, please do not hesitate to call on me at anytime."

A telephone is being installed for Marshall Elston this week and the number will be published in next week's paper. Bogata City Hall, the Sheriff's Department in Clarksville and the Bogata merchants will have the phone number after Tuesday, January 27. The telephone will be listed under James Elston.

## Elections Set For April 4th

Elections for Bogata City Council and the Talco-Bogata CISD trustees will be held April 4.

City Secretary, Anita Couch said the deadline for filing for the office of councilman is at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, February 18. The terms of councilmen, Billie Smiley Hervey, A.G. Puckett and Travis Hale will expire this year, she said.

Secretary of the Talco-Bogata CISD, Janice Franks said the deadline for filing for the office of school trustee is midnight, March 4.

The terms of Dr. E.E. Brooks, Jim Carroll and Billy Daniels will expire this spring. The posts held by Brooks and Carroll are three-year terms, while that held by Daniels is a one-year term.

As of Tuesday, January 27, no one including incumbents whose terms expire this year for the City Council or the school board, had filed as candidates for the offices.

## Water Bills Computerized

Water bills for Bogata residents will take on a new look beginning in February. That is because the system has been computerized.

In the past, the bills have been hand-written and individually balanced, taking two people and approximately two weeks. In order for the secretary to have time to prepare these bills, the meters had to be read by the 15th of each month and turned in to the office close to that date. By using the computer, the bills will now be read on the 19th and later they will be read even closer to the first of the month. The new computerized system will take approximately 2 days to complete the billing procedure.

Everyone on city water will have an account number which will be on the new bills. The water bills will be mailed out on the first of each month, and the bills will be due by the tenth. The penalty will automatically be added by the computer for all bills not received in the office on or before the tenth.

The computer was purchased by the City of Bogata from Municipal Data Systems in Ft. Worth.

According to Bogata City Mayor, W.T. Harbison, the council hopes to be able to use the computer in the future in collecting city taxes in Bogata.

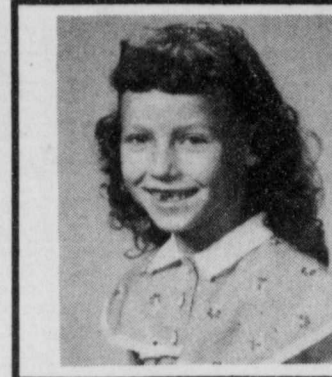

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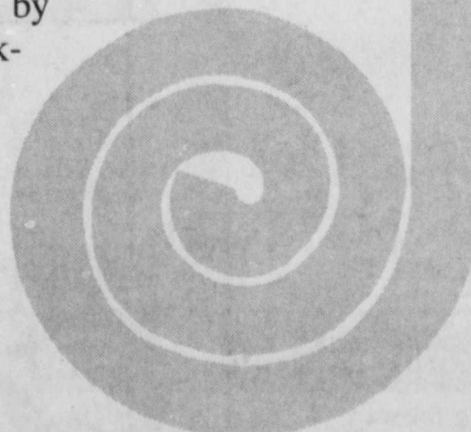
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# Rebelettes Record Falls To 1-6, Rebels Up 3-2

Coach Wake Wood utilized the entire bench as Rivercrest posted a 23-16 lead to end the first half.

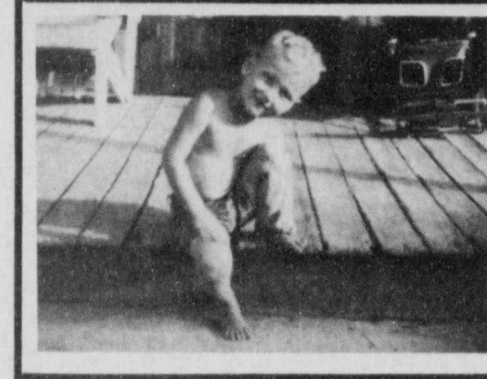

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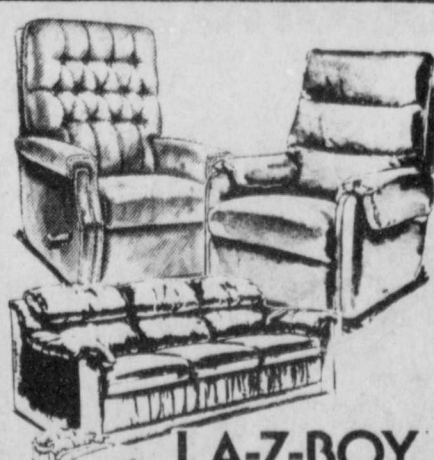
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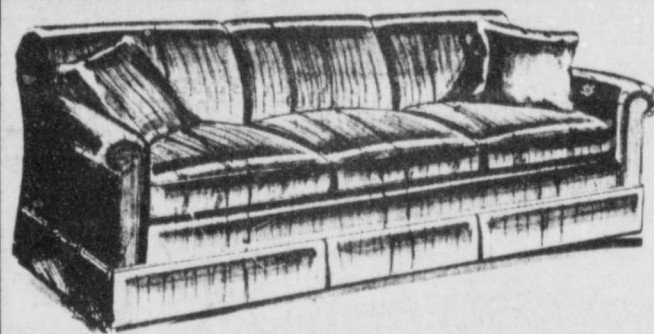
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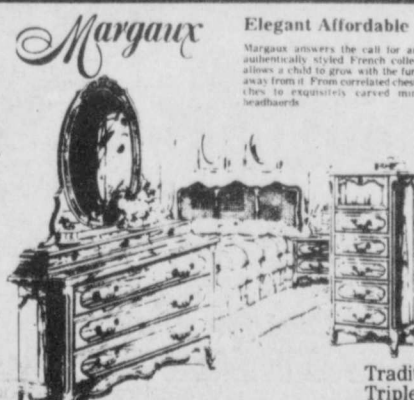
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- Use the smoke alarm to start the drill. This acquaints the family with the sound of the alarm — and gives you a chance to test it.

- Practice calling the fire department. Use a role-playing technique to help children learn their home address and how to report an emergency clearly. Teach them not to hang up until the dispatcher tells them to.
- Visit the fire department. Fire fighters enjoy meeting kids and teaching fire safety.



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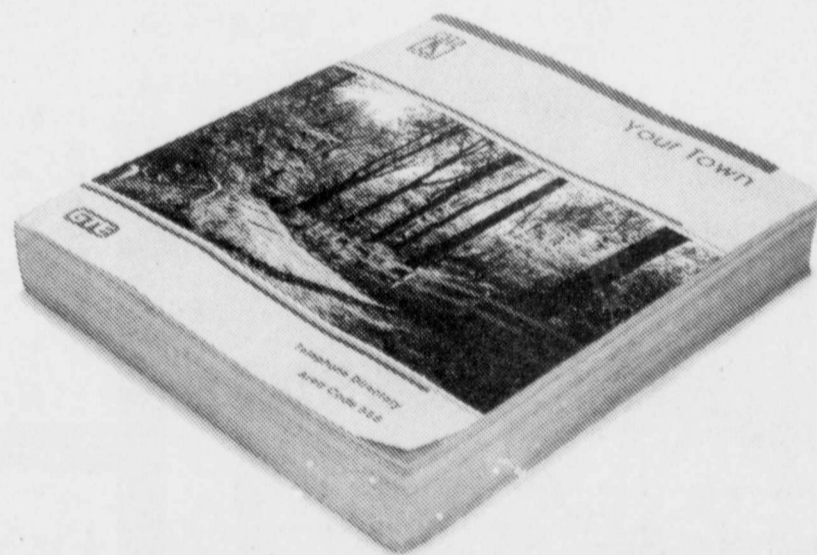

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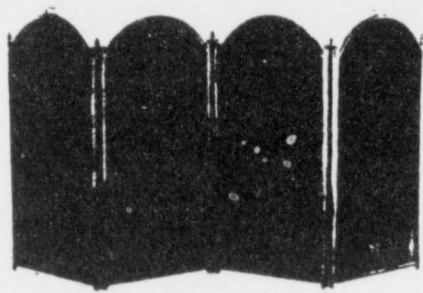


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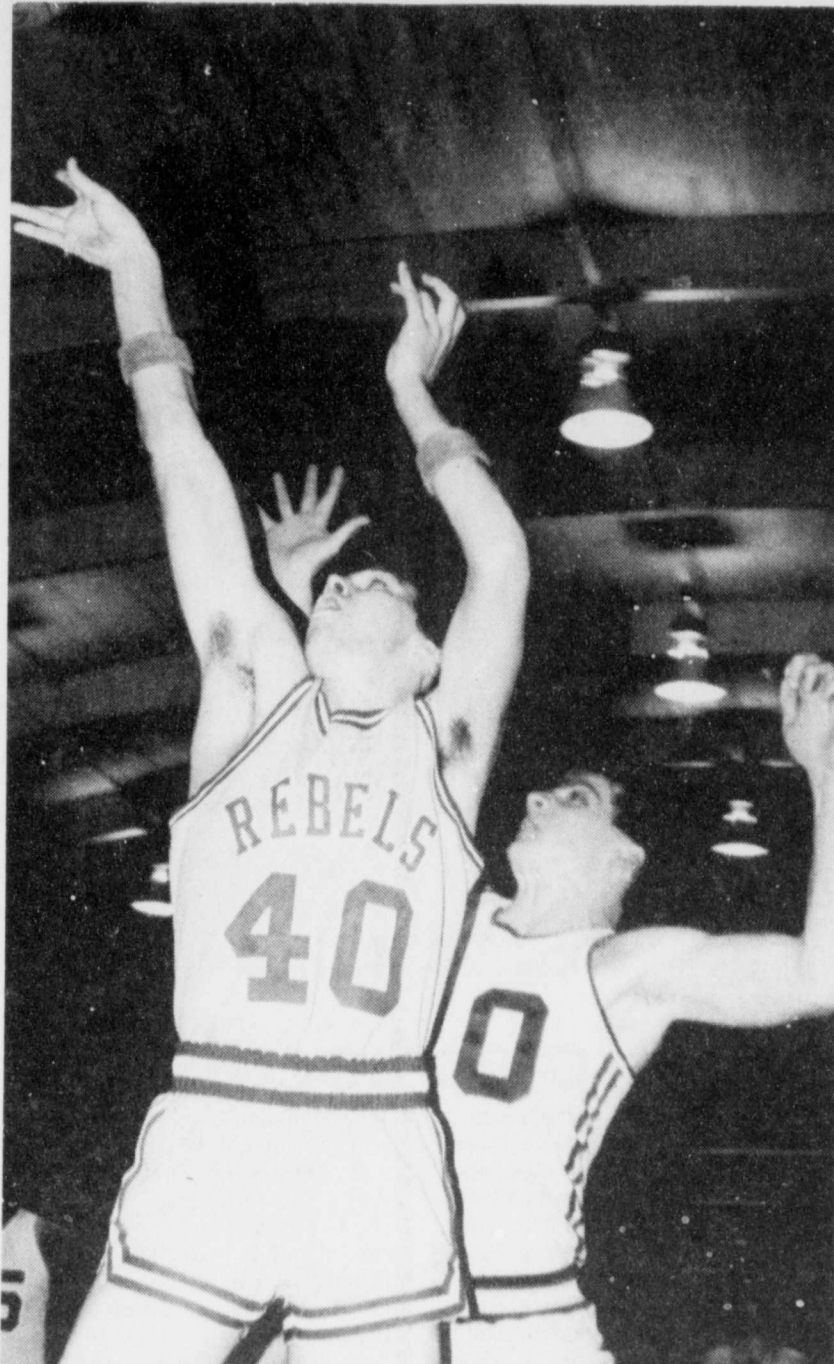
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SHOOT-Brad Branch, No. 40 for the Rivercrest Rebels, shoots against the Cooper Bulldogs. The

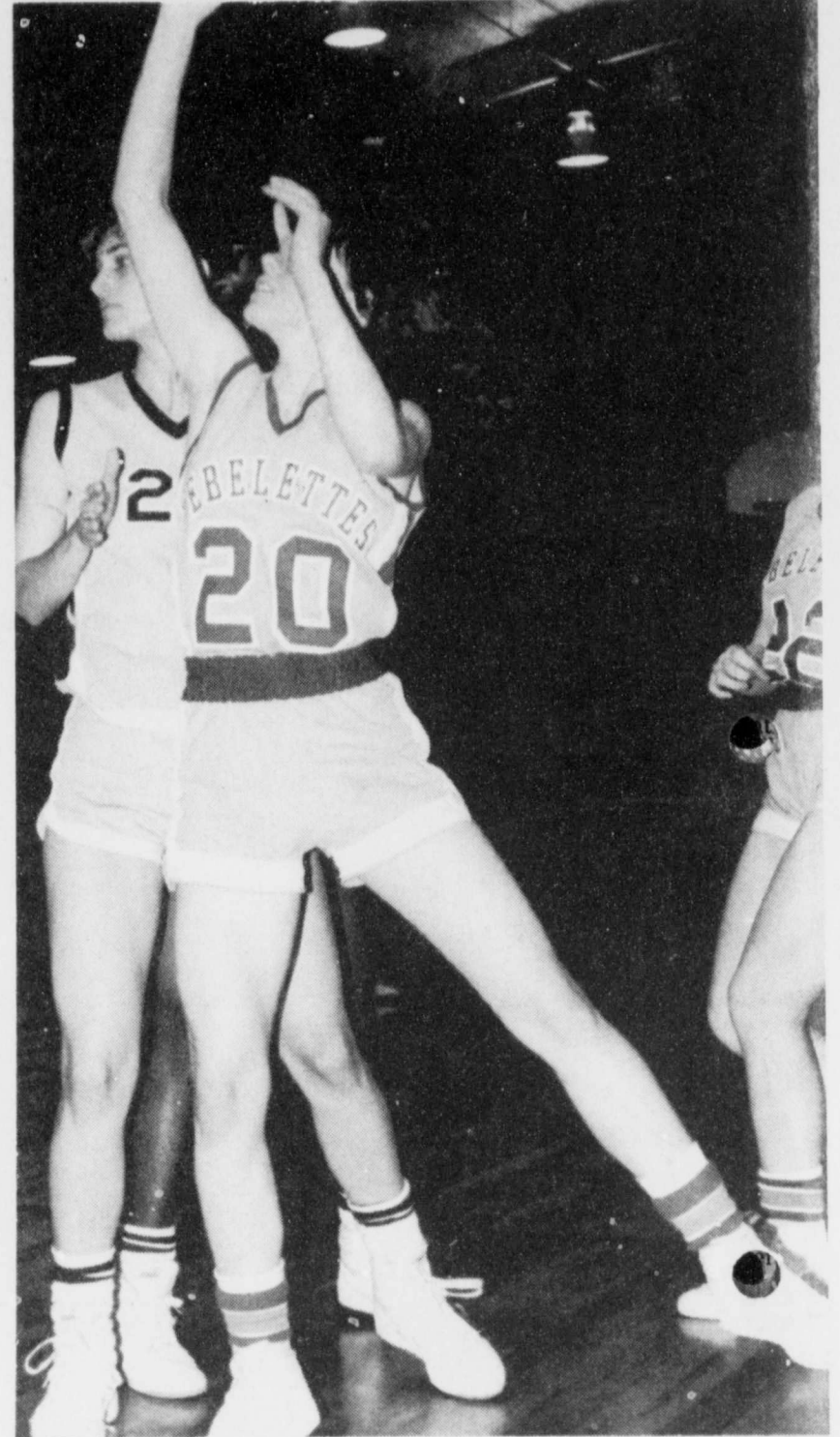

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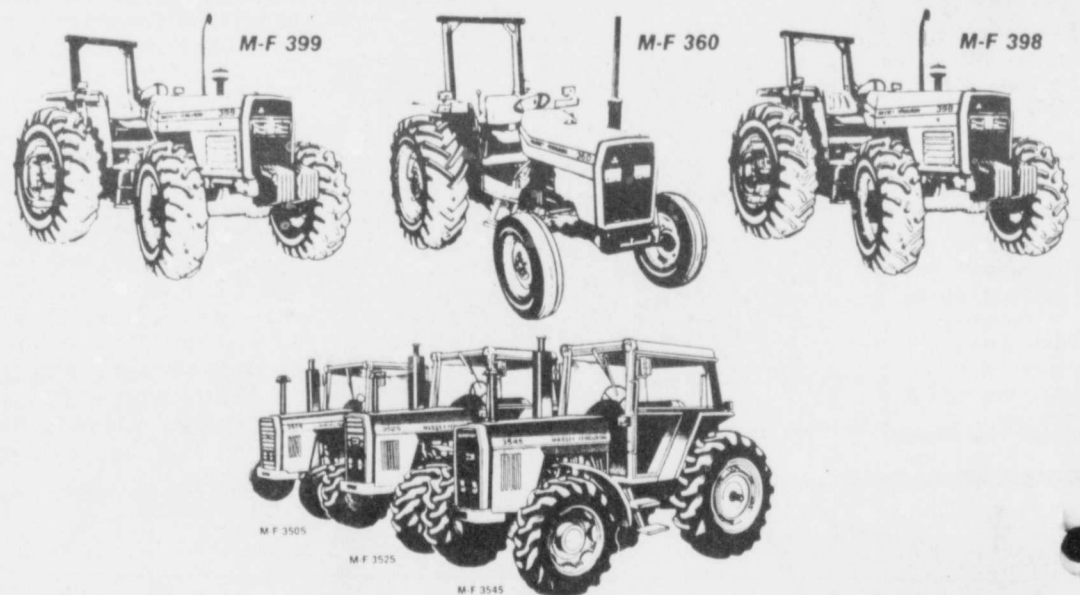

**Dr. Wayne Grogan Doing Work Concerning Irregular Heartbeat**

Dr. Wayne Grogan, grandson of Vera Grogan of Bogata, has been the principal investigator of a Sensor Kelvin 500, a pacemaker which adjusts the patient's heartbeat according to blood temperature changes resulting from rest or activity.

Dr. Grogan is an assistant professor of medicine at the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinic, and the director of UW Hospital's electrophysiology program.

A new electrophysiology laboratory will improve detection and treatment of potentially fatal heart arrhythmias has been installed at the hospital.

Grogan is quoted in the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for Health Sciences News, concerning arrhythmias, and again in the same publication concerning the new pacemaker.

About the pacemaker, Dr. Grogan says, "It's one of the more promising new pacemakers currently under in-

vestigation because it more closely and consistently mimics the response of a normal heart."

Yet another article features Dr. Grogan in the Wisconsin State Journal, and again in the Milwaukee Sentinel State News.

Dr. Grogan is very involved with detecting and treating irregular heartbeat, and is obtaining a position of prominence in the field.
