The rents council in Mill Hill doesn't like the lady having all this room. They want her to quit using the living room and rent it to someone else as a "bedsitter" a single room to live and sleep in, sharing kitchen and bath facilities!

Owning one's own home is practically impossible, property and home rates being absolutely phenomenal!

But worst of all, besides bumper to bumper traffic and tight living quarters, are the lives of those who must travel the underground train system to and from work.

We took it back from London city center to Finchley one day.

We didn't get a seat. Everyone stood up, clinging to overhead straps while the lucky few sat down crowded shoulder to shoulder.

At each stop, we would look on in horror as more people piled on and piled on. At each stop we would have sworn that not a single soul could have been added to the load...but seven or eight more would squeeze in!

There was no way to raise a free hand to scratch your nose! The folks seemed to consider it normal...they do it every morning and every evening, as it is about the only way to go back and forth to work...it's quicker than driving, even if one can afford a car...which most can't. To us, it was like an unbelievable nightmare. Mixed in with the neatly dressed work force are filthy tramps, street "buskers" and the elderly.

Those who got on looking weary after a long, hard day at work looked infinitely wearier afterwards.

Our lives are so different, even in large cities. We simply have so much more space.

At lunch hour, every park...and they have some lovely ones...is covered over with people escaping from the office for a few moments to eat their lunch on a tiny patch of green grass...but consequently, there are so many that they end up eating practically in one another's laps, the grass hidden under the wave of bodies.

We had the nicest vacation we have ever had...but it was still a relief to arrive back home...where there is still room to move about, to be ourselves and to cherish a little privacy.

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Holiday With English Friends Best Ever

Editor's Note: The number of people who have already requested write-ups on our yearly vacation is flattering. It amazes me how much a lot of folks want to hear about our travels. This year, our visit to friends in England will provide one of the most interesting sagas ever, with meetings with members of Parliament, a view of the Queen Mother, and living the lifestyle of the average Londoner to contribute to the historical sights and scenes we experienced. Here's the first installment.

There is always, I suppose, one vacation (or holiday as the English say) that stands head and shoulders above the rest. It is the one trip that is so sweet in memory that it evokes tearful feelings when recalled. This year's visit to friends in England definitely is the best, and sweetest trip we have ever had.

When my friend, Jayne King and I were in Egypt several years ago, we met a pair of retired sisters, with whom we definitely had an immediate affinity. Last year, the women came to visit us here in Texas. This year, Thomas and I went to visit them.

Mic Fuller and Lee Symonds gave us a vacation to remember, providing us with sights and experiences above what the ordinary tourist will ever experience!

My Friday job at Paris Travel Consultants provided the money for the airfare, and they provided the rest.

We flew to Gatwick Airport and then caught the train into Victoria Station in the heart of downtown London. Waiting in the rain were our two friends, faces smiling happily as we crammed into one of the London taxis which are so convenient.

It's a long ride out to Mic's house at Mill Hill, during the ride we became reacquainted with the absolute insanity of being the world's worst drivers, which is one's first impression...they must be the world's best drivers!

Bumper to bumper, weaving in and out of the narrow city streets, cutting gaps between vehicles in inches instead of feet, Londoners manage a traffic congestion that would astonish even a New Yorker.

Arriving at Mic's semi-detached (duplex), we were confronted with a tiny, but highly functional house with a gorgeous garden in the back. One has to see the gardens of England to truly appreciate their loveliness.

For the rest of the day we napped, having been up all night on our overseas flight.

Lee informed us, however, that "you are not here to have fun, but to educate yourselves." Grinning mischievously, she handed us

brochures on Hampton Court, the next day's itinerary, and disappeared to Finchley, where she lives.

That night we went to her flat (apartment), met Pam, the woman who shares it with her, and had a gorgeous English meal of roast beef and Yorkshire pudding. Yorkshire pudding, for those who don't know, isn't a dessert, but the English equivalent to our biscuits...a delicious flour and egg concoction to ladle gravy over.

That night, we slept under a thick comforter and a blanket, the temperature in the lower fifties, quite a change after the near 100 mark of the day before at home.

The journey to Hampton Court was fairly short. Like most Americans, we were overwhelmed by the beauty and age of Hampton Court Palace.

Hampton Court was built by Cardinal Wolsey, who "donated" it to Henry The Eighth when Henry expressed a desire for it.

Within are ornate ceilings of plaster and gilt, incredible murals and ceiling

paintings, and an elegance that could only be fit for a king.

Given to King Henry in 1562, the portraits of Henry's unfortunate wives are grouped within. One gallery is said to be haunted by Catherine Howard, who escaped her guards and ran screaming to try and appeal to Henry before she was taken to London and beheaded.

For centuries the poor woman's ghost was supposed to be heard and seen, tearing down the hall to cry for mercy.

Hugh fireplaces that a dozen men could stand upright in, kitchens to prepare feasts for hundreds and windows of glass unimagingly old are throughout the palace.

Since it was drizzling rain too much for a picnic, we sat in the tiny Daf, (Lee's car), and ate chicken and buttered rolls.

From there, we went to the world famous Kew Gardens, the Royal Botanical Gardens. There once more we were struck by the absolute beauty that only England seems able to

provide when it comes to flowers. Between Kew and Syon we stopped at a pub...the "Fox and Goose". Now, east Texans need to understand...a pub in England is NOT the same thing as a bar in Texas! Within there is always a warm fire going, the glitter of immaculate glassware, and the friendly smiles of people glad to see you.

Coffee is as much available as anything stronger, and kids, grandmothers and dogs are frequently in evidence.

Harry, a beautiful black Labrador, wandered in from his home down the road for a hand out of dog biscuits while we talked to the landlord, John, and Mike, a regular customer about how things were in America.

Mic and Lee make a regular route of pubs to collect money for "Age Concern" an organization which helps the elderly with extra heating bills, food needs or anything else the pensioners may need in the way of medical equipment. The two men we were speaking to had recently raised 1000 pounds by holding a raft race

down the river on a cold, wet day. Huge greenhouses shelter plants such as cactus from arid lands, banana trees and lily pads five and six feet across from tropical environments. Outside, waterfowl of every variety swim placidly on lakes and ponds, and masses and masses of blossoms accent tress of royal magnificence.

An added treat to the busy day was a visit to Syon Park, where inside a tropical greenhouse, hundreds of butterflies fluttered gently among plants and blooms.

Also at the same location was the British Heritage Motor Museum. Mic and Lee opted for a cup of tea instead of looking at antique cars, but the collection of Jaguar s, Morris', Vauxhall and Austins was really spectacular.

By that time, we were tired enough to welcome going "home" to the house at Mill Hill, which was already beginning to seem just that...home indeed.

Red River County Water District Election Is Sept. 19

Red River County voters will be asked to go the polls September 19 and approve the confirmation of the Red River County Water District, as well as approving a \$7.2 million bond issue for the construction of the proposed Dimple Reservoir Project on White Oak Bayou.

That was the decision reached by members of the water district's initial board of directors when they met Tuesday evening to hear cost projections and design alternatives from the district's financial advisor and engineering firm.

Board members had already heard James Rice, vice-president of the Longview based firm if Kindle, Stone and Associates, note that his firm considers a 409 foot elevation for the Red River County lake to be optimum.

As a result, board members had opted to consider cost projections on proposed lakes with elevations of 402 feet and 409 feet, rather than the 412 foot elevation recommended by HDR Infrastructure representatives in their initial feasibility study for the project.

Rice explained a 402 foot elevation would cover some 1,210 acres of surface area with an 11,500 acre-foot capacity. That lake, he estimates, would provide a 4.6 million gallons per day (MGD) safe yield to year 2040 for water supply purpose, and would cost \$5.9 million to construct.

A lake with an elevation of 409 feet, he said, would cover 1,800 surface acres and have a capacity of 22,500 acre feet. Such a lake would provide a safe yield of 6.4 MGD and would carry a price tag of \$7.2 million.

The larger 412 foot elevation, Rice explained, would cover approximately 2,120 acres, but would only produce 6.9 MGD of safe yield and would cost

approximately \$10.6 million. "You'd be spending about \$3.4 million more, half again as much, almost, and get about a half-million gallons in additional yield. That's just not cost effective in our opinion," he said.

The board was then addressed by Frank Medanic, a representative of First Southwest of Dallas, the district's financial advisor.

Medanic initially discouraged use of the Texas Water Development Board's storage acquisition plan, which many proponents of the lake project had hoped would lower the district's initial cost of lake construction.

Although Medanic admitted such a plan would lower initial cost, it would in the long run increase the district's total debt by as much as \$5 million.

In addition, the financial advisor noted that the TWDB has been reluctant to enter into such agreements in recent months.

He did add, however, he considered loan purchase of TWDB bonds for construction of the entire project to be the most feasible way of financing the lake. "That's the cheapest source of money I think we're going to find," he added, estimating the TWDB's interest rate would average between 7.33 and 7.35 percent.

The TWDB storage acquisition program, he added, would call for the state board to fund half the cost of the project for a period of 10 years. But, after that time, the district would be required to buy back that storage, as well as financing the interest costs the TWDB had incurred over the 10-year period.

Although Medanic said he could

compute a rough estimate of the tax rate necessary for construction of the lake, based on last year's countywide appraisal figures, he opted to wait until updated figures for the 1987-88 fiscal year are available from the Red River County Appraisal District. He said he expected to have those updated figures within the next one to two weeks.

The district's board also voted to ask voters for their approval of a maintenance tax of not more than three cents per \$100 valuation for operation and maintenance of the district.

Board President, James W. Vaughan, Jr., explained the bill signed by Governor Bill Clements authorizing formation of the district allows the RRCWD to levy up to a 10 cent maintenance tax, but board members feel no more than a three cent rate will be needed.

In fact, there will be little operation and maintenance cost until the project is completed, Vaughan pointed out.

"Just because we're asking the voters to approve a three-cent maintenance tax, doesn't mean we will levy that much tax," he explained. "We may find we only need one or two cents per \$100, and then we'd only levy that much. We must have voter approval, though, in order to levy a maintenance tax. Without approval of the maintenance tax on September 19, Vaughan explained, the district would more than likely have to hold an election in the future, again requesting voters approve a levy for maintenance and operation.

"We're simply trying to keep cost to the taxpayers of Red River County at a minimum," Vaughan said.

"We can ask for maintenance levy authority now, and save the taxpayers the cost of another election in the future."

The district's board, in addition to Vaughan, is composed of Don Cole,

vice-president; Tommy Van Deaver, secretary-treasurer; W.C. "Sonny" Covington; George Beman; Eddie Hausler; Alfred Puckett; Travis Hale and Harley Bridges.

For visitors in the Bogata area wishing to attend church services at the First Assembly of God or the First Baptist Church, it might be a little confusing to them as they discover that the locations for the two churches are one and the same. Of course, most

On one Thursday out of every month, you'll find it filled with members of the Adult Number Two Class of the First Baptist Church for their monthly prayer meeting and lunch. Other times you'll find members of the First Assembly meeting for their monthly fellowship supper, the Senior Citizens get together, or a youth meeting.

First Baptist pastor, Bob Posey and First Assembly pastor, Larry Allgood, say that the arrangement has worked very well. The only problem members encountered was in parking their cars. This problem was recently alleviated by a graveled parking lot being added on the property at the expense of the First Baptist Church. The First Baptist also purchased another air conditioner to compensate for the added number of people in the gymnasium. According to the First Baptist pastor and officials, these added features will remain on the premises when they no longer need the borrowed facilities.

According to members of both congregations, feelings of good will and love have prevailed in the community since the transition of the church, especially between the two congregations. Several members from each church have visited services of the other when times of the services did not conflict.

Although members of the two churches go their separate ways to worship, they can be seen on Sundays, following dismissals of the morning worship services, stopping to shake hands, chatting with each other and exchanging warm greetings.

Former Bogata Resident Has Unusual Claim To Fame

Earl Petty, a former Bogata resident, was featured in the Arts and Television section of the Dallas Morning News this week in a lengthy article by Leslie Barker, News Staff writer. Excerpts from the article are included here.

Long before most alarm clocks in Dallas have sounded, Earl Petty is standing on a ladder, sketching the Three Stooges in charcoal on a red-brick Henderson Avenue building.

Six hours later, the Stooges' painted images and the name of the store they advertise are clear from blocks away. The sun is high and hot now, but 77 year old Petty isn't ready to go home. He walks across the street and squints his blue eyes at the mural.

"I never know when to stop," he says, seeming more satisfied with his mural. "A real artist knows when to stop."

So what is Petty, if not a real artist? "Oh," he says, "I'm just a sign painter."

During the 1930's and early 1940's, Earl Petty painted the marquees outside Clarksville, Texas, movie theaters. For 26 years, anyone who traveled on highways throughout the Southwest saw his billboards, including several that advertised Old Charter whiskey.

During those billboard days, Petty would stand on scaffolding high in the air to paint signs that were 20 by 60 feet. In comparison, his current project, this brick wall, is "miniature"

he says.

Petty can hardly remember when he wasn't designing something with his hands. As one of eight children growing up in Bogata, he didn't have many toys. So he carved figures out of cakes and Procter and Gamble soap and molded toys out of clay. In high school, he was scolded for whit-tling during study hall.

Al the while, he dreamed of painting pictures on barns. Huge scenes that people could see and admire for miles away, he says.

His first paintings were seen by everyone who walked by the Avalon and State movie theaters in downtown Clarksville.

"I was paying 10 cents to go to the picture show until I was 19," he says, sitting on a couch in his East Dallas living room. "Finally, the cashier said I'd have to pay 25 cents. So I told her I'd work there instead, painting the marquees."

IN 1942, he joined the Seabees, and kept painting. He painted scenes of the Solomon Islands, where he was stationed, on strips of canvas. Soldiers would give him cases of beer for the miniatures, then send the pictures home. Petty sold the beer and saved the money. He also made bracelets out of plexiglas.

After World War II, he painted signs for Dr. Pepper in Paris, then moved to Dallas to attend the now-defunct Young's School of Commercial Art. During his schooling, he applied for work at Dewey Advertising Company.

For 26 years, billboards were his canvas. Not only did he paint the boards, but after he was hired at Dewey, he learned he was responsible for erecting the signs as well. A heart attack in 1974 forced his retirement.

He spent most of his billboard days on an 18-inch wide platform, 65 feet above the ground, painting the boards square by painstaking square. He followed a grid that he had made from a drawing or photograph and did all the lettering from block letters to script, free hand.

"Now, signs are like tracing," he says. "I did it the hard way."

He can paint anything, he says. "As long as I have a picture to go by, it's OK by me. I'm like a musician. He picks up a guitar because he enjoys doing it. I just like what I do."

On his day off during the 1950's, he expressed himself more artistically than a billboard allowed; he painted murals in Dallas. The image of a woman washing clothes by hand

graced the wall of a Laundromat. A Western scene filled a wall in a Dallas bar. Years later, someone bought the bar and covered the mural with pale green paint. Petty shrugs it off.

"I'd already gotten my satisfaction out of it," he says. The East Dallas house he shares with Meredia, his wife of four decades, reflects his talent. He painted a Western scene on his garage door and has hung his paintings in the living room.

Petty, who underwent heart bypass surgery several years ago, now spends his days doing freelance work: lettering signs, painting whenever someone needs him.

"Now that I'm out of billboards, I can paint anything I want," he says. "Maybe I'm getting into murals, and that fulfills my fondest dreams. Just so I get to do them...they're something that attracts attention."

He does much of his smaller work in his garage, where he stores paint in small cans that once held lima beans or spinach. Sometimes he makes up poems as he paints. He has written about 400, he says, and is proud of the way he can recite them.

"Poetry and art go hand in glove," he says. "I pick out words, or I put paint on a palette and express what I want."


The Health Department emphasized that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age.



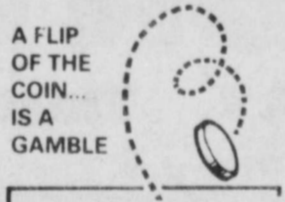

A photograph album with pictures of the entire church family was given to the couple, as well as a money tree which contained more than \$100.

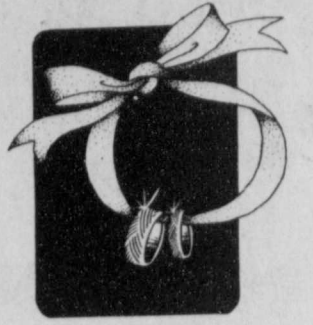

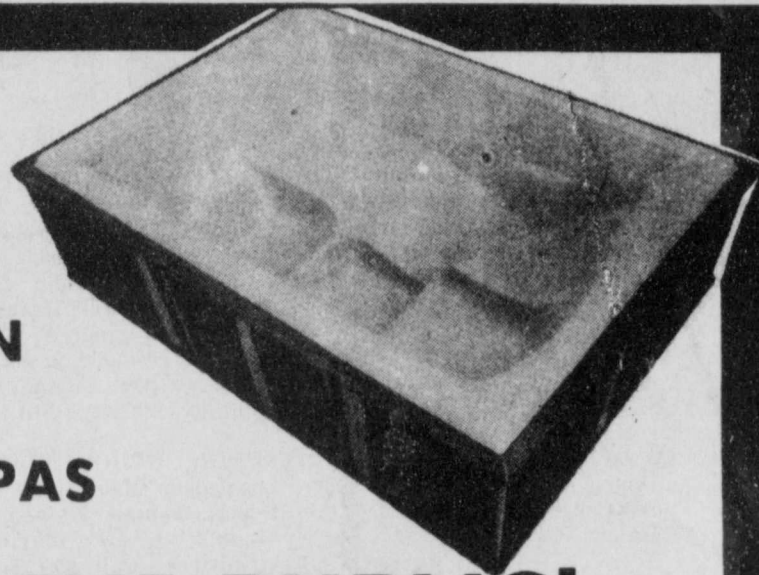
spiration to all of us. May God bless you in the years ahead. What God hath joined together, let not man put asunder.

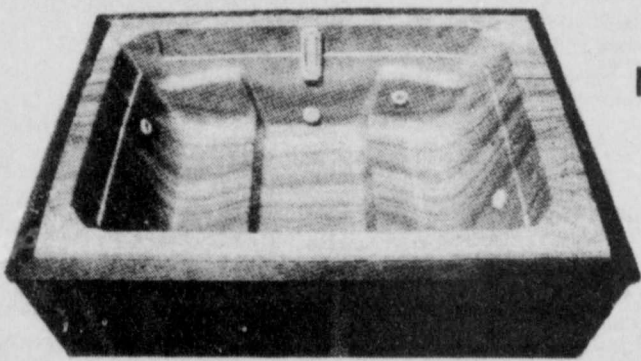
