### Land Bank **Loans Total** Over 14 Million

Joe Harper, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston reached a Billion Dollars in loans to Texas farmers and ranchers on November 27, 1974. This represents a milestone in service by the Federal Land Bank System to Texas agriculture, and is a 48% increase in mortgage loans outstanding during the past two years. ### 8 Delegates **Attend Farm** Bureau Conv.

The Haskell County Farm-Bureau was represented by 8 delegates to the 41st annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Dec. 1-4 at the Convention Center in Dallas. Some 1,500 persons from all parts of Texas attended.

Policies to guide the state's largest farm organization next year were adopted by the more than 900 voting delegates representing the majority of the 210 organized county units. Also approved were recommendations on national issues. These will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting Jan. 5-9 in New Orleans

Delegates registered Sunday, Dec. 1, before participating in the evening's activities which included a Vesper Service, Discussion Meet and Talent Find.

The Monday morning agenda included addresses by TFB President J. T. (Red) Woodson and Executive Director Warren Newberry A fashion show was featured at a luncheon for ladies that day.

Special conferences were held Monday afternoon on the following subjects: Community Services, Dairy, Wheat and Feed Grains, Rice, Cotton, Young Farmers and Ranchers. and Livestock and Animal Health. In the state finals of the TFB Queen Contest that evening. Miss Glynis Tietjen of Schulenburg was chosen queen over 10 other candidates.

Tuesday's activities included the administrative report by Executive Director Warren Newberry, and the financial report by Secretary-Treasurer Bill Reid of Lamesa and Comptroller Bill McClain of Waco. Conferences were held that afternoon on Research and Education, Services. Farm Labor, Poultry, Natural Resources and Field Crops.

Singer Anita Bryant and the Chuck Bird Orchestra entertained at a special awards and recognition program that evening. The convention business

session began Tuesday afternoon and continued through Wednesday. The last order of business was the election of directors and the president. The president for 1975 is Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart.

### **Argument Leads To Shooting**

An apparent family argument led to the shooting death of Jerry Shelton, 30, of Rochester, last Thursday night according to County Sheriff Garth Garrett.

Garrett was summoned to the home of Lee Roy Jones. father-in-law of Shelton, shortly after 7 p.m. Upon arrival at the home, 14 miles northwest of Haskell, the sheriff was told that Shelton had left and was driving toward Knox City.

After attempting to find Shelton in Knox City, Garrett returned to the Jones home only minutes after the shooting had occured.

Shelton was pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice H. M. Bledsoe of

Jones was charged with murder before Bledsoe who set bond at \$5,000.00. He was released on bond last Thursday evening.

Funeral services for Jerry Shelton, 30, of Rochester, were held at East Side Baptist Church in Haskell at 2 p.m. December 8, 1974 with the Rev. Roland Williams, Rev. Kenneth Blair, and Rev. Jimmy Griffith officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery under the direction of Holden-McCauley Home.

Born January 22, 1944, he had lived in Haskell County all of his life. He was a member of East Side Baptist Church in Haskell.

### **A&M To Conduct Groundwater Quality Study**

COLLEGE STATION-North Texas water resources are being checked by Texas A&M University researchers for pollution.

Dr. Calvin Woods, an environmental engineer. heads a research team that is compiling information on groundwater quality and factors that change it in Haskell. Baylor and Knox Counties.

The Seymour Aquifer, a layer of sand, silt and gravel, supplies water to this area that is located between Abilene and Wichita Falls. It is from 0 to 85 feet deep and generally provides fair quality water while the Permian clays below it contain brackish to salty

TAMU agreed to do the study after county fathers realized the high plains were drying up and the three counties had the potential to become one of the major food and livestock producing areas of the nation. Realizing the emphasis that is presently being placed on world food shortage and increased production community members decided to make every effort to protect the natural resources of their underground water and farm land.

Residents in the area say they are alarmed over salt and nitrate pollution that they feel threatens their economy and future development.

Among other tasks the local officials wish to determine the source of waters in the Seymour Aquifer and determine the sources of increasing chloride contamination in water wells and soils. They also want to verify what harm there is to humans and livestock from drinking water with a high nitrate level over an extended time. They are also concerned with productivity, reproductive and longevity

factors. The Haskell, Baylor and Knox county spokesmen felt that with the advent of shallow oil production in 1956 this area began to experience chloride pollution of its underground water supply. They feel that

pollution has continued to increase until it has reached alarming levels in some area wells. At the same time, nitrate levels have also increased in parts of the area to above acceptable state health

Woods made an initial study that failed to link the oil wells with pollution of the aquifer. It noted pollution directly in the vicinity of poorly plugged wells. The team is now preparing a proposal for a longer, more comprehensive look at the problem.

Team members include representatives from TAMU, Texas Water Development Board, Texas Water Quality Board. Texas State Health Department, Railroad Commission and an advisory committee from the counties involved.


