Dickey Appointed To Water Board

In its regular session on December 26, the Red River County Water District appointed Bobby Dickey to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of James Vaughan.

Mr. Dickey's appointment came from a field of three names which also contained Billy Bratton Baird and attorney Jim Dick Lovett, who had been recommended by the Clarksville city council. George Marshall of Bogata placed Dickey's name for appointment.

The Board also voted unanimously to proceed with the dissolution of the Water District.

Census Figures Show 2,087,759 Farms In 1987

The 1987 Census of Agriculture shows that the United States had 2,087,759 farms in 1987, a decline of 7% from 1982. The number with sales of \$10,000 or more totaled 1,059,573 or 51% of the farms. Between the 1982 and 1987 censuses, the number of farms with sales of \$10,000 or more also declined by 7%. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place which sold or normally would have sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural products during the census year.

The 1987 census shows that the U.S. agricultural sales totaled \$136 billion. Farms with sales of \$10,000 or more accounted for \$132.6 billion of the sales. Livestock, poultry and their products accounted for \$77 billion or 57% of the 1987 sales. Crops, including nursery and greenhouse products, accounted for \$59 billion or 43%.

Some 295,721 farms had sales of \$100,000 or more, accounting for

76% of total agricultural sales. About 10% had sales of \$50,000 to \$99,999 while 11% had sales of \$25,000 to \$49,999, 16% had sales of \$10,000 to \$24,999 and 49% had sales of less than \$10,000.

Production expenditures for the country's agricultural operations came to \$108 billion. Agricultural operators spent 13% less for commercial fertilizers, 10% more for agricultural chemicals and 29% more for hired farm labor than they did in 1982. They spent 3% more for livestock and poultry feed.

Illness Puts Absenteeism Up

Flu has put absenteeism up at Talco-Bogata schools, with expectations that it will probably be higher in the weeks to come.

At Rivercrest there were 20 reported absent Tuesday out of their 193 students. If school had been in session instead of out for the Christmas-New Year Holiday, it might well have been higher, as many students have already recovered.

Bogata Junior High and Elementary School had 22 out of their 330 students, and Talco Junior High and Elementary had 11 absent.

This is considered above average absenteeism for this time of year, although it isn't as high as many large cities are reporting.

There seems to be two types of illness, one that includes fever, chills, intestinal problems, and another that includes sinus problems, fever and a very sore throat.

Many people are reporting sick, while others continue to try to work. With the rapid weather changes we have been experiencing, the sickness is only made worse.

Local doctors offices have been reported full to capacity, with no let up in sight.

New Bank Opened January 2

Peoples National Bank opened January 2 at 9 a.m. Tuesday, at 35 S. Plaza, downtown Paris.

The bank will emphasize personal, local service, according to Ronald Abbott, chief executive officer.

"Our bank will not be a branch of any other bank. It is a locally chartered bank," said Abbott.

"We believe in Lamar County, we believe in people," he said. "We do not send our deposits out of state. Our money stays right here at home where it can work for us. We do our business at home."

Regulations somewhat limit the services banks offer, levelling the playing field among them. Basically, they are all in the business of providing service and loaning money, said Terry Christian, president of Peoples National Bank - Paris.

"We can't change the color of that money. There's not a whole lot we can change about the way you pay it back," he said. "But we can serve you, and we can serve the people of Lamar County in a personable manner."

"And that is where I think, and hope, and promise that we will make our mark."

Peoples National Bank has also acquired the old Belks Department Store building adjacent to their building to the east, and will raze it to create a two-level, 120-space parking lot.

"We think that this will not only solve parking problems for the bank, but will also add a great deal to our downtown community," said Abbott.

The surroundings will be landscaped to provide more greenery downtown, and may include benches for picnic lunches and relaxing. The parking area will have elements de-

signed to tie the space to adjoining buildings so there won't appear to just be a gap in the buildings on the square.

Months have been spent remodeling and decorating the old Liberty National Bank building, he said. Marble flooring and other areas have been refurbished, restored and installed, complementing the new furnishing and decor.

Drive-through facilities will be provided at a full-service branch to be built at the corner of Collegiate Drive and Lamar Avenue, which will hopefully open in early May, said Abbott.

There will be no drive-through facilities at the downtown location, though there will be night deposit capability.

Because they are already an established, successful banking operation with a \$15 million asset base on which to build, Abbott said the group feels it has an excellent opportunity in Paris.

The new bank's nine-member staff represents 86 years of banking in Lamar County and they, along with a board of directors drawn from the local business community, are also reasons the group feels it will be successful in an area already served by a number of banks and other financial institutions.

Tuesday's opening will be the culmination of nearly two years of effort, said Abbott.

"One year ago, on December 15, 1988, we purchased the failed First National Bank of Bogata from FDIC," said Abbott. "Over the past year we...have been very successful."

In its peer group -- \$25 million and under -- the bank in Bogata now has the highest return-on-assets ratio in the nation, he said.

In September of this year the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency approved moving the bank's charter from Bogata to Paris. The group will retain Peoples National Bank-Bogata as a separate, full-service branch operation.

"It will have its own president, its own note department, its own credit files, its own general ledger. It will have everything of its own and will operate as an autonomous, full-service branch," said Abbott. "We will not go in and gut everything out and try to run it as a shell bank."

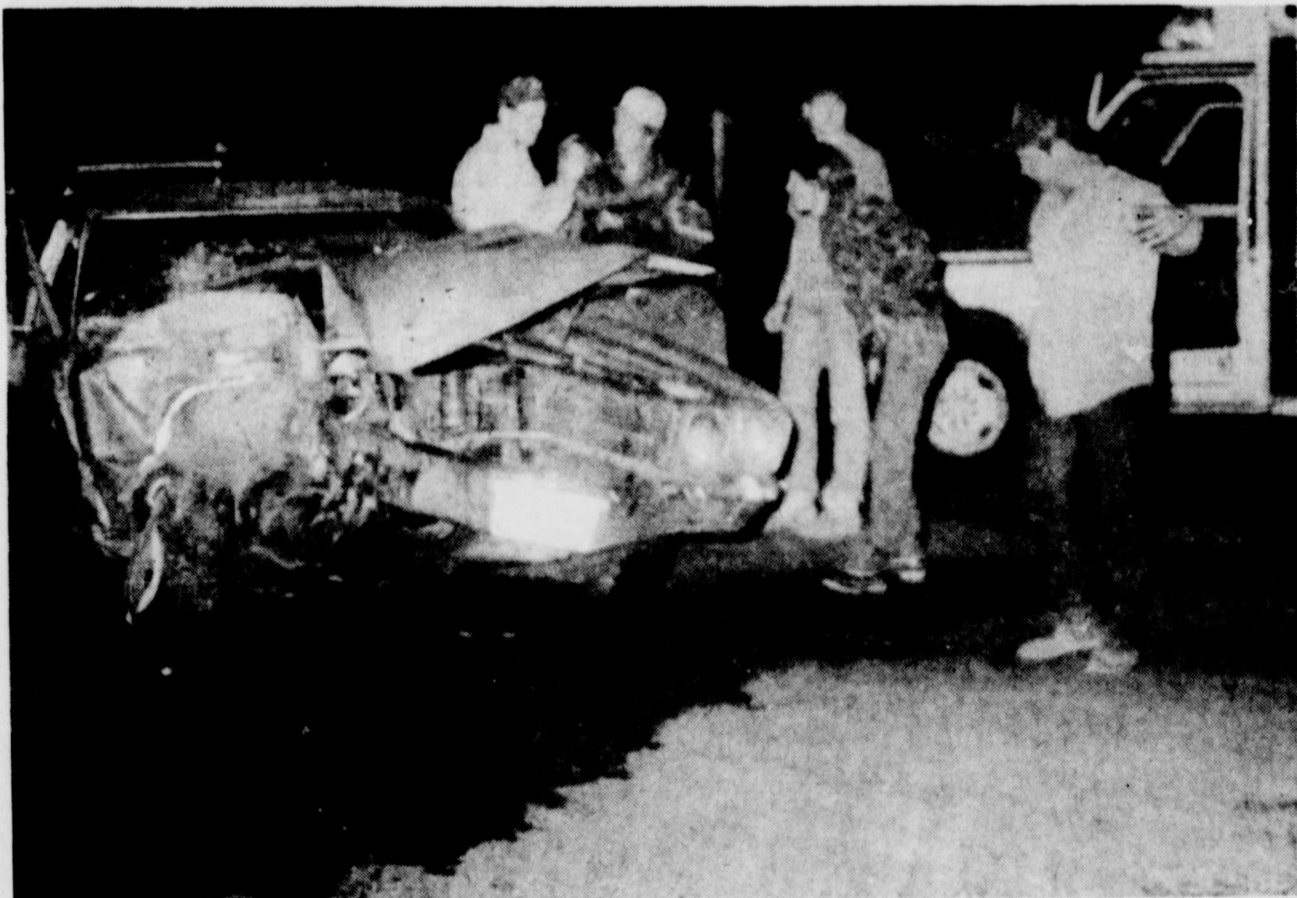
The combination of downtown and east-side locations, a full spectrum of personalized services and the established, firm foundation on which the new bank is built makes the directors of Peoples National Bank confident of success.

"We feel like that if we service the needs of the people of Lamar County, that we will not have to worry about our profitability, that it will come," said Abbott.

The board of directors of Peoples National Bank are Dr. John Miles; Daon Wall; Ray Spencer; Darrell Coats; B.R. Stokes, president of Peoples National Bank-Bogata; Terry Christian; and Abbott.

Employees and officers of the Paris bank are Terry Christian, president; Sally Martin, vice-president and cashier; Linda Dickey, manager of loan operations; Sharon Hampton, executive secretary; Carole Nixon, new accounts; Carol Cody, lead teller; Debbie Head, teller; and Steve Wilson, data processing and computer operations.

Thomas Steely will be public relations and marketing representative for the bank.
