## Bogata On "Map"

Bogata was "on the map" Sunday in Dallas Life Magazine.

Among cities in Texas named for foreign places, Bogata was starred. Also honored were Venus, Italy, Scotland, Ireland, Naples, Paris, Rhone, Athens and Palestine.

Omaha was overlooked, perhaps because Iowa isn't foreign enough.

Bogata's photogenic Mayor W.T. Harbison was quoted and pictured in color, standing on Main Street with Buckman's and adjoining businesses in the background.

Bogata was given its present name in 1881 by postmaster James E. Horner. Proud that the United States had created a democratic country by rebelling against the British monarchy, Horner sympathized with the

Latin-Americans' struggles to win independence from the Spanish Monarchy. Earlier in the century, Latin American patriot Bolivar had won a major battle against the Spanish at Bogota, Columbia.

When Horner proposed "Bogota" as the name for the community previously known as Maple Springs, Washington authorities agreed, but in replying wrote the name as "Bogata".

It's anybody's guess whether Postmaster Horner's "o" looked like an "a" or the fellow in Washington was just careless with his spelling.

Anyway, Bogotans weren't particular about little things like that, and accepted the misspelled name.

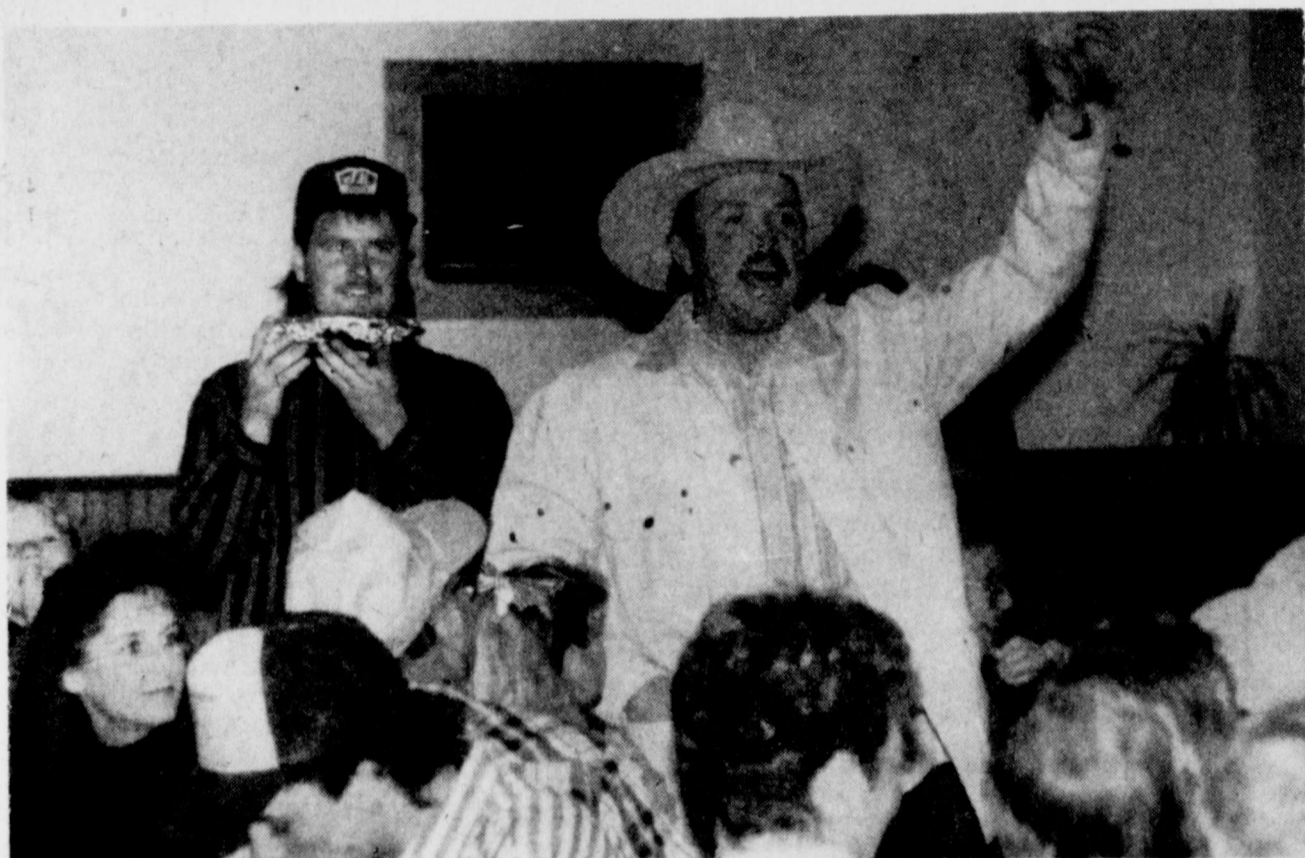

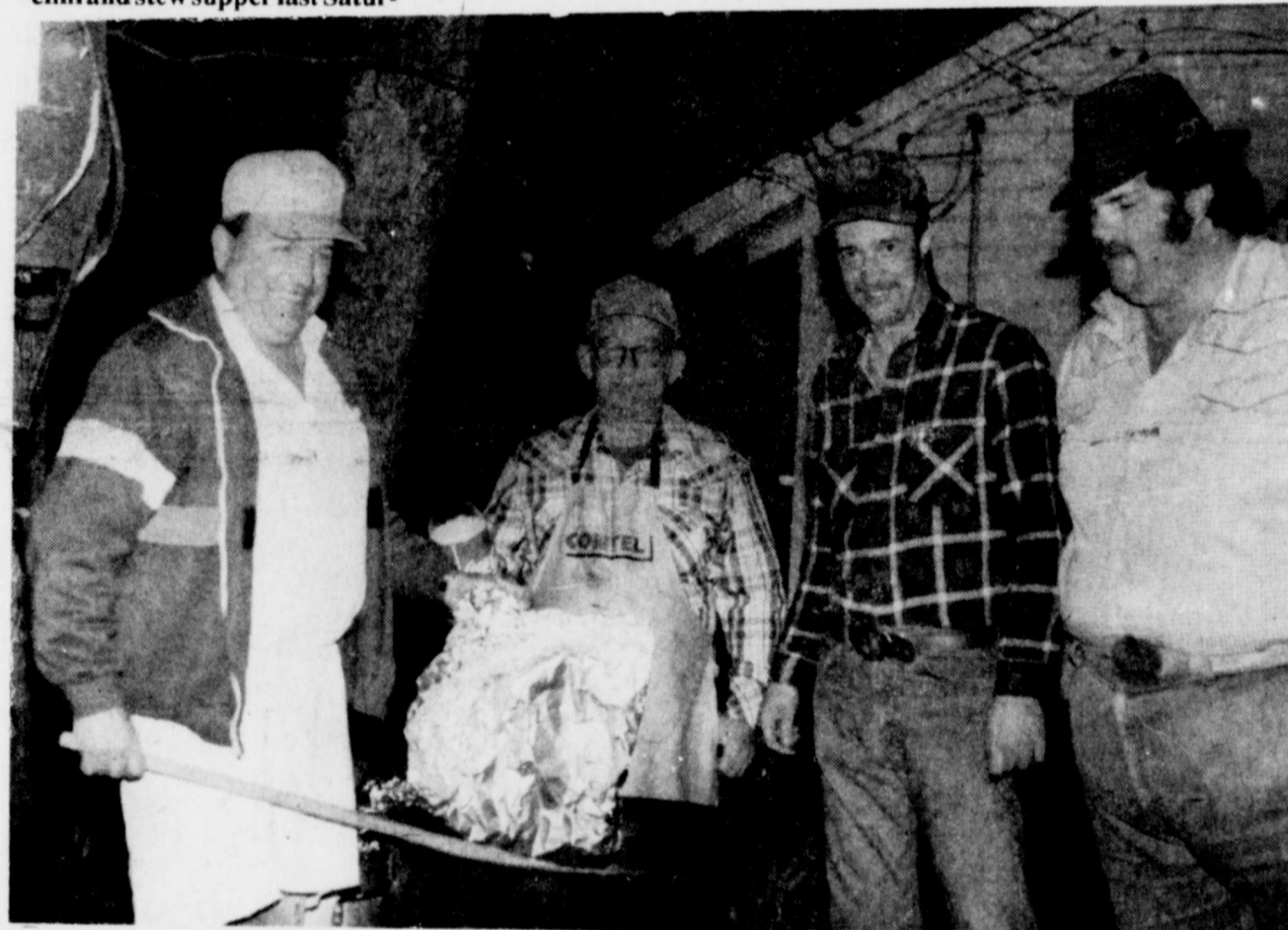



**Leonard L. Cheatham Dies February 14**

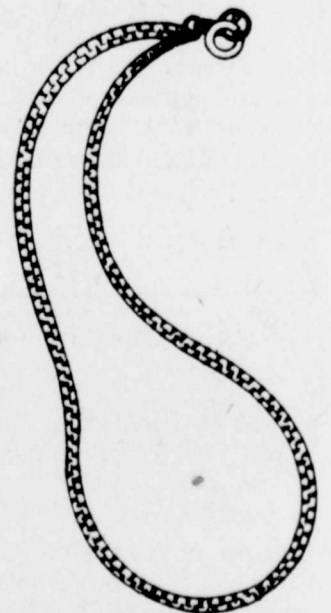
Leonard Lee Cheatham, 84, of Long Beach, CA died Wednesday, February 14 in Edge Water Convalescent Home after a lengthy illness.

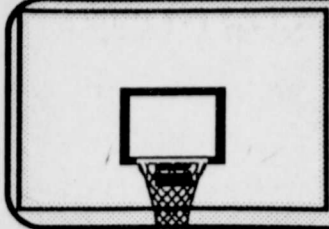

# Roundball Roundup

## Rebels Tie For District 17-AA Championship

After defeating the Como-Pickton Eagles on the road by a score of 53-35, the Rivercrest Rebels positioned themselves to go for a shot at the district 17-AA championship. That is precisely what they accomplished on Friday night at Joliet in the regular season finale, as they defeated the Chisum Mustangs, 65-61, forcing a tie breaker game on Monday night.

A packed house saw the Rebels play their best overall game of the year, according to Coach Wake Wood. Even though starter Galen Logan was sidelined with injuries, the Rebels' cause was enhanced by the play of senior forward Jason Lankford, who started for Logan.

The Rebels built a 13 point lead midway through the second quarter, but the Mustangs fought back to erase that lead late in the contest.

But senior Donald Combs, who scored 8 of his game leading 19 points in the final eight minutes, repeatedly penetrated the soft Mustang defense for buckets. Teammate Jeremy Abshier also did the dipsy-doodle on the Mustangs and ended the contest with 15 points. Two other Rebels, finished the game in double figures, Jaosn Pogue had 14 and Ronald Simmons had 10 points.

The Monday night game at Paris Junior College was played before a packed house, and was intense in the calibre of play. Although both teams will advance to bi-district play-offs later in the week, the Rebels wanted to earn the right to be called CHAMPS.

A Rebel win would also mean that

they would not have to face defending state Class 2A champion Edgewood in the opening game of Bi-District play. With starter Logan still sidelined with a bruised knee, and senior post Jason Pogue finding himself in early foul trouble, the Rebels were in an awkward position. Yet, the forced the contest into overtime before falling to the Mustangs 67-57.

The Rebels trailed 27-16 in the second quarter when Pogue was whistled for his fourth foul. At that point, senior Combs began to bomb from 3-point territory, and by halftime the Rebels were behind only a point, 29-28. Combs led all scorers with 19 points.

The strategy of Coach Wood in calling for the Rebels to employ a four-corner attack enabled them to take a lead on the first shot of the third quarter; with 5:28 to play, a bucket by Kevin House, who moved to the low post slot with Pogue on the bench, gave the Rebels their final lead of regulation, 34-33. House finished with 13 points, and played the defensive boards well grabbing six rebounds, as well as three steals.

The Rebels fell behind by 7 points, 51-44, with 5:02 left to play in the game, but a bucket by House, and a pair of free throws by Jim Purviance, cut the Mustang lead to 3. Then Jeremy Abshier hit the next six Rebel points, and Combs knotted the score at 55 with :21 seconds to play on a free throw.

A missed Chisum free throw went out of bounds to the Rebels with :12

seconds left. The Rebels worked to win the game in regulation, but a non-call on a push foul to House caused him to pass to Combs whose shot from eight feet was partially blocked with :03 seconds left, to send the game into overtime.

Although the Rebels scored the first two points in overtime, their energy was spent, and with two starters benched with fouls, the Mustangs were able to pull away to the 67-57 win.

But congratulations are in order to the Rebels for making the play-offs for the first time in five years. With a little luck, and continued fine play, the Rebels may go far in the post season play. Coach Wake Wood, Eddie Barker and the entire Rebel crew are to be praised for their efforts. GOOD LUCK!!

The Rebel Junior Varsity showed just how much they have improved since the onset of the season in their home-closer against Chisum on Friday night. Down 16-3 after one quarter, the Rebels went on a 23-7 blitz as Corey Gable hit 12 of hi game leading 25 points for a 26-23 halftime lead.

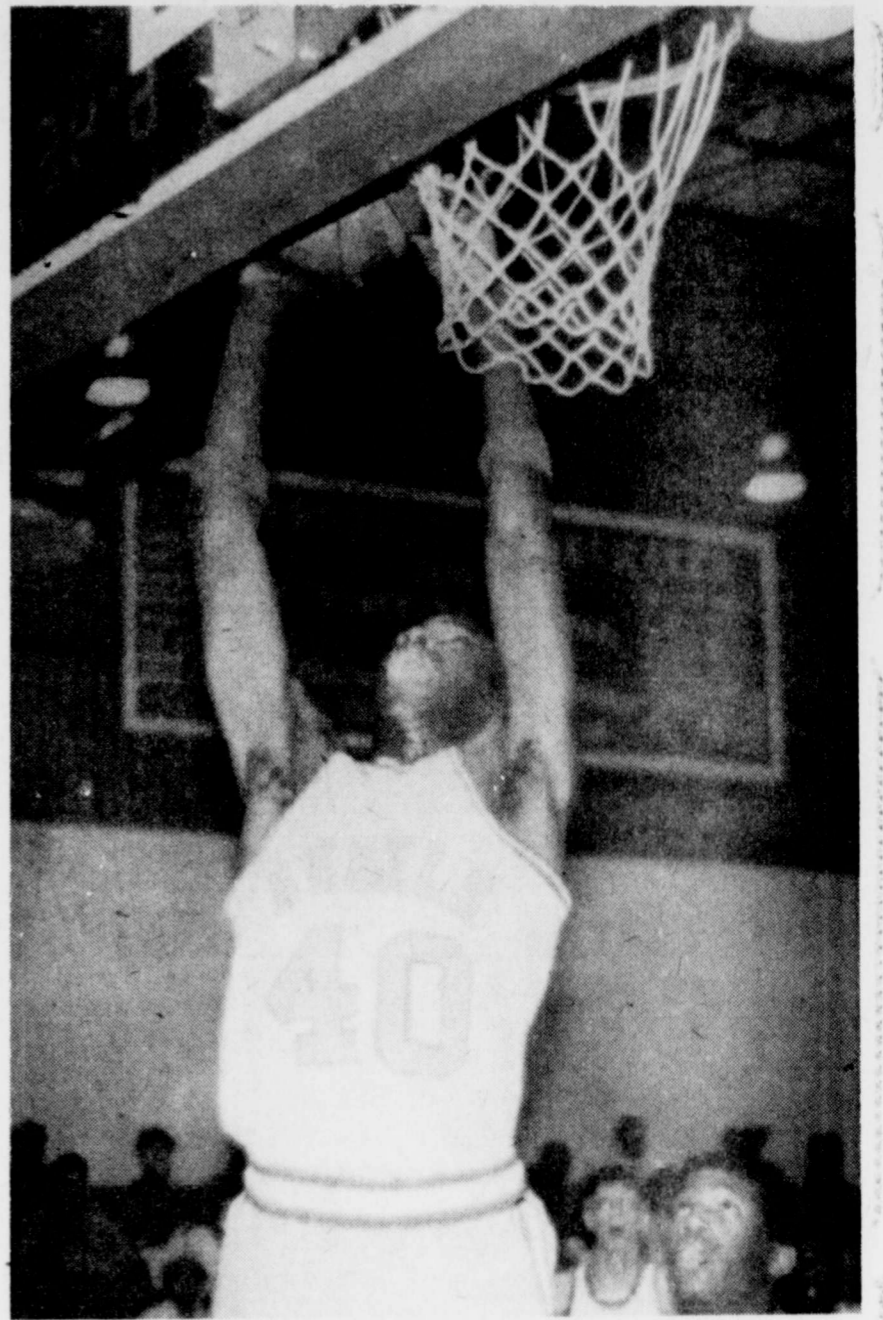

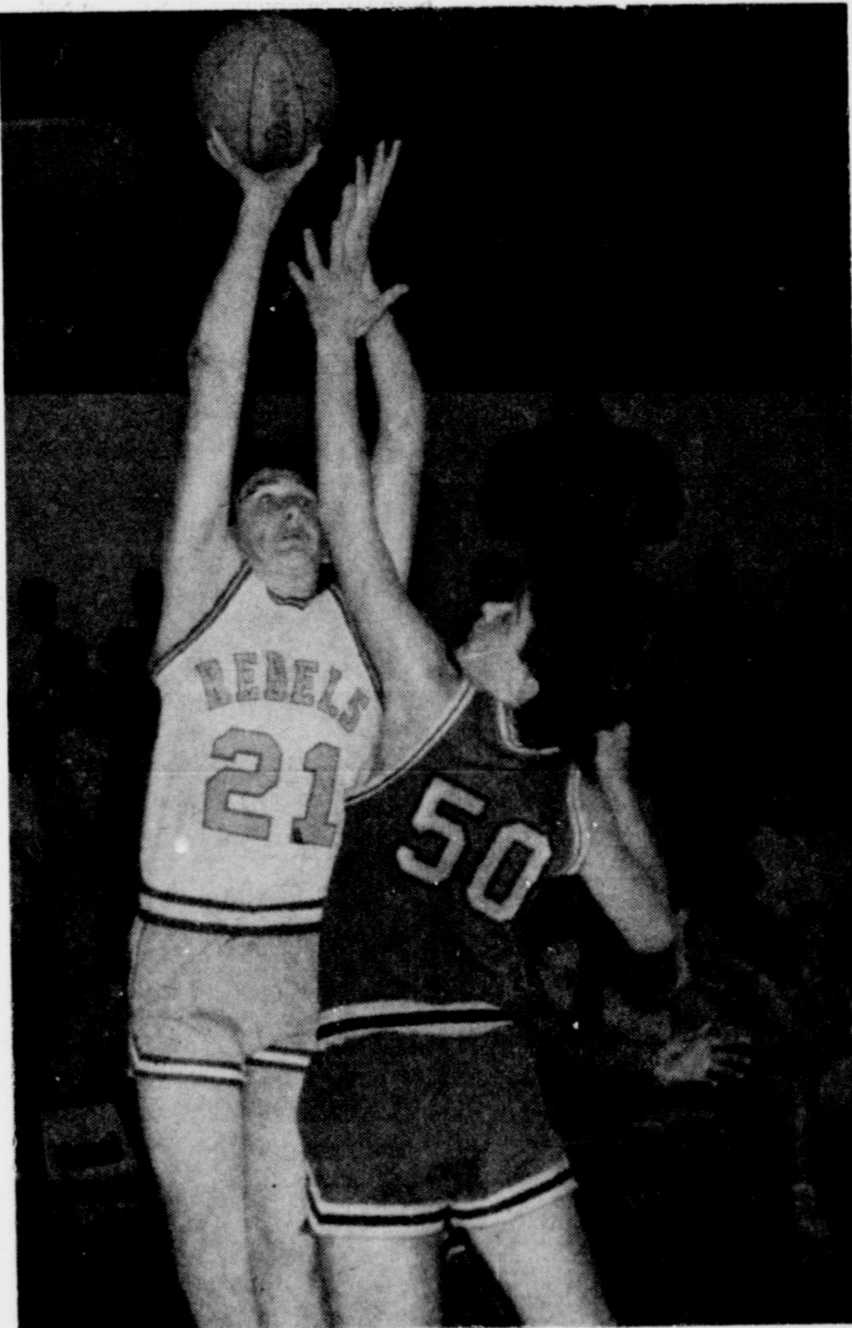

### Gardening Time Has Arrived In East Texas

By Herb Brevard

Gardening generally gets into full swing during February in east Texas. "Many of our vegetables can be successfully planted or transplanted in February," said Marty Baker, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, March and April are the months when warm season vegetables are planted."

"Beets, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, chard, collards, English peas, garlic, kohlrabi, onions, Irish potatoes, spinach and turnips can tolerate cool temperatures this time of year," Baker said. "If really severe cold weather is expected, some of these vegetables may need extra protection from the cold."

"Several practices are critical to successful vegetable gardening," Baker said. "Proper selection and preparation of the garden site is very important. The area should be well drained, have access to sunlight most of the day, and contain soil with a high organic matter content."

A soil test is the best method of determining the fertilizer needs of the garden.

"One of the biggest mistakes made by many gardeners is planting too much and trying to grow vegetables on too large an area," Baker said. "Only a small area is needed to produce enough vegetables for the average family. Vegetable planting guides are available from local county extension agents. These guides suggest when to plant, what to plant and how much production can be expected from 100 feet of row. Gardening should be fun as well as produce fresh, delicious vegetables for the family's food needs."

##### Peanut Butter Struesel Pie

**Social Security Notes**

Although, in general, the earnings test is the same for self-employed people as for wage earners, there are some differences. It's important for people who receive earnings from self-employment to be aware of the differences.

The earnings test places a limit on the amount of money a beneficiary can earn without affecting benefits. In 1990, the limit is \$9,360 for people 65 to 70 and \$6,840 for people under 65. Benefits are reduced \$1.00 for

each \$2.00 earned over the limit for people under 65; for those 65-69, the withholding is \$1.00 in benefits for each \$3.00 of earnings. The earnings test does not apply to people who are 70 and older.

The difference comes during the first year of retirement. During the first year of retirement, wage earners can get a full benefit for any month they don't perform substantial services in self-employment, regardless of their earnings in any month.

Whether or not services performed in a business are "substantial" depends on a number of factors. They include the amount of time devoted to the business or profession, including time spent planning and managing, the kind of work done, and how the work compares with what the person previously did.

The more valuable and highly skilled the work performed, the more likely it is to be considered substantial.

In general, more than 45 hours of work devoted to business during a month constitutes substantial services. Less than 15 hours a month is never considered substantial services.

People who need information on the retirement test should be sure to call the nearest Social Security office.

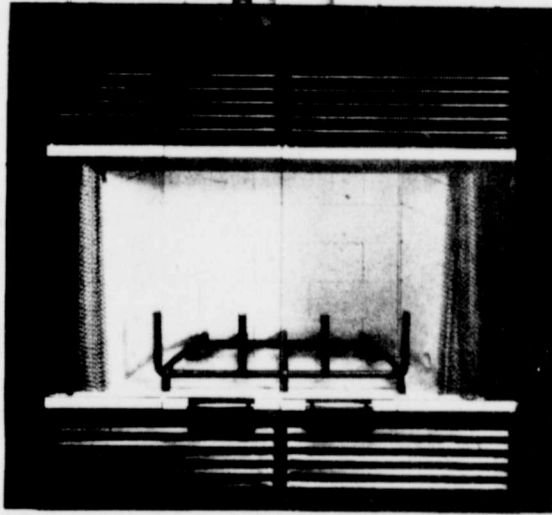

## Reunion Held For Iwo Jima Veterans

Bill White of Bogata attended a reunion on February 15-18 for the survivors of Iwo Jima, a major battle in the Pacific during World War II.

The reunion was held at the Hilton Hotel in Baton Rouge, LA.

While there, Bill met Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Theford of Tarpin Springs, Florida. Vernon is a former Bogata resident and a brother of Mrs. Jack (Mable) Troutt. Vernon's wife, Jessie Lou, is the former Jessie Lou Bond of Bogata. They had an enjoyable visit and saw many other Marine buddies.

Bill obtained a copy of a Japanese message to the Japanese forces right before the Americans captured Saipan. The letter apparently was written to the Japanese forces by General Saitors, Japanese Imperial Army. It reads:

"I am addressing the officers and men of the Imperial Army on Saipan. For more than 20 days since the American Devils attacked the officers, men, and civilian employees of the Imperial Army and Navy on this island have fought well and bravely. Everywhere they have demonstrated the honor and glory of the Imperial Forces.

"I expected that every man would do his duty. Heaven has not given us an opportunity. We have not been able to utilize fully the tension, we have fought in unison up to the present time, but now we have no material with which to fight. Our artillery for attacks has been completely destroyed, our comrades have fallen

one after the other. Despite the bitterness of defeat we pledge 7 lives to repay our country.

"The barbarious attacks of the enemy are being continued even though the enemy has occupied only a corner of Saipan. We are all dying without avail under the violent shelling and bombing. Whether we attack or stay where we are there is only death, however in death there is life.

"We must utilize this opportunity and exault true Japanese manhood. I will advance with those who remain to deliver still another blow to the American Devils, and leave my bones on Saipan as a bulwark of the Pacific.

"As it says in the Senjishen (Battle Ethics), I will never suffer the disgrace of being taken alive and I will offer up the courage of my soul and calmly rejoice in living by the eternal principal."

General Saitos, Japanese Imperial Army, Died 1000, 6 July, 1944

Bill obtained the letter from Josias O. Villarreal of San Antonio, who was in intelligence during World War II.

It demonstrates clearly why the U.S. Forces had such a tremendous time winning against the single-mindedness of the Japanese.

The Americans on Iwo Jima truly deserved the motto engraved on their 45th anniversary reunion program, "Uncommon Valor Was A Common Virtue".

### Three Arrested For Spotlight Deer Hunting

Constable Randy Boren and Game Warden Waters arrested three for "spotlighting" deer near Cunningham on Thursday, February 15.
