Well, no, I don't guess that is too good of an idea. It was only a thought.



'Why be a Victim" was the subject of the program presented by Buddy Owls from Tyler and Jewel Sullivan from Texarkana . The program was sponsored by the Bogata VFW Post

An interesting and informative program, the former State Highway Patrolmen spoke at length on ways to prevent becoming a victim of crime.

Ways to avoid robbery, assault theft, rape, murder or burglary were discussed.

With one major crime occurring within the state of Texas every 35 seconds, these precautions make good

sense. They advocated that while trav-

elling vehicles should be checked before entering them, doors should be locked while driving, and one should try to pick only well lighted areas to park. Parking next to vans or similiar vehicles which could conceal people was is not advised. Valuables should never be left in the glove box, or in plain view on a seat, and no keys should be left in sight. Keeping keys in hand ready to get into the car instead of fumbling for them after getting to the car is poor procedure. Obviously, never picking up

strangers is a major point. If car troubles occur the troopers advocate getting off the road, raising the hood, and tying a handcherchief on the door or antenna. Flashing lights

or sounding the horn to attract atten-

tion is an excellent idea if someone

Know who you are talking to on the phone and don't give out personal information or credit card numbers over the phone.

Don't give information out as to who is not at home or when they will be back unless you know the caller, instead, take a message.

The best response, they said, to an obscence phone call is to give no re-

sponse, just hang up. Babysitters should be known, and should know not to open the door. and to give explicate instructions.

Practicing with children on the phone so that they can hear themselves answer the phone properly is an excellent idea.

In case of someone trying to force you off the road, don't try to outrun them, they said. Leave the car running and in gear, and stop far enough back so that you can manuever around someone.

Concerning sexual assault the officers said that it occurs to all ages. There is active, passive, and verbal self defense.

Verbal is to try and talk the assailant out of any action.

Passive defense is to try not to antagonize the assailant, and make him think you are co-operating.

Active defense is poking in the eyes, kneeing, stamping on feet, head butting, biting, elbowing in ribs, hitting in adam's apple, a hand under the chin or even hair spray directed at the eyes.

Other options include creaming, running, hiding.





"Since the Legislature directed us last year to increase contracting to 25% of our routine maintenance budget, we need to attract more bidders to keep the process as competi-tive as possible," said Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver.

Routine maintenance includes just about any kind of work performed on the highway right-of-way, from mowing and picnic-area maintenance to pavement marking and crack sealing. Contracts are awarded throughout the year in all areas of the state.

In the past, each of the department's 24 districts maintained its own list of prospective bidders. When a contract was to be let, the district would notify contractors on the local

The data base will include the types of work each contractor can perform and the areas of the state where each contractor wants to work. When a district office needs bids on a contract proposal, contractors on the statewide bidders list will be notified automatically by

Delay Pasture Fertilization Until Warmer Weather

grasses are beginning to show signs of growth, don't fertilize yet, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Overton.

"About the middle of April is a good time to begin fertilizing hay meadows and pastures," said Dr. Reeves. "By then, night temperatures should be above 60 degrees and bermudagrasses should really begin to grow."

There is still tito take a soil test in ordero make ferilizer applications more precisd thus more economical. Guessing at the fertility needs a hay meadow or pasture can be an expensive gamble.

"If broadleaf weeds are a problem,

Even though some warm season a post-emerge herbicide should be applied before fertilization," Reeves said. "This will prevent growing weeds from using all the nutrients before the bermudagrass gets growing good. Weeds make poor quality forage and take up space, water and nutrients that are needed by the higher quality bermudagrass.'

"Once the fertilizer to be applied has been determined, shop around for the best prices," Reeves said. "However, the price is not the only factor to consider. The honesty and reliability of the dealer must also be considered. A good job of spreading the fertilizer is very important for uniform production over the entire meadow or pasture."



VanDeaver Announces For Water District

Charles L. VanDeaver has announced his candidacy for place #7 on the Red River County Water District. Place #7 repreents all of the county precincts 1 and 2. VanDeaver and his wife, Mary Helen, live on their farm about three miles west of Clarksville. They are active members of the First Baptist Church in Clarksville.

VanDeaver was born and raised in the Lone Star and Fulbright areas. After graduating from Fulbright High School, he received both B.S. and Masters degrees from San Houston State University. VanDeaver served two years on active duty in the Army, of which 18 months were in Germany. The candidate was employed by the Soil Conservation Service for more than 33 years of which 19 years were served in a management position. His first 10 years of S.C.S. employment were in Navasota, transferring to Red River County in 1963. During 1967, he worked in Paris and Lamar County. Transferring back to Clarksville, he served as district conservationist from 1967 to 1987.

During his tenure with the Soil Conservation Service, VanDeaver says he helped many people, both rural and in towns with soil and water related problems. During his employment in Lamar County, Van-Deaver is proud to say that he started the work on Deport Creek watershed. The dam that protects the City of Deport was later constructed with his help as district conservationist in

Clarksville. "I furnished part of my staff to assist with the engineering survey," VanDeaver stated. "Also the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District was a co-sponsor before engineering and construction funds could be received," he

VanDeaver gives credit to Robert Gwin and the original board of directors for the dams on Langford Creek that protect Clarksville and the surrounding area. However, Langford Lake and others were constructed during his employment here. Many individuals and towns have been helped with the Resource Conservation and Development program. VanDeaver says that he was very instrumental in getting this five county RC&D area started in the only one in this part of Texas. He further stated that during some years, this county received over \$300,000.00 on RC&D

During the 1970's VanDeaver served six years as chairman of the Red River County Water Supply Corporation. "I am proud that many families were added to the system and received running water in their homes during my tenure as chairman," VanDeaver said. "It was during that time the system added expensions at Cuthand, Maple, Pine Branch, Rosalie, Johntown, south of Annona, north and south of Avery, Dimple and Negley. It was during this time that we could not furnish enough water and it became neces-

sary to buy Lake Texarkana water." After his retirement from the SCS in 1987, VanDeaver was appointed to the board of directors of the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. He was re-elected in 1989. VanDeaver is chairman of the Northeast Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, which includes a 10-county area. 



Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test vear rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. 
