

Variable Factors Influence Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$47.9 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that 1987 payments to date were down six percent as compared to payments to date made in April of

last year.

Houston's check for \$7.5 million was the largest, bringing 1987 payments to date to \$43.5 million, down seven percent from 1986. Dallas received \$5.8 million for a 1987 total of \$32.2 million, down four percent.

Mt. Pleasant received \$6,951.52 for a 13.98 percent decrease over last year while Talco received \$1,546.81 for a 23.61 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,285.19.

Bogata received \$375.66 for a 12 percent decrease over last year's pay-

ment of \$1,673.10, bringing the 1987 total to \$7,487.42.

Clarksville received \$10,500.49 for an 8.41 percent decrease while Detroit received \$767.62 for a 2.25 percent increase.

Blossom received \$713.61 for a 16

percent increase. Total payments to date are \$4,662.11, compared with \$4,654.44 for 1986.

Deport received no payment for this period, compared to no payment in 1986, for a total of \$3,613.59 of payments to date for 1987.

Paris received \$116,314.54 for a 1.05 percent increase over last year.

April checks represent taxes collected on sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller by March 20.

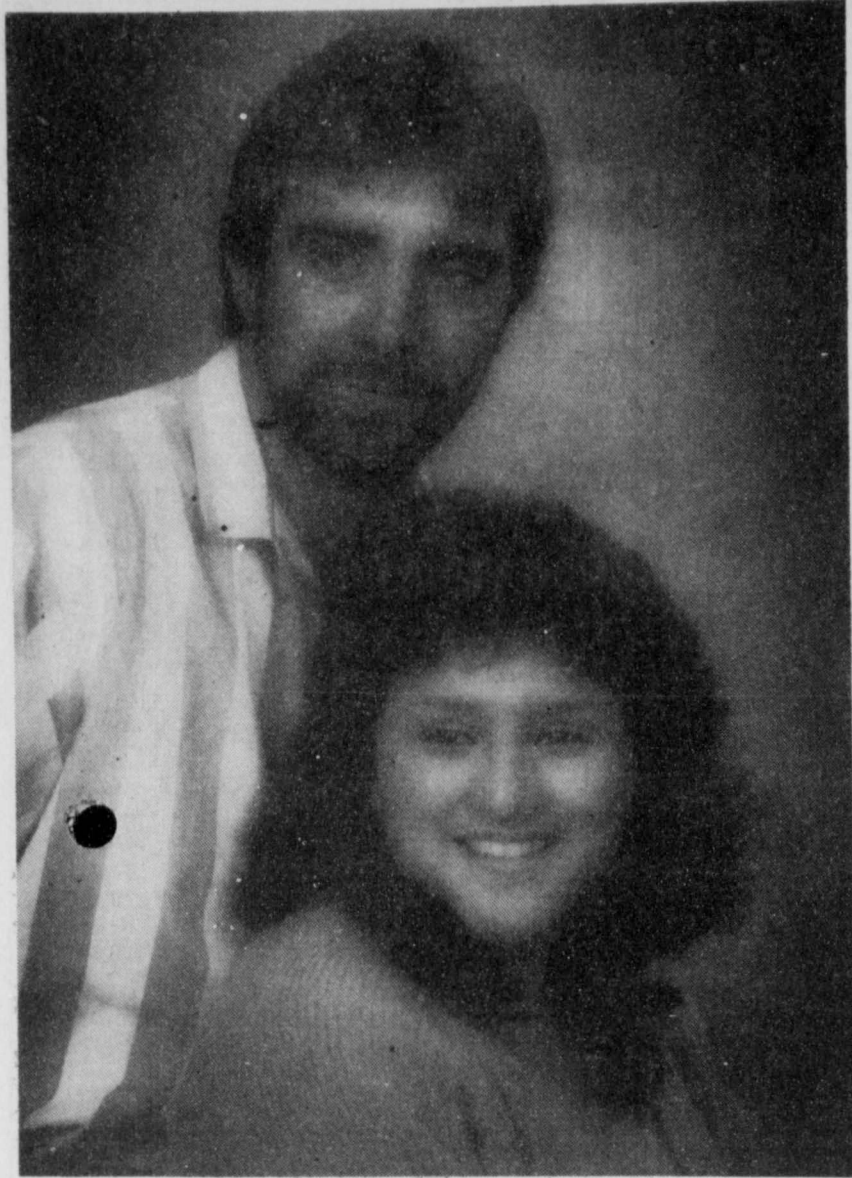

During the training, students received instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid and Army history and traditions.

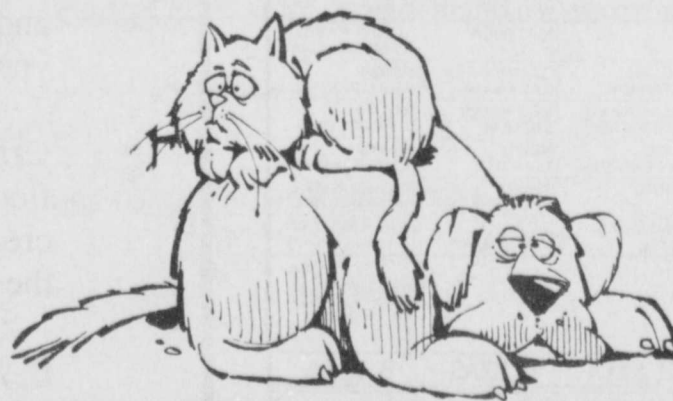

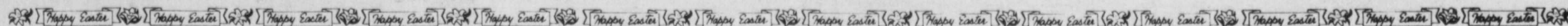

Texas Has Class B Brucellosis Rating Now

A Class B brucellosis classification for Texas has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as of April 1.

"This is a tremendous achievement for the livestock industry. It is the cooperation of cattle producers that makes this possible," John S. Cargile, Chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

Texas has been classified as a Class C and Class B state since 1980. With the Class B status, the B-C line will be eliminated, and the B designation will mean less restriction on movement interstate for producers in Texas, Cargile said.

Increased efforts will be needed in the future to reach the eradication goal, and Cargile said TAHC is taking measures now to assist producers in this effort.

Nationwide, there are now six states with the Class B status. There are 19 states with a Class A status and 23 with a Free status, one B-C and one C state.

"Our next step is to meet the Class A status as mandated by USDA," Cargile said. He also noted that other states are putting more and more

pressure on Texas producers to increase efforts to control and eradicate brucellosis.

"Actually, we are getting more pressure from states to clean up our

act than from the Federal government. This shows to me we need to meet the challenge of ridding the state of brucellosis as expeditiously as possible," Cargile said.

Serious Leaf Rust In Wheat

It now appears that leaf rust will be a problem in area wheat fields this year. In fact, severe infestations are already present in at least two fields in the county. One of these is located near the West Lamar School campus and the other one is between Pattonville and Blossom. There are possibly others.

The strain of rust that is predominant presently is Stripe Rust. The rust pustules are located in rows up and down the leaves whereas leaf rust is not located in rows. Stripe rust is favored by cooler climates. The spores germinate at temperatures between 32 and 70 degrees. Temperatures of 50 to 59 degrees and the presence of rain or dew are favorable for rapid disease development.

The results of stripe rust infestation is the same as leaf rust, loss of yield and quality of grain.

Not every field of wheat that I have

checked has rust. In fact, one will find hot spots of the disease in a field. However, the weather pattern is ideal for the disease to spread, and it has the potential of severely reducing wheat yields.

The question on most producers minds concerning economics of spraying, timing of application, costs and etc. We believe that a field of wheat should have a yield potential of 40 bushels before one should consider spraying. There is nothing magical about that number, but it is important that a yield of at least 40 bushels be possible on the field.

Applying the fungicide at the correct time is very important. The aim in rust control is to protect the flag leaf and hopefully the leaf just below it. On a normal plant there will be four good leaves at the time the grain head emerges. Even though the lower leaves on the plant may be affected by a disease, one should not be concerned about them. So, ideally, one should apply a fungicide as the flag leaf is emerging.

There are two different types of fungicides available. Contact fungicides such as Dithane or Manzate are not as effective as a systemic fungicide such as Bayleton or Tilt. A heavy rain will wash off the contact fungicide, but will not affect the effectiveness of the systemic. We would suggest that one only use a systemic for rust control.

One needs to apply four ounces of the Bayleton in five gallons of water per acre. If you have a septoria leaf spot problem, then a 2 plus 2 application should be considered.

Should you spray. The decision is yours. I cannot guarantee one a ten bushel increase, but the savings could be significant this year. Do not wait until it is too late to apply a fungicide. It should be applied to protect the flag leaf.

- 1 can (10 oz.) enchilada sauce
