Tax Bills Show Decreases, Increases

Several Red River County taxing entities have already begun mailing out tax bills for 1987, and County tax bills should be in the mail by mid-October.

Clarksville, Avery and Bogata city taxes and Clarksville and Avery school taxes were mailed by the end of September. Bogata school taxes were mailed October 2.

Tax bills from municipalities and school districts will in most cases be larger than in 1986, while county taxes will usually be lower.

"The Commissioners' Court has been able to pare spending in several areas," reports County Judge L.D. Williamson. "We were able to meet revenue requirements under our budget while reducing the tax rate from 63.85 cents to 61.35."

"This is the first county-wide tax reduction in living memory," Williamson says.

Talco-Bogata I.S.D. taxes for 1986 were calculated at a total rate of \$1.06 per hundred dollars' valuation, an increase from the 89 cent rate charged for 1985.

"We trimmed the budget to the bone," says School Board Chairman Tommy Corbell. "The increase in the tax rate was mostly caused by a decline in property values, particularly the decreasing value of oil-producing properties in the Talco end of the district."

"When there is less property to tax, the rate has to go up just to bring in the amount collected last year," Corbell noted.

"Had we not trimmed the budget to absorb the teacher pay increases dictated by the state, we would have had to increase our tax rate to \$1.24," explained Superintendent Harold Cowley. "Next year, when the people in Austin catch up with the fact our tax base has lost some \$62 million in only two years, perhaps our rate can go down."

Some owners of agricultural land

may find that benefit from the County's tax rate reduction will be reduced or erased by increases in assessed valuation of their properties.

Assessment of agricultural property is calculated under a complex formula many taxpayers find difficult to understand.

"The formula is laid down in the Texas Property Tax Administration code," says Appraisal District head H.H. Quillen. "We just apply the formula."

The formula takes a five year average of net income from an agricultural property and "capitalizes" it at a rate based on the interest rate charged on the last day of the preceding year by the Federal Land Bank of Houston, plus two and a half percent.

Sound complicated? It is.

Try the following example:

Let's say you own a hundred acres of land, and over the last five years an average rancher might have netted \$1000 per year on the property, whether by renting the land, sharing it, or using it himself. (This is a fictitious example; your experience in real life, and your assessment, was probably different!) On the thirty-first of December, 1986, the Houston Land Bank was charging interest at ten and three-quarters percent. Add two and a half percent, giving a total of 13.25 percent.

The net of \$1000 is 13.25 percent of \$7547, which under the formula becomes the value of your hundred acres for assessment purposes. Under the reduced 61.35 tax rate, the 1986 county tax on your property would be \$46.30.

If under the formula the value of your agricultural land increased by \$1000 or more, you were notified in June of the reassessment. If you did not receive such a notification, the valuation of your agricultural property presumably increased by less than a thousand dollars.

Herring was arraigned before Judge Watson and later released in lieu of \$2,500 bond. According to Deputy Larry Taylor, the case will come before the Grand Jury on October 20.

"Play It Safe, Plan Your Escape" is Theme Of Fire Prevention Week

This year's theme for fire prevention week, October 4-11 is "Play it safe, plan your escape." Some tips to prevent fires are:

- Never smoke in bed.
- Never leave invalids or small children alone in the house, not even for a few minutes.
- Never use flammable liquids for dry cleaning indoors.
- Have periodic fire drills in your home to be sure everyone knows what to do in case of fire.

Keep easy to use fire extinguishers in your kitchen, cottage, back bedrooms and on your boat. Invest in smoke detectors, and be sure that they are kept dust free and in working order.

The telephone number of your fire department should be taped to every telephone in your house. If it isn't should a fire occur, don't waste time trying to find it; get out and call from a neighbor's house.

The Volunteer Fire Departments advise the following steps in reporting a fire in this area:

1. In Deport, call 652-3241; in Bogata, call 632-5234; In Blossom, call 982-5300; in Talco, call 379-3331. These are emergency numbers ONLY and should NOT be used for any other purpose.
2. Don't panic.
3. State: grass fire or house fire.

4. Give directions clearly.
5. Give the name of the owner of the property if you know it.
6. Give your name and the phone number you are calling from. If possible, have someone stay by that phone in case more information is needed.
7. It is important to have someone standing near the road to give directions when the fire trucks arrive. Such as gates and driveways.
8. Know where the nearest fire hydrant is to your house before a fire starts.

Time To Plant Clover

Past experience shows that producers had better response from clover planted in October than in any other month, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Select the clover species best adapted to the land being planted. Reeves says that white clover does best in bottom land while arrowleaf, crimson, Subterranean and vetch do best on well drained upland soils.

Clover produces a high quality forage and, if properly inoculated, leaves enough nitrogen in the soil for use by summer forages to more than pay for the seed costs.

Four essentials of successful clover production includes a soil pH of 6 or better, adequate phosphorus and potassium, having the sod short, and properly inoculating the clover seed. To properly inoculate seed, a good sticker agent is needed to keep the bacteria next to the seed.

Clover can be planted in a sod by drilling or sowing. If broadcast, the area needs to be dragged or scratched to get the seed in contact with the soil.

Fall application of phosphorus and potassium is excellent for clover. However, do not apply more than 20 to 30 pounds of nitrogen per acre or the grass will overcome the young clover plants.

Rebels Take Homecoming Win

The Rivercrest Rebels won their first homecoming game in four years, by defeating the Redwater Dragons 28-26 before a capacity crowd at Rebel Stadium last Friday night.

The Rebels utilized a complete team effort to overcome a larger Redwater team that in some positions outweighed the Rebel linemen as much as 100 pounds.

Rivercrest received the opening kick-off but found the interior line of the Dragons to be rock solid and were forced to punt on consecutive downs.

Redwater took over on their own 26-yard line and began a steady march downfield behind the running of sophomore Jeff Kelley and the arm of quarterback Scott Steed. The Dragons pushed the ball to the Rebel 17-yard line and on the first play from the 17 had a apparent touchdown, but an ineligible lineman downfield nullified the score. Several plays later Rebel defensive back Marvin Anderson stepped in front of a Dragon receiver to intercept the ball in the endzone, giving the Rebels the ball on their own 20-yard line.

The Rebel line began to use their quickness to take advantage of the slower Dragon team, as running backs Scooter Brown and Geary Savage ripped off 25 and 24 yards respectively for two first downs. A fifteen yard Dragon penalty helped push the ball to the 11-yard line. Five plays later, quarterback Bradley Wood sneaked over the goal line to put Rivercrest on the scoreboard first. The PAT kick was good and Rivercrest led 7-0 as time expired in the first quarter.

Redwater was unable to advance the ball on the Rebels and a fumbled punt attempt gave the Rebs the ball and good field position on the Redwater 35-yard line. One rushing attempt by Rebel back Marcus Savage netted Rivercrest one yard. Bradley Woods intercepted a pass to Marvin Anderson, but was unable to connect. On his next attempt, he found Wade Smith alone on the two-yard line. Smith dodged one defender and stepped into the endzone for the second TD of the evening. Donald Combs made good on his extra point kick and Rivercrest led 14-0 midway through the second quarter.

Redwater took possession on their own 33 and with a good running effort by Jeff Kelley and an untimely Rebel penalty, found themselves on the 50-yard line with a first down. A 23-yard pass completion moved the ball to the Rivercrest 27-yard line. Two plays later Kelly ran through the Rebel defense for the last TD of the half with Rivercrest leading 14-6.

The Rebels came out smoking in the third quarter. They started their first possession at their own 11-yard line. A strong running effort by wingback Jimmy Lewis and back Scooter Brown, pushed the ball

steadily downfield. Quarterback Bradley Woods carried the ball into the endzone on the final play of the drive. The TD and extra point gave the Rebs a 21-6 lead.

But the Dragons still had some life in them. An alert Dragon defense pounced on a Rebel fumble on the Rebel 21-yard line. Six plays later, the Dragons scored again, the PAT attempt was no good and the Dragons trailed the Rebels 21-12 going into the final quarter.

Rivercrest opened the fourth quarter with another scoring drive of their own. Starting near mid-field, Rivercrest moved the ball to the Redwater 16, when Bradley Woods found receiver Marvin Anderson wide open across the middle for the Rebs' fourth TD. The PAT was good and Rivercrest led 28-12.

Nearing the 3:00 minute mark, the Rebs appeared to have a safe lead, but the Dragons began charging back. Dragon quarterback Scott Steed carried the bulk of the load, passing for five completions on the way to their third touchdown of the contest. The Rebs lead was cut to 28-18.

An on-side kick by the Dragons gave Redwater the ball again on the Rebel 48. Redwater used only one minute to score again. The two point attempt was good as Redwater pulled within two points, 28-26, with one minute left in the contest.

Rivercrest ran out the clock and went on to win 28-26.

Rivercrest amassed 257 yards of total offense. Bradley Woods passed for 75 yards and Scooter Brown led all rushers with 116 yards.

This week the Rebels open district play at home against Honey Grove. Kick-off is at 7:30 p.m. at Rebel Stadium.

at the school and distributed at the discretion of Mr. Stubblefield.

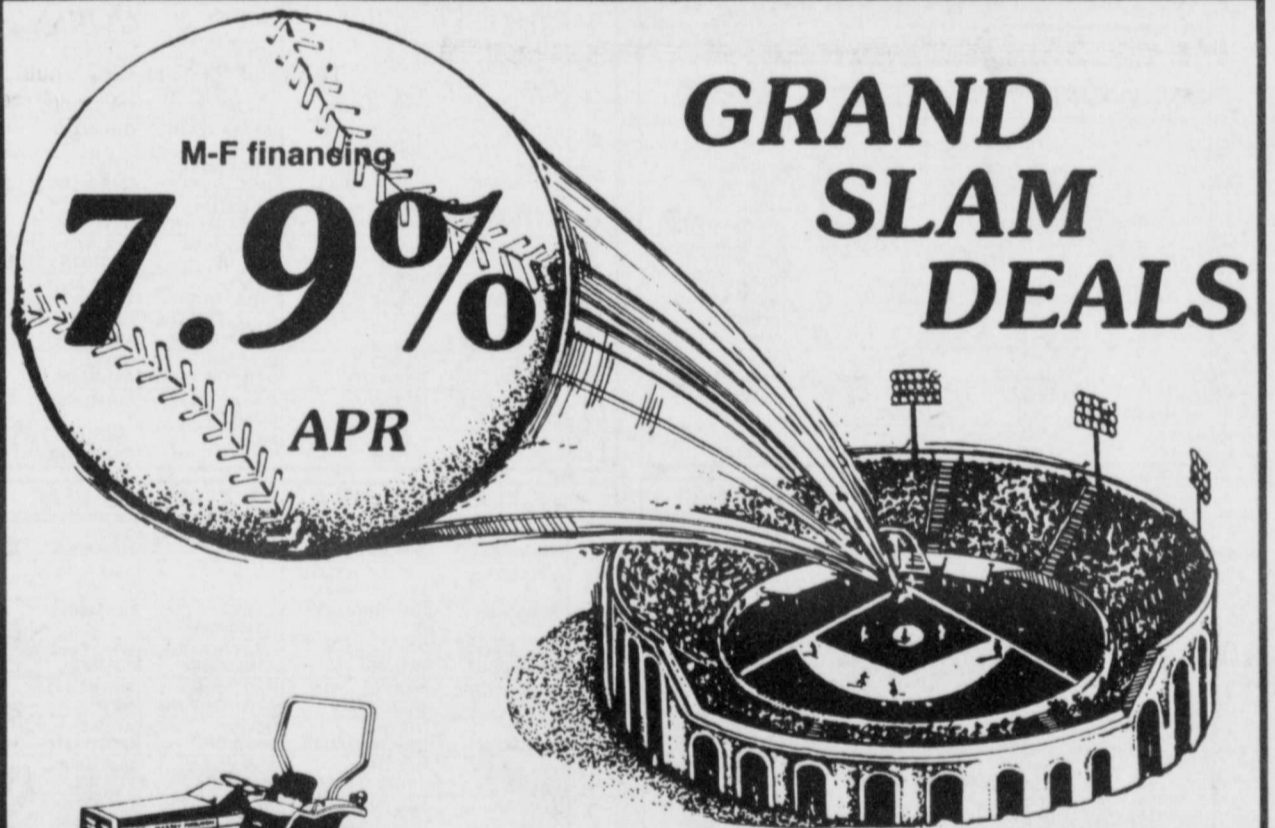

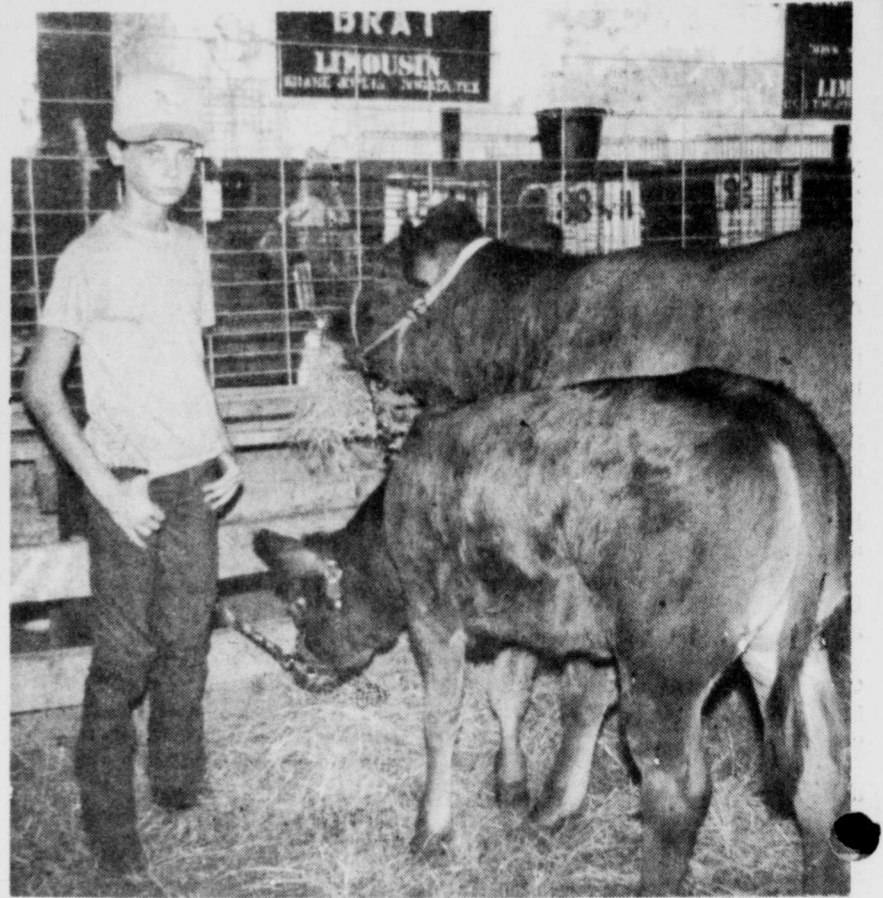

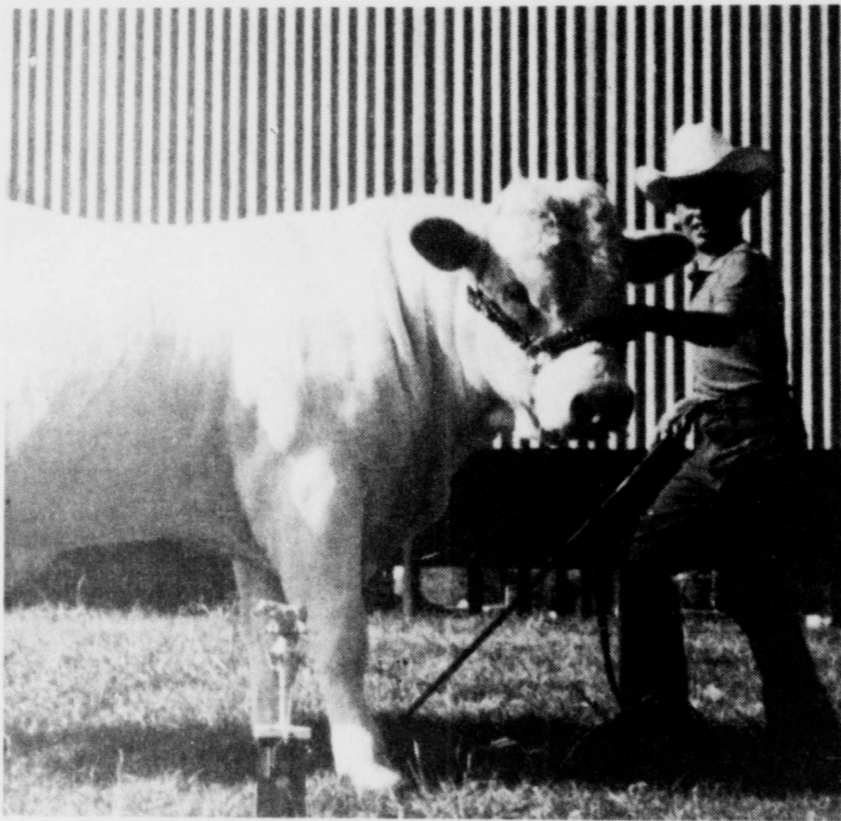

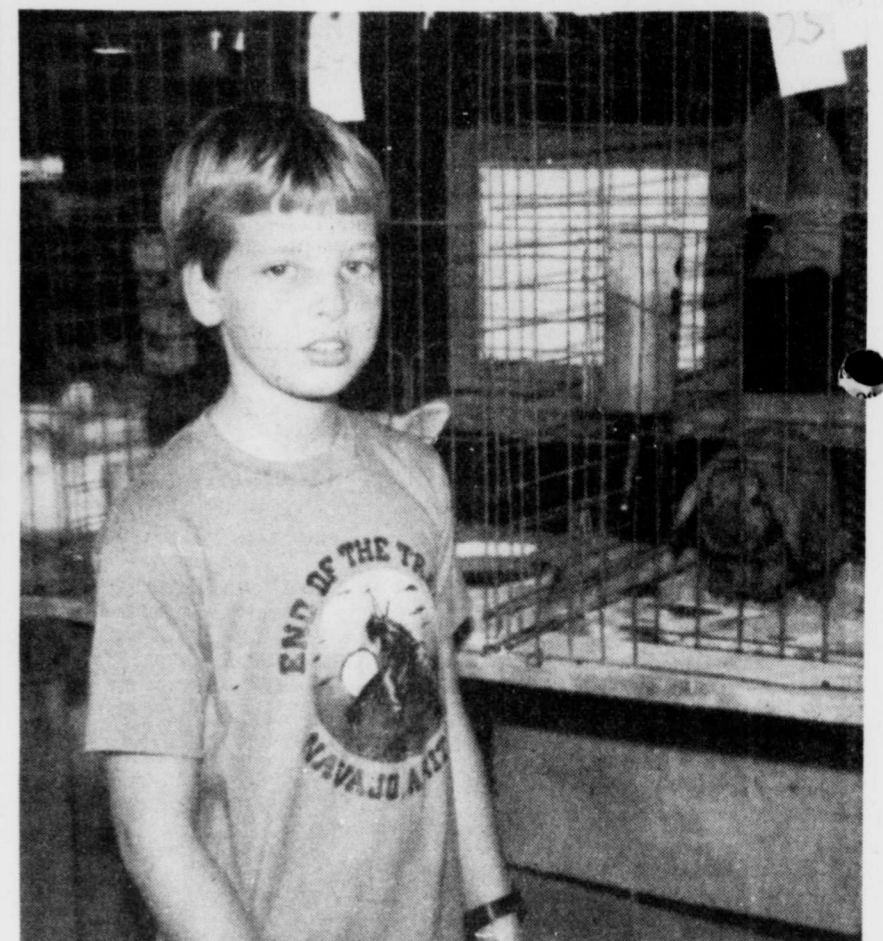


THIS LIMOUSIN cow and calf owned and shown by Shane Joplin of Bogata at the Red River Coun-
