

# Dry April, Wet June, Keep Agriculture Off Balance

With the promise of heavy rains in sight, hay producers are keeping a "weather eye" to the hazy skies while meteorologists have flatly announced that "it will rain across Texas this week".

After the driest April ever recorded, it seems that June may turn out

to be more April-like rainfall wise, than has been recorded in many a year.

Although this area has so far escaped the serious flooding which has created havoc across much of the state, heavy rains have packed the earth and the combination of low

April and May rainfall and the late freeze have created some serious shortages.

Wheat producers have found their harvest yield reduced in some cases to marginally being worth the combining.

The late freeze combined with the

immediately following drought has damaged the heads so that they have little weight and few grains.

Soybeans and milo look, at this point, excellent, but cotton is requiring heavy poisoning. Insects, as anticipated, are heavy.

Home gardeners report skimpy

results with onions and early produce, but say that okra, tomatoes and beans and squash are doing well.

Hay producers have discovered that their first cutting is depleted, the grasses have height, but being thin. Most meadows are cutting out distinctly short of last year's average.

Whether the June rains will provide a remedy for this shortage remains to be seen.

In the meanwhile, cool night temperatures and humid days continue and the area continues to wait and see just how much rain will be dumped on them.

## Red River Co. Fire Fighters Assoc. Formed

Having felt the need of a county wide coordinating organization, the Volunteer Fire Departments operating in Red River County recently organized the Red River County Fire Fighters Association. The organization has adopted by-laws and a mutual aid agreement between departments. The Association will be a non-profit organization.

The member volunteer fire departments of the Association are Annona, Avery, Bagwell, Bogata, Clarksville, Cuthand, Detroit and Pine Creek. Each department has elected a delegate and an alternate to represent them when the organization has its regular monthly meetings.

The year officers of the new organization are: president, Kenneth Parker of the Detroit VFD; vice-president, Robert Moore of the Bagwell VFD and secretary-treasurer, Wayne Jeffery of the Avery VFD.

President Kenneth Parker indicated enthusiastic satisfaction for the formation of the Association stating "we now have the opportunity to open up better lines of communication between departments and can work more closely together to provide better fire protection throughout Red River County. The organization should qualify for grants available for equipment and training material, he added."

The regular monthly meetings will rotate among departments in order for each department to become familiar with all other department's equipment and manpower capabilities.

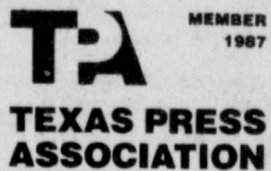
The Red River County Fire Fighters Association should prove to be a vital asset to the residents of Red River County.
