They find the dad gummedest places to decide to dig in...places that are hard to scratch, and usually can't be scratched in public anyhow!

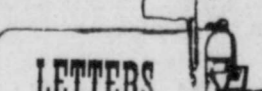

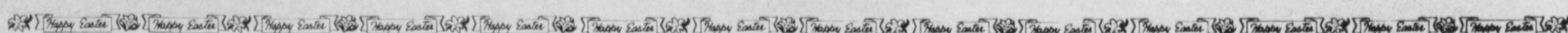

# Declaration of Independence Has Special Meaning To WWII Vet

To those veterans who have braved the battlefields of war in defense of our country, I'm sure the words penned in the Declaration of Independence have a much greater meaning than to those of us who have only a secondary account of those battles. Those famous words "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of

happiness. That to secure those rights, Governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. That whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness."

One of those who more fully

understands the meaning of these words is Bogata resident and World War II veteran, Bill White. Bill fought with the Fourth Marine Division, was wounded at Iwo Jima, and received a Purple Heart for his bravery. He recently had a brass plate made inscribed with his name, the Fourth Marine Division, dates of service in the Marines, a duplicate of the arm patch and Marine Corp emblem worn on his cap, a duplicate of the Purple Heart medal awarded for his bravery on Iwo Jima and the other islands on which he fought.

Bill enlisted in the Marines in October, 1943, disregarding a deferment his father had gotten for him. His father owned a ranch and had a large corn crop in Sulphur Bottom. Bill would pull corn all day and at night go into town for recreation. Most of Bill's buddies had already gone to the service and weren't around to pal around with at night. Finally, tired of the corn patch and missing his friends, Bill told his dad he didn't want the deferment any longer. Bill recalls with a sheepish grin, his father's reply, "Well, son, there's some things in life you'll have to learn for yourself, so go ahead and enlist." Bill did just that the very next day.

Bill was sent to Camp Pendleton for training. He remembers arriving at the camp around midnight with several other recruits. As the apprehensive greenhorns scrambled to get off the bus, a Marine Sergeant began to curse and belittle them. "At that moment," Bill says, "I knew exactly what my daddy was talking about."

After extensive training, Bill along with others, was sent to San Diego and from there boarded a ship for Honolulu where he received a three-day pass before sailing for the Division's first mission.

The Fourth Marine Division, of which Bill was a part, set three new records on its first operation, it became the first division to go directly into combat from the United States,

it was the first to capture Japanese mandated territory in the Pacific and it secured its objective in a shorter time than that of any other important operation since the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Bill recalls that not until the big convoy had passed the Hawaiian Islands was its destination revealed to all hands, the twin islands of Roi-Namur in the Kwajalein Atoll of the Marshall Islands. As those in charge began to brief the men on Operation Flintlock, Bill says there was a strong urge to be back home pulling corn in Sulphur Bottom, but it was too late. Bill remembers arriving on the islands and the deep sand, white as snow and the dead vegetation from the bombing and shelling of the islands by the ships of the naval task force and aircraft of the Fast Carrier Force in support of the Fourth Division. Although the islands were highly defended by the Japanese, they were secured within approximately three weeks. Shaking his head as though the pictures are still all too clear in his mind, Bill tells about seeing one of the ghastliest sights he saw in all his days of combat, a trenchful of enemy soldiers who had committed hari-kari by placing the muzzle of their rifles under their chins and pulling the triggers with their toes.

He recalls that dozens lay sprawled in this grotesque posture of suicide, a means to an end, typifying the spirit of hopelessness which surrounded the Jap soldiers. Bill remembers watching as the trucks and dozers picked up the bodies, dumping them into its and covering them with sand.

After a short rest and regrouping, the Division sailed for Saipan, capital and stronghold of the Marianas Islands. Pointing to a spot on the map of Saipan, Bill explains how that at that place, called Marpi Point, from their position on the cliffs, they watched as Japanese soldiers urged fleeing civilians to throw their children and then themselves onto the sharp jagged rocks below rather than be

taken prisoner by the Americans. Surrender pleas and promises of food and safety to the civilians by an interpreter were largely in vain. Many who wished to do so were prevented by Japanese soldiers. On July 9, after 25 days of continuous fighting, Old Glory went up on Marpi Point.

Two weeks later, Bill White along with those of the Fourth Division, made the beachhead on Tinian. The initial plan presented to Bill and the other Marines was to sneak in the back door while the Japs waited at the front. After securing the island, pleas of surrender again went out to those still remaining. Bill mentions with gratefulness, the fact recorded in history that at the end of this battle, "Japanese fanaticism had lured a few score to their deaths, but American persuasiveness had saved thousands of others."

Bill was shot by a plane in Iwo Jima after two days in battle there. He was loaded along with other wounded soldiers and shipped to a hospital in

Guam. After two weeks there, he was sent to San Francisco, then to San Diego and released after several weeks of stay in the hospital there.

Bill returned to the states in 1945. He married Noma Jean Bell in 1946. To this union, a son, Ronnie, was born in 1948. Ronnie is a special son, due to injury to his brain received at birth. Noma Jean White passed away in 1986. Bill and Ronnie live together in their lovely home on 271 Highway in Bogata. They enjoy camping, working with their cows and horses and traveling.

Yes, the Declaration of Independence, and Old Glory have special meaning to veteran Bill White. From his time spent in battles on foreign soils, he has seen results of forms of governments which have become destructive to the rights of others and he has done his part in helping to "institute new government, laying its foundation on principles and organizing it spowers in such form to most likely effect their safety and happiness."

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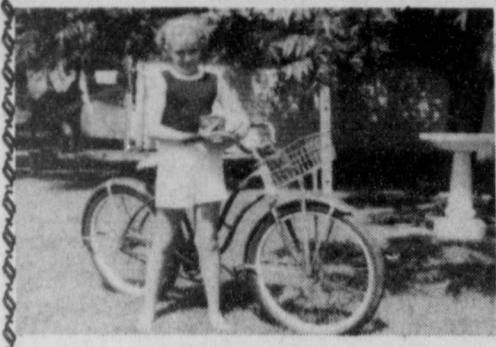

## Milo Should Be Checked For Midge

All milo that blooms from now on this season should be checked daily for Midge. Midge numbers are built up and present a serious threat to the milo crop if not treated.

The adult sorghum midge is a tiny, fragile-looking, orange colored fly. Damage results from larvae that hatch from eggs deposited by female midge in spikelets of flowering heads. Each female may deposit about 50 tiny, yellowish-white eggs during her short lifetime of less than 24 hours. An orange colored maggot hatches from the egg and feeds on the newly fertilized grain, thereby preventing kernel development.

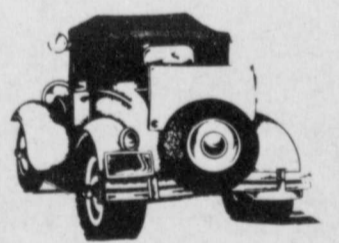
Since midge lay eggs in flowering heads, damage can occur until the entire head or field of sorghum has flowered. The individual head flowers starting at the top. It normally takes from seven to nine days for an individual head to flower. However, the 87 milo stand is not uniform, and it will take several days for blooming to take place in most fields. As a result, more than one application of an insecticide may be needed to control midge.

Entomologist have determined that an economic damage level has been

reached when 25 percent of a field is blooming and an average of one midge is found per head. This same "thumb rule" can be used during the bloom period.

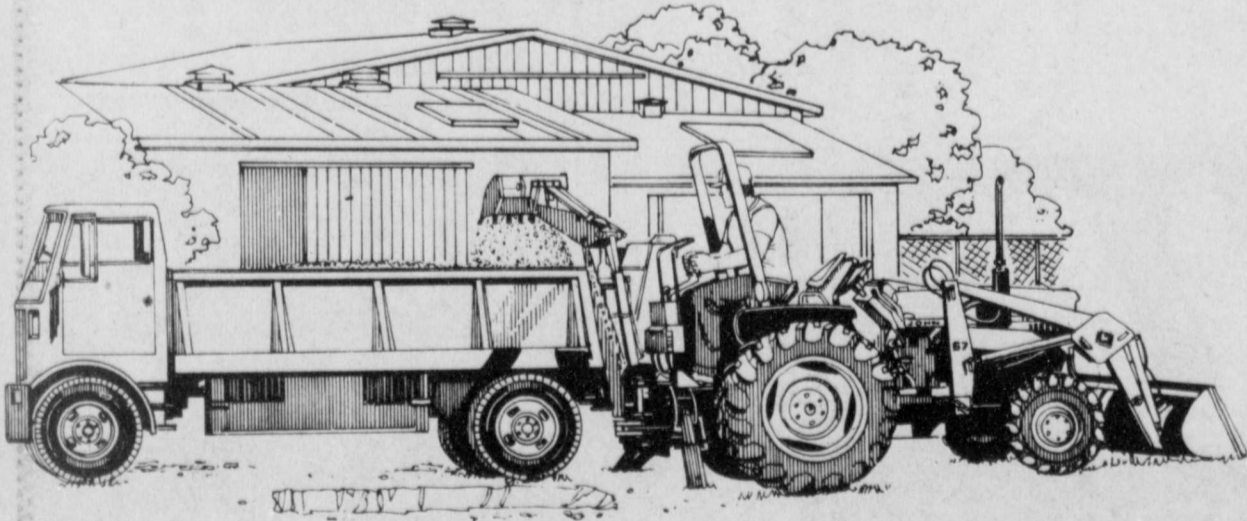
After an initial treatment one should retreat in three to five days if the infestation level is at the one per head level or greater. This will not mean that the first treatment was no good, but that the residue of the insecticide has dissipated and new midge have hatched.

The following insecticides are suggested: Lorsban, Lannate, Nudrin, Ethyl Parathion, Diazinon and Malathion. Be sure to read the label and note use restrictions.
