

School Board Employs New Personnel

Uniforms for employees were discussed and tabled until next meeting due to the absence of two council members.

Adjustments on customers water bills with water leaks was discussed and the Council voted against allowing the adjustments

Mayor W.T. Harbison noted that the insurance on the Community Center has been paid and that several letters have been sent to people advising them of the need for Building

The Council voted to rescind the motion to buy the lab equipment. The motion to purchase sewer clean-out mchine subject to bid opening May 18, and to pay for demolition of Old Imhoff tank was approved.

Highway Commission Approves 65 MPH Speed Limit

At one minute past midnight Friday night, a new 65-mph speed limit goes into effect on rural Interstate Highways in Texas.

The public is excited about this," said Byron Blaschke, deputy engineer director of the highway department, "and we are doing all we can to make a smooth transition to the new speed

Last Friday, the highway commission established the new maximum speed limit for 65 mph for cars and light trucks on rural Interstate highways. In this context, "rural"

means outside urban areas of 50,000 people or more.

The governor concurred Wednesday with the new speed limit which becomes effective at 10:01 a.m. Satur-

day, May 9 where signs are posted. Some rural Interstate sections will continue with speed limits posted lower than 65 mph for traffic and engineering reasons. These reduced speed zones existed before the 1974 federally mandated reduction to 55 mph. The department will examine each of these areas and determine the need to continue or discontinue the lower speeds

Blaschke emphasized that the new limits apply only to rural highways with Interstate designation. The speed limit on all other roadways, including urban Interstate, remains 55

The department will be working Saturday to put up the new signs.

'With more than 1,300 signs going up statewide, it will take us a few hours, but we will get the job done as quickly as possible," Blaschke said. The sped limits will affect 2,441 miles of the 3,148 mile Interstate

Chlordane Controversy Continues

By Paul D. Payne

One of the hottest topics of discussion in the county now concerns the use of pesticide Chlordane. There are a variety of ways that a community can gain recognition, but receiving daily information on the misuse of a pesticide is not one of the better methods

There is a definite need for everyone involved to maintain a calm composure. Certainly there is reason for concern where Chlordane has been applied to the inside of a building. However, there should not be a panic where a house was treated for subterranean termites in the correct manner.

Chlordane, where used properly, is needed to prevent subterranean termites. It has been estimated that the insect causes more than one billion dollars of damage each year in the United States. If present efforts to remove Chlordane from the market is successful, the losses to the American homeowner would be staggering unless some new product comes on the scene very soon.

It is legal to apply Chlordane to the soil prior to pouring the concrete for buildings. It is also legal to treat existing buildings by digging a trench around the foundation, applying the chemical and covering the chemical with untreated soil. If one does have a house or building on piers, it is legal to use Chlordane around these piers. One should trench around the pier, apply the chemical and cover with untreated soil.

On the other hand, Chlordane

should not be applied under a house on top of the ground or on the outside of a building on top of the soil. Neither should it be applied inside a home in any method.

The present situation points out the importance of everyone applying a pesticide in the proper manner.

I would suggest that we give the regulatory agencies an opportunity to determine the amount of challs residue present before we individuals have a bunch of tests run. There are several private labs around that are available to run samples. The point I want to make is let's be calm and rational







Bulls Crucial To Cattle Operation By Herb Brevard

beef producers can afford to lose part or all of a calf crop, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist Many factors can reduce the calf crop percentage. However, Grooms adds that neither disease, nutrition nor weather can destroy a calf crop like a sterile bull. Several things should be checked about the herd sire to insure a high calf crop percentage.

The first checkpoint for a herd sire is a breeding soundness exam immediately before the breeding season. This exam includes a physical and a semen test. The bull should be physically sound on feet and legs, be in excellent body condition and have clear, alert eyes. He should be able to maintain vigor and body condition to get him through the 60-90 day breeding season. The semen check should point out any potential problems with semen quality or reproductive organs.

If a bull passes the first checkpoint, he is well on his way to becoming a herd sire. Grooms says the second potential problem area is libido or sex drive. A bull with low sex drive will result in a more strung out and even lower total calf crop. Producers should observe the bulls in the pasture to be sure they are completing breeding services. Since the cows cycle on three week intervals, it is


