Palette Of Color Marks Autumn Season

October provided some rare opportunities this year for fall foliage appreciation, as dry weather early in the month set up a perfect color-

creating situation.

Heavy rains and high winds have generally ended the palette of colors that motorists and hikers have been enjoying up until this week, however.

Before it came to an end, numerous area residents took advantage of mild, sunny days to travel up into Oklahoma, Arkansas or south Texas

to view roadsides ablaze with color. What plants and trees create this show? They are many and varied.

Maples provide one of the finest sources of color, ranging from dark red to a gorgeous yellow-red or even pure golden.

Hickory provides splashes of brilliant yellow with their large oblong leaves and shuck, the glowing wine-red bushes on the fence rows, counterpoint the taller trees.

Virginia Creeper frequently shows the trunks of trees in an autumn afghan of delicate color, and sassafras on sandy land is astonishingly bright.

One of the real surprises of the fall season is poison ivy. It's all too familiar three leaf cluster changes from a dark green into a glorious bright red or orange...but beware, the same rash-creating properties of summer still remain!

Sweetgum, the hackberry turn yellow and send leaves scuttling

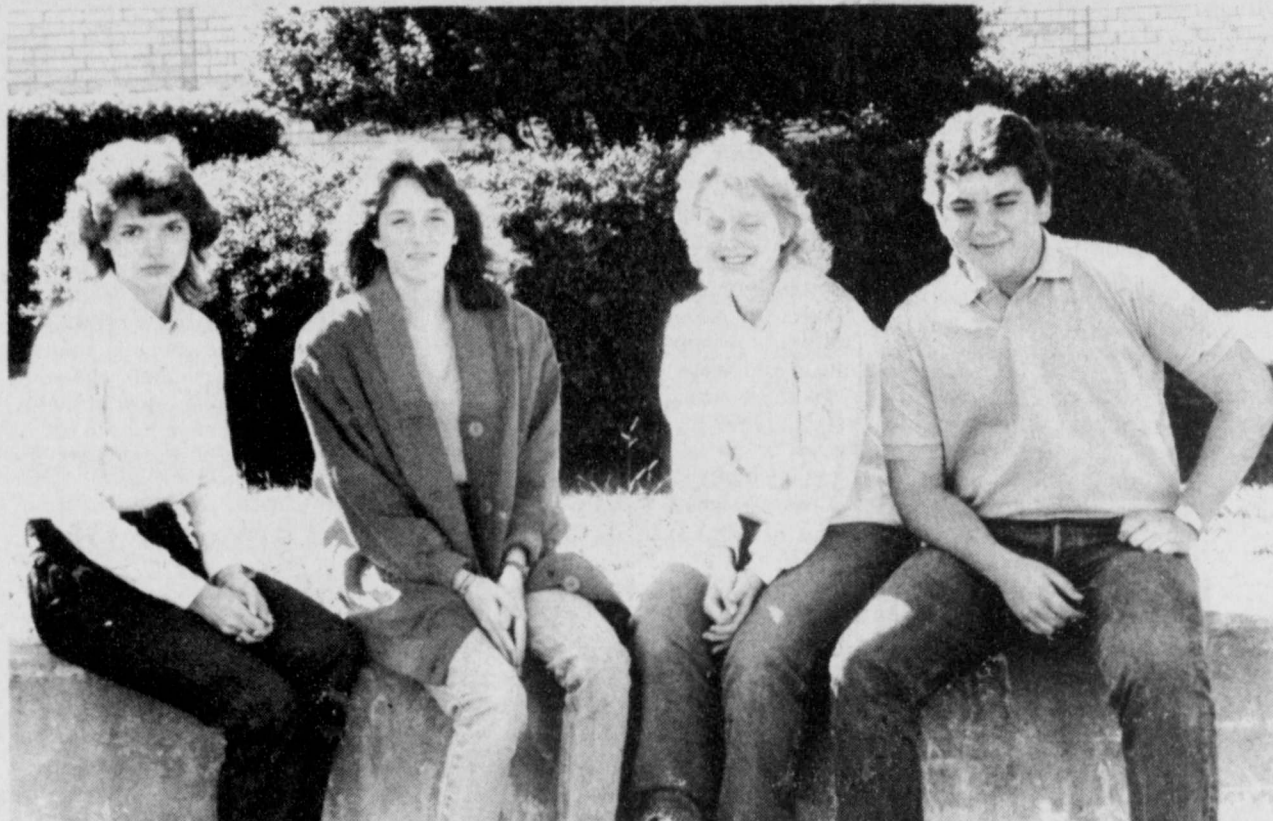
through the breezes.

Another surprise is the often-ignored bois 'd arc tree. All along roadsides, fence rows and creeks, the bois 'd arc casts a canopy of brilliant yellow, interspersed with the round globes of yellow-green fruit that squirrels delight in.

To add a muting, subtle tone to the whole natural palette are various other trees which turn, but not to the fiery colors one associates with fall.

Pecans and some oak trees provide a softening influence on the woods and roadsides. Darker and more dramatic than ever are the cedars and pines to that furnish even more contrast.

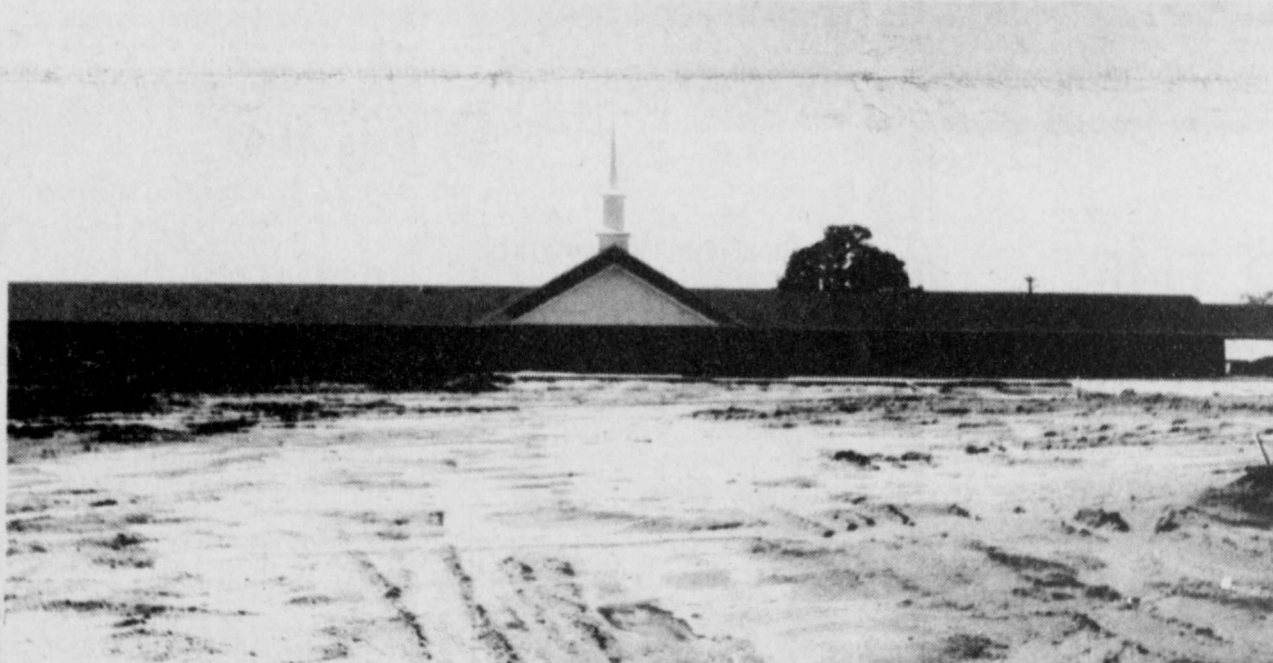
The whole choreography of color is a delight to the eye and to the soul. Fragile, the rains and winds of winter have swept it away, except from the hearts of those who have taken advantage of one of the loveliest autumn seasons in years, and carry it inscribed in their memories.

Bogata First Baptist Church Completed

The new Baptist church building is now completed and the first service in the new facilities is scheduled for Sunday, November 14. The building consists of 18,660 square feet and includes a sanctuary, choir room, offices and a fellowship hall.

The former church building was destroyed by fire in November of last year, making the construction of the

new building necessary. The congregation chose to relocate north of Bogata across from Huddleston's Grocery Store.

Church services have been held in the gymnasium of the Bogata Assembly of God Church since the fire.

"We are so grateful for the kindness shown to us by the Assembly of God Church in allowing us to use their

facilities," said Rev. Posey, pastor of the Baptist Church. "And," he added, "I am speaking for the entire congregation when I say thank you to them for their patience with us during the past months."

A dedication service is planned for a later date and will be scheduled at a time convenient for members of other churches to attend.

Five Inches Of Rain Drench Area

Rebs Close Out Season With Win

The Rivercrest Rebels ended their 1987 campaign with a 20-7 win over the Wolfe City Wolves in Johntown last week.

The win improved the Rebs record to 5-4-1, quite an improvement over last season's 1-9 record. And the future looks even brighter for the 1988 season. The Rebs will only be losing five senior starters and returning a host of talented young players that should provide an exciting football season.

Wolfe City got on the scoreboard first in this contest, following a Rebel fumble that gave the Wolves good field position at the Reb 30-yard line. The Wolfe City pack score came with two minutes left in the first quarter.

Rivercrest started their first scoring drive on their own 16. Bradley Woods, Marcus Savage and Scooter Brown split the running chores as they pushed the ball to the WC 27-yard line. On a third and four play, Scooter Brown followed his line enroute to a 27-yard scamper for the Rebs first TD, knotting the score at 7 each.

The Rivercrest defense forced Wolfe City to turn the ball over on fourth down. The Rebel offense took over on their own 6-yard line. A 27-yard burst by Brown and a Wolfe City penalty moved the ball near midfield. Several plays later, the Rebs found themselves faced with a fourth and three situation when Scooter Brown ran around the right end and raced into the endzone from 42 yards out. With two minutes left in the half, the Rebs had a 14-7 edge.

The third quarter proved to be a

defensive struggle as neither team mounted a scoring threat, and ended the quarter trading punts several times.

Rivercrest provided some offensive spark early in the fourth quarter as senior Marvin Anderson returned a Wolfe City punt for 45 yards and a TD only to have it called back by a Rebel penalty. Two plays later, Rivercrest fumbled the ball away to the Wolves on the WC 40-yard line, who fumbled the ball to the Reb offense on the Rivercrest two yard line several plays later.

The Rebels pushed the ball out to the 23-yard line before a host of Rebel penalties brought the ball back to the 5-yard line. Bradley Woods booted a 39-yard punt to the Wolves but again the Wolves were plagued with an untimely fumble giving the Rebels the ball on their own 33.

Two plays later the Rebs coughed up the ball also on the Rivercrest 34. Wolfe City moved to the Reb 18-yard line when Rebel defensive back Jeremy Abshire stepped in front of a Wolfe City pass and returned it to the Reb 22. Brown advanced the ball to the 23 and on the following play, Bradley Woods swept around the left end for a 77-yard touchdown spring with 35 seconds left in the contest. The final TD of the contest gave the Rebels a 20-7 victory, ending the 1987 football season.

Rivercrest amassed 336 yards rushing and 33 yards passing for the evening. Scooter Brown led all runners with 156 yards followed by Woods with 85 yards. The Rebels also received

outstanding play on both sides of the line from seniors Todd Denny, John Purviance and Sammy Sparger. Senior defensive back Marvin Anderson led the Rebel secondary with a super performance at cornerback. These seniors will be sorely missed next year but the addition of new talent to an already explosive Rebel team should provide for an even brighter season.
