The Haskell Lions Club met for their weekly luncheon Tuesday, at the Haskell Steak House.

Lion Bill Comedy presented Harrold Couch, of the Department of Public Safety, as program for the week.

Couch spoke and gave a slide presentation on Drug Abuse. While showing commonly used drugs, he stated that the Department of Public Safety believes it is important that teachers and parents recognize the common symptoms and signs of drug abuse, since many potential "hard-core" addicts can be rehabilitated if their involvement in drug abuse is detected in its early stages.

Couch covered the common symptoms of drug abuse and the manifestations of specific drugs.

Afterwards, Lions asked questions about specific drugs and prevention of use.

Area May Face LPG Shortage

Mrs. W. D. Penman of Penman Butane Co. in Rochester, Jesse Dean of Dean Butane in Haskell, and Roy Pittman of Haskell Butane in Haskell, all attended an emergency meeting of Texas LP (Liquid Petroleum) gas dealers in Austin last Thursday.

Last week, most of the butane dealers of this area got together and ran two display advertisements in the Haskell Free Press telling their customers of this LP shortage, and urging them to clip the ad and mail it to their representative, their congressman and their governor.

Attending the emergency meeting in Austin was another way they felt they might forestall the shortage they see coming this fall.

LP gas—an energy staple of farmers and rural homeowners—may not be around this winter to keep out the cold, if something is not done. Nor, this summer to keep out the heat, raise the crops, or pump the oil. "If this winter is any worse than last winter," one North Central Texas dealer reported at the meeting, "then I guarantee you we'll run out of gas. When you give a man 25 gallons of gas in the winter and tell him you can't give him any more until you get more, he's likely to run out."

Skelly has notified dealers it will begin cutbacks May 1, according to reports at the meet-

ing. A resolution is pending in the legislature requiring the Texas Railroad Commission to challenge the cutbacks. According to reports, the commission could intervene even without the resolution, but a court fight would probably ensue.

Texas produces about 8 billion gallons of LP gas yearly, but has been keeping only one billion in the state. Cutbacks would diminish even that amount.

The association was attempt-

ing to find ways to overcome the shortage problem. LP gas primarily goes to rural areas not served by the Rural Electric Administration, an LPA Association spokesman said.

Most dealers said they would be cut back from one-fourth to one-eighth in gas available to customers.

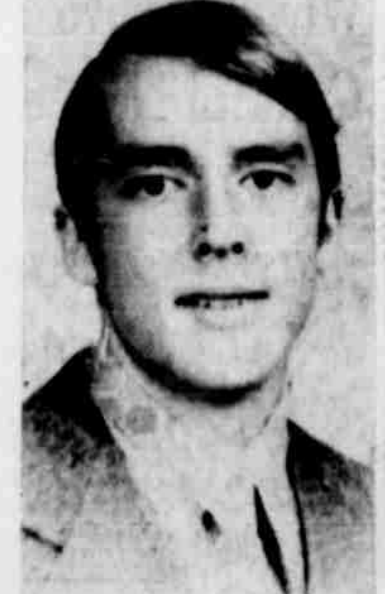
Honor Students Named At Haskell High School

Santa Rosa Roundup Set May 9-13, Vernon

VERNON, Tex. — The 1973 voice of the Santa Rosa Rodeo May 9-13 will be a familiar one to countless rodeo, television and motion picture fans around the country.

It belongs to Pete Logan of Medford, Ore., who has been assigned microphone chores for the 28th annual Vernon event and at more than half the 14 National Finals Rodeos held to date.

"The announcer is the average fan's only contact with arena activities," said rodeo producer Mike Cervi, of Beutler Bros. and Cervi. "His role is a demanding one, requiring well-rounded knowledge and authoritative presentation of the subject. The announcer can make or break a rodeo. That's why we hired Pete for the Santa Rosa."

In addition to Logan's NFR appearances, Cervi said, he is the only man to have announced New York's Madison Square Garden Rodeo on ten occasions. Logan is on record with 20 years' experience in the cowboy sport's varied aspects and annually emcees many of the nation's major events.

This will be Logan's second Santa Rosa appearance.

The six-foot, one-inch North-westerner is a versatile man. He is an accomplished pilot with more than 2500 cockpit hours to his credit, and in the midst of a busy rodeo schedule has found time for such things as guest appearances on the Daniel Boone TV series and a major role in Disney Studios' "Hang Your Hat On the Wind."

He also appeared in the Disney film "Run, Appaloosa, Run," featuring another rodeo personality, former Girls' Rodeo Association world champion barrel racer, Sammy Thurman.

When not in front of the cameras or announcing rodeos, Logan trains race horses on his ranch in Southern Oregon's Rogue River Valley.

Cervi added he was impressed with preparatory work at the Santa Rosa grounds by members of the American Association of Sheriff's Poses and Riding Clubs.

Santa Rosa sessions are set for 8 p. m. May 9-12 and 2 p. m. May 13.

Evening sessions will be followed by rodeo dances—featuring country-western music by Bobby Weddle—at the National Guard Armory.

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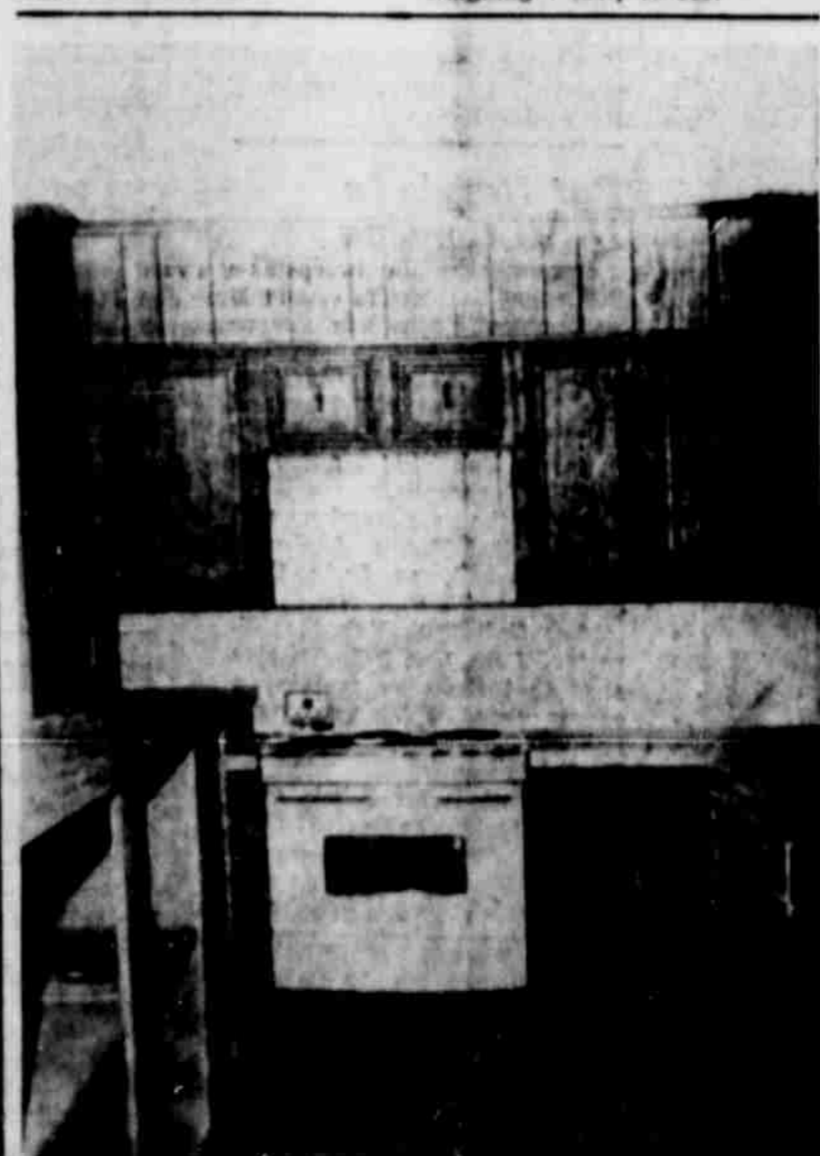

During Parents Day, Mickler, representing Squadron 12, presented the Commander with the Squadron Emblem.

Recently, we gave assistance to the Kitchens Feedlot of Rule, cooperating with the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District in the planning of a pollution abatement system that would be acceptable to and meet the standards of the Texas Water Quality Board. The techniques and practices to be used are aimed at incorporating the waste material into the soil and the utilization of nutrients in the waste by thirty acres of bermudagrass and another sixty acres of annual forage crops.

Grassed waterways continue to be a popular practice with our landowners and operators. The construction of a waterway—its width, depth, slope, and vegetation—is determined by the amount of water it must carry. There are many grasses that work well in waterways, but bermudagrass is by far the best! It furnishes protective covering for the soil that withstands the ravages of flowing water, as well as furnishing an abundant amount of highly nutritious forage.

Milton Christian of Haskell, cooperating with the Wichita-Brazos SWCD, has recently seeded three waterways to bermudagrass. Dan Griffith of Paint Creek, cooperating with the California Creek SWCD, has just finished construction of a 20 acre waterway which will be sprigged in the near future to coastal bermudagrass, and has started construction of another waterway which will also be sprigged to bermudagrass.

Bailey Toliver of Haskell has just recently completed developing plans on the J. L. Toliver, Sr. farm north of Haskell in the Wichita-Brazos SWCD. Toliver's plans include parallel terraces on 290 acres, minimum tillage on all crop land, three acres of bermudagrass waterway, and 25 acres of bermudagrass pas-

ture to aid in combating an increasing salt problem.

Boyd Cathey of Grand Prairie has a farm in the Paint Creek community operated by Jiggs Isabel. He is now in the process of seeding his waterway to bermudagrass.

SCS, besides furnishing planning and application assistance to individual landowners and operators, is increasingly being called on by communities and their various commissions for inventory and evaluation assistance in developing programs for community improvement, recycling to the land the efflu-

ents and sludges from sewage treatment plants, solid waste disposal, and many other projects.

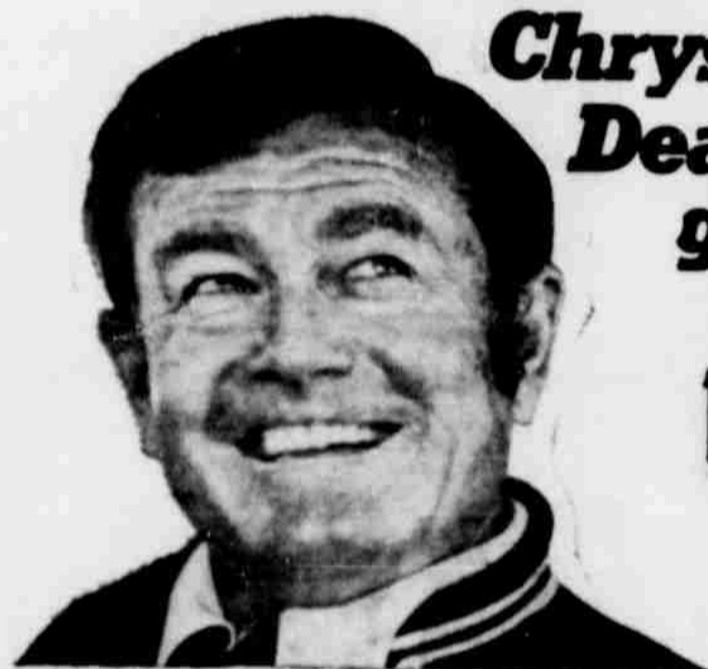

Residence Homestead Exemption Amendment Deferred

Haskell residents have inquired about information, concerning the constitutional amendment on residence homestead tax exemption.

Article VIII, Section 1-b, states, "From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt, by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all valorem taxes thereafter levied by the subdivision."

For Haskell to have this exemption, a petition must be signed by twenty per cent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision.

After the petition, foregoing constitutional amendment would be submitted to a vote of the

Austria's Royal Lipizzans To Be In Abilene

The Royal Lipizzan Stallions of Austria, featuring the rarest, most aristocratic breed of horse in the world, will perform in the Taylor County Coliseum in Abilene on Sunday, May 6, at 2 p. m. Tickets are on sale at the Coliseum.

Starting with the Lipizzans will be Colonel Ottomer Herrmann, whose ancestors have owned and trained Lipizzans for over 300 years. They were given Lipizzans by the Hapsburg Emperor, Ferdinand II, to lead the Austrian armies during the Thirty Years War, 1618 to 1648.

Col. Herrmann took out a group of Lipizzans from under the very eyes of the Russians in World War II, one of the men who saved the rare breed from extinction. Col. Alois Podhajsky took out the Spanish Riding School Lipizzans, took the protection of General G. Patton. The way the rare breed was saved was told in the Walt Disney movie, "Miracle of the White Stallions."

Lipizzans are famous for their great leaps into the air, called "airs above ground," and Col. Herrmann is considered to be the greatest trainer of the "airs" alive today. Originally these were battle maneuvers, used by mounted nobles to inspire terror in the hearts of the enemy. Now performed for their aesthetic beauty, Lipizzans are called the ballet dancers of the horse world.

The Lipizzan stallion, Flying Falcon, is the only horse in the world to leap a hurdle on his hind legs like a man. His rider is Harry Herrmann, first rider of the "airs". Another star is Wolfgang Deilefent, formerly of the Spanish Riding School, and leading rider in the Disney movie.
