What is important is the common joy parents take in their children...the pleasure most of us find in the outdoors...the little things in life that are, essentially, what life is all about.

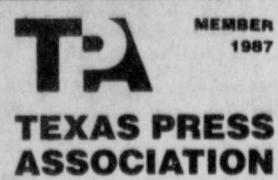

Texas Economy Should Show Growth

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday issued a state revenue estimate that reconfirms previous reports from his office that the Texas economy will show modest growth in 1988-89.

The report, provided in accordance with a provision in this year's ap-

propriation bill, also shows that the state could have a 1989 ending balance of nearly \$200 million in the General Revenue Fund.

According to the estimate, most of the gain in the ending balance is the result of \$133 million in vetoes by the Governor.

The estimate also notes that the state closed its books for the 1987 fiscal year \$745 million in the red, which is about \$267 million smaller, than anticipated last July.

The estimate pointed out that the \$267 was an "artificial improvement" in what was projected to be a billion-

dollar deficit because spending was simply postponed until the 1988 fiscal year.

Bullock's estimate showed that he now forecasts the price of a taxable barrel of oil at \$17.40 for 1988 and \$18.00 for 1989, up about \$1.00 a barrel each year.

Bullock attributed the oil price increase to continued stability in world oil markets, but cautioned that declining Texas oil production would actually result in 22% less tax income from oil.

Capps Insurance was approved as insurance carrier for property, general liability, professional liability and broiler and pressure vessel for the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. during the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held Tuesday, October 13.

The Board also approved the minutes of the last meeting, payment of bills, budget changes and the 1987 tax roll. The tax report and adjustment were accepted and the transportation report was accepted with mileage cost set at 1.007 per mile for co-curricular trips.

The Board adopted the resolution relating to Proposition No. 1 concerning election of state Board of Educa-

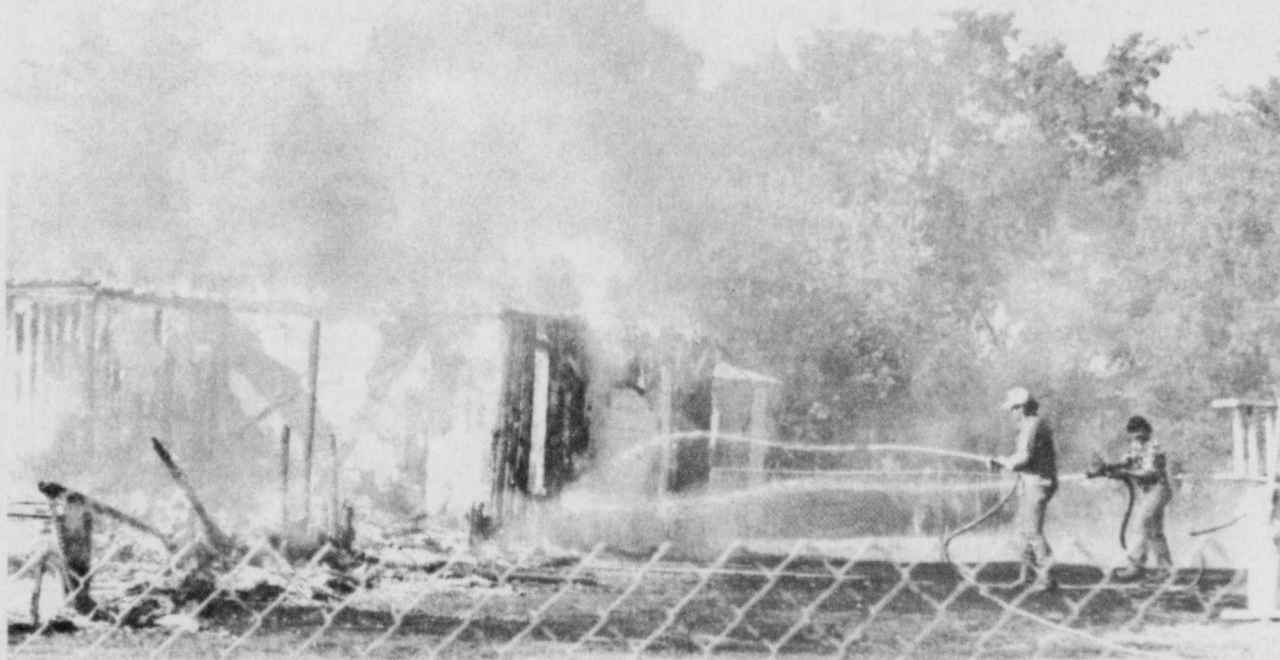
tion members.

Bogata To Get "No Parking" Signs

The motion was approved by the council to appoint a committee to look at other City Hall buildings and investigate and report on the investigation at the next meeting. H.E. Bryson was appointed as chairman of the committee.

The council approved the annexation of the Texas-New Mexico property on Hwy. 271.

An ordinance regulating closing time for game rooms in the City was discussed. The issue was tabled and Mayor Harbison was to discuss the ordinance with owners of the game rooms.

The dates for clean-up were set for November 20-21. Customers will be advised to call in by Thursday, Nov. 19 at 5 p.m. for pick-ups.

Council approved the payment of \$55 for charges of cleaning out the septic tank and new lines to be laid at

the Community House.

Mayor Harbison was given authority by the Council to confer with Jim Carroll with Texas Industrial Disposal, Inc. on providing trash pick-up services at a price lower than what the city is now paying.

Water Superintendent Tony Mauldin reported that he had applied for Highway Permit for work on sewer on Hwy. 37 North and that the culvert at Mike Fenner's needs to be moved and was to be moved this week.

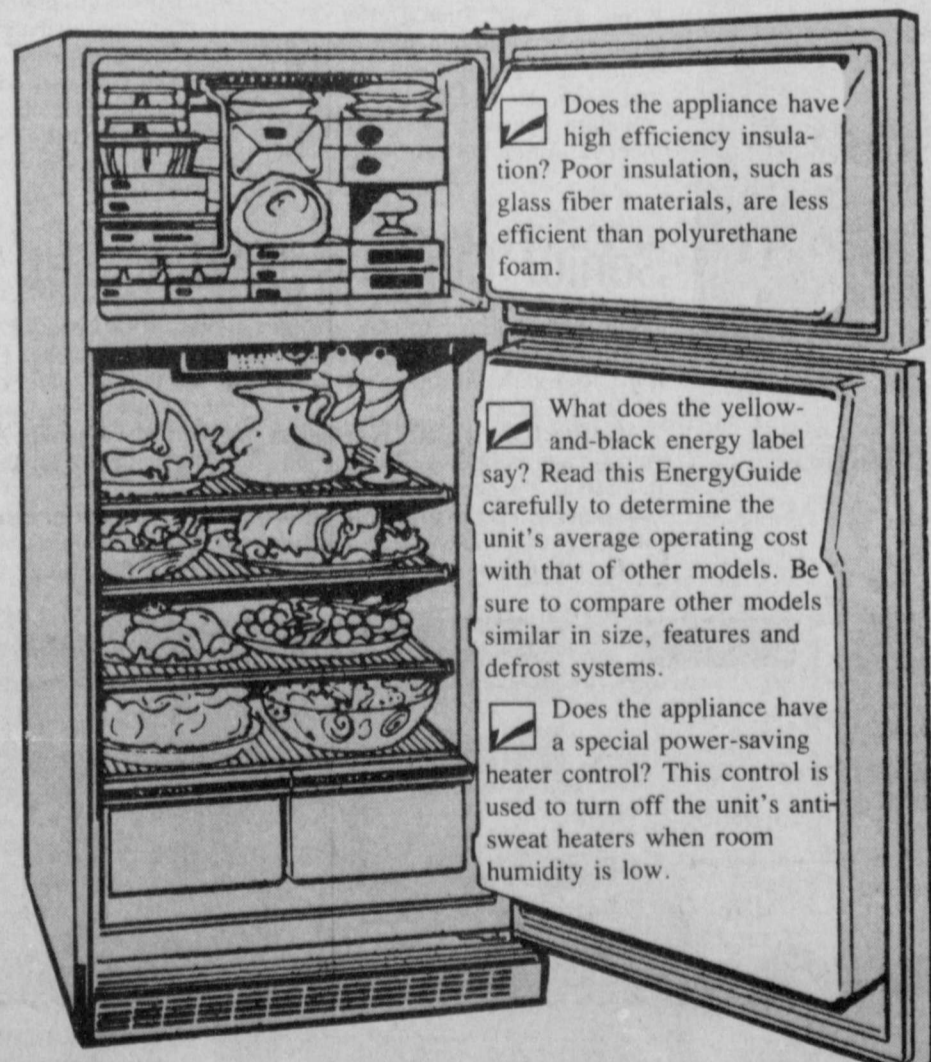

Mailbox Vandalism, Everyone Loses

Through rain, sleet, snow or dead of night, the U.S. Mail gets delivered to postal customers across the nation. The elements of nature don't stop letter carriers from getting the mail into a customer's mailbox, but sometimes mailbox vandalism does.

Mailbox vandalism comes in a variety of shapes and sizes from the placement of objects inside the mailbox to the actual theft or destruction of the mail receptacle. Letter carriers and customers have reported finding bottles, snakes, snails, food, trash and even small animals inside their mailboxes. These items are usually easily removed and do not disrupt the delivery of mail. On the other hand, firecrackers, shotgun pellets, baseball bats, rocks and even an occasional pickup truck usually do enough damage to cause an interruption in mail service until the box is repaired or replaced. Beyond the damage to the boxes, which costs the

postal customer time and money to repair or replace, mailbox vandalism sometimes causes the loss or destruction of valuable and important mail.

U.S. Mail receptacles and the mail inside are protected by Federal law from theft, damage and destruction. The violations are felonies which carry penalties of between three to five years imprisonment and/or fines between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Through the years it has been discovered that the vast majority of incidents of mailbox vandalism are the result of juveniles playing pranks. Juveniles, those under the age of 18, cannot be prosecuted in Federal court, so frequently, even though vandalism is a Federal offense, the local sheriff or police are called upon to investigate. They can respond quickly and usually have a good idea which individuals are most likely to be involved. In addition, juveniles can be prosecuted for vandalism of mailboxes under the State law con-

cerning criminal mischief.

The best way to prevent the destruction and vandalism of mailboxes is through education. Parents with young children should take a few moments to explain the importance of an individual's mail to them. They should also let their older children know that what may be intended as a harmless prank is actually against the law and that everyone involved loses; the prankster who can

end up in jail; the customer who has to pay for the repair or replacement of the damaged mailbox and mail; and the community who pays the local sheriff or police to investigate the incident.

It's your mail, protect it. Any act of vandalism or information concerning vandalism of mailboxes should be immediately reported to the local sheriff or police and to your local postmaster.
