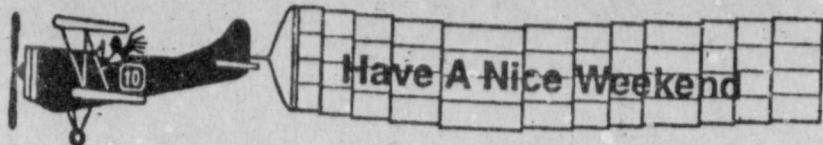

Playing With Dolls No Game For Collector

What began innocently enough with the purchase of a Shirley Temple doll in 1972 grew into an obsession.

Peggy Yale became so consumed with doll collecting that she opened her own shop, Enchanted Dolls at 6519 E. Lancaster in Ft. Worth.

She admits though that she was more concerned with building up her collection than with making money.

"My hobby became my business. You could say I decided to buy and sell dolls to support my habit," she said with a laugh.

Yale said she had never seen an antique doll before she bought her first Shirley Temple, but "1972 was my downfall."

"It all started with a Shirley Temple doll that I wanted. My poor husband said, "Oh, let's humor the poor thing." But it just got me started until it became a permanent condition."

She began reading all the books on antique dolls she could find. She joined national doll collectors associations; and for the last five years she has judged national doll contests, specializing in antique German bisque-head and character dolls.

Today, Yale's husband has given in to his wife's obsession. "Always at Christmas and my birthday, I don't ask for furs and diamonds, I ask for another doll," she said.

Enchanted Dolls is a child's delight and a collector's treasure. Antique dolls from the Bye-Lo Baby of the 1920's to life-size Shirley Temples of the 1930's fill the glass cases that line one wall.

Madame Alexander sits on one shelf and Cabbage Patch Kids festoon another. Sugar Britches, a sleepy-eyed baby doll handmade by Mary Ann Mckayof Ft. Worth, rests comfortably in an infant seat.

Celebrity dolls including Elvis Presley, John F. Kennedy, Marilyn Monroe and Judy Garland occupy two shelves in the store. Yale said those lavishly costumed dolls are very popular among collectors now. The line's famous duos include Rhett Butler and Scarlett O'Hara, Bud Abbott and Lou Costello, Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers and even Ralph Kramden and Ed Norton of "The Honeymooners".

Yale sells antique and a few modern dolls from her shop. She also buys, trades and appraises them, and sells a full line of doll supplies. Two of her employees repair dolls, charging anywhere from \$10 for restringing a small doll to \$75 for completely restoring a badly damaged antique.

Last week a woman asked if her Barbie, bought the first year the dolls were made, could be repaired. Her small daughter had torn the doll's head off. The woman left dismayed; not only was the damage beyond repair, Yale told her, but collectors pay up to \$800.00 for first edition Barbies in good condition.

Another woman toted a grocery sack full of dolls. She was worried about the eyes of one of her favorite baby dolls from her youth. Yale took the doll to the back of the shop and deposited drops of sewing machine oil in her eyes. Minutes later she returned with the doll, cooing to it, "Sweetheart, your little eye's lazy." She told the woman to keep the doll stored face down to keep the eyes from sticking.

A small girl left the store carrying her mother's huge teddy bear. The woman had won the bear at the Louisiana State Fair one year. She had the bear restuffed and a new set of eyes sewn on at Enchanted Dolls for \$8.00.

Doll collecting remains one of the world's most popular hobbies, Yale said, adding the number of men collectors is growing. The "most collectible" modern doll, she said, is anything from the Madame Alexander line.

Collectors went "bazookers" over Cabbage Patch Kids, but their popularity began dying out last year, she said. The dolls will be remembered not only for their homely faces, she said, but also because "they helped children get back to cuddly dolls".

Dolls fill plastic hampers in a room behind the cash register. They are waiting to be repaired or be fitted to new clothes. "This dolly's here for a new hairdo," Yale said, picking up a doll with matted hair. The hair will be shaved and replaced with a human-hair wig.

People will spend a lot of money to have their old dolls restored this year, she said. Restorations for Christmas have already begun.

Why do people spend so much time and money on dolls? Yale puts the answer simply. "I think we never grew up. Just like Walt Disney. He never grew up, and look what happened to him."

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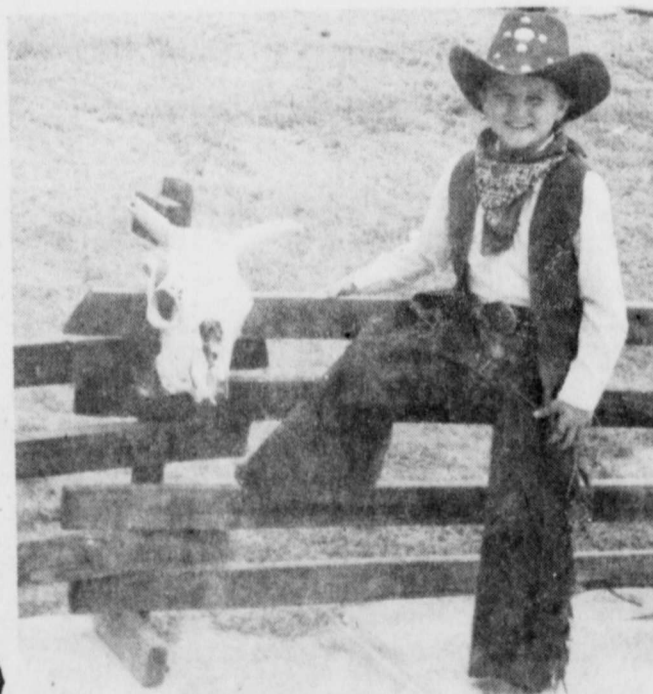

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:
I read with interest your article on Persimmons in the November 9 edition of The Deport Times. I am a native of Lamar County, born and raised between Minter and Cunningham; however I have lived in Enid, OK for a number of years. I am acquainted with people who have been forecasting the weather for years by using the shape of the embryo of the persimmon. This art of predicting the weather by the use of the persimmon seed has been used for centuries by the American Indians and one of my friends learned to read them from an old Cherokee Indian. Knives, forks and spoons can be found in a given year in the embryo of the persimmon. The spoons mean mild or moderate weather, forks forecast very severe weather and the knives mean a severe winter. The immature seeds have no weather related meaning. In your area, most of the embryo's will be spoons, but a knife or fork could show up which would indicate a severe storm. It might interest you to gather and cut open 10 to 20 seeds to check the weather forecast for your area. If a knife or fork shows up, you can expect a severe spell of weather. If several knives are found, be prepared. I enjoy your paper each week with all the local news and interesting articles. Looking forward to moving back to Lamar County in a couple of years.

NTCC Announces New Registration Procedure

Registration for the 1990 spring semester will take on a new look at Northeast Texas Community College, according to Phil W. Ebensberger, NTCC Dean of Admissions and Registrar. APPLE-RAISIN COFFEE CAKE

- Ingredients:**
Apple Topping:
1/2 cup low-fat margarine
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

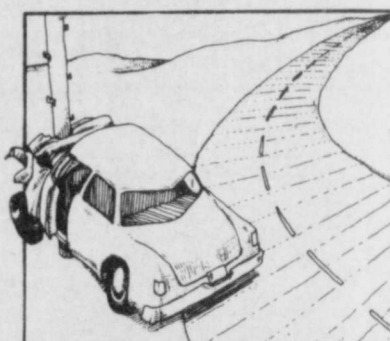
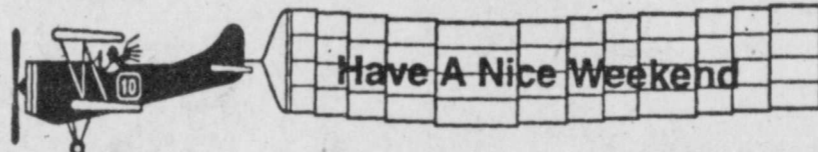
