Johntown Man Dies After Fighting Fire

Malcolm Dean Rhodes, a resident of the Johntown Community, died while fighting a grass fire on the property of Ned Rhoades, brother of the deceased.

According to citizens in the vicinity, Rhodes was attempting to burn a brush pile on the place, when the fire got out of his control. A neighbor came to help fight the fire and found

Rhodes lying face down in the edge of the fire. A portion of Rhodes' pants leg was burned. The Bogata Fire Department was summoned and an ambulance was called.

Titus County Memorial Hospital responded to the ambulance call. Rhodes died enroute to the hospital. Cause of death is undetermined at this time.

Lindley Pleads Guilty To Kidnapping

On Tuesday, May 19, Billy Don Lindley pled no contest before District Judge Leon Pesek of Texas and was sentenced to 10 years in prison for the kidnapping of his wife, Cynthia Lindley on March 22. Pesek sentenced Lindley to the maximum sentence on the charge, which

was reduced from aggravated kidnapping, after Mrs. Lindley claimed her privilege not to testify against her husband. Police had reported finding dynamite in Lindley's care at the time of Lindley's arrest.

Dr. Earl Wayne Grogan Retires

Earl Wayne Grogan, D.V.M., retired as director of the National Research Council's Institute of Laboratory Animal Science in Washington, D.C. on May 11. He had served in the position since 1975, following a previous career of 29 years of government service, for a total professional career of 41 years. The National Research Council, part of the National Academy of Sciences, is a private organization that provides advisory service to the Federal government and other agencies on science and technology and their application for the public welfare.

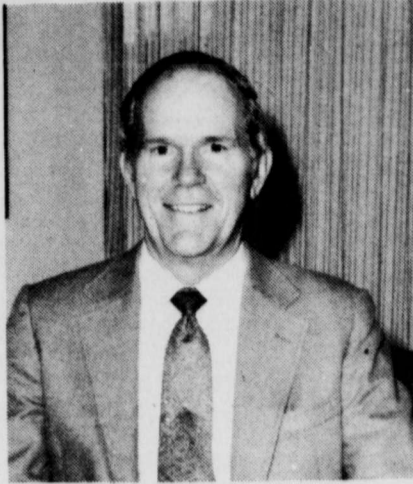
Dr. Grogan was born in Rugby, the son of Vera and the late Earl Grogan, his mother now resides in Bogata. He graduated from Bogata High School in 1941 and received his D.V.M. from Texas A&M College in 1946. After a brief period in private veterinary practice in Ft. Worth, he entered the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps in 1946. While in the armed services, he earned a Master of Public Health Degree from Johns Hopkins University in 1951.

In addition to tours of duty at four major military area medical laboratories in the United States and Europe, Dr. Grogan served two tours at Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in Washington, D.C., one at the U.S. Army Medical Unit in Ft. Detrick, Maryland and one in the U.S. Army Medical Command, Japan. While serving as Chief of the Department of Biologies Research at WRAIR in 1961, he traveled to Dacca, East Pakistan, as a consultant for the World Health Organization on an extended mission in which he assisted

that country's Public Health Institute in implementing new methods for production, testing, quality control and freeze drying of smallpox vaccine. During his tour in Japan from 1966 to 1969 he traveled to Saigon, South Vietnam as a consultant for the Agency for International Development on two different missions to assist the country's agricultural and health agencies in implementing improved methods for production, testing, quality control and freeze drying of veterinary vaccines. Dr. Grogan was promoted to the rank of Colonel in 1966.

Following a five-year tour as Director of the Division of Veterinary Medicine at WRAIR, Dr. Grogan retired from the Army and was appointed director of ILAR in September, 1975. During his eleven and one-half years in this position, ILAR continued to serve its important role as the National Research Council's principal center of expertise on the use of laboratory animals in biomedical research and testing. The National Institutes of Health document, Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals, was updated by ILAR committees twice during that time, and numerous other documents and reports providing scientific information and guidance on laboratory animal matters were developed.

Dr. Grogan and his wife, Alice, reside in Rockville, Maryland. Their early plans include visits to their two sons and families. Earl Wayne, Jr., is a cardiologist in Madison, Wisconsin and Allen Ray is an attorney in Los Angeles, California.

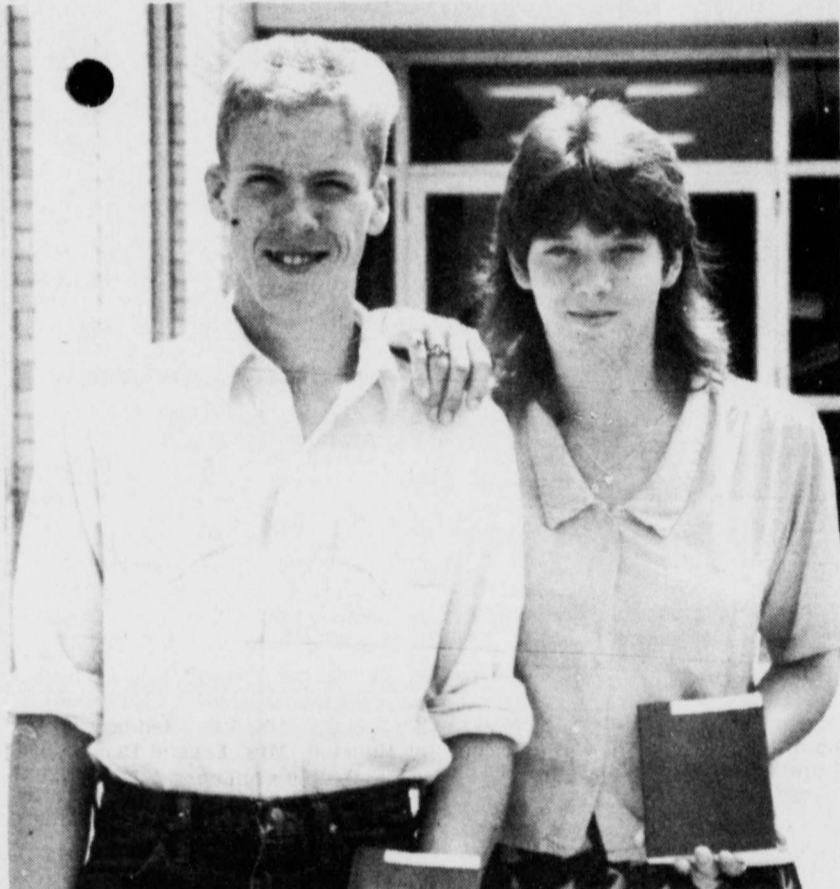

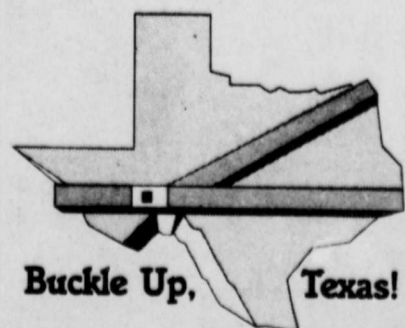

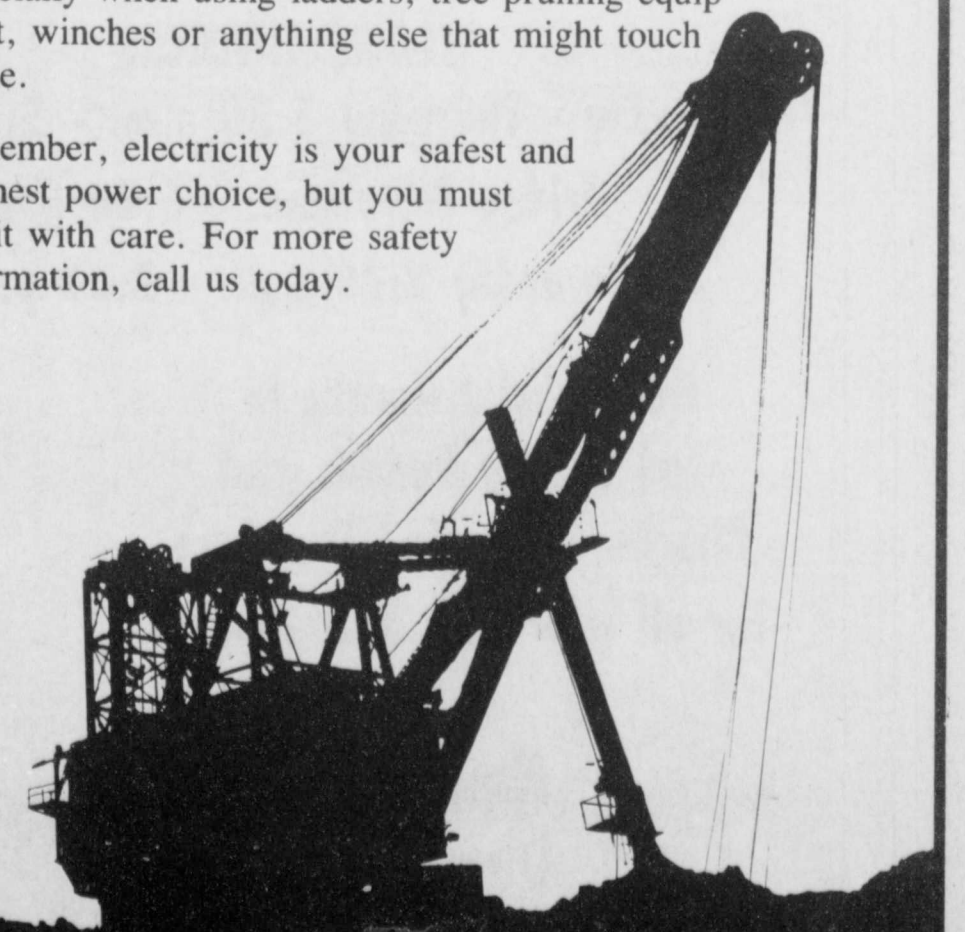
