Way Cleared For Industrial Development

A major industrial, recreational and residential development on the Shawnee Creek Ranch property in southeastern Red River County moved closer to reality Tuesday.

Th new board of the Red River County Industrial Development Corporation, appointed by the Commissioners' Court only last Friday, held its organizational meeting at 10:00 a.m. on May 31 and hours later made a conditional decision to authorize an \$8 million taxable revenue bond issue in the Corporation's name. The authorization is subject to a number of conditions to protect the Corporation against any liability

After The News went to press last week, the former board of the Industrial Development Corporation, whose members included James Vaughn, Cab Wolf, Tommy Reep, Billy Sam Allen, and Dick Goodman, declined reappointment, thus permitting the Commissioners' Court to appoint a new board. Members of the former board are said to have favored

clearing the way for the Shawnee Creek project, but to have been unwilling to act against the advice of corporation attorney Austin Guest. Guest, well-known for his long record of contributions to community projects, including legal services provided without charge, had been counsel to the Development Corporation throughout its eight-year life. In the present case, Guest apparently took a position on substance, although not a member of the board.

The newly appointed board, whose members were appointed by the Commissioners' Court in a special session on May 27 has seven members: Olen Douglas and Alan Hale of Clarksville. Buford Hervey of Johntown, James Wood of Bogata, (Mrs.) Ivas Robinson of Avery, George Beaman of English and Avery and Bobby Brem

At the organizational meeting Tuesday, James Wood was elected President; Alan Hale, Vice-president; and George Beaman, Secretary. Ivas

Robinson was subsequently elected Treasurer.

In acceptance remarks, president Wood noted the county's need for industry and pledged the Board's best efforts to encourage industrial activity. He stressed the view that industry in any part of the county was good for every part, and said th etime for jealousies and rivalries was past. Vice-president Hale noted that members of the new board were representative of the entire county, not a single area.

The text of the conditional resolution authorizing revenue bonds had not yet been cleared and was expected to be telexed from Austin later in the day. Wood scheduled a second meeting for 6:00 p.m., at which time, after brief discussion, the authorization was passed by unanimous vote.

"This is a first step, and we hope there will be more, to encourage industry to bring jobs to Red River County," Wood said. "Our action doesn't certify the project's creditworthiness nor its compliance with Texas regulatory laws and regulations. That's the job of the lending institution and the Texas Attorney-General and Department of Commerce. Obviously, we hope these conditions will be met and that the project will become a reality.'

An associate of developer Del Clow said after the new Board's decision that he expected Clow would move immediately to exercise his option to buy the 20-square mile Shawnee Creek Ranch and begin site work.

Clow's next task in his program to get the project rolling is to obtain necessary authorizations from the Texas Attorney-General and Department of Commerce.

Construction of the 350-acre lake and the major catfish processing plant that are central features of the project would await actual issuance of the bonds authorized by the Development Corporation, Clow said. A Canadian "thrift" -- a savings and loan association---would buy the bonds, according to Clow.

Also foreseen in the project, which Clow described in earlier visits to the county, are another lake of 33 acres, five large ponds for raising catfish, a lighted airstrip, twenty miles of paved roads, a campground with thirty RV pads, a hunters' dormitory, dog kennels, stables, deer runs, and, eventually, two 100-acre duck lakes. Building lots around the large lake for builders of luxury homes would be sold, and lots for "fourplexes" would

be available at the 33-acre lake. County leaders say the project if it becomes a reality would mean up to two hundred jobs during the construction phase, a smaller number on a continuing basis, and a major increase in the county's tax base. (A larger tax base is good news for taxpayers, as it means tax revenues will be larger without a rise in the tax

"It isn't a reality yet," cautions county Judge L.D. Williamson, who in his private capacity is chairman of the Red River County Industrial Foundation, "but so far, so good."

Board Meeting Considers Classroom Solution

Several parents of Bogata Elementary and Junior High students attended the special called meeting of the Talco-Bogata School Board Tuesday night, May 24 to discuss possible solutions nto the need for more classroom space on the Bogata campus.

Superintendent Harold Cowley explained to the board members and guests that due to House Bill 72, a ratio of one teacher to 22 students will be enforced beginning in September for grades K-4. Mr. Cowley showed the projected enrollment for Talco and Bogata schools as follows, with the Bogata figure listed first: Kindergarten, 25-28; first grade 40-20; second grade, 43-18; third grade, 43-18; fourth grade, 35-24; fifth grade, 45-14; sixth grade, 43-26; seventh grade, 51-17; eighth grade, 38-14.

Mr. Cowley stated that based on these enrollment figures, more personnel will have to be hired for the schools and space provided for two more classrooms on the Bogata campus

Mr. Cowley then presented suggested solutions to the space problem submitted to the administration as

Plan A: Transport Bogata seventh and eighth grades to Talco campus. This solution would involve only transportation costs.

Plan B: Move Bogata and Talco seventh and eighth grades to Rivercrest campus. This plan would in-

volve the cost of five buildings. Plan C: Move all grades, Bogata and Talco, to Rivercrest. This would be a long range plan involving the construction of new school buildings and would be done only with consenting votes of the majority of

communities Plan D: Place a temporary building on the Bogata campus. This plan would involve the cost of one temporary building which would house two classrooms.

Plan E: Move students from one campus to the other in order to balance grades.

Parents attending voiced their concerns regarding transporting students to the Talco campus and stated their preferences to keeping Bogata students on Bogata campus. There were some objections to another temporary building on the Bogata campus from parents and board members.

Other problems discussed were the repairs needed on the Bogata Junior High building and the gymnasium floor. Mr. Cowley also informed those attending of the state's mandate to teach a Light Managemetn class in the eighth grade. The class requires a certified Home Economics teacher.

A final suggestion was presented at the meeting to start school in September with intentions to build a permanent structure on the Bogata campus. Those parents attending stated their willingness to transport the Bogata seventh and eighth grade students to the Talco campus for one semester, until construction of classrooms at Bogata could be completed, if forced to by the State. The School Board is to look into cost of the permanent classrooms on the Bogata campus, available property to buy near the Bogata campus, and the State mandates concerning starting school with the intent to build and have information at the June board meeting.

Mr. Cowley suggested that residents of the communities ask themselves the question, "Where do we want to be five years from now?" and form research groups to consider the needs of the campuses, including repairs, new buildings, and more playground space and look for solutions to these problems.

In other business, the board approved the Amended Recommendation of the Career Ladder.
