Editor's Note: This is the last in my travel series. To all who have taken the time to call and tell me you have enjoyed it...thanks, I've enjoyed sharing it with you:

On Thursday we all set out for downtown London once again. We were told to put on dresses and ties, as we had a surprise waiting. We took the underground in. More on that later.

Westminster Abbey was quite an experience. Seeing the burial spots of Edward the Confessor, Mary Queen of Scots, all the other famous people, was sobering. It made us aware of the multitude of generations that have gone ahead of us.

My favorite part was the poet's corner. There T.S. Eliot, Alfred Lord Tennyson, W.H. Auden, Milton and so many more of the authors that helped to shape literature, lay at rest.

We walked through Whitehall, an area people with private (very private) residences of royalty. We were clowning with a pair of bobbies when Thomas stepped into the road to take a picture. One of the bobbies said "Move over a bit, chap, you're blocking Princess Margaret". Thomas thought he was joking. He went ahead, snapped the picture, then turned around to see that he actually HAD been blocking the Princess Margaret! Embarrassing!

We strolled on toward Buckingham Palace. Noticing some policeman setting up to block traffic, Mic politely inquired "Who is coming out?"

"The Queen Mum" he replied... "in about five minutes."

So we stood as a stately, chauffeured driven black Rolls Royce limo pulled out, with a spry, smiling 85-year old Queen Mother (Queen Elizabeth's mother) swept past!

The changing of the guard was yet another example of the pomp and pageantry the British are proud of. Bright reds, flashing brass, shiny horses completed the morning.

We were then told why we had to dress up...what our surprise was.

Lee had written to Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher about a private tour of the Houses of Parliament. Mrs. Thatcher, understandably, was too busy. But Sir Fergus Montgomery, a member of Parliament and aide to the Prime Minister, was to give us a tour!

We sauntered by about 150 people standing in line at the gates for the

public tour. My scalp crawled just a little at the angry glares we got! We seated ourselves for a short wait, then Sir Fergus appeared.

A white haired, pleasant man, we felt very comfortable with him.

We went to St. Stephen's crypt, the chapel which members of Parliament can be married in, and their children christened in. A magnificent marble baptismal font staggered the imagination.

Sir Fergus pointed out that there were two lions, one over each door.

One had it's mouth shut, the other's mouth was open with the tongue out.

This, he explained, was done in early times when people could not read. The lion with his mouth closed meant in...the one with his tongue out...exit!

We chatted with him amiably, overcoming a slight tremor of awe at our special treatment, and were treated to a tour most people could only dream about!

After that, I'm forced to admit that the quick lunch and cruise down the

Thames seemed a little tame!

The cruise, however, was nice, since it offered the opportunity to see London as it should be seen, for the river that has been her lifeblood.

Then it was home on the underground...a situation I never hope to encounter again. For two people used to open spaces, the hundreds of people pressing on was a bit disconcerting! Every time those doors opened, I swore there wasn't room for another body...and ten more squeezed in.

Steak and Yorkshire pudding at Mic's house made up for it, though, and on Friday our friends had yet another treat in store.

Pam took us that morning to the British Museum. It is counted as one of the world's finest...and has been a goal on my list for many years.

I strolled happily through gallery after gallery filled with Greek marbles, Egyptian artifacts, oriental treasures, etc.

Then we went to the Royal Tournament. It was something, indeed. Each year the branches of the military compete, and the winner sets the theme of the show. The Navy had the honors this year. The whole afternoon was non-stop pageants, military bands, tests of strength and skill, and special effects to take the breath away.

There were horse drill teams of amazing precision. There were bands from Australia, bands from the Army, Navy and Marines.

In one race, which was serious competition, a group of young men pitted themselves against another group in dismantling a gun carriage, transporting it across obstacles piece by piece, reassembling it, and then firing it three times. They could do this in under three minutes. The whole thing was strenuous, and precise to the point where if any one person had failed to execute their part, someone would have been crushed, killed or hurt.

The finale by the Navy was awesome as hoardes of seamen ascended 90 feet up the rigging of a ship's mast in time to drum beats.

The whole afternoon was a look at the traditions, pride and love the British have for their country. It was a fitting close to our stay.

Sadly, all that was left to us was a dinner (our treat) at the Manor Cottage and an early to bed before flying home on Saturday.

Saturday was a long, dull day in the air, and the heat at home slammed into us with the force of a hammer.

Even now it's hard to realize that for 11 days we were cool and damp in the middle of a hot, dry summer.

We can never begin to explain how wonderful our friends were to us. We can never explain what a beautiful trip we had.

We can hope they will return to us so that we can try and give them a wonderful time, too...but that is all.

Schools Open Sept. 1

Although the start of school in Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. is just a few days away, it's time for students to start thinking about the upcoming fall term.

The Talco-Bogata schools will hold the first day of classes for the 1987-88 school year on Tuesday, September 1. Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeteria.

Rivercrest High School Principal James Smith stated that the buses will make their regular runs on Tuesday morning with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual. It will probably take one or two days to establish regular times for each bus route. Should the bus fail to pick up a student for any reason, contact the appropriate building principal.

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are new to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School at 632-5204 for information regarding bus routes.

Principals Billy Joe Vickers at Talco and Frank Stubblefield at Bogata want to remind parents that all students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled. First grade students who did not

attend kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling in the first grade for the first time in the district must furnish a birth certificate.

Parents are also reminded that all children entering elementary schools in Texas must have met the required state immunizations of diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella. All students in high school must have diphtheria, measles, tetanus and polio immunizations up to date.

Jr. High Football Equipment To Be Issued

Football equipment for the Talco and Bogata Junior High boys will be handed out Thursday, August 27, beginning with the eighth grade at 5 p.m., followed by the seventh grade at 5:30 p.m. at the Rivercrest High School field house.

All boys who plan to play football should bring physicals. No practice will be allowed for boys without physicals. Those who do not receive their equipment on August 27 will have to wait until September 1 to get their uniforms.

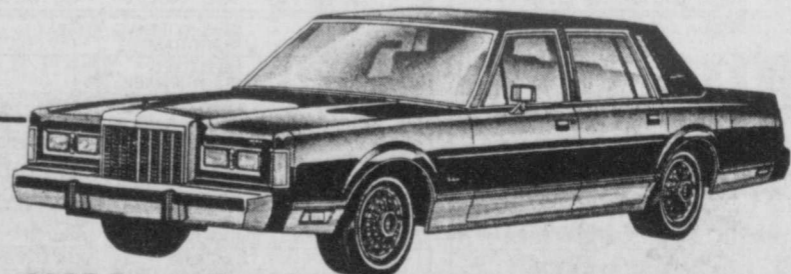

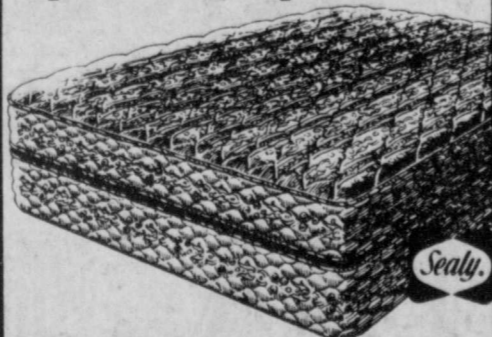

Please Watch For School Children!

When classes start Tuesday, September 1, the tardy bell rings at 8:15 a.m. on all three campuses. But, schools will dismiss according to the following students. Kindergarten through third grade will dismiss at 3:05 p.m. and the rest of the students at the Talco and Bogata campuses will dismiss at 3:50 p.m. The Rivercrest campus will start at 8:15 a.m. and will dismiss at 4:30 p.m.

The crossing guard at the Bogata campus will be working from 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. in the morning. In the afternoon, the guard will be working from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. The flashing lights will also be working during this time.

In the 1987-88 school year, all vocational education programs are open to all students, including women, members of minority groups, han-

dicapped students, disadvantaged students and persons of Limited English Proficiency. They shall have equal access to vocational education programs, services and activities.



Talco-Bogata Lunch Guidelines

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. will begin registering children who are eligible for the free and reduced-priced meals program.

On the first day of school, students will be given an application to be filled out either by a parent or guardian and returned to the school.

Instead of regular meal prices of \$1.00 for lunch and \$.50 for breakfast, students who qualify for reduced-priced meals will pay \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

Children from households with incomes not exceeding the family size and income specified below are eligible for free or reduced-priced meals:

- Family Size: 1, yearly \$10,175; monthly \$848; weekly \$196.
 - Family size: 2, yearly \$13,690; monthly 1,141; weekly \$264.
 - Family size: 3, yearly \$17,205; monthly \$1,434; weekly \$331.
 - Family size: 4, yearly \$20,720; monthly \$1,727; weekly \$399.
 - Family size: 5, yearly \$24,235; monthly \$2,020; weekly \$467.
 - Family size: 6, yearly \$27,750; monthly \$2,313; weekly \$534.
 - Family size: 7, yearly \$31,265; monthly \$2,606; weekly \$602.
 - Family size: 8, yearly \$34,780; monthly \$2,899; weekly \$669.
- Each additional family member: yearly \$3,515; monthly \$293; weekly \$68.

Once the applications are handed out, parents and guardians are urged by the school administration to return the forms within 10 days. However, applications will be received any time during the year, especially if a family's income changes significantly, someone in the household becomes unemployed, or if there is an increase in family size. Also, if there are foster children living in the home, they may be eligible for these benefits.

School officials said information will be kept confidential and that all information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year to verify statements made. Anyone requiring assistance in filling out the applications may contact the child's school.

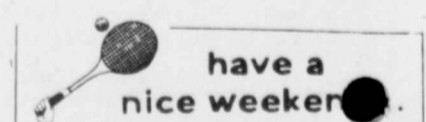
