I suppose it's been a while since I crawled up on the old soap box and really began a lecture. (My grandma always said I should have been a lawyer or a preacher, I liked to talk so much).

Over the years I've heard a lot of lectures that we shouldn't fly...not only in big commercial airliners, but most especially in those little bitty two seater planes.

I've been painted pictures of gloom and doom when we flew gliders, and when we took up white water rafting...well! Going down in caves, up in balloons, out on the ocean, all seem to be things that are considered dangerous.

On insurance policies they ask questions about "hazardous" hobbies or pursuits such as rodeoing, hang gliding, scuba diving, all those things that most of us think of as dangerous, and life threatening. And they are, there's no doubt about it, the chances of getting hurt or killed doing these things DOES exist. It's more dangerous than sitting home watching television...that's a fact.

But the single most dangerous thing ANY of us do is go out onto the highways in an automobile!

Now, I know lots of folks are going to disagree with me.

But each and every one of us has lost a friend or family in an auto accident. Each and every one of us knows people who have been badly injured in wrecks.

I counted it up the other day...between Blossom, Pattonville, Deport, Bogata and Talco in the past five years I have been to accidents that claimed the lives of fifteen people. Several of those were children or teenagers.

We long ago lost count of the number of wrecks that tore vehicles up without seriously injuring the occupants, or even lost count of the accidents in which people were badly hurt, but survived.

Every day, across this nation more people die in auto accidents than in a massive plane crash! But because the body count isn't presented all at once, and we never hear a national total, the impact isn't so great.

I know that driving is a necessary, and pleasurable part of life. I know we have to do it...and on't have to indulge in dangerous hobbies...but the odds are still in favor of car accidents getting us instead of one of those other pursuits!

Lots of folks aren't going to agree with me that seat belts help. But I've never seen a dead person in a seat belt...and I've never seen but one live one that was hurled out of their vehicle. Yes, I know that seat belts can't save everyone...but they do help...especially in preventing injuries in less serious accidents.

But even more helpful is responsible driving. And that's what my whole point is... that we ALL need to drive more carefully.

Check twice before passing, make sure there's enough room. Look very, very well before pulling out. Don't turn off or onto roads without making sure there's enough room, or that it's clear...we all know the rules. We just don't always follow them as carefully as we should.

Defensive driving is important too. There an old line about "here lies Joe, he was right, but he's just as dead as if he were wrong"...that's the whole idea behind defensive driving, watching out for the other fellow.

Please folks, don't add to the horrendous statistics about car wrecks...drive carefully, courteously, defensively...and lets all stay alive!

## Intense Storms Dump 4.5 Inches Of Rain On Area Tuesday Night

In a year noted for severe thunder storms, the area suffered one of the worst so far Tuesday night. According to an official rain gauge 4 and one half inches of rain fell in Deport, four of those inches in one hour. Similar amounts were measured at Bogata with Talco coming out a little lighter, and Blossom about the same.

Lightning had power out for as little a time and thirty minutes in

some places, but out for six hours in others, and Texas New Mexico Power Company had linemen working as fast as they could replacing burned out transformers, lines and resetting thrown switches, all the results of a tremendous electrical display.

Several large trees succumbed to high winds, and water was over roads in places that it doesn't normally get over, prompting the highway depart-

ment to be out directing motorists through or around the deeper areas.

Damage to gravel roads and driveways was severe as the runoff carved new paths through them, and fields suffered some damage from the pounding rains.

Speculation as to whether this trend towards an extremely abnormal summer continue, but only time will tell whether more of these intense thunder storms are in store.

## Canine Orphan Earns Home

For several months before the death of Jack Lapsey, better known as "Happy Jack", two of his dogs began to follow his vehicle a she left for work each day. The dogs always ended their chase at the home of my parents. There they would wile away the day chasing cats and napping. Each evening around the time for "Happy Jack" to come by on his way home, they would sit beside the road anxiously awaiting his return.

A few days following the death of Happy Jack, the dogs found their way to the Roach home again. My mother felt sorry for the dogs and put out food for them. Each evening at the usual time, the dogs would take their place beside the road, and listen for the familiar sound of Happy Jack's vehicle. After a while, the dogs realized their master wasn't coming and

took shelter from the night in the barn behind my parent's house. During last winter's icy weather, one of the dogs died. My mother called several people trying to find a home for the other dog, but no one was interested. Although they did not really want the dog, my mother and dad continued to feed it each day.

One afternoon my parents heard the dog barking ferociously. They ran to see what was happening and found that the dog had cornered a frog. Sometime later, the dog found a grass snake and again got the attention of my parents by barking. Then, during the month of June, the dog became alarmed and began barking again. My parents knew from the previous experiences that there had to be a reason. They rushed out the back door, leaving it open, and began

searching for the intruder.

This time it appeared that the dog had issued a false alarm for there was nothing in sight.

But just as my mother turned to go back into the house, she saw the tail of a huge snake as it slithered into the door and took refuge behind her cook-stove. She screamed, the dog barked, and daddy headed for the telephone. They secured the aid of my husband and with a rifle and rat shot, he managed to squeeze in between the cabinets and the stove and get two good shots. To the horror of them all, he pulled out a huge copperhead.

My parents rewarded the dog with a good meal and promised her a home as long as she lives. "Lapsey Lou" as she is now called, has ceased to wait beside the road and seems to be quite content in her new home.

## Abbott Named To Legislative Honor Roll

who were instrumental in assisting the Texas Bankers Association in accomplishing their legislative objectives in the Texas House of Representatives most recent session.

## Local Sales Tax Shows Upward Swing

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that local sale tax rebates across the state continued to climb this month, increasing by 12% over last year's July payments.

"National economic indicators seem to be showing a slowdown, but the trend in Texas remains upward," Bullock said. "Our diversifying economic base should ensure that we continue to do well."

Bullock added that Texas' economic growth is becoming apparent in almost every sector of the economy.

"Oil and gas, construction, banking and real estate appear to have bottomed out. And some of the areas in Texas that lagged behind in economic growth are beginning to show

signs of improvement," Bullock said. Rebate checks totaling \$68.7 million were sent Monday to 939 cities that impose local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent, Bullock said.

Houston's allocation of \$11.2 million was the largest in the state. Dallas' check was the second-largest, with a payment of \$7.6 million, Bullock said.

The state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department received \$34.5 million, an increase of 16.1%, according to Bullock.

Blossom received \$706.85 for this period, for a 19.69% increase over last year's payment for the same date. Deport received \$635.52 for this

payment for a 21.91% increase over last July's payment.

Paris received \$158,391.97 for a 7.27% increase.

Bogata received \$1,412.58 for a 9.28% increase over last July's payment while Clarksville received \$4,001.70 for a 2.19% decrease.

Detroit received \$688.60 for this period, marking a 34.38% decrease from last year's payments to date.

Talco received \$1,347.24 for a 19.96% decrease. Mt. Pleasant received \$83,998.29 for a 10.31% increase.

July's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in May and reported to the Comptroller's office by June 20, Bullock said.

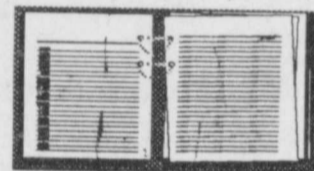
Jared is the son of Rex and Sherry Huddleston of Bogata and is undergoing treatments for leukemia.

Barbecue and fish were sold through the concession stand and about \$3,500 was raised to help the two families.

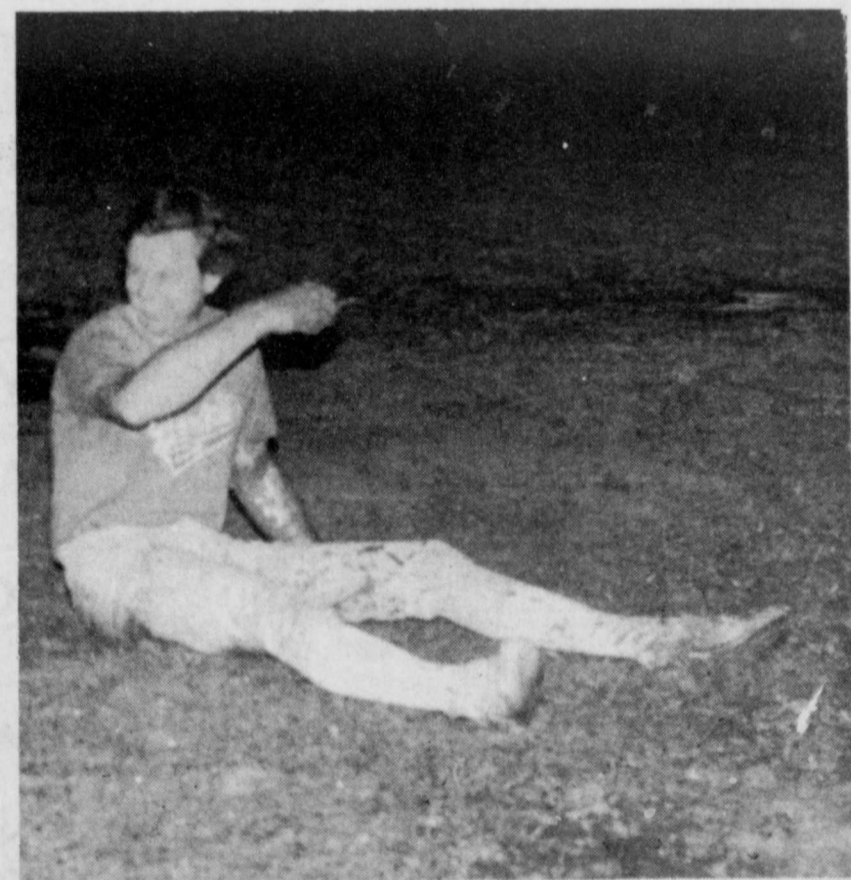
