Rural School Education
 Week at the University

The University of Texas is doing a great work for the rural school education in Texas. The University is supported by taxation of the people, and is under business obligation to render back services to each citizen and to all the people. In a general sense the University fulfills this obligation by sending educated young men and woman back into their home community to carry with them the culture of a broader outlook.

It is conceded by the student of education generally that the greatest field of needed work is in a proper solution of the rural school problem. Secondary and higher education within our country have attained a satisfactory degree of excellency and efficiency. The University is offering its services in this work.

The University is striving to broaden its scope of work, to extend its interest and service to all parts of the state, and to bring its benefits within the reach of as many individuals as possible. It offers free bulletins and free help in improving school houses. The modern up-to-date school houses built during the past three or four years is the result of the efforts of the University. It has extended its help to all teachers through the

department of extension. It offers summer schools for the convenience of students and teaches who are unable to attend the long session. It offers correspondence-instruction to teachers by mail. The department of extension offers instruction in public welfare, information and exhibits, speaking and debate. In this way the University is doing a great work for the rural schools in Texas.

The writer has just attended the Rural School Education Week at the University. The program of the summer school gives one week to the rural education. The University secures the best informed lecturers or speakers to discuss the problems of the country schools. The program is arranged for the benefit of the rural school life in Texas. The county superintendents in Texas attend this week of free lectures and discussion. Any county that fails to send its county superintendent loses much in the progress of its own schools.

The University is serving not only its resident students but also the entire community. It offers its assistance to teachers, boards of school trustees, to school organizations, to various clubs, and to the communities in general.

Every rural school should be doing something to make improvements in the country life

for the boys and the girls. Every board of school trustees should be business like in the consideration of their duties and responsibilities. Good teachers, by all means, should be selected; well equipped school houses should be provided; longer terms of school and better attendance must be brought about if our boys and girls in the country are educated.

What Eggs are Made of.

The white of an egg is nearly seven-eighths water, the balance being nearly pure albumen. The yolk is slightly less than one-half water. These figures apply approximately to the eggs of turkeys, hens, geese, ducks and guinea fowls. To show how nearly alike the eggs of various domestic fowls are in respect to composition, the following figures are given by the department of agriculture: Hen's eggs—50 per cent water, 16 per cent protein, 36 per cent fat. Duck's eggs—46 per cent water, 17 per cent protein, 36 per cent fat. Goose eggs—44 per cent water, 19 per cent protein, 36 per cent fat. Turkey eggs—48 per cent water, 18 per cent protein, 33 per cent fat. Of course farmers understand that protein goes to make muscle and blood. Fat of course is fuel for running the body machine. Thus it will be seen that eggs, though half or nearly half water, are extremely nutritious containing all the elements required for the building and support of the human body. But the old saying that an egg contains as much nutriment as a pound of beefsteak is far from correct. It would be nearer the fact to estimate a pound of eggs as equal to a pound of lean beefsteak in nourishing power.—Cal. Cultivator.

Call the Best Bolls for Seed.

The average farmer picks his cotton as it opens, gins it, sells lint and seed, and then, about the last of the season, hauls home seed enough for next year's planting. In this way as a rule he saves the latest and the poorest seed.

If, when the cotton begins to open, the farmer, with as much intelligent help as the crop will warrant, will go through the field and select the early big bolls that are grown on short-jointed, vigorous, well-fruited stalks until he has saved enough for next year's planting, and would have this seed ginned to itself and carefully stored where it will not heat, it is safe to say that the next season's crop would ripen ten or fifteen days earlier than the average of this year's crop, and that the yield would be practically doubled.

It would be just as reasonable to shake down the apples promiscuously from a tree and take them to the Fair, hoping to win a premium in competition with a man who had selected only the choicest specimens, as to turn all your stock loose to breed indiscriminately—instead of forcing the survival of the fittest by the most rigid selection—and expect to improve your stock, as it is to plant seed of any kind without selecting with the greatest care the most vigorous and the best, and hope for good results.

It is fair to say that ten per cent of the cotton seed selected as above suggested, is infinitely superior to the average of the other ninety per cent; therefore if you plant only the average of the whole you invite deterioration at nine to one.

Every cotton grower, from the man who raises one bale to the man who raises one hundred bales, can very greatly increase his yield and his profit by this simple and inexpensive method. This is something that you can do in your own field; try it.
