1959 graduate, Ralph Cawley, sang "One Day At A Time" with everyone joining in on the chorus.

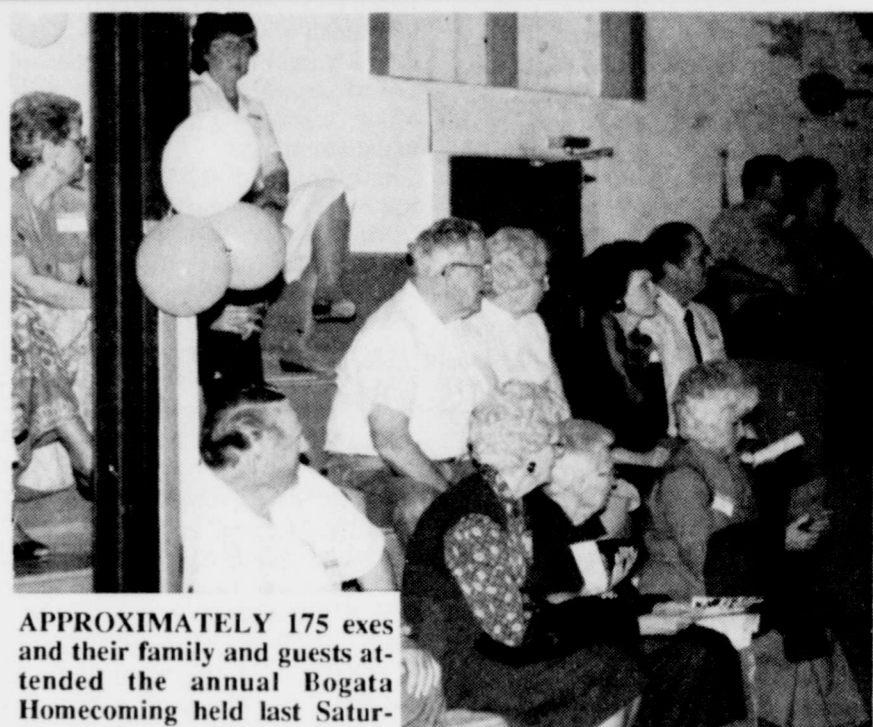
He introduced Gayle Roach as the lady who married one of the hometown guys. Gayle sang "The Old Light House" and "Leave It On My Mind".

"Why Be A Victim" Program Informative

"Why be a Victim" was the subject of the program presented by Buddy Owls from Tyler and Jewel Sullivan from Texarkana. The program was sponsored by the Bogata VFW Post 8187.

An interesting and informative program, the former State Highway Patrolmen spoke at length on ways to prevent becoming a victim of crime.

Ways to avoid robbery, assault theft, rape, murder or burglary were discussed.

With one major crime occurring within the state of Texas every 35 seconds, these precautions make good sense.

They advocated that while travelling vehicles should be checked before entering them, doors should be locked while driving, and one should try to pick only well lighted areas to park. Parking next to vans or similar vehicles which could conceal people was not advised. Valuables should never be left in the glove box, or in plain view on a seat, and no keys should be left in sight. Keeping keys in hand ready to get into the car instead of fumbling for them after getting to the car is poor procedure.

Obviously, never picking up strangers is a major point.

If car troubles occur the troopers advocate getting off the road, raising the hood, and tying a handkerchief on the door or antenna. Flashing lights or sounding the horn to attract attention is an excellent idea if someone

harasses a stranded motorist. Another safety tip was checking the rear view mirror to make sure you aren't followed.

In case of someone trying to force you off the road, don't try to outrun them, they said. Leave the car running and in gear, and stop far enough back so that you can maneuver around someone.

Safety tips at home included: never advertise that you aren't at home by letting newspapers or mail collect.

"All public service people have some kind of identification, often with a picture on it" they stated. Asking for credentials is sound practice.

Don't let strangers use your phone...instead, do the calling for them.

When walking women are urged to walk with the purse under their arm and on a strap. Don't walk alone, and don't take short cuts. Go where people are. If a car should follow a waker, turn and go in the opposite direction since it is not easy to turn a car around.

Active defense is poking in the eyes, kneeling, stamping on feet, head butting, biting, elbowing in ribs, hitting in adam's apple, a hand under the chin or even hair spray directed at the eyes.

Other options include creaming, running, hiding.

With the aid of slides the officers from the Texas Department of Public Safety made the public much more aware of the things they can do to help prevent becoming victims of crime, surely an important subject in today's world.

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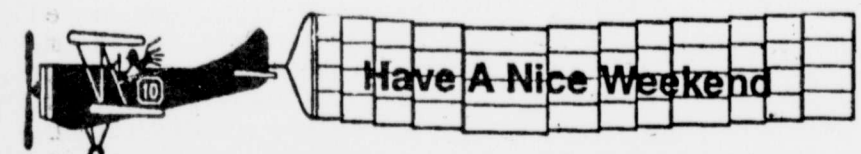

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Delay Pasture Fertilization Until Warmer Weather

Even though some warm season grasses are beginning to show signs of growth, don't fertilize yet, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Overton. "About the middle of April is a good time to begin fertilizing hay meadows and pastures," said Dr. Reeves. "By then, night temperatures should be above 60 degrees and bermudagrasses should really begin to grow." There is still till take a soil test in order to make fertilizer applications more precise thus more economical. Guessing at the fertility needs a hay meadow or pasture can be an expensive gamble. "If broadleaf weeds are a problem, a post-emerge herbicide should be applied before fertilization," Reeves said. "This will prevent growing weeds from using all the nutrients before the bermudagrass gets growing good. Weeds make poor quality forage and take up space, water and nutrients that are needed by the higher quality bermudagrass." "Once the fertilizer to be applied has been determined, shop around for the best prices," Reeves said. "However, the price is not the only factor to consider. The honesty and reliability of the dealer must also be considered. A good job of spreading the fertilizer is very important for uniform production over the entire meadow or pasture."

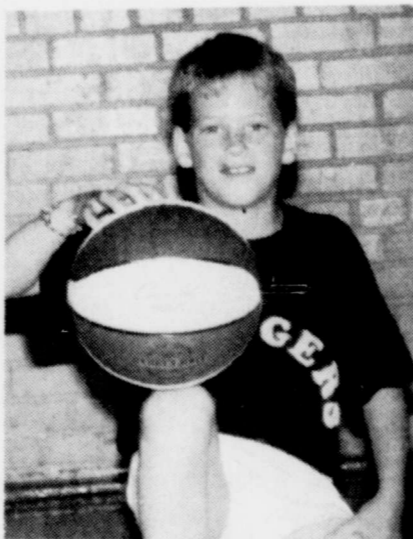

VanDeaver Announces For Water District

Charles L. VanDeaver has announced his candidacy for place #7 on the Red River County Water District. Place #7 represents all of the county precincts 1 and 2. VanDeaver and his wife, Mary Helen, live on their farm about three miles west of Clarksville. They are active members of the First Baptist Church in Clarksville.

VanDeaver was born and raised in the Lone Star and Fulbright areas. After graduating from Fulbright High School, he received both B.S. and Masters degrees from San Houston State University. VanDeaver served two years on active duty in the Army, of which 18 months were in Germany. The candidate was employed by the Soil Conservation Service for more than 33 years of which 19 years were served in a management position. His first 10 years of S.C.S. employment were in Navasota, transferring to Red River County in 1963. During 1967, he worked in Paris and Lamar County. Transferring back to Clarksville, he served as district conservationist from 1967 to 1987.

During his tenure with the Soil Conservation Service, VanDeaver says he helped many people, both rural and in towns with soil and water related problems. During his employment in Lamar County, VanDeaver is proud to say that he started the work on Deport Creek watershed. The dam that protects the City of Deport was later constructed with his help as district conservationist in

Clarksville. "I furnished part of my staff to assist with the engineering survey," VanDeaver stated. "Also the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District was a co-sponsor before engineering and construction funds could be received," he said.

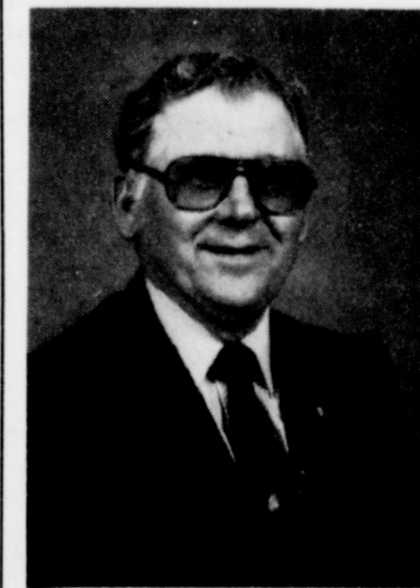
VanDeaver gives credit to Robert Gwin and the original board of directors for the dams on Langford Creek that protect Clarksville and the surrounding area. However, Langford Lake and others were constructed during his employment here. Many individuals and towns have been helped with the Resource Conservation and Development program. VanDeaver says that he was very instrumental in getting this five county RC&D area started in the only one in this part of Texas. He further stated that during some years, this county received over \$300,000.00 on RC&D projects.

During the 1970's VanDeaver served six years as chairman of the Red River County Water Supply Corporation. "I am proud that many families were added to the system and received running water in their homes during my tenure as chairman," VanDeaver said. "It was during that time the system added expensons at Cuthand, Maple, Pine Branch, Rosalie, Johtown, south of Annona, north and south of Avery, Dimple and Negley. It was during this time that we could not furnish enough water and it became necessary to buy Lake Texarkana water."

After his retirement from the SCS in 1987, VanDeaver was appointed to the board of directors of the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. He was re-elected in 1989. VanDeaver is chairman of the Northeast Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, which includes a 10-county area. He also serves on the Red River County salary grievance committee and the agriculture and forestry advisory committee with the Red River County Appraisal District.

VanDeaver has helped with many civic projects having been an active member of the Kiwanis Club for over 20 years and twice past president of the local club.

VanDeaver states that he will be glad to continue working for the people of Red River County if elected to the Red River County Water District Board of Directors.

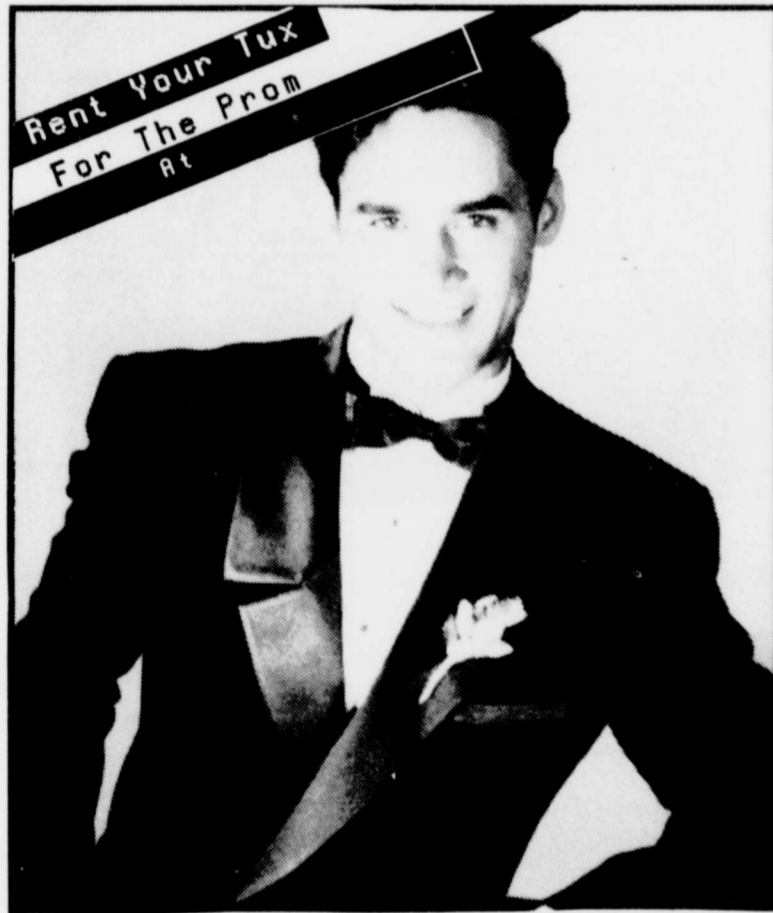

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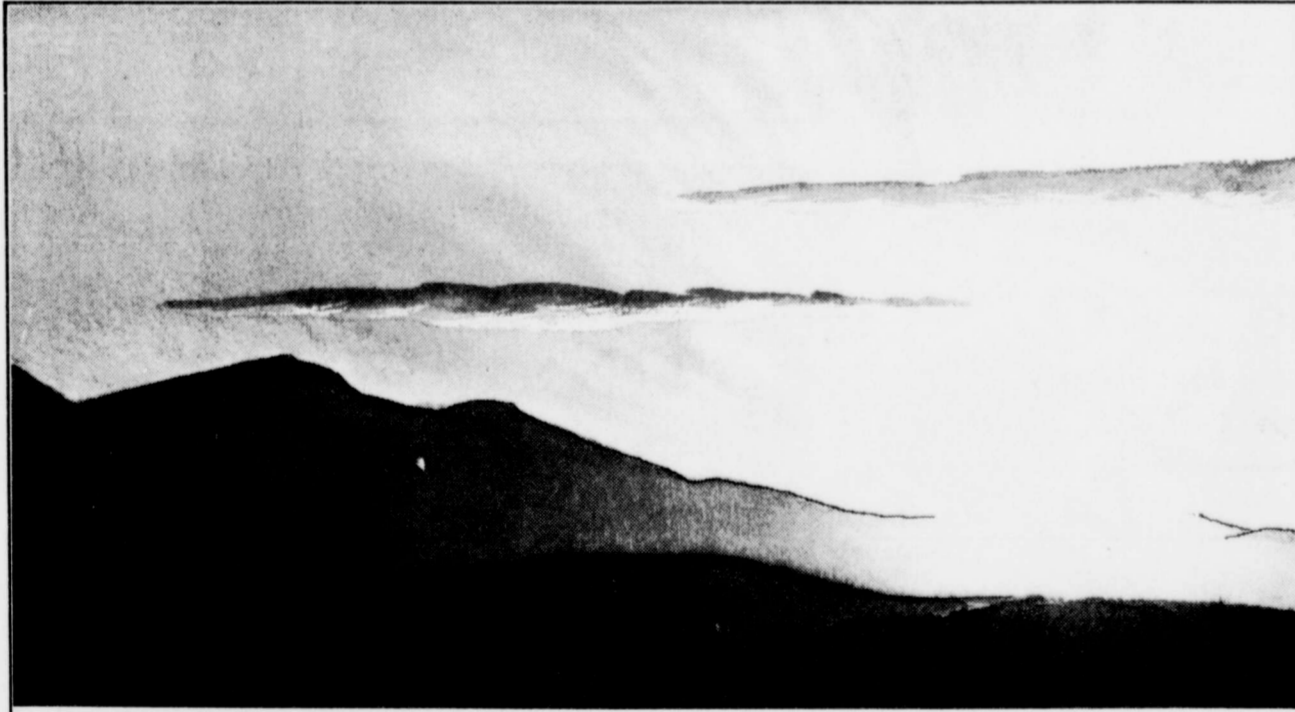
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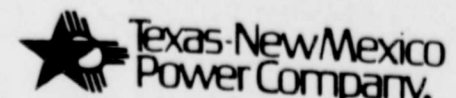
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Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

The girls will play again Monday, April 23. Everyone is invited to come out and support the girls softball and boys baseball teams.

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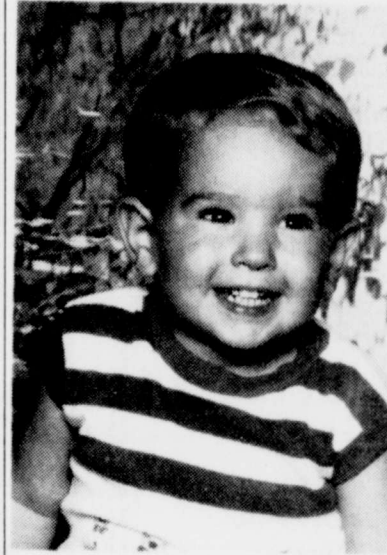

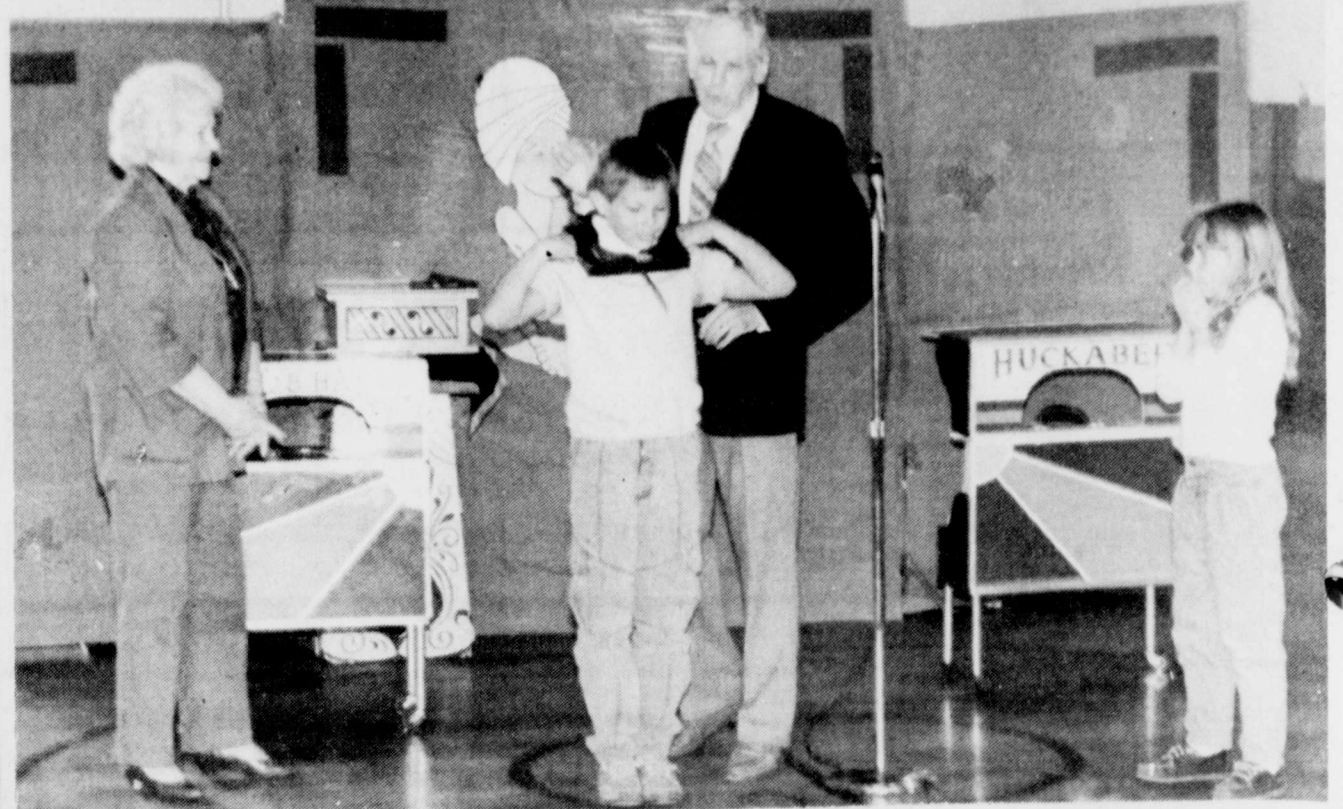
