Something is seriously wrong in my life. Recognizing the problem is easy enough, but correcting it seems totally impossible.

Two weeks ago we left for our yearly vacation. That was after careful preparation so that we could go.

By careful preparation I mean leaving notes stuck up all over the office for Cindy and Barbara. Calling the girls at Bogata and Talco and Blossom and arranging for them to split up our evening Wednesday night route between them.

Before we could go sales routes had to be pre-sold, stries and columns written before we could leave. All that is pretty normal, and expected.

But what really threw me for a loop was when I sat down to write out all the animal care instructions and house care for our friends who were staying at the house during our absence!

It took three typewritten pages! Three...three single spaced pages of type to tell them about all the routines. I doubt that a zoo has much more to do.

There was the corn and bread for the ducks, amounts and when. There was the canned dog and vitamins for the two big dogs, and their dry food.

There was the bag of dry food for the outside cats, then the inside cats got the can and canned food. We took the bottle kitten to other friends to take care of.

The hummingbird food had to be mixed and labled, and instructions written up on keeping two feeders going.

There were pages of instructions about watering outside porch plants, watering inside plants, and watering the flower beds.

There were instructions about taking care of the puppy.

There had to be instructions about the wall plugs on the east side of the kitchen, and a half page of notes about keeping the chlorine level correct in the above-ground swimming pool we picked up at a garage sale last year.

In other words, there is absolutely nothing simple about our life. The possibility of simply locking up a door and going doesn't exist.

By the time we were through with giving all the notes and instructions we were exhausted, tense and more than a little startled to realise just how complicated things really are!

At intervals throughout my life I've had the desire to simplify things....and this is definitely one of those times.

I dream of having one dog, one cat, nothing else to tie me down. I dream of an easy maintenance yard and house, a 9 to 5 put your time in job.

I also know, deep, deep down in the bottom of my soul, that it won't ever be that way.

There won't come a time when pets strays aren't welcome, when pets aren't a part of our lives, when work doesn't require lots of extra miles.

And basically...that is the way we both like it...but every now and then, when the zoo keeping, gardening and picture taking stacks up it's hard not to ponder lingeringly on the idea of a simple household...even if pondering is the only thing we'll ever do about it!

## Question About 911 Posed

"How many people know right now exactly what number to dial for an ambulance, doctor, fire department or law enforcement official" that is one of the questions proponents of the 911 emergency number ask. They feel strongly that the one simple, easy number can save lives and make emergencies simpler to deal with. That, they believe, makes the fifty cent per month cost on phone bills money well spent.

Those against the number object to the cost, which would begin immediately, and it might take some time for the service to be initiated.

To address this question a form has been prepared asking if Red River County residents would be for or against the service, and it should be mailed back to Judge L.D. Williamson at the Red River County Courthouse.

The technology that is being offered to county residents, whether urban or rural, would have a 50 cent monthly charge on telephone bills plus a minute (2/10 of one percent) state-required surcharge on intrastate long distance calls (approximately 2 cents for each \$10 in long distance charges).

For this amount residents could be secure in the knowledge that in case of emergency help could be dispatched accurately within second of the call due to the state of the art computerized equipment which would display not only the telephone number from which the call was being made, but also a location that emergency personnel could be directed to

in the vent that the caller could not speak or knows no directions, or as frequently happens, hangs up before a location can be obtained.

This service would help ambulances, fire fighters, police, or any combination of emergency services to be dispatched quickly.

According to Ms. Janell Browning, Manager of Special Programs for the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, almost the entire state has implemented this program. Only 12 counties have declined participation and locally all cities with the exception of Bogata have agreed to participate. However, Bogata has agreed to review the question once more.

The system works by a telephone being answered in a central location and the correct emergency assistance is dispatched to the caller.

This saves time for both the caller and

the emergency personnel.

In a situation where seconds count the 911 program could very well save lives and property, and in places where it is in effect is working very well.

Ms. Browning explained that the system would be fully implemented by 1994, and the 50 cent charge would begin in January of 1990.

"We must have the funds available to pay for the system when the telephone companies are ready to switch over" she said. "So we must begin to collect now. However, we feel that in about 2 years we will have the equipment and necessary items paid for.

The number, proponents say, is especially beneficial to households with young children, enabling them to have one number to easily remember, and which they can dial in any emergency situation.

## Talco-Bogata School Pre-Registration Information Given

Students living more than two miles from their assigned campus and who are new to the district may contact the office at Rivercrest High School I (632-5204) for information regarding bus routes.

New student pre-registration for Rivercrest High School students will be held on Monday, August 21, 1989 at the high school principal's office from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Rivercrest high school students may request schedule changes, if needed, on August 22 and 23 from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at the Rivercrest High School principal's office. Schedules were planned and issued before dismissal of school in May of 1989.

If another copy of a student's schedule is needed, it will need to be requested on the dates previously mentioned. The student must list the reason for a schedule change in writing and see the principal and counselor

for change approval.

All changes will be made on August 22 and 23. It would be advantageous to the student to complete the scheduling process prior to the first day of classes.

Elementary and junior high students who have not been previously enrolled in Talco or Bogata school campuses should also pre-register for classes on August 22 and 23 at their prospective campuses where they will attend. Principals Billy Joe Vickers at Talco and Jerry Teel at Bogata want to remind parents that all students entering the 1st grade must be five years of age on or before September 1st of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled. First grade students who did not attend kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling in the first grade for the first time in the district must furnish a birth certificate.

## Cabells, Redfearn and Pyatt Get School Bids

Several bids for the 1989-90 Talco-Bogata CISD school year were accepted during the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held Tuesday, August 8th. Those bids went to Cabells for the dairy products, Redfearn Bakery, and Pyatt for the gasoline bid.

In other business the Board approved the minutes of the last meeting, approved payment of the bills, accepted the budget changes, accepted the tax report and adjustment, accepted the calendar designating first and second appraisal period, and accepted early dismissal days for the 1989-90 school year.

Superintendent Harold Cowley was appointed as the asbestos coordinator for the 1989-90 school year

A report of the summer library program was given by Mr. Cowley. He reported that more students participated in the program this summer than last year.

The Board appointed school committees as recommended.

The resignation of Charles Cole as counselor on the Talco campus was accepted.

Board members set the date for the budget hearing and adoption for August 21, at 7:30 p.m. and set the date for adopting tax rate for 1989 taxes and date to adopt amend budget for 1988-89 for August 31.

A workshop for the Board members was hired as teacher on the Bogata Campus.

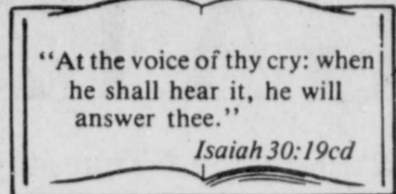

Night student may register during the scheduled night registration times or during the appropriate alphabetical time during the day.

An open registration period has been scheduled from noon to 3 p.m. Friday, Aug. 25 for all students. Fall semester classes begin Monday, Aug. 28, and the last day to add classes is Tuesday, Sept. 5. 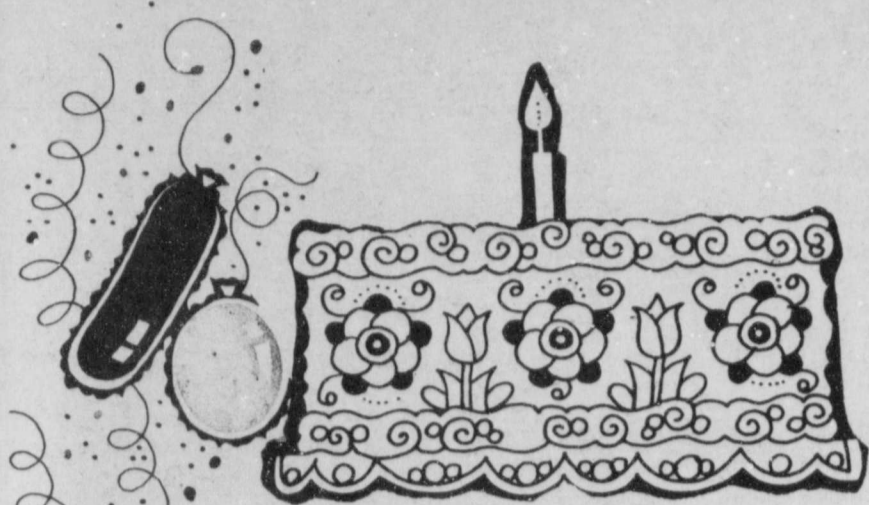

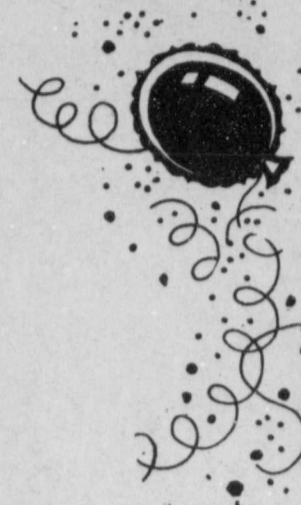

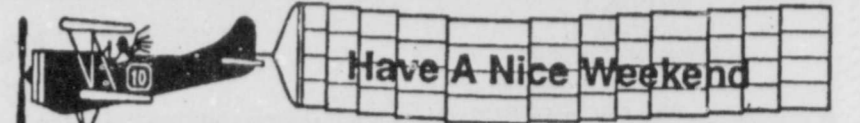

Herman "Sonny" Moody, a leukemia patient whose June 21 bone marrow transplant was called "one last chance", died Wednesday of apparent heart failure. He was 47.

Moody's doctors had been searching worldwide for a donor when they discovered the rare match in a 27-year old Belgian, Eric Smekens. Smekens, whose 15-year old cousin had died of leukemia, agreed to come to Dallas to donate marrow to Moody, whom he had never met.  
"The marrow transplant went well," said Dr. Joseph Fay, who performed the operation at Baylor University Medical Center. "He went into complete remission. We surmise that his previous chemotherapy on top of getting additional chemotherapy just injured his heart and he essentially died of congestive heart failure."

The exact cause of death will be known after an autopsy, Fay said. Tests before the operation revealed

no heart damage, Fay said. Moody had been diagnosed with leukemia during a routine physical examination six years ago. Janet Moody, his wife, had called the marrow transplant her husband's "one last chance" for life.

Moody's longtime friend, Roy Orr, said he believed Moody would urge people with leukemia to seek donor seals in the disease and encourage healthy people to consider becoming donors. "We feel very much if he could have found that match two years ago when he was in better physical condition that his chances would have been better," Orr said. "He always knew the odds were against him. He always knew he was fighting."

Moody was a self-employed importer and exporter in DeSoto. Besides his wife and mother, survivors include one son, Bart; grandmother, D.L. Cowan and brother, Jerry Moody.
