# Pari-Mutuel Betting, Super-Collider Project Top Election Victories

After a predicted low voter turnout Tuesday, election officials were startled to see Texans voting in record numbers.

For the first time in 50 years, Texas will have legalized parimutuel betting as the result of the election.

Also winning was a plan to sell \$500 million in bonds to try and get the

federal government Superconducting Super Collider project.

The measure which would have kept the Texas Board of Education as an appointed panel instead of an elected one failed, however.

The parimutuel measure will allow up to four large tracks, in metropolitan areas. Smaller tracks

would be allowed in any county that approves gambling in a local-option vote.

Dog races would be restricted to Gulf Coast areas.

Voters approved most of the "Build Texas" plan on the ballot, which would make it possible for \$1 billion

in bonds to be issued to build prisons, mental health and retardation facilities and water projects.

A constitutional amendment to issue \$400 million in bonds to help finance public works projects was apparently defeated.

A profile of the entire election seems to indicate that Texas voters were willing to vote for anything that they believed would help the state's economy, creating more jobs and attracting industry to the state.

## Burglars Hit, Suspects Apprehended

Three residences in the Johntown community were burglarized Monday, Nov. 2, and a fire, reported minutes after discoveries of the burglaries, is believed by residents to have been set by the burglars as a diversion.

Dorothy Wilson returned to her home located on Highway 271 around 3 p.m. Monday afternoon to find that burglars had broken in through the back door and ransacked her house. Cabinet drawers were left open and papers were scattered on the floor. Clothes had been pulled from the closets and left lying on the floor. A

sack of pecans had been taken from her refrigerator and poured out onto the floor. Upon further investigation, Mrs. Wilson discovered several food items missing, along with a large flashlight, and a gold chain. She immediately called the County Sheriff's Office.

Mary Lynn Horn, another resident of Johntown, was away from her home approximately 30 or 40 minutes, returning around 6 p.m. As she entered the front door with her two small children, she noticed a bedroom door partially shut and remembered she had left the door open. Opening the door a little more, Mrs. Horn

could see that the bedroom had been burglarized. "Dresser drawers were open and clothes strewn everywhere as if someone had been searching for something," she said. Alarmed at the sight, Mrs. Horn left the house for help. When she returned with help, Mrs. Horn reported that it appeared that the burglars were probably in the house when she first arrived home. Mrs. Horn reported two rings and a knife missing.

Shortly after Mrs. Horn returned to her house with help, a fire was reported at a cabin belonging to Wendell Hervey just back of the Horn house. By the time the Bogata

Volunteer Fire Department could get to the scene, the cabin was in full blaze.

Kathy Hervey, owner of the Johntown Grocery Store arrived at her home around 7 p.m. As she entered through the back door, she saw that the screen had been taken from the kitchen window and the window was open. The Hervey house had also been burglarized. Mrs. Hervey reported that clothes were strewn all over the house from bedroom furniture and closets. She reported several guns missing, bullets and about \$25 in change. There were indications that a gun had been shot in the bedroom and blood was found on the dresser and on clothes pulled from the drawers.

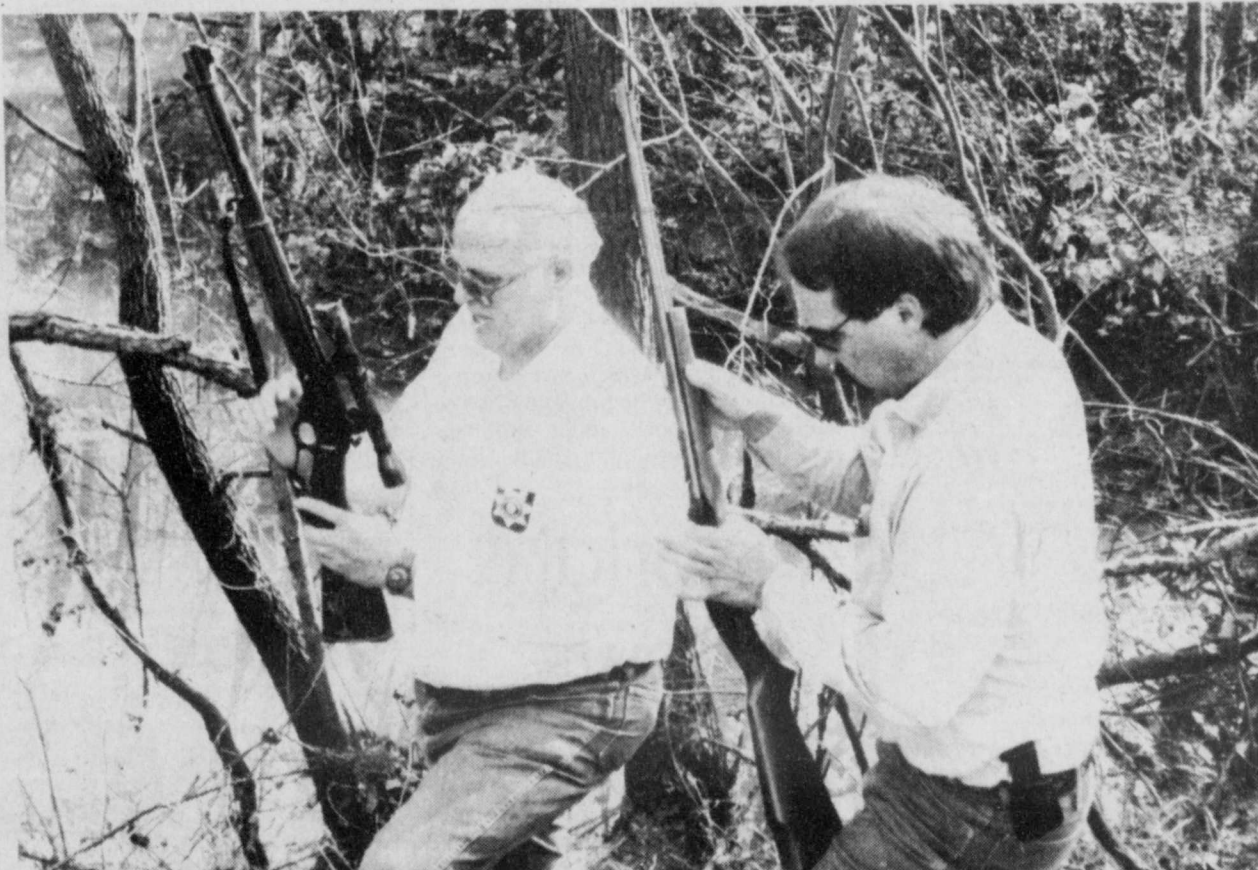
Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 3 around 2 p.m. two juveniles were spotted by

Kathy Hervey and Mary Lynn Horn. One went into Ward's Cash and Carry Grocery in Talco, and was detained inside the store until Red River County and Titus County deputies arrived. The other juvenile was waiting outside the store, apparently for his companion to return.

After deputies arrived, the male juvenile showed deputies rifles and clothing that had apparently been taken from burglarized residences the night before.

Rifles were hidden under the Sulphur River Bridge and the clothing was stashed along the fence line by Highway 271 north of Talco.

The juveniles will remain in custody of Red River County Sheriff's Department pending further investigation of the case. No further details were available at press time.

## Answer Filed By Water District On Lawsuit

The Red River County Water District filed its answer last week to a lawsuit seeking to void the September bond election in which voters narrowly approved construction of the Dimple Reservoir.

Earlier this month, three county residents filed a suit alleging the election was improperly held and asking the court to void it or delay implementation of the results until the water district complies with state law.

The water district has hired Paris attorney Jim D. Lovett to assist its bond attorney in the case. Mr. Lovett stated that the response consisted of a general denial. He said the district will seek a hearing on the suit at the earliest possible date.

The suit alleges the water district

failed to comply with Texas Water Code provisions concerning notice of the election. It also alleges that there has been no confirmation election scheduled for the district's board of directors.

Officials of the Water District have indicated the election was held in accordance with state law and under the advice of their bond attorney, Peter M. Tart of Dallas.

Lovett says that in his opinion the suit against the Water District resulted from a misunderstanding of Texas law and that he hoped to resolve the case in a manner that is least expensive to taxpayers in Red River County.

### Cannon Graduates From Air Force Course

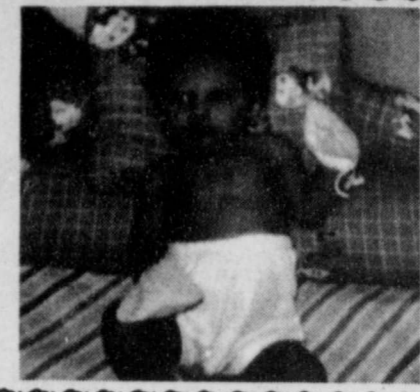

## Rebels Lose To Cooper In Tough Game

The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Cooper last Friday night for a shot at a play-off berth for the Reb team. Rivercrest entered the contest a 22 point underdog to the Bulldogs, but proved a more worthy opponent than most expected.

The Rebs took the opening kick-off and set up on their own 25-yard line. Rebel quarterback Bradley Woods directed the offense as three Rebel backs combined their running talents to cover 75 yards in a drive that consumed nearly seven minutes of the first quarter and took 14 plays before the Rebels scored the first touchdown of the contest. The PAT kick gave Rivercrest a 7-0 lead.

The first Cooper possession only netted the Bulldogs seven yards and a punt on fourth down. The Reb offense fared little better on its next set of downs and also had to punt the ball away.

Cooper attempted to unleash fullback Bam Morris on the Reb defense, only to have Rebels Bradley Woods and Todd Denny combined to throw him for a one yard loss. Two plays later Reb defensive back Jimmy Lewis stepped in front of a Bulldog pass and returned it to the Reb 37-yard line.

But the Reb offense sputtered again and was forced to punt the ball back to the Bulldogs.

Bulldog Bam Morris carried the ball three consecutive plays for 21 yards on the Dogs next possession. A second down pass from Cooper quarterback Chris Partain to Stacy Miller put the Bulldogs on the scoreboard and knotted the score at seven each.

Rivercrest took the ensuing kick off and pushed the ball to their own 33. The Rebs managed one first down before the Bulldogs forced another punt.

The Bulldogs set up on their own 42-yard line, following a Reb punt. Morris ran the ball four times for 50 yards of the 58 needed to score as the Bulldogs scored to go ahead 14-7.

The Bulldogs provided the only scoring threat in the latter part of the first half. But a Bam Morris fumble in the endzone stifled the Dogs chance to go further ahead of the Rebels. The half ended with the Bulldogs holding a 14-7 lead.

Cooper opened the third quarter on their own 45, but a Brad Lancaster fumble gave the Rebels the ball on the Cooper 47.

The Reb offense only squeaked out one yard before punting. The Dogs managed two first downs before the Reb defense forced a Bulldog punt.

Rebel Marvin Anderson returned the punt nearly 60 yards for what appeared to be a Rebel TD, but a Reb penalty brought the TD back and pushed the ball back to the Rebel 24-yard line.

Undaunted by the bad luck, Rebels began a drive that included two key passes on third downs. The first, a 20-yard gainer from Woods to Anderson, and a 25-yarder to tight end Dennis Ewing. The next play saw Reb back Scooter Brown turn the corner around the right end and race 29-yards for a Rebel touchdown. The Reb coaches opted to try the two point attempt and scored easily giving the Rebs a 15-14 lead with 2:00 minutes left in the third quarter.

An onside kick by the Rebs proved successful and the Rebels found themselves with the ball near midfield. But the Bulldog defense only allowed the Reb offense four yards before punting.

Cooper wasted little time scoring in eight plays from 83 yards out as the Bulldogs went up 22-15 over Rivercrest.

Rivercrest answered the Cooper score with a drive the Rebs started a drive of their own that would end in a two yard scoring plunge by Geary Savage. The score left the Rebels trailing 22-21. In the event of a tie, the Rebs were behind in penetrations beyond the opponents' 20-yard line. So a PAT kick would tie the game but award the game to the Bulldogs, who led by one penetration. So the Rebs opted for the two point conversion. But a pass attempt fell incomplete in the endzone and the Bulldogs held on to a 22-21 lead.

The Bulldogs returned the kick off to the 50, and followed the strong run-

ning of Morris and Lancaster to score the final TD of the contest, sealing a 29-21 victory for the Bulldogs.

This week the Rebels host the Wolfe City Wolves at Rebel Stadium. This will be the final game of the season for the Rebels and the final game for the seniors of the Rebel team. Game time is set for 7:30 in Johntown.

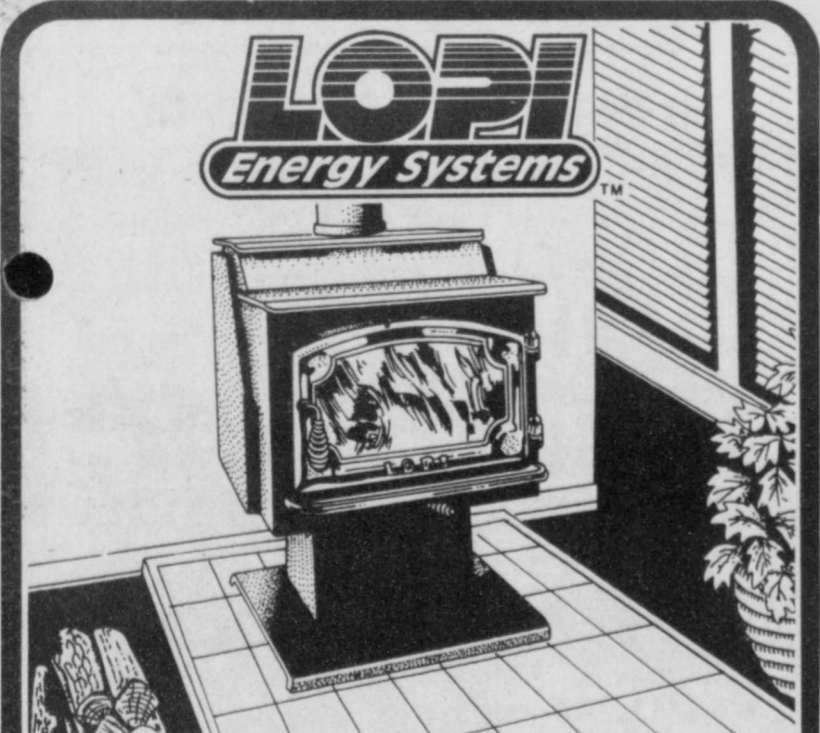

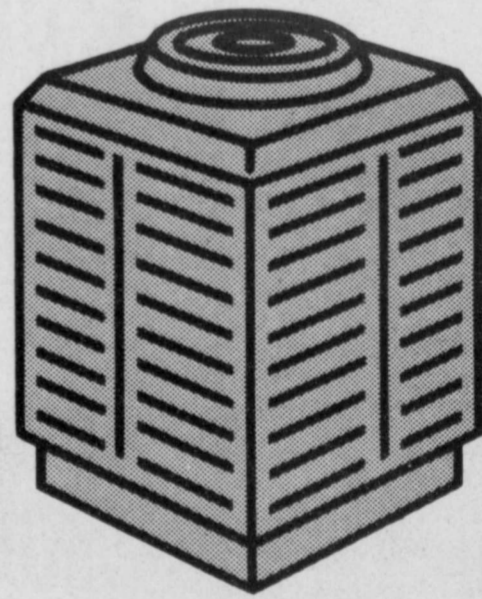

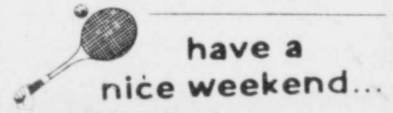
