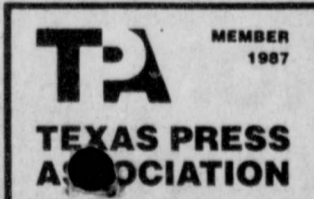

## Brothers Enjoy Delving Into The Past

Local brothers, Donnie and Deon Williams, spend a lot of their free time digging in various areas of Red River County searching for arrowheads and other artifacts. The boys recently unearthed several pieces of Indian pottery which date back many centuries.

According to Mr. and Mrs. D.R. Williams, parents of the boys, their eldest son, Donnie, was born with a natural interest in digging for buried treasures. They recall that as a small boy he would spend hours digging in the back yard of their Odessa, Texas home, always expecting to find something. They laughingly tell of the time when he was five years old and persuaded two neighbor friends to help him dig to hell. As Donnie began to tell friends what they would find once they reached their goal, the boys became frightened and ran home. Their mother promptly called Mrs. Williams and angrily advised her to warn Donnie to keep his interpretations of hell to himself.

During summer vacations and at Christmas time, the Williams family visited relatives in Red River County. During one of these visits, the boys grandfather, Travis Williams, told Donnie about finding arrowheads near a farm on which he and his parents, George and Ada Williams, had been sharecroppers. This information, coupled with his natural desire, motivated Donnie to spend more and more time digging.

Donnie's consistency and determination in searching for things of value didn't actually begin to pay off until the Williams family bought a grocery store and moved to Clarksville, Texas in 1972. While his parents worked in the store Donnie occupied himself with digging in an area beside the store building where an old washateria had once stood. He found old coins, rings, pins, and some broken pieces of gold plated china.

Donnie found his first arrowhead on a catfish farm in Oklahoma while passing the time as his dad bought fresh fish for the store. Later he found several more arrowheads on the

building site of the Assembly of God Church parsonage in Bogata, and with these, Donnie began his arrowhead collection.

The Williams family built a home at Pine Branch on the old Mauldin place in 1975. While helping his dad build a gate there, Donnie spied a tomahawk head lying nearby. He learned later that the tomahawk was made by the Caddo Indians which once inhabited this area. This new knowledge sparked a special interest to learn about the early civilization of Indians in the area.

He became an avid reader of biographies, novels of early Texas settlers and books about Indians. In later years Donnie was given the privilege of visiting the Caddonian Indian Museum in Crockett. He learned from information gained there that most of the arrowheads in his collection were made by the Caddos. Although the Caddo Indians were mostly farmers, they could become savage when protecting themselves. Another interesting fact he learned from the museum was that the Caddos practiced cannibalism. If an unhealthy, deformed or undesired child was born, the parents would use the child for food!

By this time, Deon, the younger Williams brother, was old enough to go with Donnie on his digging expeditions, and from the influence of his older brother, he too, developed a great interest in digging and began his own collection of findings...arrowheads, tomahawk heads and other items.

The many years of digging and constantly scanning areas in search of artifacts developed into a special knack to spot items usually overlooked by most people. A common saying among the family and friends is "If you need something found, just call

Donnie". His parents acknowledge that on a number of occasions while riding with them, Donnie would look out the passenger's window of their pickup and spot arrowheads along the road. At first they thought his preoccupation with his hobby was causing him to act irrationally, but after relenting to his pleas to stop, they found that he had truly found arrowheads!

Deon tells of the time when Donnie was riding his bicycle down a paved road and found an arrowhead partially stuck in the pavement. Apparently it had been dumped out with the gravel as pavers worked on the road.

With Donnie and Deon spending so much time digging, their collections have become quite large. Digging at the Cross Arrow Ranch in Maple Community, Deon discovered another tomahawk and Donnie found several "Apache Teardrops". Studies revealed that these transparent purplish-black rocks were brought into the area by Northwestern Indian tribes. The rare stones were used as money in trading by the early tribes. Other findings include small clay balls used as rattles in gourds, hard bags of buffalo hide or tortoise shells which served as drums for the Indians. They have found stones used for grinding corn for food and herbs and roots for medicine. A shark's tooth and a tiger's tooth are included in Donnie's collection and he believes that these were probably worn on a necklace by an early day Indian. The arrowheads found are made from petrified wood, bone, pine sap, soft flint, hard flint, quartz and obsidian. The most recent and perhaps the most valuable findings include several pieces of Indian pottery, some of which are in perfect condition.

The pottery was found in Red River County, buried under about two feet of earth. A white substance filled

about one third of one of the bowls, and inside another bowl Donnie and Deon found and arrowhead. Digging in the same mound, Donnie unearthed several bones which a medical doctor later declared to be human.

Donnie says he can tell about how old his findings are by the number of layers of ground soil under which the items are buried and the technique used to make the arrowheads. He says that each layer of artifacts will be different. Arrowheads found in the bottom layer are usually more crudely made than the other layers, testimony that these layers are remains of different tribes and different eras of time. Donnie and Deon use a trowel for most of their digging and have learned from experience to dig carefully so as not to mar the items.

In judging where to dig, Donnie looks for sandy places near creeks or rivers. He also looks for high places or mounds. These mounds were where the Indians usually built their

adobe or grass huts.

Along with their archaeological hobby, the men enjoy playing gospel music, talents which they use at the Assembly of God Church in Bogata, where they are both members. Donnie plays lead guitar and Deon plays percussion. The brothers also enjoy fishing and again their special abilities of seeking out hidden things are shown in the number of catches brought home from each trip.

Donnie is now married and he and his wife, Tina, have a 15 month old daughter, Kristen Noel. They live on Clarksville street in Bogata. Deon is a sophomore at Rivercrest High School and lives with his parents in Pine Branch community.

Although the brothers both have busy schedules with work, school and church activities, they still manage to find time each week to do what they enjoy most, pursuing a glimpse into the past through archaeology.

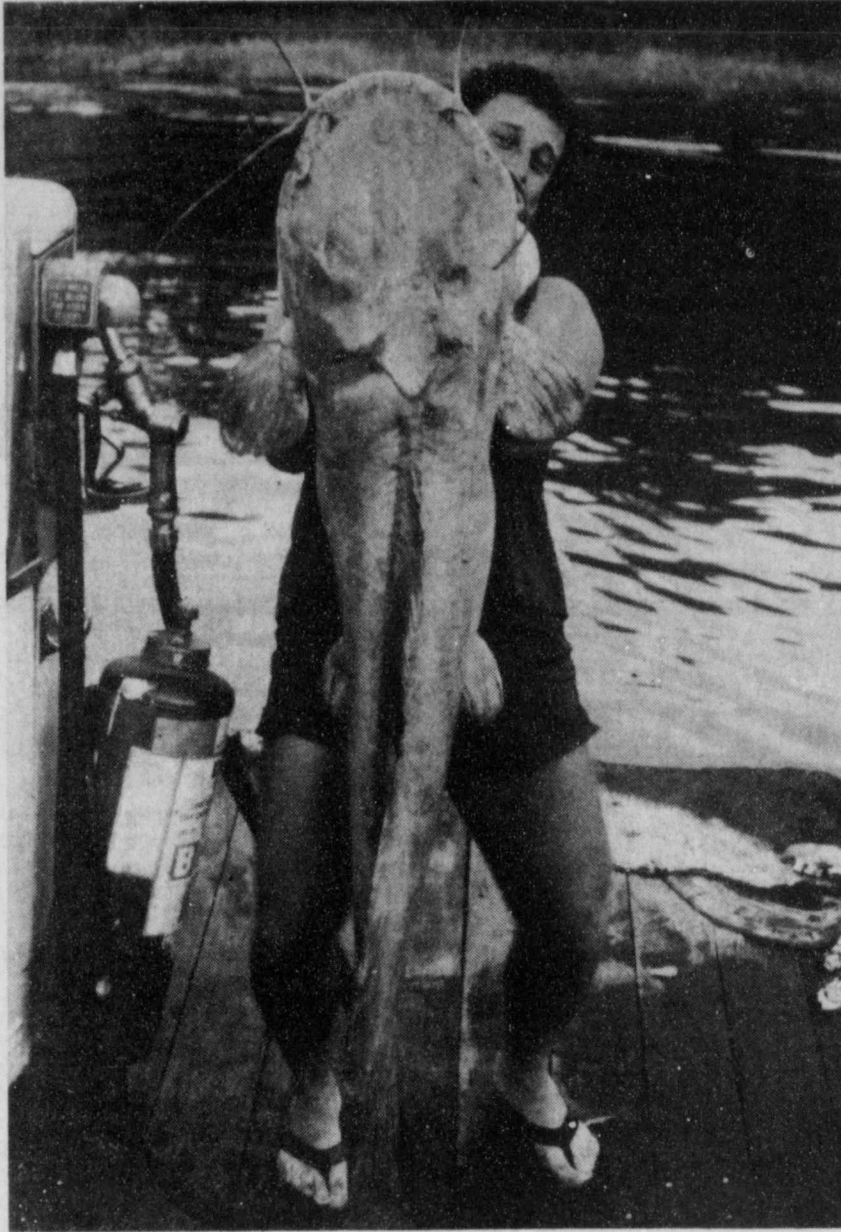

Representatives in the department's 24 district offices have available the locations of the most bountiful wildflowers in their districts. The department's 11 tourist bureaus also have this information.

With more than a million acres of highway right-of-way to maintain, the highway department is the nation's largest landscape gardener, giving Mother Nature a little help through native plant and wildflower seeding programs. The programs, in all 254 of the state's counties, cut maintenance costs, save water, and also control soil erosion on the roadsides.

"All the conditions are right to have an outstanding year for wildflowers," said Craig Steffens, supervising landscape architect for the department. "The late freeze confused the plants, but we're just now having warm nights which will tell the plants to burst out in beautiful colors."

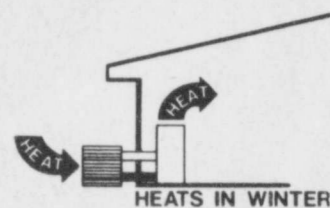

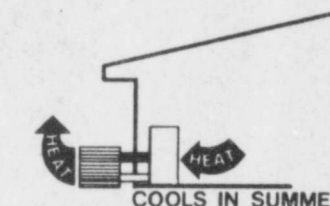

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# Bogata First Baptist Hold Ground-Breaking Ceremonies

Members of the First Baptist Church in Bogata, friends, relatives and other community residents met Sunday afternoon, April 26 for ground breaking ceremonies at the future

building site of their church. The new building will replace the one destroyed by fire on November 16, 1986, and construction is planned to begin in the next few days.

Rev. Bob Posey, pastor of the

church, opened the ceremonies with prayer and welcomed those attending. The congregation joined together in singing "To God Be The Glory", led by First Baptist Minister of Music and Youth Vince Blankenship. Rev. Larry Allgood, Pastor of the First Assembly of God Church, using Nehemiah 4:6 as a text, spoke briefly to the congregation on the topic "Having a Mind to Work".

Building Committee Chairman C.D. Glass introduced special guest Charles Dawson, of Dawson and Dawson Construction Company of Clarksville, winning bidders for the contract on the construction. Mr. Glass stated the purpose of building the church as "a place to worship God, a place to bring glory and honor to God, and to meet the needs of the community".

Mrs. Ann Cody, long time member, gave the following brief history of the church: The First Baptist Church in Bogata was organized in the early 1870's. The members first worshipped in a little church which was located in our present park where the community house now stands. The Cumberland Presbyterians built a frame Church on North Main Street in 1890. This church was used by all denominations for many years. In 1900, the Baptist congregation decided to build their own church on a lot donated by Rev. J.E. Horner. This was the same lot on which the church that burned stood. It was a hexagon shaped building made of lumber. Some of the early day pastors of this church were: Bro. Horner, Bro. George Ferguson, Bro. McCulough, Bro. Blanchard, Bro. Veteto and Bro. Lee Fuller. In later years, Bro. Peaden, John A. Williams, John Goodman and Robert Heugley were pastors. In 1937 under the pastorate of Rev. Heugley, the hexagon building was completely remodeled and made into a 40x60 ft. building with Sunday School rooms and an auditorium in one unit. In 1947, the church went from half time services to full time work in spreading the gospel. The church was led full time under the direction of Rev. Curtis Hoover. In 1950 with Rev. L.L. Hanson as pastor, the church built an educational building. A few years later, finding this building inadequate to meet needs, an army barracks from the closed Camp Maxey in Paris was bought and placed on the parking lot just north of where the Bank now stands. The notes were paid off and
