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## Geese War Collection Makes Past Live

If anyone would like a glimpse into the past, specifically the second World War, Harold Geese can provide that glimpse.

His collection of memorabilia from World War II includes guns, flags, letters, German and French money, pictures and much, much more. In fact, the collection included enough items to cover a large antique dining table.

During the war, Mr. Geese was in the United States Army, 4th Platoon, Company A, in the Engineering Regiment.

Although the war is many years past, Mr. Geese describes with extreme clarity each person or event he recalls as he thumbs through his thick picture album.

With the same expertise he most likely initiated in the 40's, Mr. Geese mounted a grenade launcher to the

end of his old army rifle, explaining with surity just how it was done, and the uses it had during war time.

Among the most fascinating things in his collection is a diary, kept from 1941 to 1945, his service years.

Scanning the handwritten pages is an almost magical journey back to those war days. All the anxiety he and others felt as the bombers flew overhead, attacking the camp.

The sadness he felt as he wrote about the many Americans he saw killed, while fighting for freedom, the loss of friends, all are revealed in this day to day account of life during a turbulent, difficult time.

At the end of the diary, the tone changes, and the exuberance and pride Geese felt as he recounted the victories and his final days of wartime becomes stronger and stronger.

Mr. Geese generously explained

about many items of interest, and his pride and his devotion to his nation is strong and inspiring.

After a visit to his home, after talking with someone whose patriotism has been tested in the sternest of tests, it is impossible not to ponder on the men and women who fought so bravely for the liberty that each and every American enjoys.

Mr. Geese was among the fortunate ones who lived to come home from that war. Those memories are branded forever in his mind.

Somehow, it is doubtful that he, or other veterans, sees fit to consider burning the flag that they fought for as a "form of free speech". For him, the flag and the collection of war memorabilia, are very real reminders of a desperate time when freedom was at stake. It isn't something they take lightly.

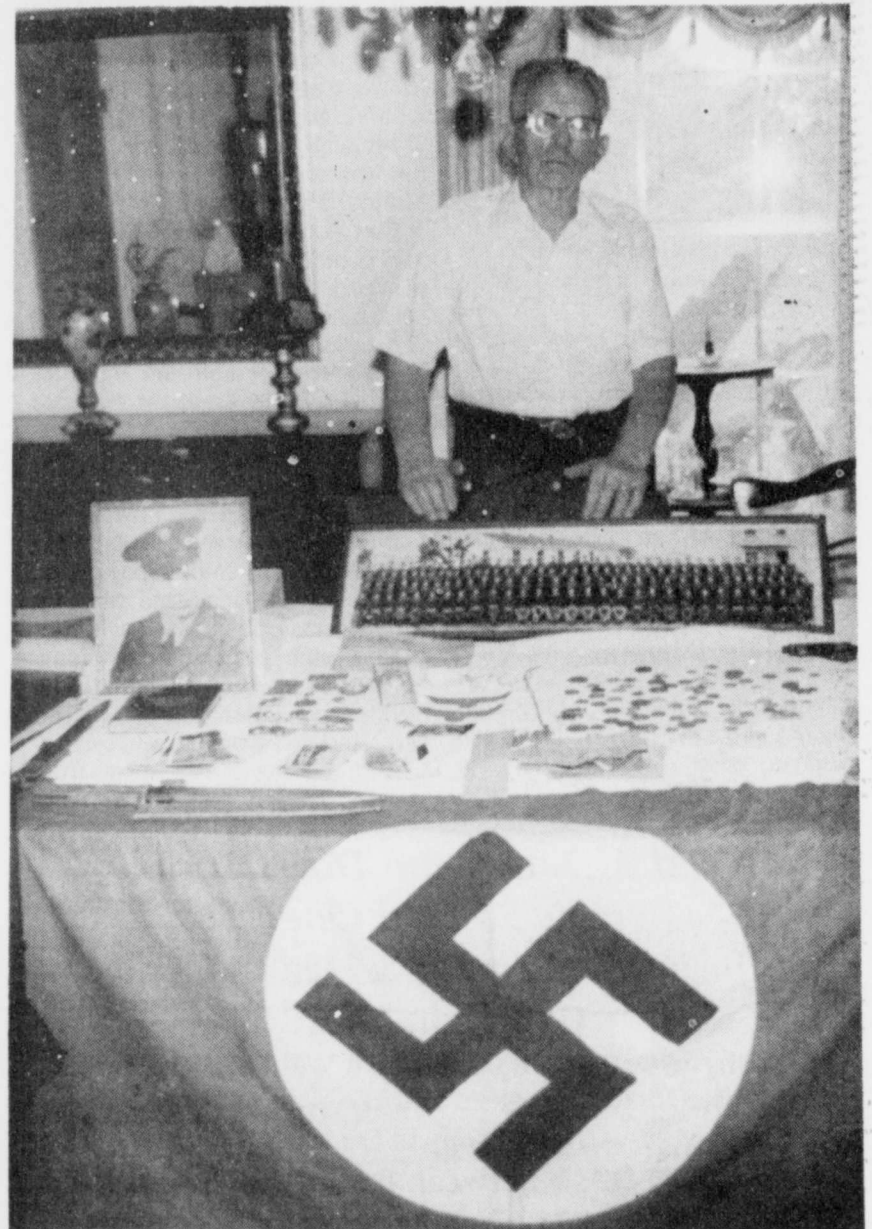

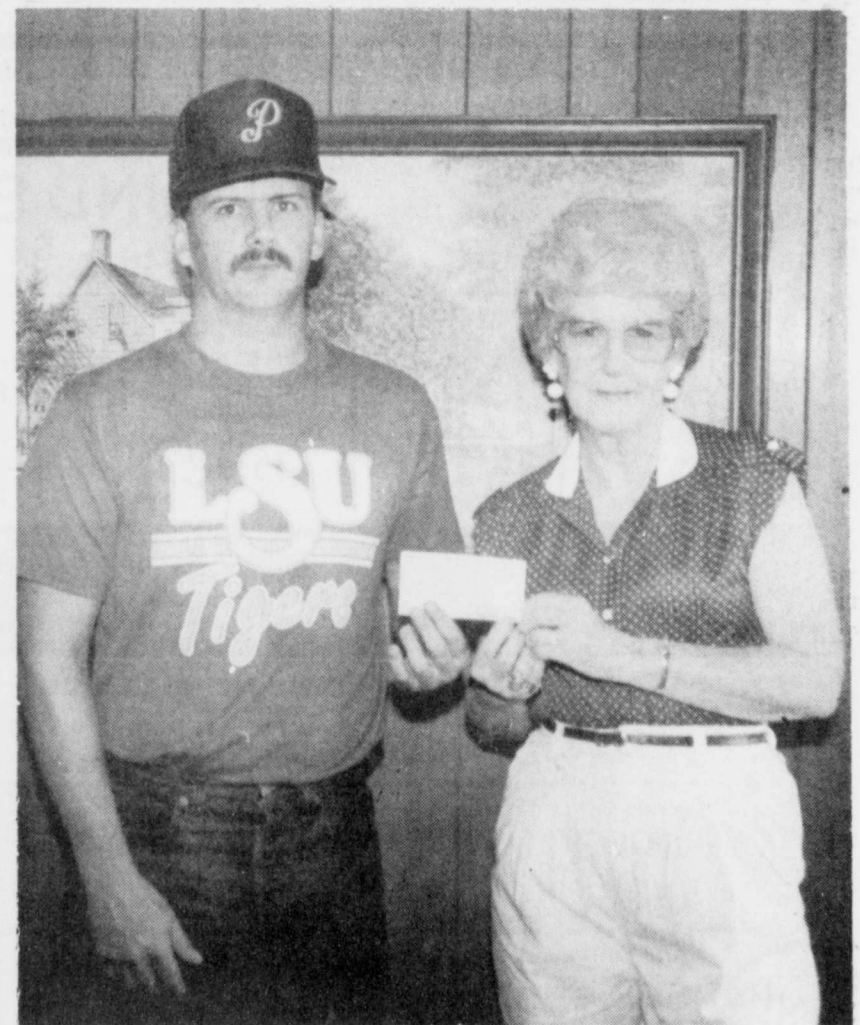
**PARTICIPANTS in the Summer Library Program at Bogata Elementary School heard taxidermist Mark Figueroa tell them about his taxidermy work**

## Abundant Rain Leads To Abundant Mosquitoes

How can anything so very small be such a very big problem? But with the abnormally wet spring, and the continuing rains of this summer, the mosquito is very definitely a big problem.

The fierce, persistent, armed, as everyone knows, with a blood-sucking "beak" and the desire to feed, is everywhere this summer.

Few things are as frustrating as trying to sleep with the irritating whine of a mosquito fading in and out as it zooms in closer, then backs off. Small enough to evade being spotted, the mosquito nevertheless, leaves behind

huge welts that itch fiercely. Fortunately, this part of the world doesn't have to worry about transmission of diseases such as malaria by mosquitoes, so that the welt is about the only result of a bite.

Usual control methods, such as eliminating standing water in outside containers and pots, are nearly useless this year, because of the large amounts of water left standing everywhere.

Old tires, cans, jars or scrap piles make ideal sites for mosquitoes to raise, and usually by July, these sites have gone dry. This year, however, with rain still falling, these places

are continuing to provide excellent breeding spots.

Since some species of mosquitoes can fly up to 10 miles, control efforts are really difficult.

Another by-product of the heavy rains is dense foliage and tall grass, mosquito heaven! Spraying dense shrubbery near or around the home with insecticide such as malathion can help, since that is where the insects concentrate.

Screens should be checked for small holes, and patches applied, in order to help keep them outside.

In order to go fishing, sit on the

porch or have an outdoor patio, some measures must be taken. Insect repellent helps, as do oil of citronella candles or lamps. But remember, it takes a pretty heavy concentration, since outdoors the effects of the repellent dissipate quickly. Bird houses for Purple Martins can provide natural controls, too.

All in all, there is little that can be done about the mosquito except to eliminate as many breeding sites as possible, spray if they are really bad, and hope for dryer weather! Oh, and be prepared to use the ever-useful slap and scratch technique!

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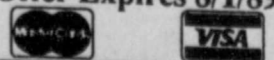
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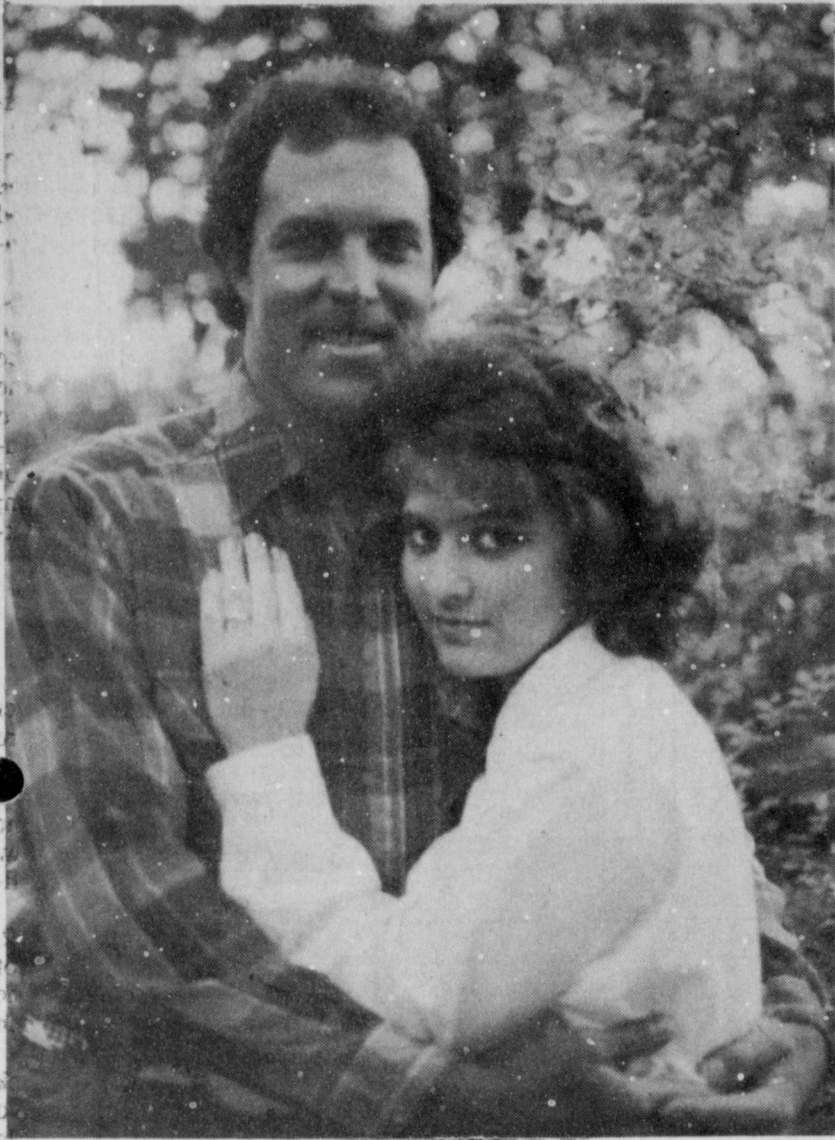

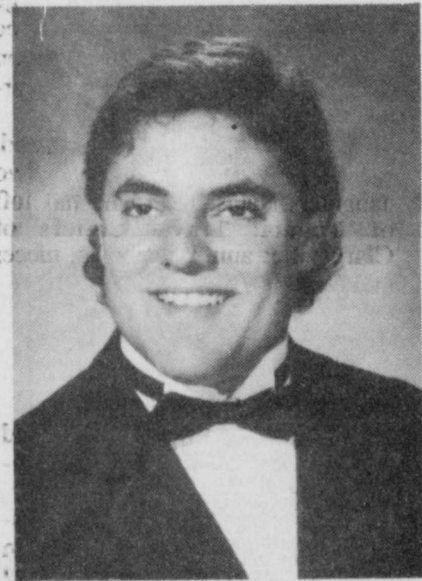
The bride-elect is a 1989 graduate of Clifton High School. She plans to attend McLennan Community College in the fall.

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#### Majority of Colorectal Cancer Patients Diagnosed Early Can Be Saved

The American Cancer Society reports that colorectal cancer is the second most common cause of cancer death in the U.S., ranking next to lung cancer. "With early detection and careful follow up, the cure rate for colorectal cancer could reach 90 percent, according to experts in the field, reports the American Family Physician.

One of these specialists, Paul Sherlock, MD, chairman of the Department of Medicine, Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, New York City, says that several factors are probably involved in the development of colorectal cancer. These include diet, environment and heredity, although the relationship between diet and colorectal cancer is still not completely understood.

Theories about the effect of diet include the idea that "dietary fat triggers the release of bile acids which promote the action of carcinogenic agents", and also that "people eating high fat, low-fiber diets excrete many mutagens in the stool". Occupational exposure to environmental pollutants have also been linked to colorectal cancer.

It is about a member of our family who has Leukemia and who is in Baylor Hospital in Dallas and who has undergone a rare, and, we hope a treatment that will not only help him but one that offers hope to others who are faced with the diagnosis of Leukemia.

Horace "Sonny" Moody is the son-in-law of Gwynne and Jo An Pike and lives in DeSota with his wife, Janet and son, Bart. He has been undergoing treatment for this terrible disease for several years and many different types of treatment have been used to try and help him recover from this disease. The doctors, through research and many many hours of searching, decided to try and match his bone marrow through a registry of bone marrow donors and the article that I have enclosed will help explain this much better than I can.

Our family is hoping that by making th people aware, that they can donate bone marrow for future use just as you can now donate blood through blood banks.

Sonny received the transplant yesterday, Wednesday, June 21 in Baylor, perhaps some of you have been watching this on TV and reading about it in the newspapers and will be interested enough to seek further information. This is a wicked disease and is no respecter of people.

The self-employed executive from DeSota, a hospital bracelet conspicuous on his wrist, struggled visibly to steady his voice.

The electrical engineer from Brussels, Belgium, eyes framed by wire-rimmed glasses, exhibited poise.

The men exchanged greetings--pleasantries that lightly veiled deeper feelings. One of the men was dying. The other man wanted him to live.

Before a small group of reporters in the warm glare of television camera lights, Herman "Sonny" Moody on Tuesday met Eric Smekens for the first time in the Charles A. Sammons Cancer Center at Baylor University Medical Center. Mr. Smekens, 27, flew to this country from Belgium and on Monday roughly a liter of bone marrow was extracted from his hip.

The procedure caused a minor ache in Mr. Smekens' back, but the marrow that was drawn from his body may save Mr. Moody's life. The 47-year old inventor and export executive is dying of leukemia.

Mr. Moody, whose disease was diagnosed six years ago, will undergo intensive sessions daily before

the marrow transplant is performed next Wednesday.

The transplant's chances of success are rated at more than 95%, said Dr. Joseph Fay, director of bone marrow transplantation.

Dr. Fay said Mr. Smekens is among a dedicated, very altruistic group of potential donors listed in bone marrow registries around the world.

Through registries, physicians search for bone marrow donors who may match a patient's human leukocyte antigen, a typing of white blood cells. Because there must be a perfect match, potential donors have a 1 in 15,000 chance of ever actually donating marrow.

Mr. Smekens was located through the Caitlin Raymond International Registry of Bone Marrow Donor Bank in Worcester, Mass. His name was placed on a list in Belgium five or six years ago when physicians attempted unsuccessfully to match his bone marrow with that of a cousin who died of leukemia.

Medical center officials said the bone marrow transplant next Wednesday will be the fourth procedure conducted this year at Baylor involv-

ing a person not related to the marrow recipient.

One donor was found in Irving. Twice, a Baylor team flew to London to "harvest" bone marrow for a transplant. Mr. Smekens is the first European donor at Baylor to travel across the Atlantic for the procedure.

Withdrawing marrow from a donor takes from 30 to 45 minutes, and the patient is anesthetized, Dr. Fay said. The patient lies on his or her stomach and a needle is inserted into a bone. A syringe then draws the marrow from different sites.

Mr. Smekens said he had three reasons for deciding to donate his marrow to a man he had never met. His cousin suffered from leukemia, he thought his contribution could be a goodwill gesture and, he added: "I am a Christian. And I think it could be hard to go to church and hear the priest saying you are all...brothers and sisters and not accepting of giving some bone marrow."

Russian roulette. Few play the game with the gun but you would be surprised how many farmers will unknowingly play a game just as dangerous to their bank account. In the trade it is called on farm storage of wheat or other food grains. On farm grain storage can be good management leading to higher prices received for harvested crops. This usually happens by timing delivery to correspond to market peaks, increased harvesting flexibility and savings of warehouse storage costs.

As with any silver cloud, the dark lining relating to storing wheat the farm, particularly that of food grains such as wheat, relates to damage by insects while the grain is stored. New USDA and FDA rules state that wheat may not contain, "By weight, 1 percent or more kernels visibly damaged by weevils or other insects." Further, wheat is ineligible for price support loan and sale on the open market if it contains, "32 or more insect-damaged kernels per 100 gram" sample. This is loosely referred to as the "32 bite rule".

Any wheat meeting the "32 bite rule" is automatically sample grade. In years past that wasn't such a big deal. Normally the mill would go ahead and buy the grain at a discounted price. You received a little less money but you still got to sell the crop. This equated to the Biblical axiom of "go and sin no more". Now the rules have changed. Any time the grain exchange grades any wheat sample due to the 32 bite rule, this must be reported to FDA. FDA then sends an inspector to the place where the grain was sampled. He has the authority to quarantine that bin to assure the grain is not entered into the food chain. Such a ruling would require the 32 bite wheat be ground into livestock feed or destroyed.

Consider the impact to a warehouseman if just one load of low quality wheat caused a large capacity silo to be graded sample due to insect damage.

If you insist on storing wheat on the farm, be sure to closely monitor moisture levels at harvest, level grain out after it is put in the bin, and use approved grain protectant chemicals according to label instructions to keep insects in check. Storing grain on the farm may be good business, but it requires a significant amount of good management to be successful.

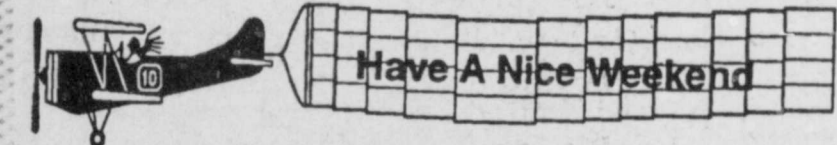
