All Voting Boxes Open For Run-Offs

Red River County Clerk Mary Hausler announced Thursday that all voting boxes here would be open for the Tuesday, April 12 Second Democratic Primary Election.

In the run-off elections, Clayton L. Hall will face incumbent Thomas H. Fowler for County Attorney; incumbent H. Drue Pirtle will be opposed by Gene Lampard for Precinct One Commissioner; and Bob W. Long will be pitted against Mary Perkins for the District 8 seat on the State Board of Education, Hausler said.

"All boxes will be open," Democratic Party Chairman John W. Hood explained. "At first, we thought all but 11 of the boxes would be open and that's the way it was printed in The Clarksville Times. I think that may have confused some people."

The county voting boxes will open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday for voters to cast their ballots at these locations: Box 1, Precinct 1, Clarksville, Col-



Major Crimes In Texas **Moderately** Increased

The overall number of major crimes showed a moderate increase in Texas last year, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

All four violent crime categories went down, with murder decreasing by 13.1 percent and rapes declining by 6.3 percent. Robbery cases fell by 4.9 percent and aggravated assault was down by 1.9 percent.

Thefts were up by seven percent, burglaries by 4.1 percent and motor vehicle thefts by 3.6 percent.

The crime rate, computed by population, increased to 7,724.3 crimes per 100,000 persons in 1987. The rate was 7,408.2 in 1986. The Census Bureau's Texas population estimate rose by 107,000 to 16,789,000.

The overall clearance percentage of major crimes in Texas last year was 20 percent, the same as noted in

Reproted arsons were down 5.1 percent in 1987, with 8,513 cases reported compared to 8.974 the previous year.

The total number of drug arrests in the state decreased by four percent last year with 873,554 reported compared to 909,805 in 1986. DWI arrests in Texas added up to 114,525 a six per-

The value of property stolen during the commission of index crimes was estimated at over \$1.467 billion, with the value of property recovered by Texas police officers last year estimated at \$605 million.

Seven law enforcement officers were killed by criminal action during he course of duty in the state last year, whiel duty-related accidents caused four deaths. The number of assaults on Texas officers increased by three percent in 1987 to 4,515.

The crime statistics were compiled based on reports provided by 805 law enforcement agencies in Texas which together represent 99.9 percent of the state's population.

It's Planting Time For Some Crops

By Paul D. Payne

The soil temperature remains very cold as the latest cold front has kept the temperatures below desired ranges. Much of the area's corn crop was lanted during the last week with the remainig corn, grain sorghum and soybeans to be planted once the soil warms.

Just when is it safe to plant what crop? The average minimum temperatures for planting are as follows: corn, 50 degrees; cotton, 65 degrees; sorghum, 55 degrees and soybeans, 70 degrees.

Hardy vegetables such as onions, cabbage and potatoes can be planted once soil temperatures range between 45 and 50 degrees while warm season vegetables such as melons, peas and beans need soil that has warmed into

Based on research that has been conducted in Lamar County for the past three years, early maturing soybean variety groups should be planted in early April. In 1987, there were 10 of the early maturing varieties planted at three times on April 7, April 17 and May 21. Those planted April 7 averaged 42.7 bushes while the April 17 planting averaged 29.8 bushels and the last one averaged 20.2 bushels. This was on upland blackland.

By delaying the planting 10 days from April 7 to 17, the production dropped 13 bushels for a loss of \$63 per acre. By delaying planting another month the yield dropped another 91/2 bushels for another \$47 loss. So it pays in our area to get the early maturing varieties planted in early April weather permitting.

The same general trend in production loss occurred in the 1986 research work on the Melvin Webb farm. Eight early maturing varieties were planted on April 16, May 5 and May The average yield was received at the three planting dates: 28.1, 20.0 and 16.4. Note tht the average yield of varieties planted on April 16, 1986 and April 17, 1987 was about the same.

A further study of the 1986 results reveals that all eight varieties decreased in yield a like amount with each delay in dat eof planting. We also found that plant height increased and distance to first pod from soil line increased as the date of planting was

We believe the research information overwhelmingly suggest that blackland soybean producers should strive to plant the early maturing varieties between April 1 and 15. It is doubtful that the soil temperature will permit an earlier planting date.

Some Wheat Has Rust

Yes, Virginia, we do have rust on wheat in Lamar County. In fact, Stripe Rust is heavy on some fields in the Chicota bottoms in northern Lamar County. Not every field in that area is infested and wheat in the Direct, Petty and Brookston area are virtually rust free.

It appears that the fields of wheat with the severe infestation should be treated as soon as the weather will allow aerial application. We have determined based on previous demonstration and research work that a yeild potential of 40 bushes should exist before fungicide can be

Most area wheat should have a 40 bushel yield potential as the less fertile soils hav ebeen taken out of production. Producers are doing a better job of managing the wheat planted by planting improved varieties that have some disease and insect resistance.

Producers are encouraged to frequently check their wheat fields by walking out into the wheat rather than windshielding the crop. In the early stages of rust development, wheat may appear to be normal from the road, yet have lots of rust on the lower leaves.

The aim of wheat disease prevention is to protect the flag leaf and possibly the leaf just below the flag leaf. We call this growth stage 8. Our wheat is not at this stage yet. So, the next two to three weeks will be

critical. Two systemic fungicides now available to the wheat producer are Bayleton and Tilt. Four ounces of either of these are recommended in

five gallons of water. It is generally believed that they have a long resideral effect in the plant three weeks or so. Satisfactory results have also been obtained in previous years by applying two ounces of Bayleton and two pounds of Manzate or Dithane.

Manzate or Dithane are contact fungicides and come in a wettable powder. The wettable powder feature is disliked by aerial applicators as it is difficult to get them dissolved and into suspension.

Due to the present disease threat to the wheat crop, a wheat disease breakfast meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, April 5 at 7 a.m. at the Holiday Inn in Paris. The purpose of the short meeting will be to give producers an update on the disease situation.

Not since the mid-19th century have settlers crossed this area in their covered wagons, laboring toward a promised land.

On Monday, however, a modernday wagon train rolled into Bogata. Five covered wagons drawn by a dozen horses and mules brought a group of travelers to the Community Center for a night's rest along a nine-

day journey through northeast Texas. While most of the early settlers were hopeful novices on a perilous journey across thousands of bonejolting miles of wilderness, today's trailblazers make their way along a carefully planned route on wagons with rubber tires

year," Boyd said. "We loaded into a stationwagon and made the route, decided where we wanted to go, what we wanted to see and then got permission to stay where we needed to.'

The trail began Saturday morning when the wagons left DeKalb for Boxelder; from there, they made their way to Clarskville and on to Bogata. The route will take them to Mt. Vernon, Mt. Pleasant, Wilkerson, Bassett and back to DeKalb by next Monday.

The wagons were designed and built by each of the owners and vary from the basic prairie schooner to the sophisticated wagon being completed by the Phillips which has all the conveniences of a camper trailer.

"It takes a lot of work to do anything like this," Jean Phillips said. "You really have to love what you're doing.




