The Rising Sun and Orange Tree, the Finches and Harcourt Arms were along the way to one of our trips.

The Highway Man and Spainards Inn were both made famous by the long-ago outlaws who used to roam the highways and rob coaches.

The Slug and Lettuce...slugs are common little critters there, and the absolute curse of gardeners.

The Three Hammers and Six Bells were self-explanatory.

The oldest pub in London is the Cheshire Cheese.

The Dirty Duck (which features a mug wailing fowl much the worse for drink on it's sign) is where the Shakespearian actors gather at Stratford upon Avon after performances.

The Olive Branch extends the gesture of peace, while the Old Mill is located where the ancient grist mill in Mill Hill was.

The names go on and on, a litany that expresses a wry sense of humour or a sense of tradition. To me, they were a major part of what I think of as England...from elaborate to simple places, the names will always remain with me like a song.

Immunization Reminders For Talco-Bogata Students

The Talco-Bogata Independent School District officials have issued a reminder to parents that immunizations are required for all school age children against certain diseases.

At least three doses of DPT and/or TD vaccines (Tetanus-diphtheria) are required, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday. Reinforcing of booster doses of Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine are required every ten years after the dose obtained on or after the fourth birthday, officials said.

All students must have received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday, or during the calendar month of the first birthday and since

Shakespeare Tops List Of Attractions

Note: This is the third in a series on visiting friends in England. For Shakespeare fans, Stratford is surely a "must".

On our Monday in London, we decided to pack up and leave the city. Loaded into two vehicles, with Mic riding with Valerie, a friend, and Lee driving Thomas and myself, we headed out the M1 motorway to go to Stratford Upon Avon, birthplace and home of William Shakespeare.

For us, the eighty mile drive was nothing, but for people used to traveling shorter distances (remember, the whole country isn't quite 800 miles long), it was a bit more of a drive. Their cars, because of high fuel prices and narrow streets, are considerably smaller than ours, and get excellent mileage.

On the way we were fascinated by the small cars with two rear wheels but only one front wheel! These, we learned, are very rough and very dangerous, but lots of people still have them.

A quick stop for tea at mid-morning...none of our cold tea, mind you...hot tea, and cakes revived one and all and before long, we were in the small town of Stratford Upon (not on) Avon.

It is a gorgeous place, the river wandering through it, half timbered buildings everywhere.

We stayed at a hotel built in the 1600's with huge English Oak beams and white plastered walls. A tiny rooftop garden graced the view from our room, and downstairs fireplaces and shining brass accented the lounge.

We hired a taxi to show us the town, rather than trying to find parking places, and discovered "Gold". He was regularly a college professor, earning money in the summer by driving a taxi for a friend. He was full of interesting facts about the area, having lived there all his life.

We made the usual rounds to the beautiful churchyard where Shakespeare is buried, simply and quietly, then onto Ann Hataway's cottage. This thatch roofed structure boasts a garden filled with plants typical of Shakespeare's time.

Within a cut-away section of the wall reveals the careful workmanship that built the house, and the distinctive pattern on the roof gable is the mark of the thatcher who did the work...as distinctive and individual as the cattle brand is here.

Shakespeare's gardens and birth place, a multi-media show, and the school and church where he was

educated, completed the afternoon for all but Thomas and myself. While they took a nap, we roamed the town on foot, going to a brass rubbing center to use bee's wax over a variety of designs, and wandering

alongside hotels, theaters and the river, contented and relaxed.

Everywhere were the fabulous flowers of England, arranged informally, or in the intricate "knot" gardens of long ago.

Local Sales Tax Figures Out

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$99.7 million in local sales tax payments to the 1034 cities that levy the one percent city tax.

Bullock said the monthly allocations were down 7.4 percent in August compared to the 1986 August allocations.

Houston received the largest check, \$16 million, bringing their total 1987 payments to \$91.2 million, down 8.4 percent over last year.

The Dallas check for \$11.5 million pushed its total to \$67.9 million, a 7.5 percent decrease from 1986.

Blossom received \$1,641.45, compared to \$1,540.90 last year, a 21.74 percent increase in total payments of \$11,411.14.

Deport received \$1,893.96 for a 14.93 percent increase over last year's payments, the payment for the same period last year being \$2,083.94, totaling \$8,061.43 to date.

Paris received \$232,173.34 for a .69 percent increase over the 1986 payments to date.

Thomas tried that most traditional of English dishes, steak and kidney pie. Unfortunately, a lifetime of not eating it apparently kept him from really liking it. A drive through rolling, misty countryside took us to Blenheim Palace. Here we were entranced by magnificent painted ceilings, fabulous golden tables and riches designed to stagger the eye.

In a small room off the main ballroom, Winston Churchill was born. The Duke of Marlboro, Churchill's uncle, claimed the palace as home at the time. Winston's American momma was at the ball there when Winston decided to arrive early!

The grounds at Blenheim are studded with fountains, pools and gardens of beauty.

The large grounds have peaceful sheep and cattle grazing.

The drive back to London was quick, if rainy. Coming into London, however, we hit some very heavy traffic. Coupled with the pouring rain, it took nearly as long to get home to Mic's as it did to drive the previous fifty miles...the price one pays, I suppose, for living in any huge city.

A simple supper fixed us up and ready for bed. It didn't take long to get to sleep after two days of beautiful sights and a lot of walking.

The storms were widely scattered, and various people reported heavy

Ghostly Tale Of Long-Ago

Editor's Note: When Ed Bryson volunteered to tell this ghost story, not long after the Deport Kiwanis Club and others had rescued the old cemetery from a weaver of weeds, grass and undergrowth, we suspended his had in mind keeping alive public interest in the continuing maintenance of the historic burial grounds. But we'll go along on the assumption our readers will like it.

This is a graveyard ghost story that goes back in my mind to 1912, when I became five years old.

It was told to me by a great-aunt, the widow of a Confederate Army soldier who drew a small pension and lived... among her kin, including my mother.

It is about the Old Deport Cemetery, the ghost, and a family that lived south of the graveyard. The ghost was of an unidentified dead man who was buried in a grave with only a bois d'arc stake to mark his grave.

Shortly after the burial, the man's ghost started showing up now and then at the home of the family who lived just west of the road that was then on the east side of the cemetery.

It was a dark and narrow road at night. Usually lonely and deserted. Members of the family would be sitting around the fireplace talking low and fearfully waiting for the unwanted visitor from the graveyard.

Its coming was always the same and always about the same time at night. The clop-clop-clop of iron horseshoes on the winding road, the silence as the horse stopped at the front yard gate, followed by the soft scuff of shoes on the walk from the gate to the house and the flare of the coal oil lamp flickering as the spectral visitor walked through the closed door and came into the living room. Then the father of the family stood up and offered the ghost his rocker. The ghost sat down and stared silently at the fire.

Dressed in its burial suit, the ghost had a shadowy face and deep set eyes. After a while, as the family sat silent and afraid, the ghost got up and left through the same closed door it had entered. Then, outside, the sound of creaking saddle leather was heard, followed by the clop-clop of the horse carrying the ghost back up the road to the graveyard.

When my grand aunt first told me that

story, which someone had told her, my hair stood up on end and my ears stuck straight out. But I managed to ask what happened to the ghost. Did it die?

"No," my aunt explained. "The ghost went away. When the family invited certain people from Deport to come down and join the ghost-watch, an old woman among the guests told the family the words to say to make the ghost go away and never come back. The words were:

"In the name of God, please leave this house now and never return."

And came in the house, the head of the family repeated the magic words and the ghostly figure faded, went up the chimney with the wood smoke and was never seen again. And the clop-clop of his horse was heard no more, leading to the conclusion that the ghostly horse and rider disappeared together into the night sky.

A few days later, someone passing the old cemetery noticed that the bois d'arc stake was gone, leaving no marker at the grave, which perhaps yet remains lost and lonely, its whereabouts known only to the ghosts in their mysterious kingdom.

The story ended there, but my fear did not. Later, our family passed the cemetery in our old surrey, and Mama pointed to the house the ghost had visited, and I saw it all over in my mind's eye.

This was more than 70 years ago, but I can still see it. Especially on dark and lonely nights when I sit before the fireplace and watch the sparks follow the smoke up the chimney. And I still hear the clop-clop of the horse on the narrow and lonesome road beside the cemetery.

Travel Scams On Increase

"Everybody loves travel bargains, including crooks," warned J. Don Clark recently, director of the state highway department's Travel and Information Division.

Clark said that Texas travelers are being victimized by spurious "travel packages" offered by shady travel service operators. "Initian contact is often by telephone," Clark said, "offering what sounds like a certificate good for round trip air fare to Hawaii, for only \$29."

"Actually," said Clark, "the certificates are usually nothing more than reservation forms for advance bookings. After the first payment, more fees keep appearing, deposits, pre-payment for transportation, lodging and other hidden costs than can amount to hundreds, or thousands of dollars."

Clark voiced special caution against giving telephone solicitors your credit card number. "If a travel package sounds too good to be true, it probably is," he emphasized.

He cited a recent "come on" related to investment in vacation

resort time sharing. A potential investor was told that she had already won an all terrain vehicle, requiring payment of only \$29.95 for handling, processing and insurance. The all-terrain vehicle turned out to be a lawn chair with four wheels attached.

Such fraudulent vacation travel schemes, which the Houston Chronicle has labeled "selling travel dreams and delivering nightmares", are currently under investigation by the Texas Attorney General's Office. Clark said that people who receive phone calls or post cards announcing they've won a travel bargain, or have been selected by computer for some fantastic travel deal, should be immediately suspicious. "I'd recommend that anyone who's approached with a cut rate travel scheme, check it out with one of our very reputable travel agencies, or the local Better Business Bureau," he cautioned.

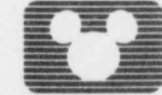

Hunter Education Course Slated

A four night hunter education course is scheduled for August 24-27. Jointly sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Titus County Extension Natural Resources Committee, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Northeast Texas Community College, the course will meet in the Student Union building of the college. Classes begin at 6:30 p.m. and end at 9:30 p.m.
According to Dick McCarver, Titus County Extension agent, the course is open to adults and youngsters. Included are instructions in handling and safety of rifles, shotguns and archery equipment. Also, outdoor ethics, laws and regulations, conservation, hun-

ting traditions, wildlife identification, field care of game, wilderness first aid and survival will be discussed.
A bill was recently signed into law authorizing the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to establish a mandatory hunter education program. According to Texas Parks and Wildlife District Warden Dexter Harris, "Senate Bill 504 enables the Parks and Wildlife Department to set up a training course and require persons of a specified age to complete the course before hunting in Texas with firearms or archery. However, the implementation depends upon availability of funds. No deadline was included for establishing the program."

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department currently has a volunteer hunter education program using volunteer instructors who certify about 13,000 students annually. The Texas course is recognized by other states that require non-resident hunters to complete a hunting safety course before being issued a hunting license.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course August 24-27 will be issued a hunter safety card from the Parks and Wildlife Department. A fee of \$1.00 per student includes registration and materials.

2 cups fresh green beans frozen in 1 Ziploc® Microfreeze® bag (pint size)
1/2 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
1/4 cup chopped onion

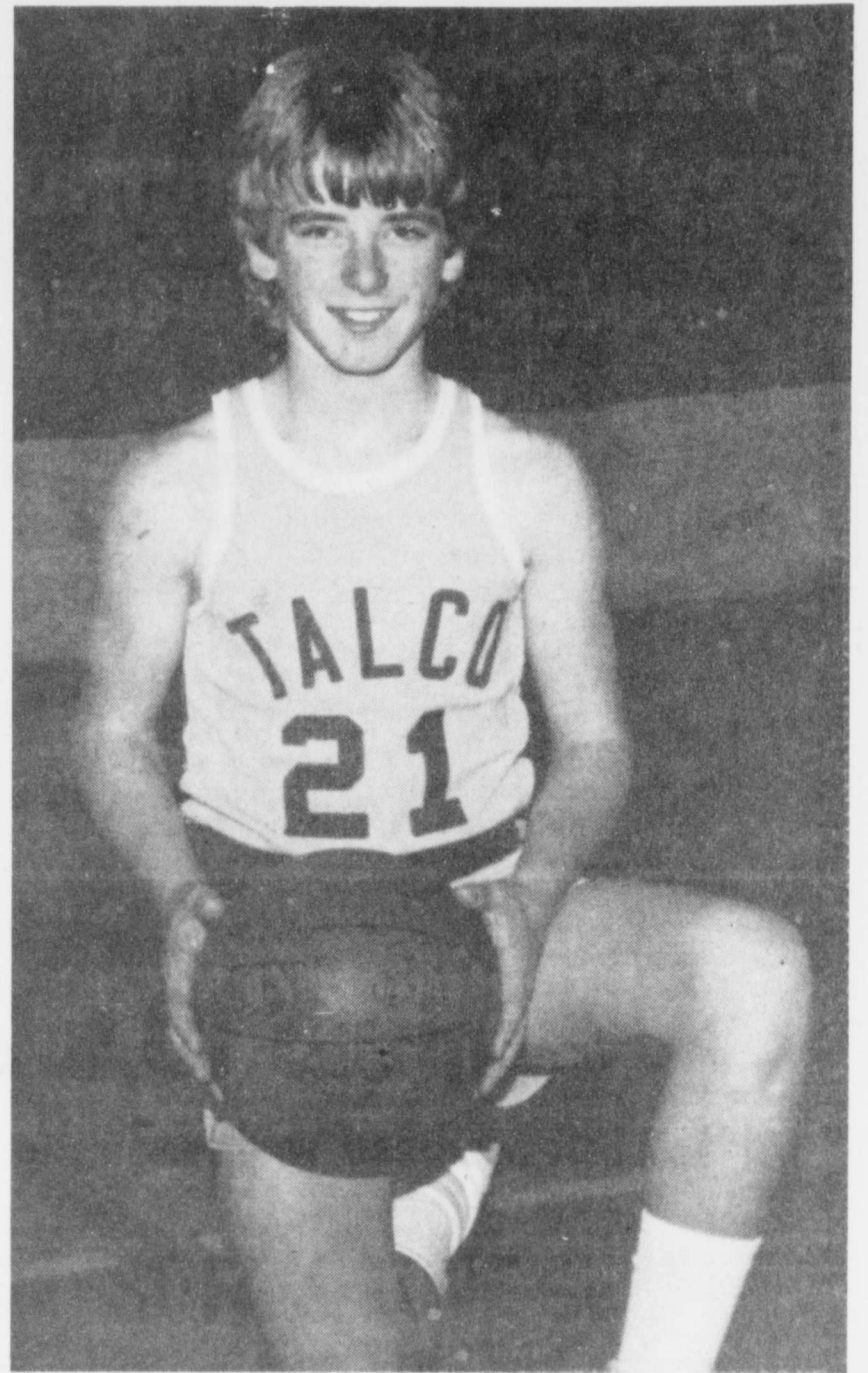

Rich Plan Freezer Was Part Of Family

A member of my family was struck by lightning a couple of weeks ago and put out of commission. Now that I have your attention, I'll relieve you by explaining that the family member was a deep freeze which had been in our family for many years.

As an upright freezer and the brand name was "Rich Plan". Now, that should tell many of you just how old the freezer was. It was one of those freezers that was sold in this area long ago with a plan that brought ordered food right to your freezer.

The deal sounded good, so my mother and dad decided to give it a try. Needless to say, the freezer lasted much longer than the food plan. However, we did enjoy several months of eating "high on the hog" and beef, too. I will never forget the day the salesman came and made his pitch. My brother and I lurked in the doorway to hear the conversation. To us, it sounded almost too good to be true.

When the salesman began to tell our parents about all the different frozen items they could order, our eyes got big and our tummies began to sing. After we saw that Mom and Dad were convinced, we went outside to continue our playing.

We were so excited and felt we just couldn't wait for the freezer and the first food order to arrive. Don said, "Just think, we can have grape juice and hamburgers anytime we want. It never occurred to us that the food would cost extra.

Soon the freezer arrived and the delivery man stocked it full of frozen juices, meats, fruits and other mouth tempting items. Don and I felt for the first and only time in our lives that we were rich. I'm not really sure just how much we ended up costing our parents by having all the different foods so readily available, but like most kids, we weren't too conservative.

I remember eating the frozen juices from the cans with spoons on hot days

and the delicious strawberries frozen in sweet syrup. The plan must have been pretty good for the consumers, because it didn't last very long. After a time, we were unable to order the food, but at least the freezer was ours for good. My mother received money for selling the "Rich Plan" to our neighbors and I remember she had quite a time collecting the money.

As I was contemplating this article in my mind, I went to my refrigerator and got a soft drink. I couldn't help but think about how my brother and I would have reacted back then to what I saw. Soft drinks, several flavors, candy bars, ice cream in the freezer compartment, grapes, apples,

oranges and almost anything else you might want. Things are certainly different for kids today in that respect. A lot of older folks, and some not so old, can remember when apples and oranges were treats received only at Christmas.

As my husband and my brother-in-law pulled the old freezer out of the house to make room for the new one, I had the thought of how wonderful it would be if only the freezer could have recorded all the memories that took place in our home through all those years, and then as I remembered some of my adolescent days, I thought to myself, "Well, maybe not all of the memories."

Talco-Bogata's Superintendent Harold Cowley also announced the calendar for the 1987-88 school year as follows:

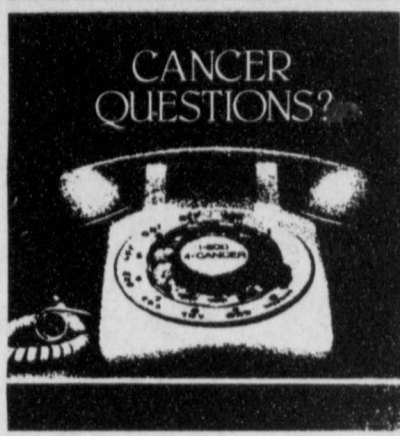

Brussels Sprouts in Cheese Sauce
16 oz. pkg. Freshlike Frozen Brussels Sprouts

Cheese Sauce:
2 tbsp. butter or margarine
2 tbsp. flour
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1/4 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
Dash cayenne
1 cup milk or light cream
1 cup grated natural sharp cheddar cheese (1/4 lb.)

Using a large saucepan, cook Brussels sprouts as label directs. Make cheese sauce: In small saucepan, slowly melt butter, remove from heat; stir in flour, mustard, salt, pepper, cayenne and milk until smooth. Bring to boiling, stirring until thickened. Reduce heat; add cheese; cook, stirring, until cheese is melted and mixture is smooth. Drain Brussels sprouts; turn them back into saucepan. Heat slightly to dry out. Pour cheese sauce over top. Serves 6.
