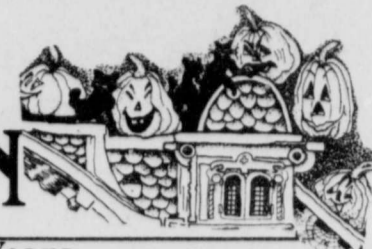

As a notoriously poor student of mathematics, and geometry, the miracles of natural math and geometry amaze me.

The miracles are small, but beautiful, and nothing beats the symmetry found in the natural world.

There is a mother that is seen often around this part of the world. I don't know what kind it is, but it has dull brownish-orange wings. Flying by, it's only a plain old moth. But take a close look at one sometime when it is motionless.

The wings have a precise geometric pattern as beautiful as ancient Egyptian designs. The lines are as crisp and clean, the angles absolutely perfect!

There are many things in nature that are that way.

The symmetry of antlers on stags, buck deer, and other horned animals is striking.

The perfection of design on birds is staggering. The color combinations, the perfect markings, the variety of designs found on wild birds, ducks, geese and other species of birds just cannot be improved upon. Even the humble sparrow, when closely observed, has a quiet pattern that is lovely.

Flowers are another example of geometry in nature.

They are balanced, with the "correct" number of petals, centers, stamens and leaves for maximum effect.

Fruits have a full, inviting symmetrical appearance and texture.

Vegetables provide a study in balance. Peas in a pod, the rows of corn on an ear, the segments in okra, indeed, even the even divisions within a tomato are all neatly designed.

Leaves with their various shapes, delicate veins and growth patterns are as gorgeous as stained glass patterns.

The webs of many spiders are exquisite.

Many grasses, from Johnson grass to ferns provide a study in careful creation.

The list is virtually endless.

Rock crystals and frost patterns, snowflakes and tiger stripes, zebra patterns and tabby cat stripes, they all exhibit a natural geometric precision that is staggering.

Common components of our daily world exhibit a perfection that we seldom take the time to notice.

Play a little game, take a look and observe some of the things around you. It's fun, relaxing, and provides a deeper appreciation of just how lovely the world can be. It also helps us remember that things are as they are supposed to be...that there is a scheme of things...for it's just not comprehensible that all this perfection was an accident!

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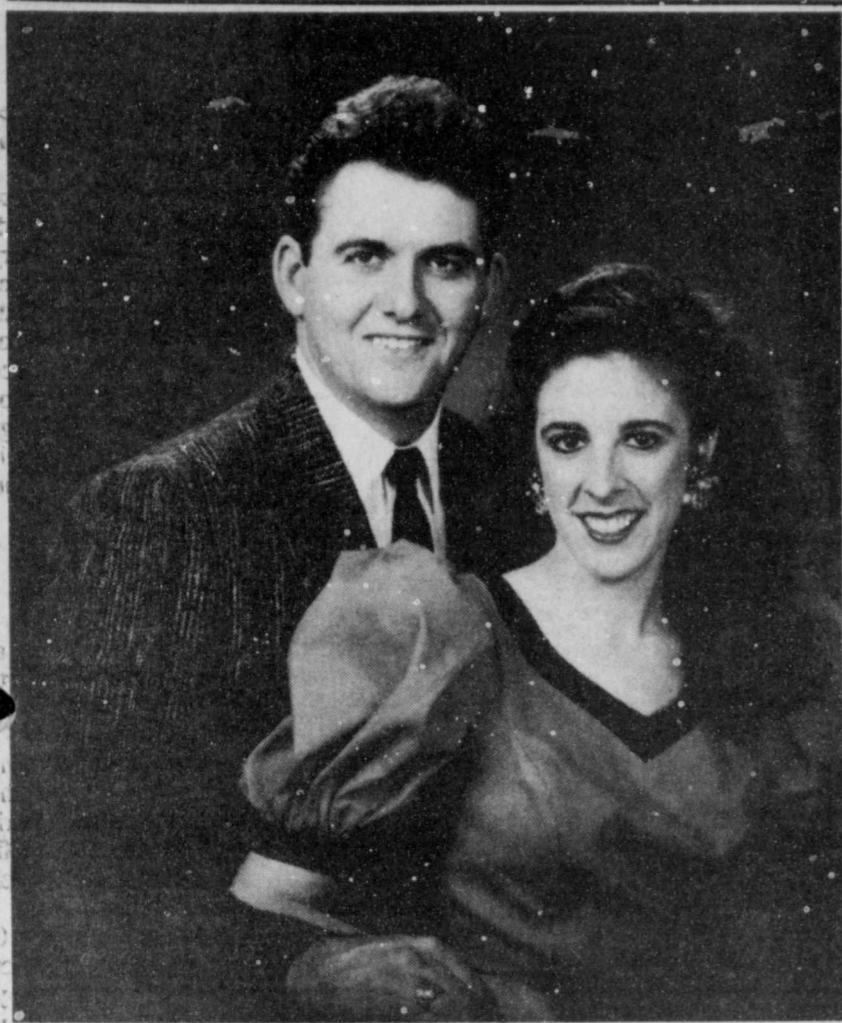

Parsons-Williams Engagement Announced

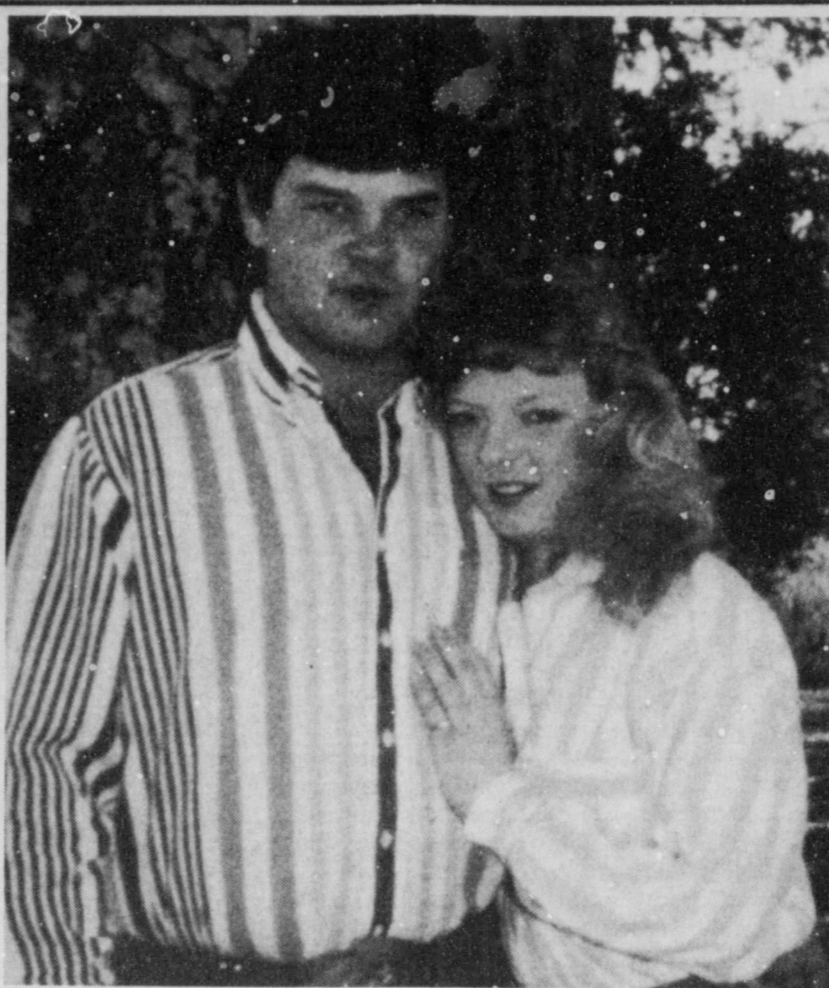

ature wooden horses, and boots with flower arrangements served as centerpieces. The dinner consisted of bodacious barbecue.

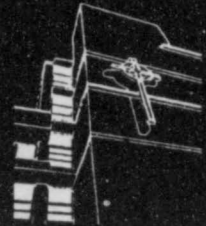

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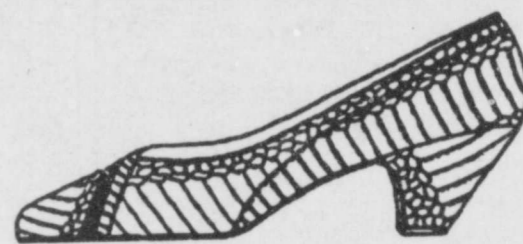

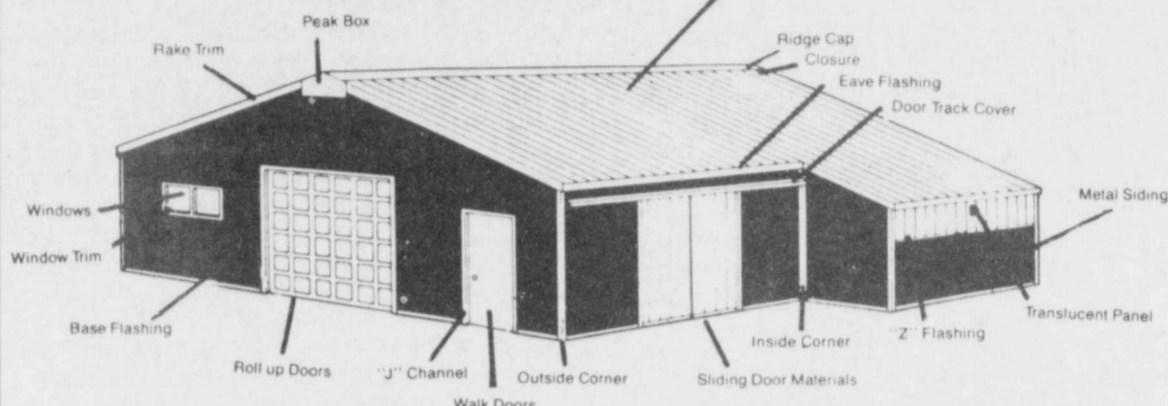

Rebels Hold Off Warriors, 9-6

If the Rivercrest Rebels ever needed a showcase game from a player, they got it Friday night against the Honey Grove Warriors, as senior Jeremy Abshier led his squad to a hard-earned 9-6 win over the District 17-AA rivals.

The victory evened the Johntown unit's District record at 1-1, but more importantly gave them momentum to continue the remainder of the battle for play-offs.

Abshier, who plays with reckless abandon, fueled by the burning desire to succeed, ran for 175 yards on 22 carries, an average of eight yards per run. He scored the Rebels only touchdown of the night in the second quarter as he took the hand-off and galloped behind fellow senior Kevin Binion and junior guard Jesse Woods, blocking for 43 yards for the tally. The interesting point is that all three players have been seriously injured in recent weeks, but have battled back to form.

Abshier's prettiest run of the night, perhaps of the entire year, came in the fourth quarter when he danced his way for 50 yards, fending off five would-be warrior tackles to find his way into the endzone, only to see the effort erased by a yellow penalty flag against the Rebels.

But it was the Rebel defense which made the difference in the game. The much maligned unit thwarted the Warrior advance inside the Rebel 10-yard line in the first quarter. Abshier

provided the initial leadership from his cornerback slot, but overall pursuit held Warrior star Darren Patt in check for most of the contest.

Indeed the only Warrior touchdown came in the second quarter following a Rivercrest fumble at their own 11-yard line. A third down pass from the six yard stripe from quarterback Jeremy Odom to split-end Justin Baker at 7:19 to play in the half, pulled the Warriors close. But Abshier broke through to block the point after attempt, then scooped the ball into his arms on the dead run and sprinted the length of the field, only to be stopped at the 1-yard line by Pat, thus denying the Rebels tow points.

The excitement continued late in the half, as the Rebel defense stymied the Warriors. First, strong safety Ronald Simmons deflected a long Warrior aerial from its intended target. On the ensuing punt, junior Eric Cabell plowed through to block the kick, thus allowing Marcus Savage to recover and return the pigskin to the Warrior 10-yard line. Abshier moved the ball inside the five. A Rebel touchdown was then aborted by a wrongly-set timer, which caused the field's sprinkler system to activate, providing a moment of levity for all, but interrupting the flow of the game, and costing the Rebels a penalty on the next play. Then the gun sounded to end the half with the Rebels leading by a single point.

The second half was highlighted by the defenses, which often bent but didn't break.

Both teams were able to move the ball in the middle of the field. The Rebels added a safety in the final period, when a bad snap forced Warrior punter Rodney Bateman into the endzone where he was tackled by Eric Cabell, for the safety.

Rebel boss Terry Giddens was pleased with the play of his charges. "This was a good win for us, for it proved that we can overcome the difficulties and hardships that may be hurled at us. This win will stay with the players, who were so down after last week's loss to Wolfe City. Because they were able to play in their normal rotation tonight, their timing was much improved. Our offensive line and our overall defense was really good."

This week the Rebels travel to Como-Pickton to face a good team which was trounced by Cooper 40-8. Giddens said of the forthcoming game, "Since everyone is being pummeled by the awesome Bulldogs, we must understand that the Eagles are a pretty good team. We have to win to keep any play-off hopes alive. Since C-P has already lost to Leonard and Cooper, they can help our cause by beating Wolfe City in several weeks. But this week they are our opponents, not our allies, so we must beat them."

Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

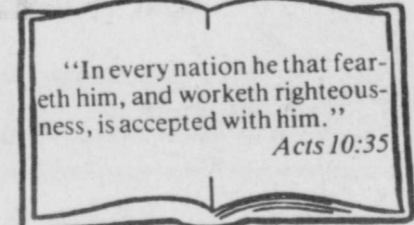

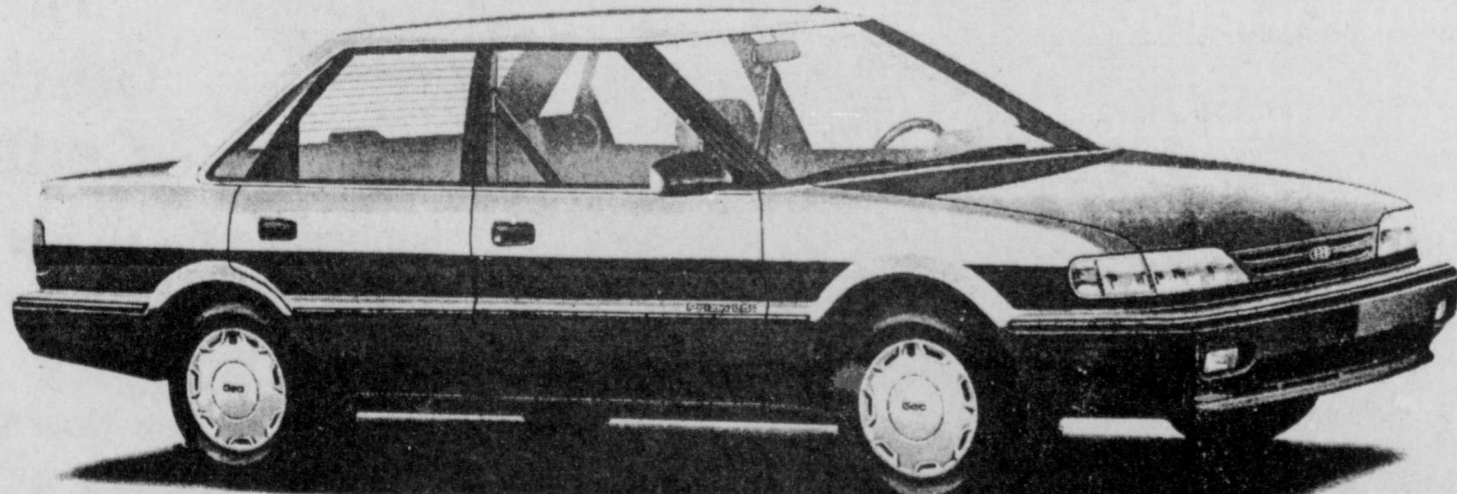
