## Big Tops And Elephants Top Tombstones

**Editor's Note: No, we didn't see the article in The Paris News and go over to Hugo....this article was worked up before we ever saw the other article!**

Over in Hugo, OK there's a corner in the cemetery that is a little different from most. It's known as Showman's Rest, and the monuments there reflect a way of life for the people buried beneath them...the way of life found in a circus.

Mt. Olivet, located on 8th Street in Hugo, is a lovely, shady cemetery, with a special corner just for the circus folks who chose it as their final resting place.

Gravestones usually have names, dates of birth, dates of death, and that's about all.

But the circus was, literally, these people's whole life, and the markers over their graves reflect what that meant to them.

One identifies the man beneath as "Boss Elephant Man for Carson and

Barnes Circus, the largest herd of circus elephants in America".

Yet another clever stone is carved into the shape of a circus big top, with the main entrance marked and taut canvas folds.

A huge circus wagon wheel sports it's shape next to a stone with a circus eighteen-wheeler on it.

Jesse Jessen, who died in March of 1987, has the biggest monument there. It is carved with elephants and circus tents. Jessen was the business manager for Kelly & Miller Circus, which makes it's winter home in Hugo. Carson and Barnes Circus also makes their winter home in Hugo, a town where one can see elephants

grazing in the winter quarters pasture! Performers from both circuses have found their final home at Mt. Olivet.

A stone marked "Kennedy Swain, Swain's Comedians, Plunkett Shows, Kelly-Miller Circus and Carson and Barnes Circus" brings hme what a life-long career the road and perfor-

ming can be. The dates are from 1902 to 1974.

A Showman's Rest Trust Fund in memory of John Carroll has helped make the circus portion of the cemetery special.

One marker has a picture of an elderly man with a trumpet emblazoned on it. "A Showman At Rest" is the final word.

"Circus, With It and For It" is the dedicated challenge on yet another.

Rearing elephants, leaping tigers, roaring lions, circus wagons carved and decorated make the tombstones as unique as the performers buried beneath them must have been.

Whole lifetimes are at rest here, beneath the shade trees and neatly clipped grass.

How many more of their companions must be laid to rest elsewhere,

along the long, long road the circus takes as it travels across the nation?

Perhaps the most poignant and touching epitaph of all is inscribed on a stone dedicated to a concession's vendor...which, according to the marble marker, were sold at "Fairs, Ice Shows, Carnivals, Rodeos and Street Corners". The simple statement sums up what these people evidently felt for their life. It simply reads "We have had the good life, but the season has ended".

It hasn't though, not quite, for as long as their are circuses to delight children and adults alike, there will be yet another generation of performers to love their lifestyle enough to come eventually to a final resting place at Showman's Rest in Hugo.

## Water District Board Lists Reservoir Facts

In a series of meetings at Clarksville and throughout Red River County, supporters of the Dimple Reservoir have been gathering to discuss the issues in the forthcoming September 19 bond election.

Speaking along with local civic leaders at the meetings is Larry Stone, a managing partner in Kindie, Stone and Associates of Longview, the

engineering firm chosen for the project by the Acting Board of Directors of the project.

Stone describes the scope of the plan, which has already been subjected to extensive preliminary engineering study by HDR Infrastructure, Inc., another engineering firm.

The plan calls for a dam to impound water from White Oak Bayou and two

smaller tributaries in a reservoir of about 1,800 surface acres, yielding about 6.4 million gallons of water a day. The reservoir will be just north of the North Lake and extend eastward almost 2.5 miles from State Highway 37 to the dam, about a mile north of the Vandalia turnoff on FM 1159.

Upper forks of the lake would reach State Highway 37 at two points between Crawford's Store and FM 2120 at Dimple turnoff.

The site was chosen by U.S. Soil and Water Conservation Service District Conservationist Charles Van Deaver several years ago and is represented as best meeting the requirements for a site, including central location; "downhill" delivery of water to anticipated users; good soil topography and sub-base to hold water; a runoff area into the reservoir of more than twenty square miles; no apparent environmental or downstream permit problems; and suitability for economic construction of a facility or appropriate size.

No other site in the county meets these criteria, say members of the Acting Board. Stone affirms that the normal pool level of 409 feet above mean sea level would give a very favorable depth to the reservoir.

"We expect that depths in the lake will vary from about 34 feet near the dam to some 12 feet in the west end," Stone says, adding that these depths assure quality water and a favorable cost ratio per acre foot of water.

Stone tells his listeners that the HDR study had projected water needs more than 50 years into the future, and had based plans on the assumption that by the year 2040 there will be twice as many people in Red River County as now, using twice as much water per capita.

The projected demand in 2040 is 4.32 million gallons per day, well below the lake capacity of 6.4 million gallons per day and leaving a very adequate margin for industrial use, Stone says.

Travis Hale of Bogata, director at large of the Water District, explains that the water district will have the same boundaries as the County, emphasizing that the county's citizens will own the lake and all of the water it holds. Thus, says Hale, the District in the future will be in a position to deliver treated water to entities that

serve every citizen in Red River County at a standard price for all. When the lake has reached its normal level, the District will decide whether to acquire the treatment plant now being constructed by the City of Clarksville or to build an additional one. Such acquisitions or improvements would be paid for out of water sale revenues, not by additional taxes.

Some two or three years after approval by the voters on September 19, it is expected that a tax of 30.7 cents per \$100 valuation will be levied by the elected Board to meet bond requirements as Reservoir construction is completed.

In discussions at the meetings it was emphasized that, by terms of the state law authorizing creation of the District, all parts of the County will be represented on the Board. Each of the five incorporated towns, (Annona, Avery, Bogata, Clarksville and Detroit) and the Red River Water Supply Corporation will name one member each. The nine-member board will have three members elected directly by the voters, one by a countywide vote, one by the voters of County Precincts 1 and 2, and one by the voters of County Precincts 3 and 4.

To approve the project, the referendum vote on September 19 will require majorities on three related issues:

1) to confirm the Texas Legislature's creation of the Red River County Water Authority, to be governed by local representatives of the entire county;

2) to authorize an eventual ad valorem tax of 30.7 cents per \$100 valuation to retire the bonds that will finance the reservoir; and

3) to authorize the Board of the Water Authority to levy an ad valorem tax of up to three cents per \$100 valuation to maintain the reservoir.

Officials are emphasizing that all three of these propositions must pass if the project is to proceed.

The next information meeting scheduled at Clarksville is Thursday, September 3 at the community room of First Federal Savings and Loan. Additional meetings are being announced at communities in various parts of the county.

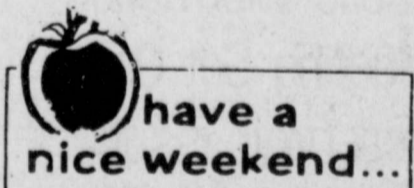

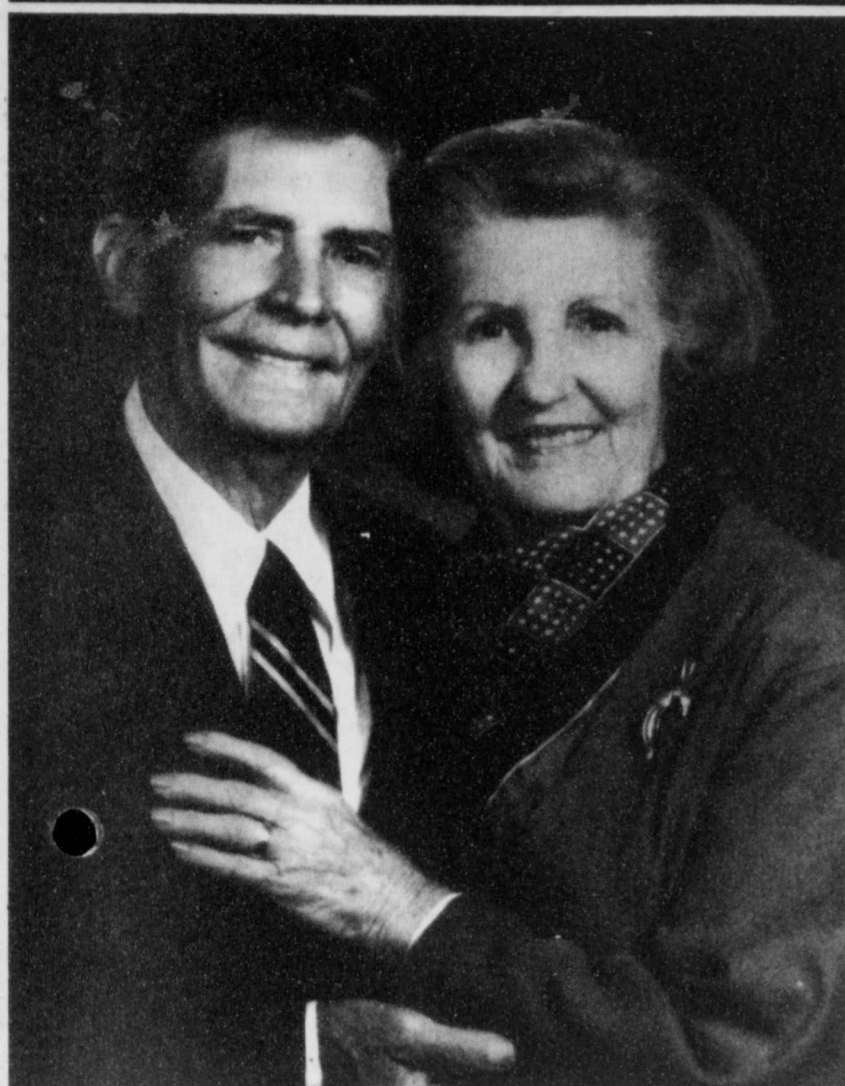

### Grant Replace Cuthand Bridge Approved

Red River County Judge L.D. Williamson received word last week that a grant to replace the Sulphur River bridge at Cuthand which connects Red River County and Titus County had been approved.

"I'm really excited about this," Williamson said. "We've been trying for the past 20 years to get a Farm to Market Road through there but we didn't go about it in the right manner."

According to Williamson, the County was unable to get funding for the Farm to Market road because of the need of replacement of the bridge. In

order to get the Farm to Market road, the state would have had to provide funds for the road and the bridge. With the grant, the bridge will be replaced with Federal funds and the Farm to Market road can be funded by the State.

In order to obtain the grant for the bridge, the County must pay 20% of the cost and the State will provide 80%. Since the bridge is on the county line, Red River County and Titus County are cooperating and each providing 10%. Titus Countians, seeing the convenience to be offered by the road in that area, sent approximately 50 representatives to Austin some time ago and addressed the Highway Commission on the bridge. Jim Hall, a Paris engineer, informed Judge L.D. Williamson last week that the state had put the Cuthand Sulphur River Bridge on the list of bridges to be replaced. County Commissioners plan to apply next year for the Farm to Market Road.

A representative from the Paris office of the Texas Highway Department said that work on the bridge was planned to begin in February, 1989. He said that an aerial view from a plane from Austin would be used to study the best location for the new bridge.

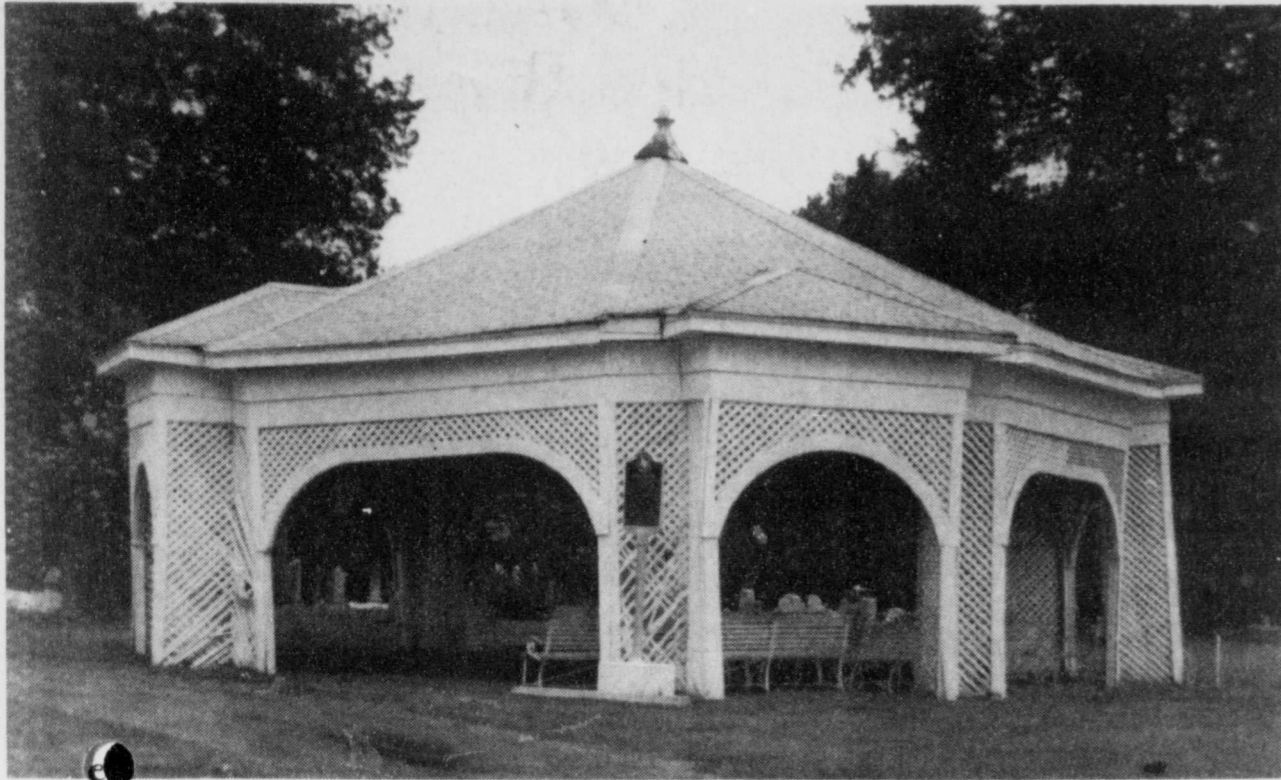

### Association Trying To Restore Pavilion

Trustees of the Bogata Cemetery Association met August 29 to deal with the problems of restoring the cemetery's historic pavilion. The structure, built about 1902 is showing its age.

In its early years, the pavilion sheltered not only committal or graveside ceremonies, but the funeral services that in later years often took place in churches or at the funeral home. Recently the early practice of a single, combined service at the pavilion has been regaining its appeal.

Built on soft sand near the earliest graves, which date from 1840, the octagonal pavilion is badly out of level. Some of its timbers and much of the lattice-work need replacement, and trustees concluded that a carpeted

floor would also be desirable if it could be funded. An anonymous donor has already pledged \$500 toward the restoration.

"We simply must restore the old structure," said Mrs. William (Frances) Rozell, president of the trustees, "but we will have to raise money first. Our endowment income and current giving has been barely enough just to keep the cemetery mowed, even in a dry summer like this one."

The 12-acre Bogata cemetery, which grew around burial grounds originally given to the community by the Humphries and Wilson families nearly 150 years ago, is largely funded by current gifts.

"Memorial gifts, made in addition to or in place of funeral flowers, have become more popular lately, says Mrs. Rozell, "but even so, we have no money to invest in improvements."

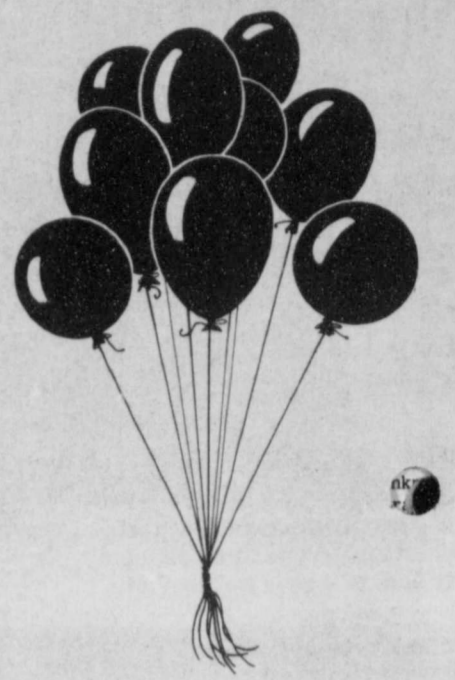

## Good Natured Sister Is Diet Scholar

A couple of weeks ago, along with my children and mother and dad, I had a great visit with my sister and family in Beaumont. Everyone should have the privilege of being with this sister of mine for a day or two. She's one of these rare individuals who always finds the good in people and overlooks the bad. She seems to enjoy life at its fullest and somehow manages to transmit that jubilation to those around her. She keeps you laughing with her witty remarks and helps you forget all the troubles and problems that surround you.

She holds a Texas beautician's license and a Real Estate Broker's license, but there's another field in which she is truly a scholar. That field is in dieting. Being just a few inches over five feet tall, she's naturally had to work constantly at controlling her weight. Referring to herself as "pleasingly plump", she's tried every diet and weight control gadget ever invented in her pursuit of a slimmer figure. Each time we see her, she's got a new one to tell about. One brother-in-law says that she's been on a diet ever since he's been in the family and that's several years, now.

While living in Jamaica, this sister of mine was fortunate enough to have a full time maid. She quickly used this asset to help control her eating habits. At night, the maid took all sweets to her apartment, out of the reach of my sister, who was a habitual night eater. She says this worked for a while, but eventually the urge for something sweet during the night became so strong that she began opening and eating cans of sweetened condensed milk.

The next weight control program was called the "Lock and Chain", a program she invented. This consisted of chaining her leg to a rocking chair next to the bed. Her reasoning was that if she couldn't get out of bed, she couldn't go to the kitchen and gorge. Her husband slept with the key underneath his pillow and he says that she continually kept him awake begging for the key. Finally after several weeks, she learned that by being very careful, she could ease down the stairs, dragging the chair with her.

One apparatus she bought to help control her eating was a muzzle. The muzzle looked much like the guard on a football helmet. She demonstrated the muzzle while home for the

holidays one Christmas. My husband recorded the demonstration and explanation of how it works on video tape. Needless to say, he's gotten several hours of laughter from watching the tape.

Another gadget she tried was a small piece that fit in your ear, similar to a small hearing aid. The end of a battery operated vibrator was held next to this piece for a prescribed length of time, thus promising great rewards in weight loss. Along with all these regimes and contraptions, were diets of all kinds, exercise programs and frequent visits to weight doctors.

While on this recent visit with her, she showed me her latest aid in controlling her appetite. It's a cassette tape which, when played, sounds like the roaring of the ocean. The tape is supposed to be sending subliminal messages to you, which keeps you from being hungry. To be effective, the tape is to be listened to for several hours a day. She says she has difficulty in finding that much time to listen to the tape, however, after listening to it for the length of time it took me to fix my hair, I reported to her that a shorter listening time had proved effective for me. I was quite nauseous. It was the kind of feeling that many people get at the mention of deep sea fishing or riding the roller coaster at an amusement park. The only problem was that nausea has never prevented me from eating.

Although we always look forward to her visits at home so we can see what her new weight loss program she's involved in, we enjoy her visits most of all because her loving disposition and good nature always leaves us in a brighter and happier state of mind.
