

#### Texas A&M Lists Entrance Requirements

GUNSMOKE

Requirements for admission to Texas A&M University and to clarify points relating to the new core curriculum that will be required for students entering TAMU in the 1988 Fall semester have been outlined.

12 MARBLEHEAD CROOK/CHASE

Two years of foreign language in high school is not a requirement for admission to TAMU. Rather, the requirement of a foreign language may be met either in high school or in college. That is, students must complete a two semester sequence of a foreign language in college unless they have completed two years of a foreign language in high school. In fact, a student may meet the requirement by demonstrating proficiency in a language other than English.

Similarly, computer science in high school is not a requirement for admistion requirement rather than an entrance requirement.

A student may be admitted to Texas A&M University who completes the "regular" high school program, the advanced high school program, or the advanced high school honors program. That is, the requirements for admission to TAMU remain as follows: English-4 units: Social Science; 21/2 units; Mathematics-3 units; Science-2 units; Electives-41/2 units

TAMU now requires either the Scholastic Aptitude Test or the American College Test as part of its admission procedures. If a student is in the top 10% of the graduating class, there is no minimum SAT or ACT score.

For students planning on a major in agriculture at TAMU, it is encouraged to advise students to enroll sion. Again, this is a TAMU gradua- in high school agricultural science





#### **Keeping Healthy**

Anti-Anxiety Drugs

Patients given widely prescribed benzodiazepine drugs for anxiety symptoms may be vulnerable to such withdrawal symptoms as insomnia, fatigue, restlessness, tremulousness, nausea, and anorexia. On high dose, long-term therapy, withdrawal seizures have also been reported to be a serious potential concern.

At the IVth World Congress of Biological Psychiatry meeting in Philadelphia recently, Dr. Karl Rickels, Professor of Psychiatry and Pharmacology at the University of Pennsylvania, reported that, in contrast, the new nonbenzodiazepine compound buspirone (BuSpar), currently awaiting FDA approval, has not been found to cause withdrawal symptoms even upon abrupt discontinuation

Dr. Rickels concluded that "the incidence and severity of withdrawal are significantly more marked with benzodiazepine medication than with buspirone.'






