

Saturday School, City Election Results Official

According to the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. secretary, Janice Franks, an official count of the election returns on Monday, April 6, determined the following: Eddie Brown, 93 votes; A.D. Stephenson, 149 votes; Jerry Stansell, 83 votes; Johnny Hood, 87 votes; Buford Hervey, 161 votes; Jimmy Smith, 20 votes; Billy Daniels, 150

votes; Scott Rackliff, 72 votes; Jerry Craig, 37 votes; and write-ins, John Brooks and Mary Joplin received one vote each.

An earlier count had reported a tie and possible run off between Bogata candidates, A.D. Stephenson and Billy Daniels. The original count gave 151 votes to each of the candidates,

but the official canvass of votes has eliminated that run-off race placing Daniels in the third seat on the Board. Bogata candidate, Buford Hervey and Talco candidate, Eddie Brown were elected to three-year terms.

In the Bogata City Council election all candidates ran unopposed. Those formally elected were Howard Ed

Bryson with 73 votes, A.G. Pucket with 68 votes and Billie Hervey with 54 votes.

Red River County voters favored a county sales tax by 1,313 votes to 285 votes in the Saturday balloting.

According to County Judge L.D. Williamson, passage of the county sales tax will lower the county proper-

ty tax from 63.85 cents per \$100 valuation to about 57.47 cents per \$100 valuation. Williamson stated the Texas Association of Counties had been asking the state for some time for permission to put the county sales tax issue before the voters. The tax will be enacted on January 1, 1988, and will provide additional tax

revenue for the county. The county's take of a one-half of one percent sales tax would be approximately \$100,000 annually.

Talco Mayor Joe B. Morse and two councilmen ran unopposed in the Talco city elections.

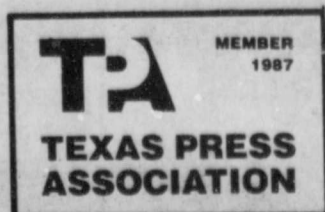

Time To Fertilize Meadows

About the middle of April is a good time to begin fertilizing hay meadows and pastures, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist. By then, night temperatures should be above 60 degrees and bermudagrass should really begin to grow.

There is still time to take a soil test in order to make fertilizer applications more precise and thus more economical. Guessing at the fertility needs of a hay meadow or pasture can be an expensive gamble.

Reeves says that if preemerge herbicides were not applied earlier and broadleaf weeds are infesting the hay meadow or pasture, a post emerge herbicide should be applied before fertilization. This will prevent growing weeds from using the nutrients before the bermudagrass gets growing good. If weeds are not controlled, they will consume most of the fertilizer. Weeds make poor quality forage and take up space, water and nutrients that are needed by the higher quality bermudagrass.

Once the fertilizer to be applied has been determined, shop around for the best prices. However, Reeves says, that price is not the only factor to consider. The honesty and reliability of the dealer are very important. A good job of spreading the fertilizer is very important for uniform production over the entire meadow or pasture.

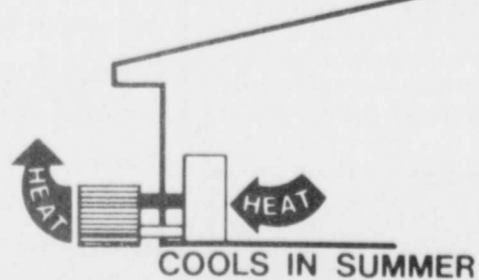

Every time I drive around the north loop of town, I recall those warm summer nights when all the kids would gather on the loop and eat watermelon right there in the middle of the highway. I never knew where all those watermelons came from, but if anyone would really like to know, you could ask Donnie Strain.

Even though Bill Buckman drives

a jeep now, in my mind, I still see him in his dad's Buick or on the motor scooter that he nearly burned the roads up on.

Every time I see Raviah Howison at the nursing home, I think about the awful time she had trying to discipline Sammy Speir and some other boys in that class during study hall. She was librarian, and got the privilege of watching study hall for all classes.

Seeing Mrs. Holder always reminds me of the time she made the memorable speech informing the student body that whoever had drunk the mixture in the chemistry room had consumed only vinegar.

Every meeting I attend at the community center, I find myself looking around the building and remembering the many parties and fun times there. Each time a new pastor of the Methodist Church comes to Bogata, it reminds me of the day the Hawkins moved here, bringing Carol and Marvin to add to our group.

A few days ago, one of my little girls came home telling me about a new boy in school. She told me how excited all the little girls were and I smiled as I realized that some things never change. As she continued to talk, I found myself remembering that summer of 1962. I had just returned home from Longview where I attended beauty school, and was riding around with several girlfriends and catching up on all the gossip. The girls were all so excited as they told me that three boys had moved into town and would be attending Bogata High School in the fall. Little did I know that night that one of those boys would later become my husband.

My computer is filled with these and other good memories. I just hope and pray that time and age doesn't erase them from the mental disc of my mind.

Cancer Society Volunteers Bring Good News

During the month of April, American Cancer Society volunteers will bring some good news to women of Bogata as part of the Society's 1987 Residential Education and Fund-raising Crusade.

"Breast cancer, one of the most feared diseases among women, can be one of the easiest cancers to cure, if it's found early," said Mackey Guest, president of the Society's Red River County Unit. "The good news is there is a tool to detect breast cancer when it is too small to be felt. This is made possible by mammography."

According to Mr. Guest, mammography is the use of a low-dose x-ray to detect minute changes in breast cancer tissue. "A mammogram can single out a malignant tumor years before it becomes large enough to be felt by even the most experienced physician," the president added.

Mr. Guest said the purpose of this year's Crusade is to inform as many residents of Red River County as possible about cancer prevention, early detection, early treatment, as well as the society's many service and rehabilitation programs. Every year, the Society's Crusade takes place in

April, Cancer Control Month.

As part of the campaign, more than 40 trained volunteers will distribute a folder called, "Now, Breast Cancer Has Virtually Nowhere To Hide" to local residents. The folder includes the ACS recommendations for early detection of breast cancer in women without symptoms.

Breast self-examination: This procedure should be practiced every month by women 20 and over.

Examination by physician: For women 20 to 40, examination of the breasts by a physician should take place every three years. For women over 40, this exam should take place annually.

Mammography: Women between 35 and 39 should have one baseline mammogram, for future comparisons. Women between 40 and 49 should have this test every one or two years as recommended by their physician. Women 50 and over should have a mammogram annually.

According to Mr. Guest, studies show this early detection of breast cancer through mammography can not only better one's chances of survival, it also can result in less extensive surgery for the patient. "There's no question that mammography can save a woman's life," he added. "It

can also save the breast."

The door-to-door distribution of the folder is only one of the many activities planned by American Cancer Society volunteers in Red River County. Kim Kelsey is chairman of the Bogata crusade. 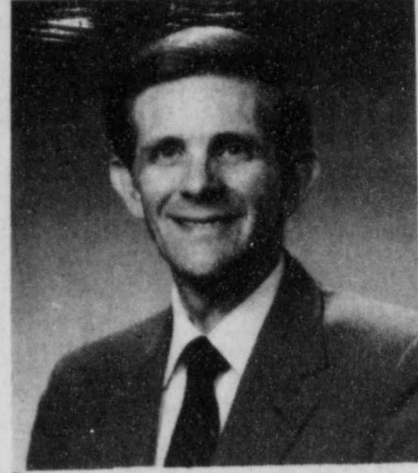
Bogata First Baptist To Hold Revival

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Keeping Healthy
Father/Infant Relationship
Fathers are playing an increasingly important role in child rearing and Michael W. Yogman, MD of Harvard Medical School has been studying the infant/father relationship for the past decade.

Dr. Yogman reports some similarities between paternal and maternal play, and that the infants exhibited the same number of positive facial and verbal expressions with the father as with the mother.

The differences in play with each parent may mean that each influences different elements of the child's development, according to the doctor. Turn-taking games more common with mothers may help the child to learn basic social skills, facilitate later language development, and promote the integration of new skills. The more vigorous games exhibited in play with fathers may encourage the infant's inquisitiveness, present alternatives in social play, and promote the acquisition of new skills and the capacity to experience intensity.

"Together, these differential tracks, which appear to be available to infants as early as one month of age, may foster the development of a wider range of social skills than would develop if only one pattern were available," says Dr. Yogman.
